 A Lee family was injured, including three children who were seriously injured, when the car they were riding in overturned on Monday, Sept. 17. According to a Florida Highway Patrol report, at approximately 7:21 a.m., Travis Hill, 32, was westbound on NE Juniper Drive when he failed to negotiate a curve to the right. The 2000 Lincoln he was driving began to rotate clockwise and struck a dirt embankment. The vehicle overturned three times, coming to a final

rest, facing north on the north side of NE Juniper Drive. Hill and Tristian M. Hill, 14, suffered minor injuries in the wreck. Calvin L. Hill, 16, Kristian A. Hill, 9, and Kayden I. Hill, 9, were seriously injured. The four passengers were all taken to South Georgia Medical Center. FHP Trooper Brian Lundy was the investigating officer. The Lee Volunteer Fire Department, Madison County Sheriff's Office, Madison Fire & Rescue and Madison County EMS assisted at the scene.

Without missing a beat, the former Madison County Cowboy used his God-given ability to do what he's always done well - run. He's like the lovable Forrest Gump who also ran mightily. Making history at Florida State University this past Saturday against Wake Forest, Thompson rushed for 197 yards on just nine carries in the first half. With two touchdown runs - one 74, another 80 yards, he set a rushing record for the most first-half yards for any running back ever at FSU. Take into account that this was the exact match-up a year ago when he fell to a devastating

broken back injury that almost took him out of the game permanently, and the 52-0 win is that much sweeter, not only for him, but for the whole Seminole Nation. Chris Thompson has proven that injuries are just a side-step in life - a side-step that's taking him straight to the top of the game of college football. At 5'8", he is comparable to David who slew Goliath. He's the comeback kid who came back to become the Offensive MVP of Saturday's win against Wake Forest. Thompson's a player to be admired, a down-to-earth person we all can learn from. He's taught every one of us the greatest life lesson - how to run again after adversity, not with a cape or superpowers, but with courage. Great courage! Better Off?

Republican candidates Romney and Ryan and even an odd journalist or two are asking the question Ronald Reagan made famous in the 1980 debate with Jimmy Carter: "Are you better off than you were four years ago?" Let's examine this because it is, to my mind, the essential question for this president, or for that matter, any president who seeks a second term in office.

Let's look at unemployment. When Barack Obama took office, the unemployment rate had climbed to 7.8 percent. He promised that if Congress quickly passed his economic stimulus bill designed to interject \$787 billion into the stumbling economy, unemployment would not exceed 8 percent. Today, unemployment is 8.1 percent. It has been above the magic 8 figure for 43 consecutive months, a modern day record of dubious nature. 23 million Americans of working age are either unemployed or underemployed. The only reason the unemployment rate isn't above 13 percent is because so many American workers have given up and stopped looking for a job.

The economic growth rate stands at a stagnant 1.7 percent which is a really good clue why business owners aren't hiring. Since Obama took office in January 2009, the growth rate has averaged 0.7 percent which hasn't even kept pace with population growth. This economy is, at best, stuck in neutral and it isn't George Bush's fault. As Harry Truman famously said, "the buck stops here." Barack Obama gets the blame.

Since Obama took office, the national debt has climbed 50 percent to more than \$16 trillion. The federal government is spending \$100 billion each month more than it collects. As a result, our credit rating has been downgraded for a second time in less than a year. Obama's answer is to raise taxes. Reread the paragraph immediately

above this one and show me one credible economist who would recommend raising taxes in the current situation. I'll save you the time – there aren't any!

Check out gas prices – they are double today what they were when Obama took office. Diesel, the fuel of business (trucking, farming, construction), is more than \$4/gallon. This is ruinous. I did a rough calculation the other day and figured I buy a little over a thousand gallons of gasoline and diesel every year. The Obama "fuel tax" is costing me over \$2000 a year more than I paid four years ago. Thanks a lot. What's Obama's answer – less drilling and more precious tax dollars wasted on pie-in-the-sky clean/green ideas like solar and wind that defy both the laws of science and economics.

The housing market continues to stumble. This not only negatively affects the net worth of individuals (for most Americans, their home is their single greatest valued asset), it has totally stalled the all-important construction industry. Ask the bankers – the good news is that interest rates are at historic lows; the bad news is that it is very difficult for borrowers to get a construction loan.

To make matters even worse, we're facing two near term crashes that will be very difficult for the financial services industry to absorb – a second wave of mortgage foreclosures and student loans that cannot be repaid because college graduates can't find a decent job.

There is another factor that is wearing down the American people that I haven't heard anyone else discuss – fatigue. When Obama took office, there was a shock factor of the financial system crash in September 2008. The shock factor has worn off as the economy has evolved from recession. What we are feeling now is economic malaise. The economy is going

nowhere in a hurry. When people give up and stop looking for work, you begin to appreciate the impact of economic fatigue.

There are ominous signs on the horizon that threaten to create more economic havoc like burdensome regulations and the heavy hammer of Obamacare beginning in 2014. This creates both uncertainty of how bad the economic impact will be and certainty that costs will increase, a double-edged sword.

The news is not all bad. The bulls are raging in the stock market right now, but I seriously wonder whether or not we're on a "sugar high," fueled by the Federal Reserve buying mortgages and priming the monetary pump. In other words, are the equity markets unrealistically "juiced" and how deep will they plunge when the realities of quantitative easing catch up?

Are we better off than we were four years ago? From my perspective, the answer is a resounding NO. Do I see any policies that Obama advocates on the campaign trail that suggest the economy will turn around in a second Obama administration? Sadly, I don't. From the standpoint of economic understanding and resultant policies, the guy is a loser. Obama might win this election, but the American economy and all of us who believe in it will be the big loser.

Florida Drivers Encouraged To Provide Emergency Contact Information Online

Automobile accidents happen everyday. Over a million lives are taken each year by accidents, and just as many are left with serious or critical injuries. In this difficult time, it's imperative that emergency personnel have current information on who to contact should this unplanned disaster ever occur.

The Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles has created a database to store emergency contact information to be better prepared in this situation. Once the information is entered into the database, whenever law enforcement runs the driver's license, the information given by the license holder will be provided to them.

To enroll, visit www.hsmv.state.fl.us. Near the top of the screen one will see "Handle It Online." Select "Emergency Contact Registration" in the drop-down box and follow the instructions. The driver will be able to submit the names, addresses and telephone numbers for two people they choose to be contacted in the case of an emergency. That information will be stored in a secure protected database with the driver's record or identification card. The driver's personal information is secured and protected by the Driver Privacy Protection Act.

Accidents are never planned and could occur at any time or any place. So register today and be prepared for the unexpected.

"It Was A Dark And Stormy Night" For The Writer

Snoopy always started his novels with this line. I loved reading it in the Peanuts comic strip when I was a kid.

If you've ever wondered where that line came from, here's the answer for you: Snoopy didn't create it; he borrowed it from a novel written in 1830. (The name of Snoopy, by the way, is the name most commonly chosen by dog owners, but that has nothing to do with this story, so we'll move on.)

The novel was titled, "Paul Clifford," and it was a crime story about judicial reform. I had never heard of the novel before working on this story, but my research led me to an interesting fact.

In 1982, the English Department at San Jose State University established a contest for the writer who could create

the worst opening sentence for a novel. It's called the Bulwer-Lytton Fiction Contest, and it is named for the Paul Clifford author, Sir Edward Bulwer-Lytton. He was the author who penned the opening line of "It was a dark and stormy night."

Edward Bulwer-Lytton was born in London in 1803, the youngest of three sons. His father was a general who was assigned by the British government to help defend against a possible invasion by Napoleon. Bulwer-Lytton's mother was an heiress.

Writers enter the Bulwer-Lytton Fiction Contest by writing the worst opening sentence for a possible novel. The winner in 2000 won with this line:

"The heather-encrusted Headlands, veiled in fog as thick as smoke in a crowded pub, hunched precariously over the moors, their rocky elbows slipping off land's end, their bulbous, craggy noses thrust into the

thick foam of the North Sea like bearded old men falling asleep in their pints."

Who would intentionally write such bad prose? Well, who would know more about writing headlines than an advertising executive?

The "winner" was an advertising executive named Gary Dahl of Los Gatos, California (which is also the hometown of Apple co-founder Steve Wozniak, but that has nothing to do with this story, so we'll move on). One of Dahl's claims to fame is that he is the author of the book, "Advertising for Dummies," so he knows a thing or two about good writing.

That can't be the end of this story, can it? No, we're only halfway there.

Gary Dahl invented something that you either watched your kids go crazy over (if you're a senior citizen), or you went crazy over it yourself (if you're a Baby Boomer or a member of Generation X), or you

heard your parents tell you stories about this ridiculous invention that everyone bought back in the mid-1970's (if you're a member of Generation Y or the millennial generation).

Whenever people talk about fads, they inevitably mention Gary Dahl's invention. In fact, whenever people talk about inventions, they often mention the invention that Gary Dahl invented in 1975 – a full 25 years before he won the Bulwer-Lytton Fiction Contest.

His invention was originally conceived as a parody of a dog-training manual.

If that doesn't ring a bell, it's because he refined it until he had a product that people wanted. In fact, Gary Dahl sold more than a million units of his fad, at a profit of \$1.05 each. You can buy a lot of rocks with a million bucks, and that's exactly what he did, because the invention that Gary Dahl created is the Pet Rock.

The Town of Greenville, Florida is applying to the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO) for a grant under the Neighborhood Revitalization Category in the amount of \$600,000 under the Small Cities Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program. For each activity that is proposed, at least 70% of the funds must benefit low and moderate-income persons. The activities, dollar amounts and estimated percentage benefit to low and moderate-income persons for which the Town is applying are as follows:

The proposed CDBG project will include construction of at least one new 75,000 gpd sewage treatment plant module, and related activities to serve all customers within the existing Town Sewer Service Area. The Town Sewer Service Area generally includes the entire corporate boundaries of the Town, and extending south generally running along US Highway 221 South to just south of the interstate 10 Interchange. The proposed new sewage treatment plant improvements will take place at the existing Town sewage treatment plant site, located just east of Highway 221 South and on the south side of Greenville Hills Academy Road.

The percentage benefit to low and moderate income persons from the proposed project activities will be in excess of 70%.

The Town of Greenville has determined that no displacement of persons will occur as a result of planned CDBG funded activities.

A public hearing to provide citizens an opportunity to comment on the application will be held on Tuesday, September 25, 2012, at 6:00 P.M., or as soon as possible thereafter, in the Greenville Town Hall, 154 SW Old Mission Avenue, Greenville, Florida. A draft copy of the application will be available for review at that time. A final copy of the application is anticipated to be submitted to DEO on or before October 1, 2012, and a copy of the final application will be available in the Town Clerk's Office, Town Hall, 154 SW Old Mission Avenue, Greenville, Florida, on Monday through Friday between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. after the anticipated October 1 submittal date. - Other governmental (federal, state and local) assistance to the project in the form of a gift, grant, loan, guarantee, insurance payment, rebate, subsidy, credit, tax benefit, or any other form of direct or indirect benefit by source and amount;
- The identities and pecuniary interests of all developers, contractors, or consultants involved in the application or assistance or in the planning or development of the project or activity;

Frances Ginn Retiring As Tax Collector

Following 38 years in the Tax Collector's office (with eight of them as the tax collector), Frances Ginn is retiring at the end of the year.

Of all the changes she has seen in the office, she said the biggest change was going from typewriters to computers.

"We used to have to type the delinquent tax roll on a manual typewriter and we had to manually verify it," she said. "That was my job."

Hunting and fishing licenses were typed out on electric typewriters in 1974.

"We did tags back then and didn't even capture people's birthdays," she said.

She pointed out that all license plates were issued in the summer back then and so they all had the same expiration date.

"Back then, we only had nine different license plates we had to deal with," she said. "Now, there are about 150 or so."

She pointed out that the office now has to put in much more information than they did in 1974, including different stickers on hunting and fishing licenses.

"The State of Florida has added more things that the tax collector's office must do," Ginn noted.

When Ginn began working for then-Tax Collector Pat Millinor in 1974, the others in the office included the late Brenda Baker (mother of Property Appraiser Leigh Barfield), Christine Millinor (wife of Pat Millinor) and Jackie Williams.

Prior to working at the Tax Collector's office, Ginn had worked at the Department of Agriculture in Tallahassee. A graduate of Greenville High School, she is also a graduate of Lively Vo-Tech in Tallahassee.

Ginn was elected Tax Collector herself in 2004, replacing Wes Kelley, who replaced Millinor in the posi-

tion. Ginn grew up in Greenville, one of five daughters of F.C. (now deceased) and Vera Cone. She also has one brother.

She and her husband, Rickey, have two daughters, Lori Collins and Lisa Newman, and a son, Matthew.

When asked what she will miss about the Tax Collector's office, Ginn replied, "The people. I really enjoy helping and serving people. That's the thing I'm going to miss the most."

Ginn enjoys working with her church, Greenville Baptist. She is the church clerk, a member of the Board of Trustees, sings in the choir, helps in the nursery and works with Team Kids.

In addition, Ginn is a member of the Greenville Woman's Club and the Kiwanis Club in Madison.

She plans to enjoy life with her husband and family and to have more free time during her retirement.

New Beginnings For Madison Garden Club: Ralph Esposito is First Guest Speaker

When the pale white September sun shimmers off Lake Frances across the road, it's a time of new beginnings for several organizations after a summer break, and that includes the Madison Garden Club. Inside the building, golden yellow fall flowers with purple accents looked forward to the cooler autumn months ahead. Next to the podium, a large bear wearing a garland of autumn leaves looked as if he had just wandered in from the nearby woods to see what was going on. The decorations, including the bear, were the work of Catherine Cassidy, who also designed and donated the club's new booklets and name tags for the coming new year.

As the club members arrived and greeted old friends, thoughts naturally turned toward new beginnings in general, particularly the new school year just getting underway for local school children. At the next meeting, the ladies will bring school supplies to be distributed to disadvantaged children, the beginning of a whole new cycle of charitable projects for the year.

"New beginnings" was the theme of the day, along with the need to keep the new beginnings, as well as old traditions, alive and vital by passing along knowledge and values to the next generation. Just this past summer, the club invested in a few of the next generation by providing camp scholarships for three boys to attend 4H Camp and one girl to go to SEEK Camp.

The club also pledged a \$1000 contribution to the Florida Federation of Garden Clubs (FFGC) statewide scholarship endowment fund,

a fund which has felt the impact of the recession. The FFGC awards scholarships to Florida college students in qualifying botanical, horticultural, or other environmentally related studies, helping defray the skyrocketing costs of higher education.

Dolly Ballard, who has spearheaded the Madison Youth Garden

Club at Pinetta for the last three years, will be leading the young gardeners there again this year, helping them grow container plants for entry in the North Florida Fair and teaching them about vegetable gardening in general.

This year, she will also lead a 9-week patriotic music class for Pinetta's third, fourth

and fifth graders, inviting local veterans for the children's final performance, Friday, Nov. 9. Her team members for these projects (most of whom help with both) include: Lura Fine, Laura Coleman, Louanna Forness, Sally Johnson and Esther Decker.

Club President Martha Beggs thanked City Manager Tim Bennett, who was one of several special guests, for helping make the Clubhouse grounds a little nicer by clearing out overgrowth, and a little safer with a security fence and new security lights in the back parking lot. The grounds also have a new irrigation system.

Bennett has also agreed to help the club with their adopted water project for the year: Lake Francis.

Finally, it was time for the special guest pre-

sender, Ralph Esposito of Esposito's Nursery in Tallahassee.

Esposito began working in the nursery business as a senior in high school during the 1970s, because his father said so. As a teenager, he wasn't thrilled by the idea of running a nursery, but as time went by, "It grew on me," he said.

Today, his favorite part of the week is visiting the Esposito greenhouses in Havana to see all the little plants growing week by week until they are big enough to sell.

His business is one that has seen some changes over the years. In the 1970s, he recalls hordes of avid gardeners visiting his nursery. In those days, he used to sell 6000 rose bushes a year. In the last 25 years, however, he doubts he has sold 6000 rose bush-

es total.

Today, though, he feels more optimistic than he did 10 years ago. With the economy in a recession, he is now seeing a lot of young families coming in, wanting to start a garden.

The secret, he says, is to make sure those young families have success, and he encourages their interest by giving a tomato plant to each child who comes in with them. It doesn't matter how many; if they have five kids, they get five free tomato plants.

He is also seeing a growing trend toward organic gardening. People now want to see where their food comes from and know exactly what goes into producing it.

For fall vegetable gardens, now is the time to get started, and typical fall crops in this part of Florida include tomatoes, peppers and eggplants. Tomatoes come in so many different varieties, all with different tastes. He advises gardeners to plant several different kinds to find out which ones they like best. He had brought several varieties with him, all with one thing in common - they were easy to grow and care for.

His collection also included plants for attracting bees (anise hyssop) and butterflies (purple cone flower) as well as plants that were perfect for containers and hanging baskets (cascade petunias, fan flowers, etc.).



MCI/Community Partnership Meeting Discusses Ways To Help Facility And Its Inmates

"My goal is not to let this prison ever, ever be privatized," said Warden Diane Andrews at the regular meeting of the MCI Community Partnership.

The Partnership, begun about three months ago by Deloris Jones, has been holding meetings to discuss ways for the community to help MCI achieve that goal. Andrews also wants to know how MCI can better serve the community of Madison and become a vital part of the community, in a way that goes beyond just being a major employer for the area; so much so, that if state officials ever considered another round of prison closings, including MCI on that list would be "unthinkable."

Already, said Andrews, there had been an amazing outpouring of volunteers from the community in just the short time since she had arrived, including Rev. Barfield who had agreed to teach G.E.D classes and some life-skills classes such as marriage relationships and parenting.

MCI needs even more volunteers to teach life skill classes in anger management as well as such basic daily financial skills as how to balance a checkbook, how to write a check, how to use a debit card and numerous other things people take for granted. The inmates themselves have asked about such things as how to fill out a job application, how to dress for a job interview and how to speak and conduct themselves during the give-and-take of an interview situation.

But more than anything, they wanted "somebody to come out and talk to us about having hope."

Currently, there are inmates in the work camps scheduled to be released soon, "And they need our focus," said Andrews. Many of them come from dysfunctional families, and need to learn how to have hope as well as how to handle inevitable disappointments and bad times.

Another problem is Madison County itself has high unemployment and fewer opportunities than a more urban area might offer. Even much of the farm work is now handled by technology,

with very little hands-on labor required.

Still, the inmates ask about making themselves more employable. Is there some way to document what they have done on work squads? Some way to get certification for the skills they've learned and the quality of work they have produced?

"We've got to have some kind of system where inmates know where to go for help if they can't find a job right away," said Andrews, and with the community's help, she would like to have one set up in the next six months or so. Do they know where the food stamp office is? Do they know how to fill out the application for food stamps? Do they know where the Health Department is? Do they know how to find help in getting housing, if they don't have friends or family to take them in?

Jacksonville has built a Release Center/"clearinghouse" for the kind of information and guidance its newly-released inmates need, but rural Madison County does not have the resources to duplicate that effort.

Octavious Tookes believed that the halfway house concept, where inmates could live at a reduced rate until they got back on their feet, was one of the best ways to go, with staff or volunteers on hand to provide positive reinforcement and guidance for the kind of problems other people don't have to face.

Sheriff Ben Stewart pointed out the need for men's clothing, both for when the inmates are first released and for when they go on job interviews. Some men have families to bring them civilian clothes when they are released, but about half don't. In that case, the prison will provide a set of civilian clothes, but these are such standard issue that everyone knows at a glance that these are newly released inmates. (People and organizations that have good men's clothing to give away can drop them off at the Warden's office in the Administration Building.)

"These guys, when they come out, they have no resources," Stewart continued. "If they don't have access to a computer or a car, it

won't work. We've got to think about basic, basic necessities, or these guys won't make it."

Finally, there is the problem of the inmates being "marked for life." With a prison record, they will always be convicted felons in the eyes of many, and they are very much aware of this. "What do we do about that, Ms. Andrews?" is question the warden hears frequently, but as long as the state of Florida requires that disclosure on job applications for the rest of their lives, it will remain a problem they will have to deal with.

Her own personal opinion, she stated, is that after a period of maybe five or ten years, if the inmate has not broken the law again, that requirement should be dropped. "At some point, society has to say, 'Okay, you've paid your debt.'"

The Partnership Committee will meet again Wednesday, Oct. 19, from 11 a.m. until

noon in the Training Building at MCI. All interested community members and organizations are invited to at-

tend. In the meantime, there was one final request for a couple of basketball nets and some

Revolution Required

Kim Il-Sung began his military and political career when he was a young man living on the Korean Peninsula. A decade later, he was the despot over North Korea. The "Great Leader," as he was named, succeeded in holding power for the next fifty years. He also succeeded in creating one of the most oppressive governments in recent decades, and one of the more closed and oppressive societies in world history.

It did not have to be this way, however, for Il-Sung was not raised as a God-hating, church-destroying, human-rights-violating tyrant. He was raised in a Christian family. His grandfather was a pastor and his father a church elder. But in the misery of his world, Kim Il-Sung turned not to the faith of his fathers; he turned away. Why?

The "Great Leader" answered that question with these words: "Many people believed that they would go to Heaven ...and Jesus would save them from their misery on Earth; faith in Christ would give them a better life ...I thought Christian doctrines were too far off the mark to suit our misery and problems."


Certainly the words of one of the

darkest figures of the twentieth century his words are nuanced, and there are multiple reasons for his turning away from the Christian faith, but this fact remains: He experienced a disconnection between the actual message of the Christian gospel and the sufferings of the world.

Thus, the gospel was judged as too anemic to address life's evils. The result in that country is now evil upon evil, and suffering upon suffering; much of it unnecessarily so, as the trajectory set by Kim Il-Sung could have been much different.

The gospel that Kim Il-Sung heard, and rejected, was a gospel of escapism: "We cannot do anything about the sufferings and injustices of today. Therefore, we will press along until God delivers us by taking us to heaven. Jesus is good for my soul, but he doesn't really concern himself with the things of this world."

Such a gospel should be rejected because it is inaccurate. But sadly, to hear the faith peddled from many pulpits and seen practiced in many churches today, one finds that Christianity has been neutered of its revolutionary power. It has become a



faith that offers people a chance to forget their current pain and suffering (and the suffering of others) for a little while.

It has become in some circles, a help for believers to sleep at night and reminds them that there are just "a few more weary days before we take our heavenly flight," but it does very little to inspire and move people to join God's redeeming mission in the world today. It focuses all of the faithful's attention and energy on the sweet-by-and-by, and leaves only the leftovers for those in this world who cannot afford to wait until tomorrow.

This world can bear much longer a Christian faith that sleeps soundly in the confidence that the faithful will soon be evacuated, for the suffering of this world is too great. There is little time left to bask in the knowledge of our personal salvation

million orphaned children who go to bed each night without a parent; 25,000 who die every day due simply to contaminated water; while 100 million of earth's residents live without a home or permanent shelter; and a million children are trapped in prostitution and sex-slavery.

The love of Christ surely compels us to address these conditions with more than promises of a better eternity; it compels us to serve others today, transforming our society. For living the "Christian life" is nothing short of par-

ticipating in divine transformation.

It is connecting with the world-redeeming, evil-conquering, status-reversing, personal-transforming presence of heaven brought to earth today. It is joining a revolution of love that will change the world – right here, right now – today.

just had a connection with us," Norris said. "I live on a road in Tennessee with 'Chapel' in its name, and a friend of the group who owns Riverbend Campground in Pigeon Forge is a big supporter of gospel music, and this was one of the first places we performed as a group. The campground is located on Henderson 'Chapel Road.'"

The group formed about eight years ago and began in Tennessee with the original lineup consisting of: Kristen Conatser of Ponchatoula, La., Brian Norris of Pigeon Forge, Tenn. (a native of Greenville), and Gary McVay. They spent the first part of their career performing concerts around East Tennessee as their schedule permitted. As time progressed, they felt the time had come to start branching out, but McVay was not able to travel too far from home, so the group asked Jacqueline Townsend of Greenville to fill the vacancy left by McVay.

"As you can see, we all live in three different states, so we travel individually and meet wherever it is we are singing next," Norris stated. "This has probably been one of our bigger challenges, but we've been able to make it work."
