# Arrests Made In Burglaries, Lawn Mower Thefts

Madison County Sheriff Ben Stewart reports that the Sheriff's Office dedicated the Criminal Investigation Division, the Drug Task Force and the Patrol Division, as a highest priority, to focus on the overwhelming number of stolen lawn mowers and ATV type equipment. Sheriff Stewart proudly reports that through this dedication and effort the CID and DTF with the Sheriff's Office has closed several cases involving these thefts. These cases were as a result of several months of investigation that resulted in identifying a large ring of participants involving local and out of county individuals. The investigation, thus far, has resulted in recovering approximately \$50,000.00 worth of property, executed two search warrants and obtaining arrest warrants for the following;

## Health Officials Urge Residents To Avoid Contact With Wild And Stray Animals

Madison health officials urge residents to avoid contact with wild and stray animals to protect themselves from the risk of rabies exposure.

In Florida, raccoons, bats and foxes, and unvaccinated cats are the animals most frequently diagnosed with rabies. Other animals that are at high risk for rabies include skunks, otters, coyotes, bobcats, and stray or unvaccinated dogs and ferrets. Each year, Madison receives reports of rabid animals. Most recently, a fox attacked and bit a man in the area of the City of Madison on Friday, October 19. The remains of the fox have been determined by the Department of Health Laboratory in Jacksonville to have had rabies. While the man has chosen to stay anonymous, he would like to share his advice with the community;

## Teen Injured In Wreck

A 16-year-old was injured in an automobile accident Thursday afternoon, Oct. 25.

According to a Florida Highway Patrol report, Stephen Smithwick, 16, was traveling south on NE Rocky Ford Road, north of NE Persimmon Drive, approaching a curve to the right.

Smithwick swerved the 2000 Honda SUV he was driving slight to the right of the road for unknown reasons. The SUV lost traction in the sugar sand and over-corrected to the left, in an attempt to get back on the road.

The SUV traveled into the oncoming side of the roadway, then over-corrected to the right, traveling across both lanes.

The SUV's front bumper collided with a tree on the west shoulder of the road, coming to a final rest facing west.

Smithwick was taken by Madison County EMS to Madison County Memorial Hospital, where he was treated for minor injuries.

FHP Trooper H. Rothell was the investigating officer.



## Sheriff Responds To Bad Rating In American Rifleman Magazine

Dear NRA Members of Madison County:

In the November American Rifleman Magazine that I received last week there is an article titled "Candidate Endorsements 2012." This article graded me and two other Sheriff's with an "F" grade while most Sheriff's did not get graded at all. I contacted the American Rifleman Magazine to find out how they determined this false grade. They advised me that it was based on the information received from one person, Marion Hammer. Apparently Ms. Hammer is a paid lobbyist for Unified Sportsmen of Florida.

My only contact with Ms. Hammer came in the source of a survey that she sent out to the Florida Sheriffs, State House and Senate Candidates in June of this year. The survey was supposed to determine how candidates stood on issues related to gun rights for citizens. Most of the questions were straight forward however several of the questions were attacks on all Florida Sheriffs. In these questions Ms. Hammer accused all Florida Sheriffs of violating citizens' rights for political reasons, intimidating citizens with uniformed deputies, conducting illegal searches, harassing citizens with Concealed Carry Permits, and intimidating Florida Legislators. The survey also accused the Florida Sheriff's Association of illegally obtaining Concealed Carry Permit information and dispersing it.

In my response to Ms. Hammer's accusations I chose to stand up to her and not "cow tail" from her false statements. Ms.

Hammer obviously then chose to slander me with lies regarding my views of second amendment rights. With that being said I wanted to let you know in writing where I have always stood and will continue to stand regarding gun rights in Madison County.

To name a few, I am a member of the National Rifle Association and believe in the Second Amendment right of citizens to keep and bear firearms. I am a supporter of the Castle Doctrine and strongly advise Madison County citizens to possess a firearm for home and personal protection. ## Vet Vote

In next week's election, a very important constituency is military voters. There are several news reports that indicate military voters are being disenfranchised, perhaps by accident but maybe by design. Let's look at this issue because it is important - no group better understands the price of freedom than our military men and women who volunteer to go into harm's way and put their lives on the line in defense of our nation. As such, they have a very real interest in who the next commander-in-chief will be. The very least we owe them is to make sure they have an opportunity to vote and that their vote counts.

As a rule, military voters are pretty conservative. Young enlisted first-termers tend to represent a cross-section of America in their political leanings. NCOs and officers tend to be more conservative. The culture of the military is conservative in that we value national defense, constitutional law, and patriotism. Over the years of service, these values tend to cement the mindset of those that stay in the military beyond their first term. As military veterans leave the service and join organizations like the American Legion and VFW, their conservatism is more pronounced.

In keeping with the theory of "one man - one vote," where do military people and their families vote? The answer is something called the "home of record." Rather than switch voter registration every time the military member changes assignment, they generally pick a place, possibly their hometown, then establish this location as the home-of-record. They can change this, but most do not.

Let's use me for an example. In 1969, I turned 21 which was the legal voting age back then. I was a cadet attending the United States Air Force Academy in Colorado. My home-of-record was Florida where I had grown up. That summer, when I returned to my hometown of Gainesville, I registered to vote with the supervisor of elections in Alachua County. A few years later, my new wife had the opportunity to register to vote in the same place.

As we traveled around the country and overseas for the next 27 years (12 assignments in six states and three foreign countries), we maintained the same home-of-record. When it came time for an election, we would apply for absentee ballots and vote by mail. Whether or not our votes were counted, I cannot say. The legal system which established this right for our military was World War II era legislation called the Soldiers and Sailors Relief Act. When I retired from the military and we moved to Madison in 1997, we transferred our voter registration from Alachua to Madison County.

Some reports criticize the Pentagon for not pushing voter registration which has led to very few requests for absentee ballots. My experience was that every unit (generally at squadron or battalion level) had an additional duty "voting officer" appointed. At commander's call and on bulletin boards, this information was advertised. When someone came to the voting officer requesting either registration or a ballot, the voting officer had the means and training to apply for the requested information from the individual's home-of-record.

As we know, elections are largely controlled by state law and local officials. Provided that the military member is registered to vote, applies for an absentee ballot, properly executes it, and mails it back in time, his or her vote should be counted. A lot of this depends on timing. From a remote base in Afghanistan, this process may take several weeks. Someday when we get to the process of voting on-line, the timing will be much quicker.

There is a current news report that military voters in several states are being purposefully disenfranchised by state law by unrealistic deadlines. One of those states is New York.

During the 2000 Florida recount, there was a concerted effort by the Gore campaign and Democrats to discount military absentee ballots ... to their shame. One little trick they employed was to throw out ballots which were not date-stamped by a post office. We found out that often on Navy vessels at sea, the ship's post office does not have time to date-stamp mail in order to make deadlines, a perfectly logical reason. As a result of this shameful act, hundreds of military absentee ballots, particularly from heavy military communities like Jacksonville and Pensacola, were discounted. Gore and his minions distrusted the conservatism of military men and women and threw them overboard.

These are some of the issues which surround military voters in next week's election.

"If a wild animal is acting strange, then stay away from it!"

"Rabies is a potentially fatal disease. It is important not to handle wild animals, to be aware of unusual acting animals, and to keep pets vaccinated against rabies," said Kimberly Allbritton, Interim Administrator.

Rabies is transmitted through exposure to the saliva and nervous tissue from a rabid animal through a bite, scratch, or contact with mucous membranes such as the eyes, nose, or mouth. Madison County Health Department works with the County Animal Control Services in responding to incidents of animal bites, tests animals for rabies through the Department of Health state laboratory, and quarantines animals as necessary.

The following are steps you can take to protect yourself and your loved ones against rabies:

Keep rabies vaccinations up to date for all pets.

Keep your pets under direct supervision so they do not come in contact with wild animals. If your pet is bitten by a wild animal, seek veterinary assistance for the animal immediately and contact Madison Animal Control Services at 973-6495.

Call your local animal control agency to remove any stray animals from your neighborhood.

Spay or neuter your pets to help reduce the number of unwanted pets that may not be properly cared for or regularly vaccinated. Do not handle, feed, or unintentionally attract wild animals with open garbage cans or litter.

Never adopt wild animals or bring them into your home.

Teach children never to handle unfamiliar animals, wild or domestic, even if they appear friendly.

Prevent bats from entering living quarters or occupied spaces in homes, churches, schools, and other similar areas, where they might come in contact with people and pets.

Unusual acting animals should be reported to Madison Animal Control Services at 973-6495 for handling. Anyone who is bitten or scratched by wild animals or strays should report the incident to their doctor immediately, as well as Madison Animal Control Services and their local health department. The contact number to report an animal bite to the Madison Health Department is 973-5000. students to become better scholars and young people."



She is truly blessed and is a blessing to her family and friends.



There are few responsibilities greater than overseeing the education of our children, and there are few things we have more in common than the desire to see our children succeed. Regardless of age, wealth, or race, we all share the responsibility of providing children a quality education in a safe and nurturing environment.

Anyone who knows me will tell you that I tell it like it is, and being a candidate for Superintendent of Schools of Madison County doesn't change that. Seeking elected office creates all manner of objections from voters, even from friends and family. This is good. We need to justify our qualifications; we need to explain how successes and failures alike make us the best choice. Having met the state's standards





Dear Jeff:

You are hereby reprimanded for your exercise of poor judgment which led to your citations for Driving Under the Influence and other charges in connection with your driving your vehicle off the roadway during the early morning hours of April 27, 2002. Your actions in operating your vehicle when you were obviously sleep-deprived created a hazard to you and to other motorists, and the aftermath has caused great embarrassment to this office.

Your decision on the morning of April 27 not only reflects a grave error of judgment, but is also indicative of a lack of structure in your life, which has begun to manifest itself in your work habits.

I commend you for your cooperation with the investigating officers, and I acknowledge that without your cooperation and voluntary statement, no citations could likely have been issued.

The period of suspension with pay is terminated, effective immediately. You will be expected to resume normal duties, except court appearances. Those duties may be resumed upon satisfactory resolution of the pending citations.

In addition to your reprimand, you are hereby placed on probation for a period of six months, subject to the following conditions:

1. You are expected to submit to a mental health evaluation to be conducted by a mental health professional approved by the undersigned. The aforesaid mental health professional will include an evaluation of any medication or medications taken by you.
2. You are expected to satisfactorily comply with and complete any treatment or therapy recommended by the approved mental health professional.
3. You are expected to waive the psychotherapist-patient privilege to the extent that the results of your evaluation, treatment and therapy will be orally communicated by the aforesaid mental health professional to the undersigned.
4. You will be expected to observe normal office hours. You are expected to arrive for work at 8:30 AM, and depart no earlier than 5:00 PM.
5. You will not be permitted to take home files or the office computer without the express consent of the Chief Assistant-Lake City Office.

Jeff, you are a truly dedicated prosecutor and you genuinely care about your cases. This is reflected in a large out-pouring of support you have received from fellow professionals in the criminal justice community. I know that this situation has resulted in great embarrassment to you. However, your actions have also embarrassed this office, and me personally. Because I do appreciate your hard work and dedication, I have endeavored to arrive at a resolution that will be fair to all parties, and will address some underlying concerns. If you agree to the resolution outlined in this letter, please sign in the signature block below.

Dear Jeff:

This letter follows my letter to you dated May 7, 2002, and our conversations of May 7 and May 8.

I am hereby directing that you return to work at the Lake City Office at 8:30 AM on Thursday, May 16, 2002, subject to the terms and conditions outlined in my letter of May 7, 2002. If you fail to do so, I will have no alternative but to conclude that you have chosen to terminate your relationship with this office.

Jeff, I can understand and appreciate your anger and your bitterness over this incident and the events that have transpired since your arrest on the morning of April 27. I can understand the fact that you believe that I have not been personally supportive of you during this time. I totally agree with you that the charges against you will almost certainly be resolved in your favor. However, as I have urged you before, please do not allow your anger and bitterness to cause you to make a decision which would not be in your best interests, or in the best interests of this office.

The conditions which I set out in my letter of May 7 are I believe, both reasonable and necessary. The need for such conditions was underscored in our conversation of May 7, wherein a great portion of the conversation was focused on your grievances against a person who is no longer an employee of this office, and against me, for not investigating and prosecuting the persons responsible for your arrest on April 27.

You have related to me that you take medication for anxiety, that you have been diagnosed as suffering from severe stress-induced migraines, for which you take medications, and that you have lost 40 pounds in the last few months. All of these underscore the need for the conditions outlined in my letter of May 7, and the legitimate need of your employer to understand what is happening in your life and what can be done to assist in making your job less stressful. Additionally, I have learned that the estimated quantity of the butalbital and codeine found in your urine indicates a near-toxic level far in excess of therapeutic levels.

I sincerely hope that it is your decision to return to work under the conditions outlined in my letter of May 7, 2002. You are a dedicated and valuable employee of this office, and your presence would be greatly missed. However, the decision is yours.



## Rev. Robert Holmes: Architillery's After-School Program Needs Your Help

It started out as a program for the children of church members, but when word of Architillery Missionary Baptist Church's After School Tutoring Program spread out into the community, other children began attending as well.

"We couldn't turn them away," said Rev. Robert Holmes, of the program that has outgrown its current building and is moving into a bigger one. As the one who heads up the program, Holmes spoke to the Madison Kiwanis Club at their Oct. 25 meeting to tell members about the growing after school program and how the community at large could help with the inevitable growing pains.

Every Wednesday afternoon after school, volunteer tutors gather

with the children for "some good old-fashioned teaching. If you don't work and you don't learn, you don't eat." The program provides food at the end of the evening, so no child goes home hungry.

The program's primary mission for the past seven years has been to help children pass the FCAT test; so far, 99 out of the 101 children tutored by the program have passed.

Holmes, who also taught social studies for 25 years, speaks to the children each week about developing character, continuing their education and becoming productive citizens with good jobs. He credits his father, a railroad worker, with motivating him to stay in school by showing him what a day of hard work on the railroad was like.

He also recounted

his experience in Berkeley, California, of living in an experimental household with some half a dozen people of different races, religions and backgrounds. It wasn't easy, but the experience taught him that most human beings are basically alike, and inspired him to teach others to "Be healers, not brawlers. We have enough conflict in the world."

It is part of what he tries to pass on to the children in the after school program.

The program has also partnered with the Madison Health Department in the past to present a six-month series of programs entitled "It's Okay to Be Me," addressing topics on everything from hygiene to etiquette to peer pressure to decision making, teaching the children that they don't have to "follow the crowd." Being true to themselves and what they believe in is what matters.

"We let the kids know they can do better," said Holmes.

However there are some expenses with the move into the new building to accommodate the number of children the program now reaches. The program needs about \$30,000 to make the building fully operational, purchase additional computers and increase the necessary office space. Holmes presented an appeal for donations to help the after school program with its expansion and make sure it keeps reaching as many children in the community as possible.



## SENIORS CARRY WARRIORS TO 47-7 WIN OVER NORTH BAY HAVEN

Senior running back Bradley Holm gashed his way to 184 yards rushing and three touchdowns, the Warriors rolled up 502 yards of total offense, and Aucilla gained a sorely needed bounce back victory Thursday evening in a 47-7 dismantling of Panama City based North Bay Haven on Senior Night.

Aucilla could have been understandably deflated following a championship game elimination at the hands of Tallahassee rival Maclay in the previous week, but instead the Warriors rode a masterful performance from the senior class which saw 499 yards and seven touchdowns of the Warriors' total coming as direct contributions from senior players.

Appropriately enough, the offensive explosion began at the core of what has powered this Warrior team to a 6-2 record, the rushing attack.

It seemed as if senior running backs Hans Sorensen and Bradley Holm had decided beforehand that the highest yards-per-carry average would win the day, as the duo provided a stellar combined mark of 11 yards per rush. Individually, Holm finished with an astounding 16 yards per carry average, while Sorensen rushed for 7 yards per attempt.

North Bay Haven had no answer for the Aucilla rushing attack, as Warrior backs gouged their way to no less than 11 runs of at least 10 yards, Holm himself having three rushes of at least 20 yards. When the clock finally read triple zero, Aucilla had bowled its way to a season-high 307 yards on the ground.

Head coach Colby Roberts described the night's action, saying, "This is one of the most important victories of the season for our team. After the disappointment of last week's loss, the question was how our senior leaders would respond, whether they would quit or persevere. This was a gut shot win that they will remember."

While the bleeding lead of the offense was clearly centered around the ground game, the passing attack also provided several key plays that served to create a two-dimensional problem for North Bay Haven. Sophomore quarterback Wesley Smyrnios had an efficient night, completing 8-12 of his passes for 201 yards and three touchdowns. Smyrnios had several strong perimeter passes which turned into long gainers as Warrior receivers juked their way to pay dirt.

Smyrnios' lone mistake came on a badly overthrown a deep route that resulted in an intercep-

tion, one of only a handful of positive plays for the Buccaneers.

Pacing the receiving corps was senior Tres Copeland, who caught three passes for 98 yards and two touchdowns, including an electrifying 69 yard instant highlight where Copeland look to be untouchable as he wove in and out of the defense.

Also contributing were seniors Jared Jackson, who hauled in two passes for 41 yards, and Sorensen, who had a 38 yard touchdown reception in the second half.

Leading a hard-charging Warrior defense once again was senior middle linebacker Gus Smyrnios, a glass-eater physical presence that displays a bad attitude when taking ball carriers to the ground. Smyrnios had 14 total tackles, including two tackles for loss and a forced fumble on one of the great hits of the Aucilla season.

Lacking in the loss to Maclay, the Warrior defense was effective in forcing two critical turnovers that served to disrupt any offensive rhythm established by North Bay Haven. Senior linebacker Jared Jackson plucked a Bucc pass for a pick in the second quarter, while sophomore defensive tackle Cole Schwab pounced on a fumble that halted a promising drive late in the third quarter.

Schwab wasn't content with just the fumble, however, as he also added 12 total tackles, including

one tackle for loss.

Fittingly, it was the efforts of several other seniors that also served to stifle the North Bay Haven offense, including linebacker Bradley Holm, who totaled 10 tackles; Jackson, who in addition to the interception had six total tackles, including two tackles for loss; defensive tackle Ryan Rivera, who had three solo tackles, and cornerback Jay Finlayson, who finished with two tackles.

With this victory, the Warriors have now ensured another winning season a year removed from the solidly successful 7-3 opening campaign by head coach Colby Roberts. It is the first time since 1995 that Aucilla has had back-to-back winning seasons, a span of 17 years.

"It is an incredibly humbling experience to be able to bring this level of success back to my alma mater," said Roberts. "Neither I nor my coaching staff can take the credit. The credit belongs to God, without whom none of this would be possible. We aren't satisfied with our record, though. We want to set the bar higher than we did last year."

The Warriors return to action this Friday evening against Rocky Bayou Christian (2-6), who the Warriors defeated by margin of 39-6 a season ago. The contest will begin at 7:00 p.m. at Destin Middle School, 4608 Legendary Marina Drive, Destin, FL.






## Madison County Central School Holds Fire Safety Rally







*“My beloved friends let us continue to love each other since love comes from God. Everyone who loves is born of God and experiences a relationship with God.” 1 John 4:7 The Message Bible*

There has probably not been a time in any of our lives when we were not in some kind of relationship. Before we were ever conceived in our mother’s womb, we were in a relationship with God. His Word tells us that “even before the earth was formed” (I) was on the mind of God. Before we were born, we were in a relationship with our parents by the planting of the seed of our fathers and the connectedness of the umbilical cord to our mothers. Even while safe in the womb our mothers, we experienced numerous types of “mother-child” relationships before we were born, and those “womb-relationships” affect us presently.

From the time of creation, God created and instituted relationships. Thus, the essence of each relationship is a higher purpose beyond companionship, recreation, romance, achieving goals, and the many other reasons people join together. Spiritual relationships teach us of the importance of love, laughter, appreciation, acceptance, forgiveness and compassion. We learn these important aspects of life by interacting .....being in relationships with others; these relationships afford us the opportunity to experience bonding, breaking apart, and rising above petty differences. Spiritual relationships....our relationship with God determines the nature and quality of all of our relationships. When we choose God as the model of our lives, His nature and character should be reflected in every relationship that we are a part of. A spiritual relationship is more than simply attending church on Sundays, praying and meditating together, or calling each other “my sister or my brother” on Sundays or religious gathering. Granted, these practices may enhance spirituality and may even reflect the nature and character of God, but they are not the most important qualities of an authentic spiritual relationship. The real yardstick is how we treat each other on a daily basis in the day to day activities and interactions; what and (Who) does the relationship look like?

In an earlier column, I talked about celebrating our differences. When God created us, He created each of us uniquely and divinely different, and because I do believe that “God does have a sense of humor,” He allows different and sometimes extremely different persons to come into our lives in what we might call “involuntary relationships.” Relationships that are not planned

and we would definitely not want to be a part of. However, God always has a greater plan than ours, and sometimes He allows such a relationship to enter our lives to see just how we will interact with that individual. How much love, patience, or compassion are we able to demonstrate? (He) may have allowed this to be our “involuntary relationship,” but (He) allowed it to be a “divine appointment” for an individual to be saved, delivered, in need of encouragement, or a dire need that would save his physical life. In such a relationship as this, do we miss the opportunity to participate in God’s process or simply decide that the individual should not be in our space?

No matter the type or nature of a relationship, accepting other’s flaws and weaknesses is an act of spiritual love. Judgment is an ego device which divides people. Acceptance is welcoming, heartwarming, and meeting an individual exactly where he/she may be with no conditions. It involves looking beyond a person’s weaknesses to the heart of their strengths. In a relationship, individuals who celebrate and appreciate each other and their contributions to the relationship bond on a deeper level than those who focus on what’s missing or what the weaknesses are. Celebrating their successes and accomplishments, acknowledging through words or actions not only strengthens relationships, but the individuals in those relationships experience deeper emotional and spiritual growth.

Relationships do change, and no one can be in a relationship with you without your permission; in any situation/relationship, choices and alternatives are available. It is a reality that relationships do change, because change is one of the constant things in our lives. Relationships change because people grow and sometimes outgrow the other person; relationships change because people move away, marry, have children, and numerous other reasons. However, it is important to know that if God has allowed individuals to come into our lives for purpose that when that purpose is complete, no matter what changes in that relationship, God’s purpose has been completed. We simply ask ourselves: is the season/reason for this relationship over? Is God’s purpose complete? Is this relationship going to another level or is it time to end? Does this relationship enhance my life or help me to grow to my God-ordained destiny? Am I empowered to become a better person in this relationship? God will give us the answers with regard to beginning or ending a relationship, because He says “acknowledge Him and He will direct our path” and “if we don’t have wisdom(in any situation), ask Him and He will give it to us liberally (freely...abundantly).”

Relationships take on different meanings at different junctures in our lives. When I am weak and spiritually needy, the Word says that I need to be strengthened by my brother; and when that purpose is accomplished, the relationship may move to another level; when I am unlearned and you choose to help educate me and instruct me on how to continually be educated, purpose is achieved; when I have no self-esteem and you teach me that the Word says that I am esteemed through Christ Jesus and that I was on the mind of God before the world was formed...when I believe, embrace, and act on that Word, the purpose in the relationship is accomplished. When we get stuck in what our relationship was rather than constantly watch it grow and evolve, we fail to maximize all of the potential that lies within the relationship and delays our personal destiny. There is no growth without change, and there is minimal growth when we operate within the box. It is paramount that we understand “in the relationship realm” that people who truly know, value, and love you are not threatened by changes that they see happening in a relationship; instead they welcome them and celebrate them with you. ...*Story cont. on Page 5B...*

to move all the names from the 'Pagan' column to the 'Christian' column, they realized it was easier to switch the headings." The Empire gained another tool of domination without changing a thing, and the church lost its unique identity and authenticity.

Thankfully, a growing number of Christians have begun to recognize that there is something suspicious about attaching a national flag to the way of Christ. In fact, it's more than suspicious; it's downright slithery.

For a follower of Jesus to come to such a conclusion does not mean a loss of love for one's nation, but it means these followers will not marginalize the Lordship of Jesus. It is an acknowledgment that the Kingdom of God cannot be brought to earth by the poisonous powers of the world.

John Baptism of water: The act of repentance

Jesus baptism is the second baptism with the Holy Spirit and fire.

(we will chat about this next week)

What does repentance mean? To change one's mind and purpose

To repent we have to make a choice, to decide what is good and evil or let God decide. Genesis 2:17 Amplified Bible, *But of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil and blessing and calamity you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall surely die.*

They made a decision to eat of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil and become like God.

Genesis 3:5-6 Amplified Bible, (Satan speaking) *5 For God knows that in the day you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing the difference between good and evil and blessing and calamity.6 And when the woman saw that the tree was good (suitable, pleasant) for food and that it was delightful to look at, and a tree to be desired in order to make one wise, she took of its fruit and ate; and she gave some also to her husband, and he ate.*

They died spiritually. Now we are born with that spiritual nature as gods to decide what is good and evil for ourselves as Adam and Eve did. God called that a nature of death.

Repentance is giving up on that nature of death and failure. That is why Jesus said he came to bring the good news to the poor, those who are willing to give up on themselves as god.

The test of whether you have repented or not is whether you are seeking the knowledge of good and evil from God or still deciding for yourself. This is a requirement for receiving Jesus baptism and being born again. Going under the water is a symbol of dying to your way of thinking and accepting Gods. If you have not you just got wet and will never be born again in to life according to God.

This scripture is John the Baptist speaking of Jesus:

Matthew 3:11 Amplified Bible, *I indeed baptize you in (with) water because of repentance [that is, because of your changing your minds for the better, heartily amending your ways, with abhorrence of your past sins]. But He Who is coming after me is mightier than I, Whose sandals I am not worthy or fit to take off or carry; He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and with fire.*

That baptism of the Holy Spirit and fire came the day of Pentecost after Jesus had risen form the dead and was sitting next to His Father.


