Madison Man Arrested For Armed Drug Trafficking

Johnny Curtis Bedgood, 46, of Madison, was arraigned on March 6 in federal court following his arrest on charges of drug trafficking

and firearms offenses.

The three-count indictment filed by the U.S. Attorney's Office alleges that on August 16, 2012, Bedgood possessed cocaine and more than 28 grams of crack cocaine with the intent to distribute. The indictment also charges that he possessed a .22 caliber revolver and a nine-millimeter pistol in furtherance of that offense. In addition, Bedgood is alleged to have possessed these firearms after conviction for a felony offense. The indictment was

announced today by Pamela C. Marsh, United States Attorney for the Northern District of Florida.

Bedgood pled not guilty to the charges at his arraignment hearing before United States Magistrate Judge Charles A. Stampelos. Trial is scheduled for May 7, 2013, in U.S. District Court in Tallahassee.

If convicted, Bedgood faces a mandatory minimum term of ten years up to life in prison for the drug offense, a mandatory, consecutive term

of five years in prison for possessing a firearm in furtherance of the drug offense, and a mandatory term of fifteen years in prison for possession of a firearm as a convicted felon.

U.S. Attorney Marsh credited the arrest to the joint efforts of the Madison County Sheriff's Office, the Taylor County Sheriff's Office, the Drug Enforcement Administration, the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives, the United States Marshal's Ser-

vice, and the Florida Department of Law Enforcement.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Michael T. Simpson is prosecuting this case.

An indictment is merely an allegation by a grand jury that a defendant has committed a violation of federal criminal law and is not evidence of guilt. All defendants are presumed innocent and entitled to a fair trial, during which it will be the government's burden to prove guilt beyond a reasonable doubt.

Lee Town Council Discusses Sewer System

At the March 5 Lee Town Council meeting, council members discussed amending the contract with Jordan and Associates, to add a five-month time extension to the CDBG grant for extending sewer hookups to residences in Lee. The contract was set to expire in April, but will now run until September 2013.

Without the extension, the grant money would have to be sent back to the state, and the state would have to figure out how to reallocate the money from the 2009 grant.

Mayor Eddie Bell had asked how many more residents could be persuaded to jump on board during the extra five months. Upon learning that the state would rather have the town of Lee use the money than deal with the headache of deciding what to do with it if it were returned, council members discussed sit-down visits with residents to answer questions and explain the situation more thoroughly, and agreed that the extra five months would give them more time to canvass residents. Currently, about 27 have already agreed to the hook-ups.

"Seems like a no-brainer to me," said Doug McNicol of the time extension, agreeing that the extra time was needed to go knock on doors. "Sooner or later that septic tank will go bad, and the health department is going to say 'You can't fix it.'"

The council voted unanimously in favor of the five-month extension.

Next up, the Council considered a request from the Florida League of Cities that the town sign a proclamation April 17 for "Military Family and Community

School Board Taking Positive Steps

Just turning off the lights can save a whole slew of money.

That was the theme of Clara Floyd's enthusiastic report to the March 5 School Board meeting, where she gave a power point presentation of charts and graphs showing board members just how much the district had managed to save on energy costs in just the two and a half years it had been using the cost savings program.

Since September of 2010, when Floyd first began her energy education program, getting faculty and staff on board to turn off any and all lights, computer monitors, etc., when they were not in use, as

well as look for examples of energy waste that could be corrected, the school district has avoided \$587,532 in energy costs. The reduction also meant preventing 2825 metric tons of carbon dioxide emissions, which was equivalent to removing 705 automobiles from the equation for those two and a half years. In another two and a half years, Floyd hopes to find even more ways to cut costs for the district, because when the program's five years are up, the district will have to decide whether or not to continue with the it. She praised the staff of all the schools in the district, saying that the program was mostly staff-based, and depended on their willingness

to help.

She also spoke of ways to further reduce costs in the future, such as exploring the possibility of holding community events in the central school cafeteria as opposed to the high school cafeteria, because the high school cafeteria

could not be heated and cooled separately from the rest of the school, as could the MCCS cafeteria.

Floyd will bring another update on the energy savings in six months time.

"I certainly appreciate employees who are

passionate about their job," said Superintendent Doug Brown.

Another important item was the board's documented approval of the charter school, James Madison Preparatory High School. The charter committee had to have a signed docu-

ment from Superintendent Brown, attesting to the fact that it was a public charter school, not a private one, in order for the school to apply for grant money from the

U.S. Department of Education, and Brown had



AGM-114

I like to use short, catchy titles to get the reader's attention, so I was tempted (good word for Lent) to use the title "hellfire" which is the nickname for the AGM-114 missile, but I thought my editor might wince at that headline. With that introduction, let me tell you a little about the Hellfire missile and how it is the story behind the story in current news.

AGM is a military acronym for air-to-ground missile. The AGM-114 or Hellfire was developed by the Army in the mid-1970s as a small, anti-armor missile which could be employed from attack helicopters to attack Soviet tanks. The Cobra or Apache helicopter would pop-up from behind a ridge within a few miles of the target, quickly fire the missile, and duck back out of sight using terrain masking. The Hellfire has launch-and-leave capability, meaning that once the seeker is locked on to the target, guidance is internal, allowing the attacker to duck out of the line of fire and live to fight again.

Because it was designed to be carried on a helicopter, the Hellfire isn't very big. It's about 5 feet long, 7 inches in diameter and weighs roughly 100 pounds. There are basically three components: a guidance seeker using laser technology; a 20 pound warhead; and a rocket motor that boosts the missile to above the speed of sound. The Hellfire might be small, but it packs quite a punch; the combination of warhead blast and kinetic energy upon impact will tear apart most every target, even those that are armored.

And it's cheap at \$68K a copy. That might sound like a lot of money to most of us, but given the expense of

military research and development, it's pretty cheap for a PGM — precision guided munition. How precise? I imagine the CEP (circular error probable where half of all shots hit) is within a couple of feet from as far away as five miles. When you strike that closely to an aim point with a high explosive warhead of that size moving at Mach 1+, it is an almost certain kill.

The Army conducted much of the early testing of the Hellfire on the Eglin AFB ranges in West Florida, probably because of its proximity to their aviation school at Fort Rucker near Dothan, Alabama. In fact in the late 1980s, I taught my daughter how to drive on the Hellfire range ... when it wasn't in use.

So, what has this innocuous little missile got to do with the current news? The Hellfire is the missile that is launched from the MQ-1 Predator UAV (unmanned aerial vehicle or drone) that you hear so much about. The Predator carries as many as four AGM-114 Hellfire missiles under the wing. Many miles away, a sensor operator working alongside the pilot at a console can lock the Hellfire's seeker on to a target, launch, and blow it away. An old Air Force buddy by the name of Johnny Jumper was responsible in the aftermath of 9/11 for arming the Predator and turning a reconnaissance drone into an attacker.

This Predator-Hellfire combination is the weapon system that is being used so effectively for targeted assassinations against terrorist leaders. Al-Qaeda elements in South Asia, the Middle East, and North Africa are positively terrified by drone strikes from this weapon system. The Predator flies

so high and so quietly that the target has no idea they are in the crosshairs until the missile hits ... too late.

Of course, the target is dead so there is no one to capture and interrogate, but since the Obama Administration doesn't want to engage in such "dirty work," the Predator-Hellfire combination is perfect for their needs.

The question has come up recently, if the president can order the assassination of an American citizen conducting terrorist activities overseas which is apparently legal, can he do the same within the borders of the United States? That is what Kentucky Senator Rand Paul wanted to know from the Administration. When the answer was muddled and slow to develop, Paul took to the Senate floor to engage in an old-fashioned filibuster of the president's nominee to head the CIA.

What senators like Rand Paul and Ted Cruz are concerned about is a clause in the Fifth Amendment to the Constitution, part of what we call the Bill of Rights. That clause simply reads that an American citizen cannot "be deprived of life, liberty, or property without due process of law." Only courts with judges and juries can do this. Of course, if the citizen is actively engaged in a hostile act like shooting someone or something, law enforcement has the right to shoot back and kill, if necessary, but absent that, we are all protected by the Constitution. Such was the genius of our namesake, James Madison.

Covenant Day.”

Since April 17 falls on a Wednesday, when many people would be working and involved in church activities after work, there were questions as to what kind of event a community the size of Lee could stage in midweek, as well as whether it would be better to do the signing during Lee Day, which falls on the previous Saturday (April 13). Doug McNicol also pointed out that Lee already did a pretty good job showing support to veterans and military families without having to sign anything. The Council voted 4-1 in favor of the signing in conjunction with Lee Day, when a lot of people would be in town. The Council also approved a funding request from the Lee Volunteer Fire Department for extra expenses related to Lee Day.

A request from the Tax Doctor to hold a customer appreciation event in Lee was tabled until the next meeting, because the business owner, Meshalene Love-Taylor, was not present.

The Council voted to adopt a resolution supporting the Consultants Competitive Resolution Act, and City Manager Sarah Anderson announced that since the Dept. of Children and Families had closed its Madison office, there was now a dedicated laptop that local residents who needed food stamps and other assistance could use at Lee Town Hall. Since these families often lacked transportation to out of county location, Anderson said it was a needed service for Lee residents, and expects it to be used by about five people a month, which would not impose a great burden on the town hall. The rest of the time, the laptop would be safely locked away.

In other items, the town of Lee has put in a request with the postal service to have the Annett Bus Line address located in Lee. The business was assigned a Madison post office address, even though it operates mainly in Lee.

By Friday, March 8, broadband capability will be coming to Lee, and Thursday, April 11, the town will be hosting the Suwannee River Water Management District meeting at Divine Events.

Finally, in order to comply with a new regulation that requires town water be tested every day for chlorine level rather than Monday through Friday, the Council approved a new work schedule for the Public Works department that would accommodate the requirement without incurring overtime expense for city employees.

The council then adjourned the meeting.



In ancient Jerusalem there was a pool of water called Bethesda. The location served as an impromptu hospital ward, a collection point for the sick, blind and paralyzed. These infirmed went to Bethesda to receive a hoped for healing – not from a physician – but from the therapeutic waters themselves.

Back then it was a common belief that an angel came from heaven at certain times and “stirred up the water” of Bethesda’s pool, resulting in miraculous healing for anyone who could get in the water. They didn’t take this stirring as natural warm springs, percolating mineral water or air escaping the limestone aquifer. They believed it was a divine intervention.

In the New Testament gospels, Jesus makes a visit to Bethesda and finds a lame man lying alongside Bethesda’s waters. Jesus doesn’t drag him over to the pool and dunk him. He simply heals him. Then, he gives the now-made-well man excruciatingly practical instructions: “Pick up your mat and walk.” This wasn’t to get the man’s bed out of the way. Jesus was saying, “Get it out of here so that you won’t come back to it!”

This former invalid, the best we can tell from the gospels, had been coming to Bethesda for the better part of four decades. That is a long time to waste lying alongside a bubbling brook. And now that he was empowered to live a better, healthier life, it would be easy for him to fall back into old habits. Jesus wanted this stretcher removed so that the man would not have the temptation to return to it.

This olden story of faith predates today’s advances in neuroscience by centuries, but Jesus already knew what researches have confirmed in recent decades: When habits are formed, the brain actually changes. Routines – good or bad – cause neurons in the brain to alter their patterns. So in the process of breaking a habit, the brain must also be “rewired” to not only change a per-

son’s behavior, but to change the firing of synapses inside his head.

Recent studies also show, that if a person returns to their former habits, the brain returns to its former patterns as well. But every addict and Al-Anon participant already knows this. We will return to the things that hurt us, again and again, and again and again. Body and spirit will slide right back to where we once were.

If we want sustained change for our lives, if we want to be whole, redeemed, complete, reinvigorated people, then yes, we must admit our powerlessness to be well on our own, and at the end of ourselves collapse into grace. But as important as this first step is, here is another: If we are going to live out this transformation, there must be a grace-infused commitment, not to return to those ways, habits, persons, lifestyles, and behaviors that will only take us back to the unhealthy way of life we knew before.

The door to the past has to be slammed shut. Obstacles have to be put in the way to keep us from returning to old ways of thinking and old ways of acting. Spiritual reprogramming and rewiring has to take place. That is why Jesus told this man to ...*Story cont. on Page 5B...*

get his mat and get out, because that was the only way he could remove himself from this dead-end, superstitious pool-sitting that would only enslave him, not heal him.


