

ATV Driver Killed

The Madison County Sheriff's Office and Madison County first responders and EMS responded to a scene in Taylor County when the driver of a four-wheeler died in an accident on Friday, March 29.

According to a Florida Highway Patrol report, Kearney C. Renwick, 43, was westbound on a 2004 Honda ATV on West Boundary Road. For unknown reasons, he failed to maintain a single lane and left the roadway onto the north shoulder.

The ATV overturned an unknown number of times and Renwick was ejected.

Renwick came to a final rest, facing northwest, upside down.

Friends found Renwick at approximately 10:15 a.m.

Renwick was taken to Madison County Memorial Hospital, where he died.

FHP Sgt. Aaron B. Stephens was the investigating officer.

Two Killed; Four Injured



Good Friday morning, March 29, turned tragic as a mother and her daughter were killed and four people were injured (including three critically) in an accident on State Road 14, one-quarter mile south of Moseley Hall Road.

Phil and Angela Castelucci, former owners of Fat Daddy's Restaurant in Madison, were the first to arrive at the scene of the crash. Justin Buchanan, a part-time employee, was the next on the scene and he was able to begin assisting the survivors.

According to a Florida Highway Patrol report, Jakourtney Davis, 19, was driving north on SR 14 in a 2004 Pontiac Grand Prix. For an unknown reason, he swerved the car towards the west shoulder and cross over the southbound lane.

After leaving the roadway, the car began to turn clockwise, sliding in a westerly direction and overturning

onto its passenger side before striking a large tree with its roof. The impact caused the Grand Prix to rotate in a counterclockwise direction and come to final rest, facing east in the wood line of SR 14.

All four rear passengers were ejected from

the car when it made impact with the tree.

Davis, 19, and Tina Hopkins, 41, both of Perry, were trapped inside the car.

Paramedic Tika Brannon pronounced Davis dead at 11:33 a.m. She also pronounced Hopkins dead at 11:40

a.m.

Seventeen-year-old Na'Casey Freeman, of Perry, was seriously injured in the accident.

The following, all of Perry, were critically injured: Tamika Welch, 21, Tra'Shawn White, 8 and Charlene Hayes, 59, all were critically injured.

FHP was assisted at the scene by the New Home Volunteer Fire Department, Madison Fire Rescue, Madison County EMS and the Madison County Sheriff's Office.

FHP Trooper C. Powers was the investigating officer.

Man Arrested After Currency and Pills Seized

A man was arrested after a large amount of pills were found in his vehicle. Cash was also seized from him.

Madison County Sheriff Ben Stewart reports that on Saturday, March 30, Sergeant Doug Haskell conducted traffic stop on a 2013 Nissan Sedan for speeding. Vernon Terrell Lodman, 23, of Quincy, was

Upon walking up to the vehicle, Sergeant

Haskell detected the odor of marijuana coming from inside the Nissan. While taking enforcement action for the speeding violation, Sergeant Haskell requested consent to search the vehicle and Lodman agreed and granted consent.

During the search of the trunk area, Sergeant Haskell located a black

nylon bag, which contained a vacuum-sealed plastic bag that contained 465 Clorazedate pills with another plastic bag that contained a large amount of U.S. Currency. Clorazedate is a schedule (4) controlled substance and Lodman claimed ownership of the black nylon bag but not the pills or currency located inside the nylon

bag. Further search of the driver located a plastic bag containing Marijuana concealed inside of Lodman's shoe. Lodman was placed under arrest without incident and transported to the Madison County Jail. The pills, marijuana and currency were seized.

DID YOU KNOW.....?

For me "organic" meant over-priced, blemished fruits and veggies. I certainly didn't understand why anyone would pay extra for what I thought must be subpar produce. Of course, I had never seen an organic apple at that time - I just believed they would be full of worms, since no pesticides were used. Later, after I'd actually gone into a store that sold organic produce, and found my first organic apple to not only be blemish free, but also to be the tastiest apple I had ever had in my life, the word "organic" took on a new meaning for me. Now it meant tastier food, and it also took on the pastoral meaning of the traditional family farm - the type of mixed farm we read about in our first-grade readers.

Organic food now means food grown without chemical pesticides, herbicides, fungicides, and organic animals are fed organic feed, and are antibiotic and hormone-free, but originally the word "organic" meant much more than that - a communal bond that was trying to change the relationship people had with the planet in order to save it. The organic movement was born in the late 60s as a protest against the collective - anything industrial and centrist. The California hippies at the time were environmentalists who wanted to create that one-on-one connection with the earth, and to grow healthy food in a cooperative, "more gentle on the earth" way that wasn't contaminated by the industrial, collective, "conquest of nature" system. Living organically was a political act based upon three ideals: chemical-free farms (how food was grown), anti-capitalist food co-ops (how food was distributed), and "counter cuisine" or "brown food" (brown rice, brown bread etc.) which was pitted against the "white foods" created by industrial agriculture.

In nature, plants and animals are symbiotic. Animals poop on the plants which nourishes the soil that the plants need to grow, that the animals eat. It is a closed system that replenishes itself, and is therefore sustainable. So, mixed farms actually work quite well. But is the organic food we buy in the supermarket actually coming from these mixed farms we imagine in our heads, and does it fit the ideals of the originators of the organic movement?

I think unfortunately, a lot has been lost. Over the last 40 years the growth in organic food has been tremendous, the word "organic" now representing an 11 billion-dollar-a-year industry. With the demand for organic food being so big, suddenly organic food is being shipped thousands of miles from where it was grown, using lots of fuel for its transport. Organic farms have grown in size to handle the demand, meaning they have needed to adopt many of the industrial agriculture methods in order

to process the food. Sure, the food is grown without chemicals, but heavy machinery is needed to pick, wash and package all those organic mixed leafy greens or organic baby carrots we see at the grocery store. Organic beef is probably fed organic corn, and an organic cow will get just as sick on organic corn as a conventional cow will on conventional corn. So, we have organic factory farms which are indeed feeding their animals organic feed, but not the animals' natural diet, putting out organic beef, milk, chicken and eggs. But now, the farmer can't use drugs to keep the animals healthy. The organic food movement has become industrialized in order to handle demand. Also, processed organic food uses the word "organic" to denote something healthy, but organic ketchup made with organic high fructose corn syrup is just as unhealthy conventional products.

And what do the words organic "free-range" mean when it comes to chicken and eggs? The words conjure up the idea of happy chickens running about outside in the grass, pecking out grubs - being a chicken! 20,000 chickens live together in huge sheds. They are not in battery cages, but still live in pretty cramped quarters due to the number of chickens and the space available to them. Along the side of the shed is a grassy yard that the chickens can explore should they wish, but apparently because the door to the outdoors is shut for their first five weeks, they never bother going outside during the last two weeks of their life. But the farmer can put "free range" on the label because that option is available to the chickens for the last quarter of their life. The chickens eat the organic feed that is in trays above the ground in the sheds. So much for "free-range" chicken and eggs - seems a bit of a scam to me! I have yet to see "pasture fed" on milk, cream, yogurt, cheese or butter in my grocery store, so one must assume it is grain fed, even if it is organic.

So the organic movement, brimming with the ideals of the late 60s has turned into industrial organic, a method of farming that closely resembles that of conventional industrial agriculture. Ideals have fallen by the wayside, since the farming and distribution methods are essentially the same. Industrial organic is probably slightly better than conventional farming due to the lack of pesticides and chemical fertilizers, which would not only produce a less toxic, potentially healthier food, but would also do much more to preserve the soils and protect the streams from chemical run-off. But is that good enough? When it comes to meat, poultry, eggs and dairy, is the food healthy enough to provide us with the nutrition we need? Is this the food system we should be supporting with our hard-earned dollars?

Operation Linebacker

If you're a regular viewer of CBS' reality series "Survivor," you know that the current program is being filmed in Vietnam. The show raised the ire of many last week when the contestants visited a war memorial in Hanoi to look for a clue. The war memorial was the wreckage of an American B-52, shot down in December 1972 where two airmen died. Apparently, the program showed little if any regard or reverence for the sacrifice of two American patriots for their country.

The next week, the show and their parent company apologized for their cavalier approach to veterans and those of us who served in Vietnam, in particular. The incident took my memory back to an earlier time four decades ago. It was the spring of 1972 and I was flying combat missions from DaNang Air Base, South Vietnam. In early May, we received the orders to "take the gloves off" and go after the North Vietnamese who had escalated the war by ignoring a cease-fire and invading South Vietnam in late March.

The air offensive was code-named Operation Linebacker and would continue unabated for the next five months. Our targets were key combat infrastructure points that the north used to move war materials to their troops in the south. This included railroads, truck parks, bridges, ferries, airfields, communications, etc. These and the north in general had been off-limits to our airpower since 1968. In that four year hiatus, the North Vietnamese had built up their defensive infrastructure of fighters, missiles, guns and radars so that flying north was much more difficult and hazardous.

My squadron (35th TFS Panthers) was permanently based in Korea and filled with very experienced pilots. Our commander only sent highly experienced crews on Linebacker missions because they were more demanding and dangerous than normal combat flying. The pilot I was crewed with was a North Carolinian named Charlie Cox. Charlie was my flight commander; had a previous combat tour; more than 2000 hours in the Phantom; and was a Fighter Weapons School graduate. In fact, we had eight weapons school grads in the 35th, which might be a record.

Linebacker missions were complicated affairs requiring as many as a hundred or more aircraft flying from as many as five different bases. Most were fighters like the F-4 my unit flew, but there were also air refueling tankers; electronic combat aircraft; airborne weapons controllers; etc. Standing by on alert were rescue helicopters and their escorts in the case of an aircraft loss which frequently occurred.

On one mission I recall, there were 12 flights of four (48) fighters just from our base, not counting support aircraft. I'm sure there were more than 200 aircraft scheduled for that mission. At Korat (the second base we flew from), we had a single taxiway and runway. Anyone with either steering or brake problems was instructed to taxi off the taxiway into the dirt to keep the traffic flow moving.

These missions were flown over long distances and involved flying between three to five hours depending on the route. Since we couldn't carry that much fuel, we nearly always refueled before entering North Vietnamese airspace and

tapped the tanker upon exit before returning home. The tanker we used was the KC-135 (same design as the old Boeing 707) which incidentally, is still being used by the Air Force.

I have no idea how many Linebacker missions I flew that summer. Of my 121 combat missions, 43 were flown over North Vietnam, but not all of those were in support of Operation Linebacker. All the remainder were flown over South Vietnam, generally close air support (CAS) missions. In my six month tour, I didn't fly against any targets in either Laos or Cambodia, although we often overflew those inland countries transiting to and from our base in Thailand.

In early October 1972, National Security Advisor Henry Kissinger was sure he had a peace accord with all parties. The Linebacker missions were halted and my squadron deployed back to our home base in Korea. It had been more than six months since we deployed. Then the deal fell through. Two months later, Linebacker II began in mid-December, but this was much more intense. Now, B-52 bombers went north to join the fighters in taking the air war to the North Vietnamese.

The campaign lasted only 11 days but did the trick. Fifteen B-52s were shot down including the one that Survivor visited, but the bombers packed quite a wallop. At the end of the Linebacker II, the north was literally defenseless. They ran back to the bargaining table to beg for peace and an end to hostilities. We had to wonder - if President Johnson had done this seven years earlier in 1965, how many lives and tragedy on both sides would have been avoided?

Wally Davis Of National Wild Turkey Federation Speaks To Kiwanis

The wildlife conservation movement has been around for several decades, at least as far back as the 1937 Pittman Robinson Federal Aid Wildlife Restoration. Prior to this, several species of wildlife in North America had been driven to the brink of extinction by over-hunting or loss of habitat.

The 1937 Act, signed by President Roosevelt, took an existing excise tax on firearms and ammunition, redirecting it to the U.S. Department of the Interior for wildlife conservation and management. Federal monies, combined with matching state contributions enabled endangered game populations to recover and other wild game species to expand their ranges. The money also funded research projects, hunter training and habitat management and improvement. Expanded hunting opportunities have a positive impact on regional economies and stimulate eco-tourism-related enterprises.

A number of private non-profit organizations have come into being since then and partnered with various state, federal and provincial wildlife agencies to further the important work of wildlife conservation and habitat management. Perhaps one of the most familiar to many is the National Wild Turkey Federation, the largest conservation organization in North America. Since its beginning in Edgefield, S.C., in 1973, it has grown to a nationwide organization with local chapters in every state, as well as in Canada.

Wally Davis, representing the NWTf in the Madison, spoke to Kiwanis about what the organization has meant and continues to mean to Madison County and the state of Florida, where it has 55 chapters and 8,690 members. While some people see game animals as a nuisance, many other recognize them as a part of the ecosystem around us – a natural resource, and a part of the outdoors experience. Davis describes seeing his first deer at age 18, and his first wild turkey at age 21, and watching a new day breaking in a forest. "I'm fortunate and I'm blessed to have witnessed that hundreds of times."

"You don't have to be a hunter to enjoy wildlife," he told the club members. "Many in our organization don't hunt...in fact, less than three percent of Florida residents hunt."

NWTF is not solely about hunting, he added. "It's also about protecting and managing what we've been blessed with."

The organization is sportsmen, women and children from all walks of life who cherish North America's hunting heritage, its natural resources and its wild, open spaces.

According to many state and federal agencies, the restoration of the wild turkey population is probably the greatest success story in North America's conservation history. Since its founding, the NWTf and its members have spent more than \$400 million to conserve more than 17 million acres of habitat, an area larger than the state of Virginia, and helped restore wild turkey populations throughout North America. Other species have also benefited from the habitat conservation and improvement, including quail, grouse,

pheasant, deer and several species of songbirds.

The organization also brings in about 100,000 new hunters and conservationists each year through outdoor education events, Women in the Outdoors, Wheelin' Sportsmen and JAKES (Junior Acquiring Knowledge and Ethics) youth outreach programs.

The JAKES events are for young people 17 and under, and include shooting events such as archery and B.B. guns. It is free for all participants and is a great way to introduce kids to the outdoors and show them that there's more to life than video games.

The local chapter also coordinates with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Agency to have three paid biologists on staff who can help landowners all across Florida set up conservation efforts on their property.

Davis was drawn to the conservation effort long before there was a wild turkey federation, recalling how, in the 1950's, J.B. Davis, serving on the Florida Wildlife Commission, got together with some friends. They spent their own money reintroducing wild turkeys into Madison, releasing them into the swamp area and allowing the population to recover for five years.

"I've had many mentors in my life who gave me that little shove in the right direction," Davis said. "Whether I hunt another day is immaterial. Hunting is not only a privilege, it's a heritage. If we don't preserve, conserve and protect it, it's over."

What is Agriculture Looking for in the 2013 Legislature?

Florida's agriculture is not visible to 80% of Floridians. Many never leave our coastal areas; and when they do, they seldom venture beyond Florida's freeways and airports.

This is not all bad, as mostly ag wants to be left alone to do what we are very good at doing—providing food and fiber for our nation. But it is not all good either, because most Floridians do not understand the system in which their food is produced.

Florida is seventh in the nation in ag production. We have a diversity of climates and soils and produce over 250 different crops and livestock.

We're first in the nation in citrus; even after canker and greening, California isn't close. There are approximately 80 million citrus trees in Florida. We're also first in sweet corn, clams, squash, sugarcane, ornamental fish, and indoor foliage. We're second in bell peppers, horses, floriculture, cucumbers, nursery stocks, snap beans, egg plants, and all specialty crops. One Florida ranch owns the largest brood cow herd in North America, and we are also home to four of the nation's largest cow-calf operations. We export to over 100 countries worldwide. Our economic impacts amount to over \$76 billion.

So what are we asking of the legislature in 2013? First, please do no harm to IFAS - Research, technology development and education have transformed not only Florida but the entire nation from an agrarian society, where most resources were allocated to the production of food, to a society where only 2 percent of the population is needed to produce our entire food supply. And we do it for less than 10 cents on the dollar and with a very narrow profit margin.

England does it for 22 percent. Germany's is 21 percent. Japan's is 26 percent, and India's is 51 percent. America's food cost is the lowest of all nations. Land grant university programs, like IFAS are the reason. To Florida's agricultural community, the Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences (IFAS) at the University of Florida, is our rock star!

IFAS constantly strives to keep one step ahead of the problems that we face. They help us by developing new plant varieties that yield more with reduced inputs, with constantly changing markets due to changes in consumer preferences, with competition, with globalization, and with improvements in technology.

One important example is irrigation technologies and plant varieties that require less water. Citrus and tomato crops use less water than they did twenty years ago, thanks to changes in the way we irrigate.

There was a time when Florida had no blueberry industry, a crop that required a certain amount of cold in order to produce. Because of IFAS' work in

genetics, they developed a blueberry that requires less cold. Now Florida has a significant blueberry industry that supplies this product when nowhere else in the world can supply it, taking advantage of a market window.

IFAS works every day to find a solution to citrus greening and tens of dozens of other pest and diseases that find their way here. Every industry has a success story to tell, and IFAS is often the star in these stories.

Second, please do no harm to the Florida Department of Agriculture & Consumer Services -- One example within DACS is the Office of Agricultural Water Policy, which develops our Best Management Practices (BMPs), addressing both water quality and water quantity. This office works cooperatively with agricultural producers, the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, IFAS, and the Water Management Districts to develop and implement BMP programs that are economically and technically feasible.

BMPs are used to reduce the amount of pesticides, fertilizers, animal wastes, and other inputs and outputs that may enter our water resources. They increase water-use efficiencies. They benefit water quality and water conservation while maintaining or even enhancing ag production.

Third, please provide a stable regulatory atmosphere for our businesses. -- Because we are so few, because many of our governmental bodies are looking for ways to increase revenue, and because there are people in our society who would just rather we didn't do business at all in Florida, agriculture is constantly faced with an onslaught of rules, ordinances, regulations and fees.

A good example was when a county required a permit and fee before repairing a downed fence. Little thought was given as to the safety problems of cattle on the highway, while the farmer was down at the courthouse. A city decided to impose stormwater fees on a commercial timber tract, when that timber owner was already engaged in BMPs for his water runoff. This resulted in a duplication of regulation and costs for this timber owner's operations. We asked the legislature to help in both of these examples.

Finally, we ask the legislature to be very careful when dealing with Florida's greenbelt laws. Greenbelt is the backbone of Florida's ag industry, and the property taxes that farmer's pay. It is a land-use classification—not an exemption—and an assessment based on the land's production value, rather than its market value.

Greenbelt provides a lower tax rate and recognizes that ag lands consume a fraction of the public

services that homeowners do. Cows don't need schools, nor do crops need the same level of fire protection. Government services to ag farm land amount to about 25 cents for every tax dollar paid. This is compared to homeowners who receive about \$1.50 for their tax dollar. Preservation of the greenbelt classification is critical to the sustainability of Florida's ag lands.

Regulations, taxes and fees cost money; and most costs are usually passed on to the consumer. In agriculture, though, there is a time lag where the farmer has to eat the costs.

Our products are sold at market as perishables, and most Florida products are perishables (specialty crops) that cannot be stored like the mid-western (commodity) crops. You can store most corn and wheat, but you cannot store fresh fruits and vegetables for long. When our crops come into harvest, we take what the market offers. We do not set our prices. We are price takers, not price makers.

Also for Florida agriculture, there are little if any subsidies. Again, we are a specialty crop state; and we are blessed with the climate and soils to grow high value crops. The commodity crops are low value crops, and most are subsidized because of their value in storage. The kings in the Bible stored crops for droughts and to maintain civil order. Our commodity crops are America's system for doing the same. When the masses are underfed, civil disorder quickly follows.

Agriculture in Florida manages over 25 million acres of ag land, including the vast forests of north Florida. There are over 45,000 farms, nurseries, ranches and forest operations, where 36 percent of the principal operators are women. The largest farms are in central and south Florida in a belt that reaches from Hillsborough down across to Palm Beach County, the 15th biggest ag producing county in the nation.

This system of food production in America has freed millions of acres of land for other human enterprises. It has freed millions of people to produce items and services other than food. It has liberated millions of dollars to spend on activities and services other than food, such as travel (vacations), health care, clothing and our homes. It has freed time and land and dollars. Agriculture is the base on which our entire country's economy stands.

Agriculture continues to grow in Florida, because our farmers continue to adapt. Because we only make up about 2 percent of the population, our changes go mostly unnoticed. Our plea to the legislature is to realize that this industry is a complicated and industrial system. Please do no harm, as all of America depend on our products.

Suwannee River Water Management District Promotes Water Conservation

A clean and dependable supply of water is vital to our environment, economy and quality of life, today and into the future. Water conservation is the most important step that each of us can take to meet our future water needs and sustain our fragile water resources, such as our springs. That is why I am committed to fostering a water conservation ethic throughout the Suwannee River Water Management District (SRWMD).

SRWMD is emphasizing water conservation education and other efforts to assist in instilling a water conservation ethic for everyone to embrace. SRWMD places an emphasis on water conservation for all water users on a year-round basis. Large users, including agriculture, commercial, industrial and public supply are required to implement water conservation measures.

In addition, SRWMD assists our water users in implementing water conservation and efficient use projects through a variety of programs. For example, this fiscal year the SRWMD has established cost-share programs to assist agriculture producers and local governments in the protection of water resources and water conservation efforts. As a result, farmers and ranchers are participating to reduce groundwater pumping by an estimated 1,976 million gallons of water annually, and local governments are estimated to conserve about 160 million gallons of water per year. This is an excellent start, but we expect that future years will yield additional annual savings as water

conservation technologies continue to improve.

We have also realized success in our partnerships with local governments to beneficially reuse wastewater to offset groundwater withdrawals. The SRWMD has partnered with cities throughout our region to implement reclaimed water programs. Approximately 9.6 million gallons of groundwater is saved each day through these partnerships.

Our commitment to water conservation is stronger than ever before. In March, the SRWMD's Governing Board adopted a proclamation recognizing April as Water Conservation Month, joining Florida in this traditional effort. We encouraged all local governments within our region to join us in promoting water conservation by adopting a similar proclamation. So far we have 100 percent participation from our 15 counties and have received word that several cities and towns have adopted a proclamation as well. Local governments are recognized on our website at www.mysuwanneeriver.com for their support. In addition, we are encouraging schools within SRWMD to learn about water conservation during the month of April. Participating schools will be recognized on our website and at our Board meeting on May 16.

There is much more to be done. Collectively we are all responsible for water conservation, and together, we make a difference. We can all do our part to protect our precious water resources by practicing and promoting water conservation measures, both indoors and outdoors, at home and at work.


The Gold level donator (campaigns between \$5,000 and \$9,000) was Johnson and Johnson.


On Thursday, May 2, the National Day of Prayer will be observed at the Courthouse in Madison at 5 p.m.

The words “holy” and “sacred” are sometimes used interchangeably. I don’t think this should be the case, as there is a huge difference between the two. Sacred comes from the Latin, “sacrum.” You might recognize that “sacrum” is also the name of the bones in your pelvis. The ancient Romans called this part of the human body “sacred.” It is where the reproductive organs are, and, particularly in the female, it is from where life springs.

Thus, as one line of thinking goes, the sacred was recognized as something that had to be protected and secured. That is an excellent picture, actually, of how we employ sacredness. Human beings create sacred rituals that draw lines, build

barriers, and protect and secure our space and turf. We feel we have to keep everything that is perceived as a threat on the outside, so as to guard our life and our future.

A quick example: Not long ago, I was preparing to speak at a church and had my always handy coffee cup with me. Without any thought, I sat it down on the pulpit while I was reviewing my sermon notes. This church had more than a lectern or podium. It was truly the “sacred desk.”

A person came up to me and said, “I would appreciate it if you removed your cup. This furniture is sacred.” I complied but then added, “Yes, it is ‘sacred,’ but do you know why? Because it has been designated so by a church committee, not by God. God’s holiness is not violated by a Styrofoam cup” (I didn’t mean to be snarky, but I don’t think this person became a fan).

And a second example: During one of my pastorates we moved from a shabby little storefront building to a beautiful, magnificent sanctuary. It was an incredible upgrade with actual pews, a baptistery, a steeple and some other sacred things. In our old location we had been picking up children in our little church van and bringing them to

worship. These little people were tornadoes. Turned loose in an empty room, they would find something to destroy. When we moved to our new building we kept picking up these children, but I knew it would not last.

During our first week of Vacation Bible School in the new building, one of the church mothers retrieved me from my office. She was enraged. “I need you to come with me right now!” she said. She took me to a hallway, pointed at the wall, and asked, “What are we going to do about that?”

Two and a half feet above the floor was a swatch of dirt staining the white wall. It ran down the entire length of the hallway stopping at one of the classroom doors. A classroom of these “dirty bus kids” had all run their hands down the wall as they walked to class, that’s all. But I knew then that there would be no place for them in our new space.

The sacred is the ritualistic space, community, and people-dividing behavior of human beings. The holy, however, is something completely different. Something holy is something that is “whole.”

The root word is "health." In other words, holiness is something that cannot be divided. It is something that is complete, unbroken, and intact.

Thus, holiness is not something defined by lines of segregation or by different shades of acceptance. It is defined by openness and welcome. The holy doesn't alienate, it invites. The holy doesn't separate, it welcomes. The holy doesn't divide, it embraces.

Whereas what is sacred is a small restricted space that must be sheltered and guarded, the old Norse word for "holy" means "a large living room," where people are made to feel very much at home. I pray that God makes us holy: Whole, healthy, welcoming people! But I also pray that he never allow us to become a sacred people, for when we lose our ability to be hospitable, inviting the outsider in, we have lost our unique witness in the world.

"Faith, Hope, Love" will be the theme of the one-mile fun run/walk, which will be held on April 27 at 10 a.m. at Lake Frances.



For the last four years that Kay Harris has been with the Ministerial Association of Madison, she has been heading up projects like prayer walks and the National Day of Prayer for Madison.

saith the Lord.

For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, and my thoughts higher than your thoughts. For as the rain cometh down and the snow from heaven, and returneth not thither; but watereth the earth, and maketh it bring forth and bud, that it may give seed to the sower and bread to the eater: So shall my word be that goeth forth out of my mouth: it shall not return to me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it.”

It seemed that the Lord might have a purpose for her being in Madison, after all; the first part of verse 12, immediately following, reads: “*For ye shall go out with joy, and be lead forth with peace.*”

In Madison, “We are in the most beautiful county,” she said. “I’m glad I’m not in Tallahassee. I still love Tallahassee, but this (Madison) is my home.”

Echoing the thoughts of Jeremiah 29:7, a directive to request the peace and welfare of the city to which she had been brought, she added, “I want to see this community blossom and grow. I want businesses to prosper here.”

In preparation for Madison’s tradition of reading the entire Bible aloud from the gazebo of Four Freedoms Park, an event sponsored by the Ministerial Association, she is in charge of the sign up lists for people who are willing to read aloud 15-minute segments, one person after another, 24/7, from Genesis to Revelation. Harris asked Rotary members to sign up for 15-

minute segments. Later, she appeared at Holy Week services, seeking people to sign up.

The marathon Bible reading began Thursday, March 28 at 6 p.m. and runs until Thursday, May 2, at 5 p.m., ending just before the National Day of Prayer event begins.

In the weeks leading up to the National Day of Prayer, there will also be several prayer walks each Monday, beginnings at different locations around Madison, and everyone interested in participating is invited to join the group at whichever location they are meeting that week. The next walk is 5 p.m. on Monday, April 8 at the Madison County Courthouse; then April 15 in front of the Madison County High School; then April 22 at the WMAF Radio Station, on SW Captain Buie Road; and April 29 at the site of the new hospital.
