A Pinetta man was arrested over the weekend, **Josh Odom** and hit with felony charges after attempting to outrun law enforcement officers in Monticello.

The Jefferson County Sheriff's Office reported that on Saturday, April 4, while patrolling Monticello, Deputy Kevin Tharpe observed a white Ford SUV, traveling south around the Courthouse, in the

FHP Trooper Fired For "Giving Lawmaker A Break"

Florida Highway Patrol Trooper Charles Swindle was terminated from FHP in March for a ticket that he wrote in Nov. 2012 to state lawmaker Charles McBurney, a state representative from Jacksonville. McBurney had been reportedly been traveling through Madison County at a high rate of speed when he was pulled over by Swindle. Swindle said that he would cut McBurney a break and write a \$10 ticket for failure to show proof of insurance instead of the \$280 ticket that McBurney would have normally have gotten for doing

87 in a 70 mile per hour zone. Swindle's attorney Sid Matthew said that Swindle had spoken with his sergeant Gary Dawson about doing this before he did it and Dawson told him to go ahead. Matthew said that Dawson is also prepared to testify in court on the matter. Matthew pointed out that Swindle was following a policy in FHP not to ticket legislators. "How can you be fired for following a policy?" Matthew said. Matthew said that the unspoken policy he is referring to is something that is taught to the troopers at the FHP Academy.

The letter firing Swindle for "conduct unbecoming an officer" says that Swindle wrote the \$10 ticket to McBurney in spite of not asking for the insurance information. Matthew said that he believes McBurney went home and wrote the letter to the FHP on official stationery. He said McBurney was upset because he didn't think he deserved a ticket at all. Swindle and Matthew are appealing the firing and Swindle is seeking to be reinstated. The date for the hearing on the appeal is set for April 29.

MADISON STANDS IN FOR MIAMI IN MOVIE

Carl Graddy, a friend of Chief Calhoun's from Central Florida, is a consultant on the movie, the one who suggested Madison for some of the location work and asked Calhoun about the possibility.

The movie, *Hidden Agenda*, concerns a legendary Miami Detective named Matthews, a talented crime-solver who can usually crack a case right from his office. However, when an aggressive serial killer comes to town, it isn't just another case in the dockets. The threat brings Matthews out of his office, even out of

Additionally, look for Calhoun and other members of the Madison Police Department in cameo roles.

Four Arrested For Mobile Meth Lab

Madison County Sheriff Ben Stewart reports that on Saturday, April 6, Cpl. Mike Maurice stopped a Chevy Sedan driven by Rhonda Crump, 41, on Jim Clark Road for unlawful speed. Upon walking up to the Chevy Sedan, Cpl. Maurice detected the odor of burnt marijuana.

The Chevy was also occupied by Keri Exler, 26, Joshua Langille, 31 and Robert Phillips, 43.

Cpl. Maurice requested assistance from Sgt. Dennis Pitts who arrived a short time later. After completing the enforcement action, Cpl. Maurice asked Crump for permission to search the vehicle for illegal contraband. Crump granted permission to search the sedan.

During a probable cause/consent search, Cpl. Maurice located all the required chemicals to manufacture methamphetamine in the trunk of the car. Due to the volatile nature of cooking or manufacturing methamphetamine, the sedan was treated as a hazardous material scene and Jim Clark Road was temporarily blocked off for safety. A specialized response team was dispatched to dismantle the mobile meth lab and render the area safe.

Driver Killed

The driver of a 2001 Kia Sephia was killed in an accident at the 267-westbound milepost on Interstate 10 on Sunday morning, April 7.

According to a Florida Highway Patrol report, at approximately 11:40 a.m., the driver was traveling west on I-10 in the left travel lane. For unknown reasons, the driver veered to the left and off the roadway, where the vehicle traveled southwest across the grass median and across both east-bound traffic lanes.

The Sephia continued traveling in a southeasterly direction onto the south shoulder where it collided with multiple trees on the south shoulder of I-10 with its front.

Man Dies From Auto Accident Injuries

A Madison man died Monday, April 1, from injuries sustained in an automobile accident on Saturday, March 30, in Hernando County.

According to a Florida Highway Patrol report, Alberto Gonzalez Pujada, age 52, was traveling south on Interstate 75, north of State Road 50, in the outside lane when the left rear tire of his 2004 Ford F-150 blew out.

He lost control of his vehicle, which traveled first to the inside lane, then back across the roadway and onto the shoulder.

Once on the grass shoulder, the pickup overturned several times before coming to a final rest on its left side, facing west.

Both Gonzalez Pujada and his passenger, Agenee Gonzalez, age 16, also of Madison, were ejected from the truck.

Agenee Gonzalez was taken to Bayonet Point Hospital in Hudson, where she was treated for serious injuries. Her father, who was taken to the same hospital, died from his injuries in the accident on April 1.

Ana Beatriz Carrasco, 21, was taken to Brooksville Regional Hospital where she was treated for serious injuries, including two broken feet. She was trapped in the back with her one-year-old son, Joaquin Williams. Hernando County Fire Rescue cut them out of the truck. He was also taken to the hospital in Brooksville, where he was checked by doctors and was reported uninjured.

National Security

Korea

On the national security front, the peninsula of Korea and northeast Asia have dominated the news recently, thanks to the bellicose rhetoric of its' new leader, 28 year old Kim Jung Un. Four decades ago, I had to deal with his grandfather, Kim Il Sung, the founder of North Korea. Instability runs in the family.

In the spring of 1972, I arrived in South Korea at a fighter base about a hundred miles south of Seoul. I was approaching my 24th birthday, fresh out of flight training. My squadron (35th TFS Panthers) was one of two fighter units at Kunsan Airbase, located on the west coast of the Yellow Sea. At Osan, a larger base about 50 miles north, we had a third fighter squadron. These three F-4 units represented all the American tactical airpower in South Korea. The South Koreans had their own air force, but they flew much older antiquated aircraft such as the F-86 Sabre.

Shortly thereafter, I left with my squadron for the war in Southeast Asia, but I returned in the fall and would spend about six months in Korea. What were my impressions? It was very cold. I was accustomed to ice and snow, having gone to school in Colorado, but Korea seemed much colder. Our base was on the Yellow Sea, and the west wind off the water was bitterly cold. We even experienced a couple of "mud storms" where windstorms kicked up a lot of dust in Mongolia which came down with the rain hundreds of miles later in Korea. Messy.

The commitment for our unit was multi-faceted - conventional, nuclear, and air defense. We had a joint use alert facility at the south end of the runway where we had two jets on air defense alert armed with air-to-air missiles and two jets on nuclear alert armed with either one or two nuclear weapons. As I recall, the air defense aircraft had to be off the ground in 5 minutes while the nuclear alert launch window was within 15 minutes.

A lot of the extra time for the nuke birds was spent copying and deciphering the launch message. The war plan in Northwest Asia was very complicated because there were three discrete potential enemies: North Korea; China; and the Soviet Union. All three were within range of the F-4 which gives you some idea about the strategic significance of the Korean Peninsula.

North Korea is a police state and accordingly, they have a massive military. But they are bankrupt. I read a few years back that the nation did not have sufficient fuel reserves to move their military machine 50 miles! What

good is it to have a military that cannot be used? That's why I always say that the foundation of national strength is a vibrant, growing economy. The Soviet Union died and fell apart three decades ago because their moribund economy could not support their military might.

One strategic advantage that North Korea possesses is the vulnerability of Seoul. The South Korean capital, a city of more than 5 million residents, sits in the northwest part of the country, just miles south of the dividing line between the two belligerents. The North has something like 7 thousand artillery tubes trained on Seoul and its vulnerable population. I have no idea the extent of Seoul's civil defense planning, but it must be extensive.

The North Korean leaders have made a lot of bellicose statements about America's "provocative" moves that have precipitated this latest crisis. It isn't provocative to send an Aegis warship off the coast in international waters. Aegis is a defensive system designed to intercept offensive missiles the North says they intend to launch against civilian populations in the Pacific region. It isn't provocative to send F-22s to bases in South Korea since the Raptor is an air defensive platform designed to shoot down attacking aircraft.

Now, you can argue that sending two B-2 Spirit stealth bombers from their base in Missouri to drop practice bombs on targets at Koon-ni Range near Inchon is provocative, but not the Aegis and F-22. If you believe that, then you're falling prey to North Korean propaganda.

Some have argued, with justification, that all of this war talk on the part of the North Koreans is merely posturing for internal consumption to give their people something to think about other than their rotten lot in life. But we can't count on that. We have to take Un and his thugs for their word and prepare accordingly. This I know for sure -- the North Koreans cannot put any war plans into action without complicity from their sole supporters, the Chinese. Without Chinese support, North Korea is nothing.

One last tidbit: did you hear that the Obama Administration has decided to increase deployment of missile defense interceptors to counter the threat of North Korean and Iranian nuclear armed missiles? Now who do we have to thank for the idea of missile defense. His name is Ronald Reagan. And who opposed him and Republican backers every step of the way? I thought you might remember.

northbound lane.

Deputy Tharpe attempted to stop the vehicle by activating his blue lights, in front of Badcock.

The vehicle continued traveling south to Anderson Street, where it turned left. The SUV stopped beside another vehicle, and then sped off, traveling east. The vehicle then turned north on South Waukeenah Street and would speed up and then slam on brakes. The driver had turned all of his vehicle lights off, when he turned onto South Waukeenah Street, apparently attempting to get the deputy to ram him, so the deputy would disable his patrol vehicle. At one point, the vehicle slammed on brakes and tried to back up to Dixie Street. The deputy noted that the driver's window was down, and he observed a white male driving the vehicle.

Deputy Tharpe placed the front of his vehicle on the side of the SUV, so it was unable to back up. The vehicle then sped off, still traveling north on South Waukeenah Street.

Once at the intersection of South Waukeenah Street and East Washington Street, the vehicle turned east, and sped away at a high rate of speed, of 60 to 70 miles per hour. The dri-

ver attempted to turn north on North Railroad Street, but was traveling too fast and was unable to negotiate the turn, so the driver continued driving east to Marvin Street, where the driver turned south and accelerated to a high speed. The deputy noted that during the pursuit, the driver of the SUV had not turned on the vehicle's headlights.

Officer Ryan Jacobsen of the Monticello Police Department was patrolling the area and had not heard the transmission about the pursuit in progress. When Officer Jacobsen turned north on Marvin Street, he saw the approaching SUV and had to slam on brakes and moved out of the way when the driver of the SUV swerved toward him.

The vehicle continued south, and at King Street the driver turned west and accelerated, causing several pedestrians to jump out of the way to keep from being hit by the vehicle.

The vehicle accelerated through the intersection, crossed South Railroad Street, was unable to negotiate the turn, and drove onto the Ike Anderson Bike Trail, traveling north. The SUV struck a chain link fence, which caused the top bar from the fence to go through the wind-

shield, dashboard and steering column, making the vehicle's steering inoperable. The driver not being able to steer and the high rate of speed, caused the vehicle to glance off of two power poles.

The glancing blow from the second power pole caused the vehicle to travel east, crossing South Railroad Street, and coming to a stop after striking a tree at the edge of the yard, located at 540 South Railroad Street.

The driver was brought out of the vehicle and handcuffed. He was identified as Joshua Wayne Odom, 25, of Pinetta.

Odom stated that he wished he had a gun because he would make Deputy Tharpe kill him. The deputy asked Odom why would he want to die, and Odom said that his wife left him and he just got beat up at the Capri. He said that was how his ankle was broken.

The deputy noted that Odom's ankle did appear broken. (According to the on-call doctor at Tallahassee Memorial Hospital (TMH) the injuries to Odom were not caused in a "bar fight," that they were caused by the wreck because the energy it would take to break the ankle the way it was broken, would be

impossible).

Post Miranda, Odom admitted that he had been drinking and smoking marijuana. He told Deputy Tharpe that he had some marijuana in his front left pocket, and he had some more in his driver's side door.

The deputy noted that he located a small plastic bag of marijuana, weighing two grams, in Odom's left front pocket. He also located approximately one gram of marijuana in the driver's door, and a multi-colored glass pipe. All of the items field-tested positive for marijuana/THC.

Due to the severity of Odom's injuries, Jefferson County Fire Rescue/EMS transported him to TMH for treatment. Deputy Jerrod Rigdon rode in the ambulance with Odom.

Once Odom was released by TMH, he was transported to the Jefferson County Jail, where he was booked and charged with fleeing and eluding, aggravated assault with a motor vehicle, reckless driving, possession of marijuana less than 20 grams, possession of drug paraphernalia, aggravated battery, and criminal mischief. A total bond of \$15,000 was set and he remained at the County Jail at press time.

The car came to a final rest, facing in a northwesterly direction.

Ed Meggs Addresses Rotary Club

When it comes to economic and other types of county development, it takes thought, planning and long-term commitment, Ed Meggs told the Rotary Club. "It's not something that happens overnight," he said.

Meggs, President of the Madison County Community Bank and fellow Rotarian, told the story of a strategic planning committee that conducted a series of town hall meetings in the late 90s to come up with a long-term plan for the Madison County area and surrounding counties. They discovered that the towns and the counties in their region had much more in common than differences, particularly in the areas of economic development, recreation, health care, housing, tourism and local government. The plan, Vision 2010, was culminated in 1997, and since then, some of the things it outlined have come into being or are in the process.

When people are informed about what is going on and know what will be required up front, they are more likely to support a project, and Meggs believes that is what contributed to the success of several items in Vision 2010. In the area of recreation, Madison has the Cherry Lake facility and one of the best baseball/softball complexes in the region. In the area of healthcare, the new hospital, which was another project years in the making, is now being built. The county also has the Tourism Development Council to promote tourism destinations in Madison. For local government, the permitting process for building in the county has become more fluid and streamlined, especially when compared to other counties, where the process is longer and often much more expensive.

In other areas, such as education and housing, there are ongoing issues and much work that still needs to be done. The same strategic planning committee also completed another long-term plan, Vision 2020, to address those areas and keep the county on track for the future.

One of the things the committee has done recently is apply through the USDA to become an "Enterprise Community." Marianna ended up winning that designation, but Madison was chosen as a "Champion Community," meaning that it gets extra points in its favor whenever it applies for grants. It was the "Champion" designation that gave Madison an edge when it applied for a grant to purchase the new ladder truck for the fire department.

Meggs went on to discuss the North Florida Economic Development Partnership (NFEDC) counties that include an area from Madison to Putnam County on the east coast, and how catalyst sites located in one county can benefit neighboring counties.


A catalyst site is a large tract of land available for a large entity that would come in and bring related industries with it. As an example, the site

on Highway 90 where it meets I-10 in Suwannee County was a catalyst site for bringing in Klausner Lumber One, a state-of-the-art sawmill company. Even though it has required about 12 million in state and federal funds to prepare infrastructure and ready the site (the company has invested more than seven million), the ten-year return in direct jobs, indirect jobs, purchase of raw materials from sources in the region and economic spillover benefits into surrounding counties will offset it several times over. Also, now that construction has begun on the site, Suwannee has begun receiving calls from related businesses such as machine shops that are interested in locating near the Klausner Lumber One sawmill.

People sometimes balk at offering tax incentives to bring in businesses, Meggs explained, "But the reality is if we don't do it, Georgia will. They know the value of incentives for bringing jobs to the state."

The five-county region surrounding Suwannee's catalyst site can expect to see an increase in Gross Domestic Product of roughly 56 million per year.

Besides, now that Suwannee County's catalyst site is spoken for, Madison has a chance to offer one of its own in the near future.

New Exhibit Opens At Hardee Center For The Arts

Public Invited To Gallery Talk & Art Reception On Thursday, April 18 At NFCC

The North Florida Community College Art Department invites the public to a gallery talk and art reception with artist Paho Mann on Thursday, April 18 from 12-1:30 p.m. at the Hardee Center for the Arts (Bldg. 11, NFCC campus). Mann will discuss his featured work in the Hardee Center's April exhibit entitled "Paho Mann: Amassed". Light refreshments will be served.

"I invite everyone to stop in April 18 to meet our featured artist Paho Mann," said Lisa Thompson, NFCC Art Instructor and Gallery Director. "Mann's work invites us to reexamine everyday objects and consider how we individually participate in consumerism."

The exhibition includes images from three of Mann's projects: The Phoenix Recycling Project, a public art project originally commissioned by the city of Phoenix to be displayed at a large recycling transfer station in Phoenix, Arizona; One Dollar Electronics, a grid of twenty-four photographs of small electronics manufactured in China and sold for \$1 in stores in Dallas, Texas; and Junk Drawers, a typology of the nearly ubiquitous catch-all drawer in where we put objects that don't have a specific

place.

"Central to my understanding of the works in this exhibition, is that looking at what we own and consume can reveal something about our identity and culture, and that this examination underlines the importance of making thoughtful choices in what we do with these objects," said Mann.

Mann's work investigates the physical manifestation of individuality, using both traditional photographic practices and contemporary digital technology. His work has been included in exhibitions at the Arizona State University Art Museum (Tempe, AZ), Tucson Museum of Art (Tucson, AZ), Walker Art Center (Minneapolis, MN) and the Carnegie Museum of Art (Pittsburgh, PA) among others. Mann's work is included in the Tucson Museum of Art's permanent collection and has been commissioned for public art projects by the city of Phoenix.

Mann was born in 1978 on his parents' homestead near Snowflake, Arizona. In 1992 he moved with his

family to Albuquerque, New Mexico where in 2001 he received a BFA from the University of New Mexico. He received his MFA from Arizona State University in 2007. Currently, Mann lives and works in Dallas, Texas where he is an Assistant Professor of Photography at the University of North Texas.

The "Paho Mann: Amassed" exhibit is open now through April 30 at NFCC's Hardee Center for the Arts. 

“It is good for us to come together to worship our one and only Savior,” Rev. Octavious Tookes welcomes the congregation. “To fellowship in a risen Christ.”

Thursday, the fifth day of Holy Week, the choir sings out in Mt. Zion A.M.E. Church, “He’s coming, let’s go home.” It’s a powerful, shouting joy that rings through the sanctuary and brings people to their feet, clapping, singing along, hands raised in praise and worship. Moments later, the sanctuary fills with another soaring anthem: “Our God is an awesome God...He is holy...He is mighty...He can move mountains....”

“Truly, our God is awesome,” says Rev. Charles Evans as he takes the pulpit. “Even in the worst season of testing we’ve been through, God is good. The Lord is good.” In spite of a season of family illness and troubles, he tells the congregation, “I am glad we serve the God of Abraham!”

The congregation responds: *Praise Jesus! Say it, preacher! Preacher, testify!*

“Everybody needs God,” he continues. “Black people need God, white people need God, Filipino people need God...everybody needs God.”

Say it, preacher!

“Everybody needs a secret place, a place where you can go, a place where you get out of your comfort zone and go out and meet God!”

Praise Jesus!

He tells the congregation about four words everybody needs.

Presence. We need the presence of God in our lives. If that presence is not there, then whatever happens to us, good or bad, is for naught. It was the presence of God that made it air-conditioned in that fiery furnace for Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego.

Glory to God!

Purpose. “If I am to have purpose I have to go to God...if I have purpose, I don’t have to ask somebody else who I am.” The spirit of dominion is in us if we have the purpose of God, no matter what happens. “I can do all things through Christ, who strengthens me.”

Preparing For Battle

The horse [is] prepared against the day of battle: but safety [is] of the LORD.
Proverbs 21:31

For many of us this marks the final drive to work for the week. Even now, you look forward to rest, relaxation and recreation. However, imagine you are in a foxhole as bullets flying over your head and bombs explode about you. Rest would not be at the forefront of your thoughts. Rather survival and victory would be.

Today, you are in such a battle. Not in the physical sense but rather in the spiritual realm. So, as warriors what shall you do to prepare for the war?

First, we must expect opposition to our faith. The source of this opposition can come from two sources. The first source is the world. The world will seek to oppose our faith in many forms. It may assume something as powerful as governmental regulation or as seductive as media manipulation or as persuasive as a cultural trend or even something as intimate as our own family.

Second, we must become scholars in the Word of God, not merely casual readers but rather studying in depth even to the point of memorizing and then going beyond that and applying the truths we find to our lives.

Third, we must remain strong in our faith when the world pressures us to conform to its standard and even when the world appears to have won a great victory we must stand firm. After all our battle today is far easier than the fathers of our faith many of whom gave their lives that we might enjoy the glorious gospel. In the end the victory is ours. Stand firm in your faith.

Fourth, live a righteous life. There is an old saying "the proof is in the pudding." In our lives the proof of our salvation and our faith is in the life that we lead. We must walk in righteousness or we cannot hope to be an effective warrior.

Finally, we must pray. Why? Because the source of our strength our hope and or life is the Lord. Through prayer we are able to instantaneously communicate our needs to the Commander in Chief. So now, I challenge each of you to begin the process of becoming an effective warrior by expecting opposition, then preparing for the opposition and finally and most importantly looking to the Lord for strength.

Blowin' in the Wind

Catholic Church. It's not that I had anything personal against old Ben (remember I'm not even Catholic), though his role as "God's Rottweiler," the theological enforcer of the Church, made me jittery. My grudge with Benedict goes back to September 1997.

It was the Italian Eucharist Congress, and a frail Pope John Paul II was presiding. The Harlem Gospel Singers had just finished performing for the audience when who should walk out on the stage but no other than Bob Dylan! In pinstripes and a white cowboy hat, he sang three songs that night: "Knocking on Heaven's Door," appropriate I think; "A Hard Rain's A Gonna Fall," (classic Dylan); and a salute to the youth in the crowd and the aging pope, "Forever Young."

Talk about startling, historic moments! But bad-tempered Benny, then known as Cardinal Ratzinger, was not amused. He had failed in his attempt to cancel Bob Dylan's appearance before the Holy See. Benedict, a classically trained pianist, loves classical and sacred music. But his love for song does not transfer to other musical genres.

He has said that all rock music is the product of Satan, he cancelled the Advent rock and roll concert series at the Vatican begun by Pope John Paul, and took a negative view of using guitars at mass. In his memoirs he sneered about Bob Dylan's appearance before Pope John Paul II, saying: "There was reason to be skeptical – I was, and in some ways I still am – over whether it was really right to allow this type of 'prophet' to appear."

So while there may be many reasons to be glad for Pope Francis' arrival – many of these reasons complex, political, and theological – my reason is fairly simple. You have to be cautious of giving your whole-hearted trust to someone who doesn't like Bob Dylan.

But Pope John Paul II seemed to have liked Dylan just fine. As Cardinal Ratzinger stood coldly by, he delivered a short homily after the concert that included lyrics from Bob Dylan's "Blowin' in the Wind," saying: "You've asked, 'How many roads must a man walk down before he becomes a man?' I answer you: One! There is only one road for man and it is Christ, who said, 'I am the life.'"

Interesting, don't you think, that the then Pope John Paul spoke of simplicity as the road forward. He spoke as Christ being enough. It has echoes of another Paul, the Apostle Paul, who once said that all his spiritual accomplishments, all his religious fanfare, all his ceremonial ballyhoo, all his pompous credentials, and all his ceremonious posturing were now considered garbage. They were trash. Junk. Rubbish. Literally, it was all manure. The only thing that mattered to his faith was Jesus Christ alone.

I am not terribly optimistic that a single man, no matter how many "firsts" are attached to his new administration, can correct years of encrusted arrogance and corruption or replace the accumulated labyrinths of doctrinal and ceremonial complexity with simplicity. But I have hope. I have hope that change is indeed blowing in the wind.

Now that Cardinal Jorge Mario Bergoglio has been installed as Pope Francis, I must say that I could not be happier with the papal conclave's choice. Not that the College of Cardinals would bother to ask my opinion on the matter – I'm not even Catholic – but as a student of religion, one who stumbles along trying to follow Jesus, and a lover of startling, historic moments, I am ecstatic.

All the obvious reasons for my joy come to mind. Pope Francis is the first pope from the Southern hemisphere; the first Bishop of Rome born in Latin America; he is the first Vicar of Christ with a Jesuit background, and the first Successor of Peter to take the name "Francis," honoring the legacy of Francis of Assisi, the medieval saint who so loved God's creation and who practiced spiritual and everyday simplicity.

But I am most thrilled for Francis because it means the end of Pope Benedict's reign over the




