

Man Leads Deputies, MCI K9 Unit On 19-Hour Manhunt

Madison County Sheriff Ben Stewart reports that Lonnie Yates Hagan led Sheriff's deputies and the Madison Correctional Institution K9 Unit on a vehicle and foot pursuit for nearly 19 hours before being taken into

custody. Hagan, a convicted felon released from prison back in Nov. 2012 and recently arrested on drug charges in Madison was currently out on bond. Hagan committed numerous felony acts during the pursuit as he eluded apprehension. The details of Ha-

gan's pursuit and apprehension are as follows:

On Saturday, Jan. 18, at 10:15 p.m., deputies of the Madison County Sheriff's Office responded to a complaint of a suspicious vehicle parked on

Jimmy Fulford Killer Facing Execution On Feb. 26



The State of Florida has rescheduled the execution of Paul Augustus Howell, convicted of the 1992 killing of Florida Highway Patrol (FHP) trooper Jimmy Fulford, for Wednesday, Feb. 26. Gov. Rick Scott signed the new execution order on Friday, Jan. 17, following the lifting of the temporary stay of execution issued by the 11th District Federal Court last January.

The temporary stay stemmed from the court's decision to make a determination if the case warranted a final federal review, a right routinely and universally afforded prison inmates but denied Howell because one of his former attorneys had missed a filing deadline for a crucial piece of paperwork. The state initially had scheduled Howell for execution by lethal injection on Feb. 26 of last year.

In January 1995, a jury convicted Howell of first-degree murder and the presiding judge sentenced him to death, nearly three years after a pipe bomb killed Fulford while on a routine patrol.

On Feb. 1, 1992, Fulford clocked a vehicle doing 85 miles per hour on I-10 and had the driver pull over at the Aucilla exit ramp. Discovering that the driver did not possess a valid driver's license

and that the vehicle was rented to Howell in South Florida, Fulford took the driver and passenger into custody and had them transported to the Jefferson County jail.

Following the two men's departure, Fulford had the dispatcher call Howell, who told the dispatcher that he had given the driver permission to drive the vehicle but had not to take it north. Howell told the dispatcher nothing about the vehicle's contents nor did he given any kind of warning.

Fulford, meanwhile, decided to inventory the vehicle's contents while waiting for the tow truck to arrive and impound the vehicle. Unbeknownst to him, one of the packages in the trunk was a gift-wrapped microwave oven rigged with a pipe bomb that was intended to silence a woman in Marianna.

The woman was a witness who was scheduled to testify for the prosecution about a South Florida drug-related murder linked to Howell and his brother, Patrick.

When Fulford opened the microwave, the explosion killed him instantly.

The ensuing investigation uncovered a major multi-state drug ring known as the Jamaican Posse. The investigation resulted in the conviction of 28 people on federal drug charges, including the two Howell brothers.


A public hearing will be held Monday, Jan. 27, at 8 a.m. to con-

Band Of Brothers

A lot has been written about the movie "Lone Survivor" that is currently number one at the box office. I haven't seen the movie or read the book ... yet. If I do see the movie, I'll do that first before reading Marcus Luttrell's best seller account of Operation Red Wings, the 2005 Afghanistan mission to search and destroy a high-value Taliban target. Generally, I find that if I see the movie first before reading the book, I'll enjoy both of them more since the book always has more detailed information than a movie director can fit into a two-hour window.

While some have been critical of the movie, most reviews I have read are very positive. They tend to highlight the realism of the movie in depicting a SEAL Team mission in the brutal mountain war of Afghanistan.

I've watched Marcus Luttrell, the lone survivor of the four member team, in several interviews. He's no longer on active duty, having completed eight years of service in the Navy. When asked what he missed most from his military service, Luttrell talks about the bond that he felt with his servicemen, and most especially, members of the SEAL (Sea, Air, Land) community.

I think I understand something about this bond from my own experience. Let me describe it to you.

When going through intensive training like the SEALs, the sailors face incredible adversity. The training is long and brutal and as a result, the wash-out rate is high. Only one in four who begin SEAL training complete the course and are awarded the coveted Trident badge. Officers and sailors complete the same course side-by-side. The reason for this difficult training is because of the intensely dangerous and demanding missions that SEALs undertake when they're assigned to an operational team. A good example of this was the assassination mission against Osama bin Laden.

The SEAL candidates learn early in training that they must rely on each other to survive, both during training and in combat. During that process, they develop a deep and lasting bond for their fellow SEALs that is literally unshakeable. No man will be left behind. Everyone is willing to lay down their life for their teammate. In the words of the Alexander Dumas' Musketiers, "one for all and all for one."

I never went through any training as physically and mentally taxing as the SEALs. The closest I can approximate is my experience as a cadet in the late 1960s. During my first year (1966-67) and especially the first summer, I was pushed to my limit by the upperclassmen who trained my incoming class. It was incredibly hard and demanding. We were told that individually, we would fail. The only way we could succeed was as a class, depending on each other for mutual support.

I accomplished things that I couldn't imagine doing before. During that process, I became very close to my classmates. We began with 1035 and finished four years later with 745, still one of the highest graduation rates of any class in the six-decade history of the Air Force Academy.

When I am reunited with my classmates, decades later, the bonds that tied us together nearly a half century ago are still there, still unshakeable. It is a joy to see them and recall when we were young and endured so much ... together.

I think this is what Marcus Luttrell is referring to and what he misses most about his military service - the camaraderie of service with his fellow SEALs.

The concept of an unshakeable Band of Brothers was captured by the late historian Stephen Ambrose in his best-seller by the same name where he recounts the exploits of Easy Company, part of the famed "Screaming Eagles" 506th Parachute Regiment during World War II. But Ambrose borrowed the phrase from a much earlier author by the name of Shakespeare. From Henry V, here is an excerpt from the Saint Crispin speech before the Battle of Agincourt:

From this day to the ending of the world, but we in it shall be remembered - We few, we happy few, we band of brothers; for he today who sheds his blood with me shall forever be my brother.

Grapes Jubilee



Chilean grapes, available all winter, are the perfect stand-in for fresh summer cherries in this classic dessert.

- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1 3/4 teaspoons cornstarch
- 1 cup cold water
- 3 cups seedless red grapes (about 1 pound)
- Grated rind of 1 orange
- 1 tablespoon kirsch, brandy or orange juice
- 2 cups vanilla ice cream

1. Combine sugar and cornstarch in a medium saucepan. Stir in water. Cook over medium-high heat, stirring often, until mixture comes to a full boil.
2. Add grapes and boil briskly 4 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add orange rind and kirsch and boil 1 minute.
3. Scoop ice cream into individual serving dishes and spoon grapes and sauce over tops. Serves four.

From Caveman To Warrior With A Cup Of Chocolate

I love cold weather, which seems a little odd to me because that has not always been the case. Maybe it's growing older and learning to appreciate the seasons of life, whatever they are, or maybe it's just my shifting hormones. Whatever the reason, I'm glad I'm far enough North in the sunshine state to have the drops in temperature for a few short months.

The morning walks I take with my dogs, I'm especially fond of when it's cold. I dress in my warmest clothes and we're off into the woods. The chill in the air and frost on the grass makes for a brisk walk and creates visible steam as we exhale. The northern breeds with their heavier fur coats, which moved further south with me, become friskier. There are clearings in the pine trees that allow the sun to shine through and we stop so I can turn my face towards the warmth. The coldness of winter helps me to appreciate the sun.

There are times during the cold weather that I don't have so much stamina in the cold and I become, and stay, chilled. These are the times that, instead of marching out into the day, I hibernate because the only way I can feel warmth is to remain inside and bundle up with blankets and fleece socks and pajamas. Even on these days, I appreciate the cold because it allows me to do things I normally would not stop and take the time to do, such as curl up with a book while splurging on an extra cup of coffee, or even better, a cup of hot chocolate.

Life is like that; sometimes you can lead an army (even if it is an army of dogs) into the woods, prepared for adversity and whatever comes across your path and then there are days that you have to retreat, crawl into your "cave" and regenerate yourself. I used to hate those caveman days and would wonder why I wasn't strong enough to always be a warrior, but now I understand that even a warrior needs rest. Sometimes I'm in the cave for only a moment, sometimes I stay there for a week or more, and every once in a while, a visitor stumbles in who helps me to find my way back out. Good friends are like that; they bring you out, squinting into the light, so that you can once again be a warrior and face the sun.

If you're an occasional cave dweller, I'm giving you my hot chocolate recipe to help you recharge your batteries. I will confess I sometimes have this even when I'm in warrior mode, but not often. It's very easy to make, and a decadent departure from traditional hot cocoa that most people enjoy with marshmallows, but no matter when you indulge in it, be sure to serve it in your smallest cups, because it is extremely rich.

Caveman Hot Chocolate

1 cup half and half
3 oz. chocolate, finely chopped*
Whipped cream to serve

In a small saucepan, heat half and half over medium heat until steaming; add chocolate and whisk constantly until chocolate is melted. Continue heating until hot, but not boiling, stirring constantly. Pour hot chocolate into a cup and top with sweetened whipped cream.

* I love dark chocolate and have used up to 80 percent dark, but semi-sweet is good too. It just depends on how sweet or dark you like your chocolate. And if you find it's too rich, feel free to use milk instead of the half and half.

House District 7 Would Benefit From Enterprise Zones

State Representative Halsey Beshears (R-Monticello) has filed HB 611, an act relating to Rural Areas of Opportunity. The bill renames the former Rural Areas of Critical Economic Concern (RACEC) to reflect a more current representation of the collaborative efforts to focus on the economic opportunities and potential in our rural counties.

In addition, the bill includes revisions for rural infrastructure awards and qualifications to be

more competitive with other states and allows for the development of designated targeted industries for rural counties beginning in 2014 that would be specific to the region.

As Florida's economy continues to improve and the state invests millions of dollars into economic development activity, rural Florida needs to be a part of the discussion and have the ability to capitalize on business growth and recruitment.

A key component in HB 611 is that any county in a RACEC region will automati-

cally be designated an Enterprise Zone. Florida's Enterprise Zone program was created to encourage capital investment and job creation in distressed areas through tax credits and refunds. They are specific geographic area targeted for economic revitalization.

Of the \$16,299,681 state dollars awarded to businesses located in Enterprise Zones, only \$2.3 million of those dollars were awarded in Florida's thirty-two rural counties. In 2012, the state conducted a study to assess what economic development activities could be formulated to enhance business development in rural Florida.

Among the many proposals included in the report was a clear recommendation to expand the Enterprise Zone program in rural Florida. Rep. Beshears stated, "As part of the rural economic development legislation I have filed for the 2014 Session, a

number of revisions to the rural Enterprise Zone program are included to boost rural counties' ability to recruit businesses into these zones."

Rather than limiting the scope of these zones, we need to expand and designate the entire rural county as an Enterprise Zone. By eliminating limits on where a business can locate, we will create true incentives to grow businesses in our rural regions.

As our rural counties continue to face difficult challenges in their efforts to improve their economies, it is imperative that we remain proactive in our efforts to compete with urban areas and gain parity for our rural counties in opportunities for growth and progression.

The modifications in this legislation will help level the playing field to ensure rural Florida has a fighting chance to attract jobs.

private property. Upon arrival, officers attempted to make contact with the driver of a black Navigator that was parked on private property. As the officer approached the vehicle, he identified the driver as the registered owner of the Black Navigator, Lonnie Hagan. Officers further observed Hagan standing outside the car with no shirt or pants on. As officers approached Hagan he abruptly entered the car and fled on US 221 in a Northerly direction. Officers engaged in pursuit of Hagan until he quickly drove behind a residence located at 2771 NW US 221 and fled on foot into a heavy wooded swamp area.

Officers with the Sheriff's Office searched the area for Hagan to no avail and had the Navigator towed. Soon after clearing the scene, officers responded back to the area concerning a complaint that Hagan was going to different residences in the area attempting to get a blanket. Officers immediately returned to the area and requested assistance from the Madison Correctional Institution K9 Unit to assist with tracking Hagan. Hagan was tracked for several hours through the swamp area of waist deep water but continued to elude officers.

On Sunday morning, Jan. 19, at approximately 8:13 a.m., officers responded to a complaint of Hagan being seen fleeing from a residence located at 2883 NW US 221. Officers again immediately responded and identified a burglary and theft that Hagan had committed. The Madison Correctional Institution K9 Unit was requested a second time to assist with tracking Hagan and again tracked Hagan for several hours through the swamp area of waist deep water and again Hagan continued to elude the officers. It was further learned that Hagan had armed himself during the burglary with a loaded .410 Judge pistol and extra ammunition.

Finally on Sunday afternoon at 4:30 p.m., officers stationed in the area responded to a burglary complaint at 2463 NW US 221 and Hagan was again identified and victims provided an exact direction of travel into the swamp that Hagan had fled to when confronted. It was further reported by the victim that Hagan had taken a 38 caliber pistol during this burglary now indicating that Hagan was in possession of two firearms. Hagan still possessed the loaded .38 caliber pistol on his person, which he had taken from one of the burglaries.

Hagan was first taken to the Madison County Memorial Hospital to be treated for hypothermia before being taken to the county jail where he is currently charged with the following:

Property Appraiser Speaks To 55 Plus Club

Madison Property Appraiser Leigh Barfield visited the 55 Plus Club at their January meeting to talk about a fairly new property tax exemption that might benefit low-income seniors who have been longtime residents—"longtime" meaning that they have lived continuously on their property for 25 years or more, and that it has been their primary address.

With the new year starting, "now is the time to see if you qualify," she told the audience. The property appraiser's office was there to help, she added, a theme she would return to several times during her presentation, inviting

those who needed information or who had questions to come by the office in the courthouse annex. With the new exemption now available, it was more important than ever for low-income, long-time residents to come in and see if they might be eligible.

The new exemption, listed as Amendment 11 on the 2012 ballot, was approved by Florida voters, and subsequently enacted by the Florida legislature, authorizing counties and municipalities to offer an additional homestead exemption to low-income seniors who have maintained long-term residence on their property (25 years or more), whose property is valued at \$250,000 or less, who are at least 65 years of age or older and whose household in-

come falls below a certain amount defined by general law.

Last year (2013), household income had to be \$27,590 or less, as calculated by the Cost Price Index (CPI) for that year; household income for 2014 has not been established yet. The property appraiser's office is still waiting for that number from the state.

Because of this, senior homeowners must re-apply for this exemption each year; not only does the income requirement vary a little as the CPI fluctuates, but seniors' incomes can also vary from year to year as well. Those seniors who qualified last year might not be eligible again this year, and vice versa.

This is a different exemption from the standard long-term "homestead exemp-

tion" that everyone is already familiar with, which does not require the homeowner to re-apply each year; once a homeowner receives the well-known "homestead exemption," he or she remains entitled to it until something changes regarding the primary residence. Other exemptions, like the new low-income senior/long-term residence exemption, are in addition to this.

There are several other exemptions that seniors may be entitled to as well. Being a veteran or having certain disabilities may make them eligible for other exemptions, but they must go to the property appraiser's office and fill out the proper forms to see if they meet the guidelines.

"Don't be afraid," said Barfield, a theme she returned to several times, urging those with questions to come on in and ask. "It's your office...and if we don't know the answers, we'll find them."

Then, there was the often-confusing way in which exemptions applied to the tax bill. Some applied to the first \$25,000 of a residence, some to the second \$25,000, and in many cases the tax bill from the school district was not affected by the exemptions, for the protection of the school system.

Then, there was the Suwannee River Water Management District (SRWMD), charged with maintaining water quality for the region, protecting rivers and other sources of water for North Florida. Madison is one of several counties that recognize SRWMD's taxing authority.

While going through the explanations of how the various exemptions overlapped, Barfield acknowledged that it could be confusing and again urged anyone with questions to come by the office. "We'll be glad to show you how it's broken down," she said.

Getting back to the new exemption, she told the audience that the property didn't have to have been the resident's homestead for 25 years. "You could have been living with Mom for 25 years and the house was left to you," she said. "But you must have maintained your residence there for 25 years, and you must now have the current legal title to it...if you feel you might qualify, come on in."

People who feel they might be eligible will need to bring some kind of proof of their adjusted gross income, to show that they indeed fall below the CPI income limit, as well as a deed or some other documentation verifying that this has been their residence for the last 25 years, or perhaps a homestead application dating back that long.

Those seniors with computers might want to browse through the property appraiser's user-friendly website, madisonpa.com. They can apply for some exemptions online and the application site is updated once a month.

The property appraiser's office also offers residents the option of paying their property taxes in quarterly installments, but homeowners must sign up for this option a year in advance. Those who

sign up this year, 2014, will be allowed to make use of it for the year 2015.

However, it is important to understand that the property appraiser's office does not determine how much tax people pay. That is determined by municipalities, county governments, school districts, and other taxing authorities like the SRWMD. What the property appraiser does is determine the current fair value of any given piece of property and how much of that value is subject to taxation after any exemptions are applied.

The office strives to help people understand their taxes, and uses feedback from the public to improve its services. As an example, last year several people felt that their TRIM (Truth In Millage) notices were not explained well enough, so this year, the office made some changes and added more information.

However, the property appraiser's office deals only with property taxes and related issues. For personal and/or family finance issues, and things like trusts, life estates, and so forth, people need to see an attorney who specializes in those areas.

But those who have any questions regarding property taxes, how any changes made to their property can affect them, and whether or not they qualify for any of the available exemptions in addition to the homestead exemption, come on by the property appraiser's office in the Courthouse Annex at 229 SW Pinckney Street, room 201, or call (850) 973-6133.



Savvy Senior: Tips And Tools To Help Seniors Regain Their Flexibility

Dear Savvy Senior,

Can you offer some good stretching tips and resources for seniors? I've gotten so inflexible in recent years I can hardly bend over to tie my shoes anymore.

Stiff Senior

Dear Stiff,

Of all possible exercises, stretching tends to be the most overlooked and neglected among seniors, yet nothing is more vital to keeping an aging body limber and injury free. Here's what you should know along with some tips and resources to help you regain some flexibility.

As we age, our muscles naturally lose their elasticity if you're not active, which can make common day-to-day activities like reaching down to tie your shoes, or looking over your shoulder to back your car out of the driveway difficult.

But the good news is, by incorporating some simple stretching exercises into your routine (at least three times a week) you can greatly improve your flexibility, as well as enhance

your balance, posture and circulation, relieve pain and stress, and prevent injuries. In addition, stretching is also important as a warm-up and cool-down for more vigorous activities, and leg stretching is an excellent way to prevent nighttime leg cramps too.

Stretching Basics

Stretching exercises should focus on the muscles in your calves, front and back thighs, hips, lower and upper back, chest, shoulders and neck. If you've had hip or back surgery, you should talk to your doctor before doing lower-back flexibility exercises.

If you don't have any experience with stretching, there are books like "Stretching for Dummies" and "Stretching for 50+" that you can purchase at your local bookstore or amazon.com that provides instructions and illustrations of proper techniques.

There are also a number of DVDs and videos you can buy to guide you through a series of stretching exercises you can do at home.

Collage Video (collagevideo.com, 800-

819-7111) sells several at prices ranging between \$10 and \$20, as does ieffit.com and amazon.com.

Also see go4life.nia.nih.gov, a resource created by the National Institute on Aging that offers a free exercise DVD and booklet that provide illustrated examples of stretching exercises. You can order your free copies online or by calling 800-222-2225.

While stretching, it's very important to listen to your body. You want to stretch each muscle group to the point where the muscle feels tight. If it hurts, you've gone too far. Back off to the point where you don't feel any pain, then hold the stretch for 10 to 20 seconds. Relax, then repeat it three to five times, trying to stretch a little farther, but don't bounce. Bouncing greatly increases your chance of injury.

It's also a good idea to warm up a little before you start stretching by walking in place and pumping your arms. And remember to breathe when you stretch. Also keep in mind that muscles that have not been

stretched in a while take time to regain their flexibility. So be patient and go slow.

Eastern Options

Another popular way to improve your flexibility is through gentle yoga or chair yoga. In chair yoga you replace the yoga mat with a chair where most poses can be duplicated. This is much easier on tight, inflexible muscles.

To get started, there are DVDs and videos that offer yoga instructions and routines for seniors that you can do at home. Some good resources for finding them are peggycappy.net and yogaheart.com, or check with your local public library.

Tai chi is another good exercise option for improving flexibility and balance. To learn it, it's best to work with an instructor who can teach you the correct movements and breathing techniques. To locate a class in your area, call your local senior center, health club or wellness center or check your yellow pages. If nothing's available, tai chi DVDs for seniors (see amazon.com, collagevideo.com and ieffit.com) is a good alternative.



Flu activity is increasing nationally and is high in some states. Additional increases are expected in the coming weeks. If you have not gotten your flu vaccination yet this season, you should get one now. A flu vaccine is the first and best way to protect yourself and the people around you from influenza and its potentially serious complications.

What is influenza (also called flu)?

The flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses that infect the nose, throat, and lungs. It can cause mild to severe illness, and at times can lead to death. The best way to prevent the flu is by getting a flu vaccine each year. Signs and symptoms of flu

People who have the flu often feel some or all of these signs and symptoms:

- Fever* or feeling feverish/chills
- Cough
- Sore throat
- Runny or stuffy nose
- Muscle or body aches
- Headaches
- Fatigue (very tired)
- Some people may have vomiting and diarrhea, though this is more common in children than adults.

*It's important to note that not everyone with flu will have a fever.

How flu spreads

Most experts believe that flu viruses spread mainly by droplets made when people with flu cough, sneeze or talk. These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby. Less often, a person might also get flu by touching a surface or object that has flu virus on it and then touching their own mouth, eyes or possibly their nose.

Period of contagiousness

You may be able to pass on the flu to someone else before you know you are sick, as well as while you are sick. Most healthy adults may be able to infect others beginning 1 day before symptoms develop and up to 5 to 7 days after becoming sick. Some people, especially young children and people with weakened immune systems, might be able to infect others for an even longer time.

How serious is the flu?

Flu is unpredictable and how severe it is can vary widely from one season to the next depending on many things, including:

- what flu viruses are spreading,
- how much flu vaccine is available
- when vaccine is available
- how many people get vaccinated, and
- how well the flu vaccine is matched to flu viruses that are causing illness.

Certain people are at greater risk for serious complications if they get the flu. This includes older people, young children, pregnant women and people with certain health conditions (such as asthma, diabetes, or heart disease), and persons who live in facilities like nursing homes.

Flu seasons are unpredictable and can be severe. Over a period of 30 years, between 1976 and 2006, estimates of flu-associated deaths in the United States range from a low of about 3,000 to a high of about 49,000 people.

Complications of flu

Complications of flu can include bacterial pneumonia, ear infections, sinus infections, dehydration, and worsening of chronic medical conditions, such as congestive heart failure, asthma, or diabetes.

Prevent seasonal flu: Get vaccinated

The single best way to prevent the flu is to get a flu vaccine each season.

Traditional flu vaccines made to protect against three different flu viruses (called "trivalent" vaccines) are available. In addition, this season flu vaccines made to protect against four different flu viruses (called "quadrivalent" vaccines) also are available. Always remember to wash your hands as this helps in the spread of germs.

Using Language Effectively

Throughout history, the use of language and speech has allowed humanity to accomplish great, if not, miraculous achievements. For example, in the Book of Genesis, Moses relates the history of our early ancestors who proposed to build a city and a tower that would reach into heaven. He begins his narrative by stating *"And the whole earth was of one language, and of one speech."* (Gen 11:1)

The ability to communicate without language barriers permitted them to develop and implement a shared plan of action. In just two short verses, Moses offers a brief glance into their mindset. He wrote, *"And they said one to another, Go to, let us make brick, and burn them thoroughly. And they had brick for stone, and slime had they for mortar. 4 And they said, Go to, let us build us a city and a tower, whose top may reach unto heaven; and let us make us a name, lest we be*

scattered abroad upon the face of the whole earth." (Gen 11:3-4)

These verses reveal their ambitious plans as well as their desires to implement them. In order to for them to fulfill these plans three things were needed: (1) It would require a clear vision and mission statement; (2) It would require unity and commitment; (3) It would require shared communal resources and responsibilities.

One may speculate that in order to accomplish these missional directives everyone would need to be engaged and involved in the process. From their actions, it is reasonable to assume that they had developed the same mindset. Notice, no leader is mentioned, implying that they did not care who received the credit as long as the goal was met. This reminds me of the saying "There is no limit to what can be accomplished if it doesn't matter who gets the credit."

Secondly, from the text, it appears they logically concluded that by binding themselves together and combining mutual resources, it would be easier to achieve the desired results. Unity is a powerful thing because it: (1) Sustains in times of weakness (Ex 17:12); (2) Gives success in battle (Jg 20:11); (3) Inspires men to improve their living conditions (2Ki 6:1-3) and (4) Gives added power in prayer. (Mt 18:19)

Much later in history, the Apostle Paul urged the Churches at Corinth, Rome, along with Euodias and Syntyche at Philippi to come together in the spirit of unity and be of the same mind. (1 Cor 1:10; Ro 12:16; Php 4:2) He did so to encourage them to communicate the same principles of faith, so that there would be no divisions among them. (1 Cor 1:10)

It can also be noted that unity is the thread by which the believers hold together the body

of Christ, which is the Church. (Col 1:24)

Third, our early ancestors demonstrated the virtues of working together. No matter how clearly the vision is articulated or promoted, without the desire to work, it is meaningless. Work is profitable. (Pr 14:23) Work is good. (Eph 4:28) Work is commanded. (1Th 4:11; 2Th 3:12) However, it can be argued if a person works simply because of a commandment, it can lead to diminished joy, reduced work-ethic, and boredom. Most people work for personal gain.

While personal gain normally follows hard work, there is a work with deferred rewards. Such is the work of every believer in the Kingdom of Christ.

The believer's full reward will not be realized until this earthly life is over.

In the case of our early ancestors, they were working to build a name for themselves. (Gen 11:4) This is pride at its most arrogant and base level. It should be avoided at all cost.

Yet, the basic principles remain; when a

group of people develops a clear objective, come together in unity, and hard work *"nothing will be restrained from them, which they have imagined to do."* (Gen 11:6b)

Lastly, when the three principles listed above are embraced and practiced, it will get the attention of God. (Gen 11:5-9)

The blessing of living in a country where we are free to worship publicly is often taken for granted. We have the

freedom to worship with other members of God's family, yet there are many who do not take advantage of such a privilege—the freedom to worship publicly.

What if we lived in a country where we had no such privilege of freedom? Would those who do not take advantage of the freedom we have in America desire to have such freedom? I believe the answer would be yes. So, why not take advantage of the freedom we do have in America to worship on a regular basis. The presence of our attendance in church

on Sundays is vital to our witness.

As a pastor, I often hear parents complaining about their children's rebellion to attend worship services. I have, too, witnessed that many of the parents that complain about such rebellion often are rebellious too. Their children often see their parent's dedication, commitment, and faithfulness to attend worship services, as they should. How then can one expect their children to be dedicated, committed, and faithful if they are not?

Parents' actions

before their children are more powerful than words spoken. If we are to expect our children to live a certain lifestyle, we, too, must live and uphold the lifestyle we preach about.

When we, as Christians, invite and encourage people to attend church, we too must be present in church. When people we invite to church do not see our dedication, commitment, and faithfulness in attending church, it weakens our witness. In the back of their minds, they may think, "If attending church is so important, then

why don't they attend as they should?"

We have to be careful about our witness or we will cause people to lose trust and faith in us. I once heard a person share their testimony about when they began to attend church. The man who had witnessed to him was not in church the first day the young man attended the first time. And, too, was rarely there any other time when the young man attended. When the person who witnessed to the young showed up one day at the young

man's job, the young man told him that he had lost faith and trust in him because of his lack of attendance at church.

Yes! Our attendance in church is important.

Our attendance will strengthen our witness and our absence will weaken our witness.

The Bible teaches us to be a faithful witness. In Hebrews 10:24-25 it states, "And let us consider one another to provoke unto love and to good works. Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together..." (KJV). Also, in Acts 2:46 it


