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Professionalism Speaker Encourages Lawyers to Accentuate the Positive

What could be more practical than feeling good about yourself and your own personal life and career?

Lawrence S. Krieger, UF alumnus and keynote speaker for the March 30 Professionalism Symposium, posed this question to judges, lawyers and students attending his presentation on the "Inseparability of Professionalism and Personal Satisfaction in the Practice of Law."

Krieger (JD 78) is a clinical professor and director of Clinical Externship Programs at Florida State University College of Law who began researching the link between personal well-being and professional behavior in the practice of law in 1991, only after he lost the vitality in his own job.

"I went to law school and did very well but was not really happy," Krieger said. "I

was a litigator for 11 years, and while teaching at

Don't Miss Summer Deadlines for Job Fairs

Job fairs are events sponsored by groups of law schools, where employers are invited to one location to interview only students from the sponsoring law schools. Students are responsible for their own travel and lodging expenses associated with attending all job fairs. Note: Some job fairs have registration costs to be paid by the student, in addition to the fees paid by the law school.

Job fairs are a great way to gain exposure to out-of-state employers, or employers who may not interview on-campus, and to talk to a large number of employers in a short period of time. You must read your registration material for each job fair very carefully, as each has different deadlines and very specific formats for turning in materials. If your materials are incorrectly submitted to Career Services, you will be ineligible to participate in the job fair. Students are **prohibited** from contacting any of the participating employers or sponsoring law schools **prior** to the job fair or the **entire** law school will be expelled from the job fair. All students are eligible to participate in all job fairs, regardless of stated preferences.

- **Southeastern Minority Job Fair (SEMJF) in Atlanta:** Interviews Aug. 3-4. Registration Deadline: June 28.
- **Mid-Atlantic Legal Recruiting Conference (MALRC) in Washington, DC:** Interviews Aug. 24. Registration Deadline: July 6.
- **Southeastern Law Placement Consortium (SELPC) in Atlanta, GA:** Interviews Aug. 17. Registration Deadline: July 10.

To be eligible to participate in job fairs sponsored by UF, you must have a signed Job Fair No Show Policy form on file with Career Services.

Federal Judicial Clerkships

2007 Federal Judicial Clerkship Application Procedures were announced in the CCS Judicial Clerkship program last Wednesday. For anyone who missed the program, the full handouts are available from CCS. The time frame for starting the process towards obtaining a clerkship is now.

The Federal Judicial Clerkship Hiring Plan provides that:

- Only 3Ls and alumni are eligible to apply for post-graduate federal clerkships.
- 3Ls only (not alumni) should mail their clerkship applications so that they arrive no earlier than the Tuesday following Labor Day (Sept. 4).
- Mid-term vacancies must be filled promptly and may be on a different time schedule.

There are two ways to apply for a judicial clerkship. It is essential that you know which judges subscribe to which application method.

1) The first application method has the Federal courts using an **Online System for Clerkship Application and Review (OSCAR)**. This is an internet based application that permits a federal judge to opt into the system to receive clerkship applications electronically. Applicants apply to "OSCAR" judges by uploading application materials directly on-line to the designated judge and the recommender also uploads letters of recommendation in the same manner. Then once the electronic review system opens the day after Labor Day, it permits the judges and chambers staff to sort, screen, and review applications online. (2) The second method does not use the OSCAR system. Some judges, including some in the 11th Circuit publish application deadlines as early as May 1 and make their hiring decisions over the summer.

Other judges who accept early applications may communicate this information more informally. Additionally, many of the Florida Middle and Southern district court judges do not follow the guidelines and accept early applications as well.

Because OSCAR is a new system, be aware that we have had judges who sometimes request early applications and who also list themselves as OSCAR judges, not realizing that they would be unable to view the applications until the day after Labor Day. The only way to meet an early deadline is to submit a paper application.

How can Career Services Assist You With Clerkship Applications?

- CCS contacts most chambers of the courts sited in Florida to determine vacancies, preferred application method and anticipated deadlines. This information is then communicated to interested students and alums via the judicial list serve.
- To subscribe to the judicial list serve, interested students can go to the list serve home page at [https://lists.law.ufl.edu/mailman/listinfo/judicial clerkship](https://lists.law.ufl.edu/mailman/listinfo/judicial%20clerkship) hotline or send a blank email with a UF email address to judicial-clerkship-hotline-subscribe@lists.law.ufl.edu. You will receive a confirmation email within 24 hours.
- CCS acts as both the law school administrator for OSCAR application judges and as the central repository for student letters of recommendations for the second type of application, the non-OSCAR, "paper" judges.

Non-OSCAR (paper judges) judges have expressed a strong preference for receiving only completed applications together with all letters of recommendation for each applicant. Therefore, for students applying to "paper" judges, once the student's "paper" letters of recommendation are finalized, they will be delivered to CCS in a sealed envelope. In accordance with the Hiring Guidelines, UF Law will not mail any letters of recommendation before Sept. 4. Students can make arrangements with

the CCS to obtain their sealed recommendations for inclusion in any application packets that they mail.

Obtaining Letters of Recommendation from UF Law Faculty

- Students who will be 3Ls in the fall need to meet with the faculty member, clinic or legal skills instructor, from whom they are seeking letters of support now. The student will provide the faculty member with valid contact information for the summer along with a copy of their resume and other materials that would be helpful to the professor in distinguishing the student and speaking to his/her strengths. In addition, students will need to provide an Excel spreadsheet containing the list of judges with titles and addresses (one per line).
- The faculty and their support staff have asked that we impose a deadline of Friday, April 20, to request letters of recommendation for federal clerkships. This deadline will enable the faculty members to draft the letters before they begin grading final exams and before they leave for the summer. Adjustments can be made to the list of judges at a later time; however, the primary goal is to get the letter drafted early in the process.
- Full application instructions are available in CCS.

State Court Clerkships

A wide range of state and local judicial clerkships also provide highly rewarding opportunities and may be less competitive.

- For example, applications are being accepted for two-year staff attorney positions with Florida Supreme Court Chief Justice R. Fred Lewis (to begin August 2008).
- Trial court staff attorney positions and clerkships with Florida's district courts of appeal are regularly posted under "employment" on the Florida Courts site at www.flcourts.org/.
- Students interested in judicial clerkships in other states will want to consult

Though she arrived at law school with a finance degree from UF, Mary Beth Savary Taylor's passions were always in politics and public policy.

Prior to her arrival at UF Law, the Sarasota native had just completed a Lyndon Baines Johnson internship with then-U.S. Congressman Connie Mack. After clerkships for a judge in the Second District Court of Appeals and with the PGA Tour, she worked as deputy finance director raising funds for Mack's successful U.S. Senate campaign, an experience that eventually led her to her first job in Washington, D.C.

"I feel like I've been blessed being in the right place at the right time," said Savary Taylor, whose father, Johnson S. (Buddy) Savary (JD 56) is a member of the UF Law Board of Trustees. "I was given the opportunity to come to Washington, D.C. to work on Senator Connie Mack's legislative team and was handed the portfolio of health care, an area where I had absolutely no background whatsoever. But I sunk my teeth into it, and as a result I worked for Senator Mack for six years."

After working for Mack, Savary Taylor had a brief stint as general counsel for the Joint Economics Committee before joining the American



Medical Association as Washington counsel, and then spent eight years lobbying for the American Hospital Association. In 2006, she became a vice president with the Nickles Group, a strategic consulting and lobbying firm in Washington, D.C., where she's navigating her way through a variety of physician, health-care and pharmaceutical issues as well as changes in the legislative agenda brought by the recent political shift in Congress.

"I absolutely love what I'm doing now," she said. "It's a lot of fun."

FSU, observed the same distress and pressure in the law students that I had experienced myself.”

This realization sparked another interest in Krieger who received his B.A. from Princeton University in biology while also having a significant amount of psychological experience—lawyer health and personal satisfaction.

“Everyone in this room has people that hate them and love them,” Krieger said. “So don’t put too much focus on what ‘they’ think. Look at your own self, your own integrity—for the keys to your life and career satisfaction.”

Krieger and his research partner have conducted various studies on human need satisfaction and personal well-being and have found that intrinsic values—including developing one’s self, helping and relating to others—are the key to being a successful professional. Results from this research conducted on students in top-tier and fourth-tier law schools showed that students from the fourth-tier law schools felt more autonomous and respected, which translated into a higher passing rate for the bar and less stress during the first job out of law school.

In fact, this study, which will appear in the prestigious *Personality and Social Psychology Bulletin* in June, showed that the basic needs of the fourth-tier students were more satisfied than a higher ranked school. Krieger said the research showed the enormous influence that these psychological factors have on a professional’s performance, vitality and personal well-being—all keys to a successful career.

on Externships of the Association of American Law Schools from 1994 to 1998 and has also served as Vice-chair of the Florida Bar Committee on Quality of Life and Career since 1996.

He has been conducting seminars on professional responsibility and professionalism since 1991 and has published booklets for law students on stress, values and career choices that are used at 100 law schools in the United States, Canada, and Australia.

“It is important to focus on the positive side of things and to change your values when something is not right,” Krieger advised. “Every choice we make has consequences, and once you have this kind of information, you can actually choose how your life will be.”
