## City reestablishes mounted patrol


City has not had mounted patrol since the 1920s, Boston's loss is our gain.

ST. PETERSBURG - On Tuesday, Mayor Rick Baker and Chief of Police Charles "Chuck" Harmon introduced the city's new Police Mounted Unit. The Police Mounted Unit will provide a unique and highly-visible police presence in the downtown area, especially on weekends and during special events.

The two officers and their partners, who will also be present, are Officer Ron Try, 48, a 20-year veteran police officer and Brooklyn, a 6-year-old Percheron-Thoroughbred mixed-breed horse, 16.3 hands, 1,600 pounds, dark chestnut in color. Officer Jason Hughes, 32, a police officer with six years on the Department, and Jacob, a 4-year-old Percheron-Thoroughbred mixed-breed horse, 16.2 hands, 1,800 pounds, black in color.

Both Brooklyn and Jacob come to St. Petersburg from Boston, MA., when Boston disbanded the mounted patrol.

The horses are stabled in Pinellas Park at a cost of \$400.00 per month per horse for full board and feed. The department is using its forfeiture fund to pay these costs. The Boston Police Department recently donated Brooklyn and Jacob to St. Petersburg.

## Rep. Castor fights to pass act for cheaper education

WASHINGTON - The Student Aid and Fiscal Responsibility Act, cosponsored by Florida Congresswoman Kathy Castor, is poised to pass the U.S. House of Representatives this week. Castor says the Act, which is the single largest investment in higher education in history, will make the cost of attending college more affordable for hundreds of thousands of Florida students and families through increases in the Pell Grant and expanded loans.

Over the next 10 years, the legislation will invest more than \$2.2 billion in Florida and \$106 million in the Tampa Bay area to increase the Pell Grant award. Roughly 430,000 Florida students, including approximately 24,000 Tampa Bay area students, will be eligible for a Pell Grant in the 2010-11 school year.

"More students throughout Florida will have access to increased grants and affordable student loans at a time when families are being squeezed by the economy. Florida universities and community colleges will benefit greatly," Castor said. "We also will put an end to the sometimes shady and deceptive practices of

the private student loan industry, standing up against special interests and giving students and their families peace of mind that their loans are sound and reliable."

Beginning next year, all new federal student loans will be issued as U.S. Department of Education Direct Loans rather than through the Federal Family Education Loan Program, which relied on private lenders. Private lenders can remain involved by servicing student loans. This change will provide more stability and security in student loans while saving U.S. taxpayers an estimated \$87 billion over 10 years.

The Student Aid and Fiscal Responsibility Act expands access to an affordable college education. It invests \$40 billion to increase the annual Pell Grant, from \$5,350 in 2009 to \$5,550 in 2010 and to \$6,900 by 2019. Approximately 6 million undergraduate and graduate students received Pell Grants in 2007-08.

"With the price of college steadily increasing, too many students are forced to make tough

## UF Gemini Observatory photographs galactic images with new instruments

GAINESVILLE — Less than two months after they inaugurated the world's largest telescope, University of Florida astronomers have used one of the world's most advanced telescopic instruments to gather images of the heavens.

A team led by astronomy professor Stephen Eikenberry late last week captured the first images of the cosmos ever made with a UF-designed and built camera/spectrometer affixed to the Gemini South telescope in Chile. The handful of "first light" images include a yellow and blue orb-like structure that depicts our Milky Way galaxy, home to thousands of black holes - including, at its core, a "supermassive" black hole thought to be as massive as 4 million suns put together.

"We plan to use this instrument to provide the first accurate tracking of the growth and evolution of this black hole over the last 4 billion years," Eikenberry said.

Installation of the instrument, called FLAMINGOS-2, caps a seven-year, \$5 million effort involving 30 UF scientists, engineers, students and staff. Once the instrument is scientifically tested - a process expected to last around six months - it will support a range of new science. Astronomers will use FLAMINGOS-2 (FLAMINGOS is short for the Florida Array Multi-object Imaging Grism Spectrometer) to hunt the universe's first galaxies, view stars as they are being born, reveal black holes and investigate other phenomena.

"Achieving first light is a great achievement and important milestone," said Nancy Levenson, deputy director of the Gemini Observatory.

The 8-meter Gemini South telescope in the Chilean Andes is one of only about a dozen 8- to 10-meter telescopes worldwide. All require technologically sophisticated instruments to interpret the light they gather. FLAMINGOS-2 "sees" near-infrared or heat-generated light beyond the range of human vision. It can reveal objects invisible to the eye, such as stars obscured by cosmic dust, or objects so far away they have next to no visible light.

The instrument joins other near-infrared imagers installed on other large telescopes. But it is unusual in its ability to also act as a spectrometer, dividing the light into



its component wavelengths. Astronomers analyze these wavelengths to figure out what distant objects are made of, how hot or cold they are, their distance from Earth, and other qualities.

Uniquely, FLAMINGOS-2 can take spectra of up to 80 different objects simultaneously, speeding astronomers' hunt for old galaxies, black holes or newly forming stars and planets.

"At a cost of \$1 per second for operating the Gemini telescope, it will make a huge gain in the scientific productivity and efficiency of the observatory," Eikenberry said. "What would take an entire year previously can now be done in four nights. This is a real game changer."

Astronomers compete heavily for time on the world's largest telescopes, often waiting months or years for the opportunity to make observations. Eikenberry said his FLAMINGOS-2 agreement with Gemini South entitles him to at least 25 nights of observations. He will use the time to contribute to three large studies, or surveys, of the sky headed by UF astronomers.



The first is aimed at learning more about the thousands of black holes and neutron stars at the Milky Way's center. The second will probe the formation and evolution of galaxies across time, while the third will investigate the birth of new stars.

Levenson said the Gemini telescopes are well-known for their excellent image quality. With its wide large field of view and ability to examine dozens of objects at once, FLAMINGOS-2 is a good match with the Gemini South telescope.

"The center of our Milky Way galaxy is a very dusty, very crowded environment, so infrared measurements and the ability to separate the fine details of the different stars and other objects are very important," she said.

FLAMINGOS-2's debut comes less than two months after UF astronomers helped inaugurate the Gran Telescopio Canarias, the world's largest telescope, in Spain's Canary Islands. UF, which owns a 5 percent share of the 10-meter tele-

## FWC METTING RESULTS IN NEW POLICIES

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) wrapped up a three-day meeting Friday at Howey-in-the-Hills.

Wednesday's agenda focused on inland issues, including discussion of a proposed rule that authorizes the take of peregrine falcons for the sport of falconry. Commissioners directed FWC staff to proceed with finalizing a rule to allow it and bring it back for final action at the Commission's December meeting. Federal regulations would limit the program to five or fewer peregrines for falconry per year in Florida.

Another proposed rule to come up for final approval in December would solidify an existing executive order allowing licensed hunters to kill nonnative reptiles of concern in select South Florida wildlife management areas. As part of an overall review of existing regulatory measures for reptiles of concern, the Commission reviewed proposed legislation from Sen. Lee Constantine (R-Altamonte Springs) and others to enhance the FWC's efforts to regulate captive wildlife in Florida. The Commission directed staff to look into a wide range of options in dealing with reptiles of concern and other nonnative species.

Also, Commissioners approved conceptual changes to deer hunting zones and seasons. FWC biologists are recommending changes to align hunting dates with the timing of breeding activity, called the "rut." The FWC will conduct two public meetings in September to review possible changes and gather additional public input. The proposal would be up for final approval in February, if Commissioners direct FWC staff to proceed with developing it. Changes would begin with the 2010-2011 hunting season.

Commissioners also discussed conceptual changes to regulations concerning hunting, fishing, management areas, nuisance wildlife and nonnative wildlife.

In addition, FWC staff presented a detailed update on the progress of revisions to the imperiled species listing process. The Commission directed staff to bring the draft rules to the December meeting for consideration.

Wednesday's session also included a review of land acquisition and management issues.

On Thursday, the Commission waded through marine fisheries issues. Commissioners approved rules that are consistent with new federal regulations to reduce overfishing of vermilion snapper in the Atlantic Ocean and improve fishing for this species in the future.

The new rules will ...

- decrease the recreational bag limit for vermilion snapper in Atlantic state waters from 10 fish to 5 fish daily per person,

- prohibit the captain and crew of for-hire vessels from keeping Atlantic vermilion snapper, and
- prohibit all harvest of vermilion snapper in Atlantic state waters from Nov. 1 - March 31.

These rules take effect on Oct. 16. The Commission also proposed federal consistency rules to address overfishing of Atlantic grouper.

These rules would ...

- decrease the aggregate daily recreational bag limit for all Atlantic grouper in state waters from 5 fish to 3 fish per person,

- prohibit the captain and crew of for-hire vessels from retaining any species in the aggregate grouper bag limit, and

- decrease the aggregate recreational bag limit for gag and black grouper from 2 fish combined to 1

fish combined in Atlantic and Monroe County state waters.

In addition, the proposed federal consistency rules would prohibit all harvest of shallow-water groupers (including gag, black grouper, red grouper, scamp, red hind, rock hind, coney, grassy, yellowfin grouper, yellowmouth grouper and tiger grouper) from Jan. 1 - April 30 in Atlantic state waters.

Another proposed federal consistency rule would require dehooking tools to be aboard commercial and recreational vessels fishing for reef fish in Atlantic state waters. Final public hearings on the proposed federal consistency rules for Atlantic grouper and dehooking tools will be held during the December FWC meeting in Clewiston.

Commissioners also proposed new rules to be compatible with an Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission management plan for Atlantic coastal sharks and enhance current FWC protective measures for sharks that inhabit Florida waters.

These rules would ...

- prohibit harvest of sandbar, silky and Caribbean sharpnose sharks from state waters,

- establish a 54-inch fork length minimum size limit for all sharks except Atlantic sharpnose, blacknose, bonnethead, finetooth and blacktip sharks and smooth dogfish,

- prohibit the removal of shark heads and tails at sea,

- allow only hook-and-line gear to harvest sharks, and

- make other technical shark rule changes.

The Commission also directed staff to work with stakeholders and develop options to possibly add other shark species to the prohibited list, especially lemon sharks, and require the use of circle hooks to harvest sharks in state waters. A final public hearing

## 17 and 11-Foot Pythons Found Illegally in Home

An anonymous tip to the Wildlife Alert Hotline sent Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) investigators to a Lakeland residence in search of two illegally kept Burmese pythons. What was hidden from the world shocked even investigator Daryl Amerson, a 24-year FWC veteran who thought he had seen it all.

Amerson discovered an 11-foot-long male Burmese python, dwarfed by its female companion, a 17-foot behemoth of the same species that weighed more than 150 pounds.

Michael T. Hall (DOB 11/20/71) of 1836 Jupiter St., Lakeland, owned the snakes but did not have the required state permit to keep them. The FWC lists Burmese pythons as reptiles of concern, which requires owners to purchase an annual \$100 permit.

Owners are required to have the pets microchipped and must follow specific caging requirements based on the size of the reptile. They also must keep a written and approved contingency plan in case of escape or natural disaster.

Hall was charged with second-degree misdemeanors for not having the required permit and not

## Calling all Adventure Seekers

Wanted - adventurous and outdoorsy women wishing to learn more about Florida's great outdoors in a comfortable, noncompetitive, hands-on environment. If this could be you, contact the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) to participate in the Becoming an Outdoors-Woman (BOW) workshop near Tallahassee.

The three-day workshop takes place Oct. 9-11 at Camp Wallwood on the pristine banks of Lake Talquin on the Gadsden County side. Sessions begin Friday at 10 a.m. and end Sunday with lunch.

# Daily Quota Permits No Longer Available in Twin Rivers

There has been a major change at the Twin Rivers Wildlife Management Area, and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) wants to remind hunters about this change.

The daily quota permits that previously were available on a first-come, first-served basis at the check station have been eliminated and are no longer available.

"These adjustments were due primarily to the nontransferable quota permits and guest permits in effect this year," said Scott Johns, wildlife biologist.

To make up for this change, the quota at Twin Rivers was increased for archery, muzzleloading gun, and general gun seasons from 30 to 45 permits for each season.

"Because there are no more daily use permits, the need for overnight parking at the check station has been eliminated and will be discouraged. Twin Rivers WMA is a quota-hunt-only area, and each hunter must have a quota permit or guest permit to hunt. Checking in and out at the check station is still mandatory," Johns said.

There are no exemptions for the 9,288-acre management area, located in Madison, Hamilton and Suwannee counties.

There will be 20 quota permits given out for each of the two hunts for spring turkey. Again, there are no exemptions.

Hunters must submit electronic applications for quota and special-opportunity permits through the FWC's Total Licensing System at a license agent, county tax collector's

office or MyFWC.com/License.

All the permits for archery, muzzleloading and general gun seasons have been given out for this season. The spring turkey worksheets listing hunts, application periods, deadlines and instructions will be available mid-October.

A quota permit holder (host) may bring only one additional hunter. Guest permits may only be obtained from license agents or county tax collector's offices. Guest permits may be obtained up to and during the last day of the hunt.

The additional hunter does not receive a separate bag limit. The host must share a bag limit with the guest, and the host is responsible for violations that exceed the bag limit.

The guest and host must enter and exit the area together and must share a street-legal vehicle while hunting on the area. The guest may only hunt while the host is on the area and must hunt in the same zone to which the host is assigned.

Quota permits and guest permits are not transferable. Except for youths under 16 years of age, a positive form of identification is required when using a non-transferable permit.

"All hunters must have zone tags in their possession while hunting on the area," Johns said. "Zone tags will be issued on a first-come, first-served basis at the check station. The quota permit holder and the guest must hunt in the same zone. Zone tags cannot be transferred from one hunter to another. However, if they're available, one zone tag may be ex-

changed for another at the check station."

Archery season is from Sept. 26 to Oct. 2 and Oct. 3-11. It is legal to take any deer (except spotted fawn), wild hog, turkey of either sex, gray squirrel, quail and rabbit. Hunting with firearms or crossbows is prohibited.

Muzzleloading gun season runs from Oct. 30 to Nov. 1. It is legal to take deer with at least one antler 5 inches or more in length, wild hog, gray squirrel, quail and rabbit. Only muzzleloading guns are allowed for hunting.

General gun season is from Nov. 14-17 and from Nov. 18-24. Hunters can take deer with at least one antler 5 inches or more in length, wild hog, gray squirrel, quail and rabbit.

Spring turkey season is from March 26-28 and from April 16-18. It is legal to take bearded turkey or gobbler. Legal shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise until 1 p.m. Hunting other animals is prohibited. Hunting turkey with centerfire rifles is prohibited.

The only season when quota hunt permits are not required is small game season, which runs from Dec. 5-27. It is legal to take wild hog, gray squirrel, quail and rabbit. Hunting with centerfire rifles is prohibited.

## Researchers Say Change in Snake Venom Might Result in New Uses for Humans

GAINESVILLE — While studying a way to more safely and effectively collect snake venom, University of Florida researchers have noticed the venom delivered by an isolated population of Florida cottonmouth snakes may be changing in response to their diet.

Scientists used a portable nerve stimulator to extract venom from anesthetized cottonmouths, producing more consistent extraction results and greater amounts of venom, according to findings published in August in the journal *Toxicon*.

The study of venoms is important for many reasons, scientists say.

"The human and animal health benefits include understanding the components of venom that cause injury and developing better antivenin," said Darryl Heard, an associate professor in the UF College of Veterinary Medicine's department of small animal clinical sciences. "In addition, the venom components have the potential to be used for diagnostic tests and the development of new medical compounds."

But in addition to showing the extraction method is safer, more effective and less stressful to both snake and handler than the traditional "milking" technique, Heard and Ryan McCleary, a Ph.D. candidate in biology in UF's College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, discovered the venom from these particular snakes differs from that of mainland snakes, likely because of their unique diet of dead fish dropped by seabirds.

Heard and McCleary collaborated to develop a safe, reliable and humane technique for collecting venom from cottonmouths as part of a larger study on a specific population of snakes that reside on Seahorse Key, an isolated island near Cedar Key on the Florida's Gulf Coast.

The venom collection study included data from 49 snakes on Seahorse Key.

"Snakes on this island are noted for their large size," said Heard, a zoological medicine veterinarian with additional expertise in anesthesia. He added that Harvey Lillywhite, a professor of biology at UF and McCleary's predoctoral adviser, has confirmed that cottonmouths on Seahorse Key eat primarily dead fish dropped by birds in a large seabird rookery.

Lillywhite also directs UF's Seahorse Key Marine Laboratory, located in the Cedar Keys National Wildlife Refuge. McCleary hopes to build on earlier studies about the snakes' ecology and to explore whether evolutionary changes may have affected the composition of the snakes' venom.

"My interest is in the evolutionary aspect," McCleary said. "If these snakes already have an abundant source of dead prey, why do they need venom?"

Preliminary findings show some differences in venom components, he added.

Traditionally, venom has been collected from venomous snakes by manually restraining the animal behind the head and having it bite a rubber membrane connected to a collecting chamber.

"This requires the capture of an awake snake, which increases the risk of human envenomation and is also stressful to the snake," Heard said, adding that manual collection of venom also does not guarantee that all of the venom is collected.

The nerve stimulator is used in human anesthesia to measure the effect of muscle relaxants.

"It delivers a series of electric stimuli, of very low voltage and amperage, and causes no pain or tissue in-

## Exotic Mosquito Known to be Everyday Pest

VERO BEACH - The Asian Tiger Mosquito, *Aedes albopictus*, first discovered in Florida at a scrap tire dump in Jacksonville in 1986, subsequently spread rapidly to become the most common daytime pest mosquito biting people in the State. This same invasive species has been recently incriminated as a transmitter of LaCrosse encephalitis virus to people elsewhere in the southern USA, and during the West Nile epidemic of 2002, 11 states and the District of Columbia reported the detection of this virus in field-collected *Aedes albopictus*. More recently, invasive *Aedes albopictus* has been recognized as the epidemic vector of chikungunya virus in Italy and in African island nations of the Indian Ocean.

FMEL is the home base of an NIH-funded research program, led by Dr. Phil Lounibos, on *A. albopictus* invasions, conducted in collaboration with researchers from Illinois State University and the Oswaldo Cruz Institute in Brazil. Current research activities include:

- Experimental tests of hypotheses about the

roles of interspecific competition with resident species (such as *Aedes aegypti*, the Yellow Fever Mosquito) in determining invasion success.

- Examination of the effects of larval competition and rearing temperature on vector competence of *A. albopictus* and *Aedes aegypti* for dengue, chikungunya and other arboviruses.

- Experiments to elucidate the impact of larval predation on *Aedes albopictus* in aquatic container communities.

- Analyses of habitat selection by *Aedes albopictus* with GIS and experiments to define the influence of adult bloodmeal and sugar consumption.

This project has been the major focus of research since 1999, when FMEL began to examine the ecology and genetics of establishments of this species in the Americas. Research in Brazil is supported by a new (2008-2010) FIRCA grant from NIH's Fogarty International Center to investigate the ecology of invasive vectors in the context of endemic dengue transmission.

jury," Heard said. "The electrodes are placed behind the eye, across the area of the venom gland. The nerve stimulator sends a current across the gland, causing reflex contraction and expulsion of the venom."

The technique allows collection from snakes that might not otherwise give up their venom, which is an essential in the process of creating antivenins for victims of snake bite, Heard said.

"The stimulator is battery-powered and relatively inexpensive," he said. "In addition, the anesthetic we used, known as propofol, can easily be transported."

Propofol, which has been prominent in news headlines recently as being linked to the death of singer Michael Jackson, is a short acting anesthetic administered by intravenous injection. The drug is commonly used to anesthetize animals in veterinary clinical practice, but it is not believed to have previously been used to anesthetize snakes for venom collection.

having a critical-incident plan. Additionally, Hall received a warning for not having the animals microchipped. The snakes were taken to a licensed facility.

The new rules for captive wildlife went into effect in January 2008. People who owned reptiles of concern prior to the effective date are still required to purchase the reptile of concern permit.

The FWC hosts Pet Amnesty Days several times a year. At these events, people who can no longer keep nonnatives as pets can turn them over to the FWC for placement. The next Pet Amnesty Day will be for reptiles of concern only, at Gatorland in Orlando on Oct. 3.

choices when trying to figure out how to pay for college," Castor said. "Due to our efforts and support from President Obama, a college education will be more affordable and more accessible. A college education always has been critical, but is even more valued today as the fabric of our workforce changes and we prepare students for 21st century jobs."

University of South Florida psychology major Aubrey Rushing is one student who looks forward to an increase in the amount of student loans.

"I took out a significant amount of loans," Aubrey said. "The Pell Grant is a little bit each year that helps me out a lot with college expenses. It would help me out a lot if it were larger. It's hard to make ends meet when you're in college."

Castor is particularly pleased that the legislation calls for a simplified FAFSA, or Free Application for Federal Student Aid, form. Because the existing form is so cumbersome, Castor held her first of her annual financial aid workshops in May to help students and parents understand and complete the paperwork. Students and families at Castor's workshop consistently expressed concerns that the forms were too complicated. They wanted a more streamlined process and simpler forms.

"The simpler student aid application form will open more doors for students and their families," Castor said.



## RECIPE of the Week

### "Healthified" Cashew Chicken and Broccoli

Prep Time: 30 min  
Total Time: 30 min  
Makes: 4 servings



#### INGREDIENTS

- 2 teaspoons canola oil
- 1 lb boneless skinless chicken breasts, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 1 teaspoon finely chopped gingerroot
- 2 cups fresh broccoli florets
- 1 cup Progresso® reduced-sodium chicken broth (from 32-oz carton)
- 1/8 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes
- 2 cups Green Giant® frozen sugar snap peas (from 24-oz bag)

3. In small bowl, mix remaining 1/2 cup broth, the soy sauce, vinegar, cornstarch and sugar; stir into chicken mixture. Add onions; cook, stirring frequently, until sauce is thickened and bubbly. Serve over rice; sprinkle with cashews.

#### Substitution:

Frozen broccoli can be substituted for the fresh.

#### Time Saver:

Look for packages of pre-cut chicken for stir-fry in the meat department.
