

## ICON OR OUT-OF-DATE?

### Residents speak out about possibilities for the future of The St. Petersburg Pier

There was an obvious schism between citizens who want The Pier to stay as is, an icon needing only renovations to the inverted pyramid and the approach, and residents looking for St. Petersburg's waterfront to be defined by innovation and forward-thinking. Many of The Pier's business owners, whose livelihoods come from the landmark, advocate the salvation of the current inverted pyramid.

"You will lose the wow effect," said Nic Weathersbee, owner of the St. Petersburg Candle Gallery on the first floor of The Pier. Weathersbee, along with about six other pier business owners who spoke at this final public forum, believe that keeping the existing structure and widening the approach is the most effect way to renovate The Pier while maintaining the iconic draw of the inverted pyramid.

While many applauded these pleas, others did not. "Frankly," said attendee Pete Brown, "I think the inverted pyramid is kind of goofy."

Brown was not alone in his distaste for the style of the current structure.

"That protuberance into the bay reminds me of some architect's idea of erectile dysfunction," Eugene Johnston said.

Some at the meeting agreed with Brown. Many of the citizens were concerned that the walking distance between the mainland and The Pier is too far.

"As I see it right now," St. Petersburg resident Alex Size said, "The Pier is a remote spot." Other people at the forum mentioned that they rarely go to The Pier because they do not

want to walk the 3,300 ft. long approach.

"These lazy 30-year-olds will look like blimps by the time they are my age," said Pam Cichon, who spoke out at the forum for preserving the current pier.

One person asked sarcastically if they should move the Washington Monument closer to the White House so that tourists do not have to walk as far.

Others suggested having stores and activities, with air conditioning, on the approach to eliminate the issues with having to walk

## Pinellas County Beaches Join 'Hands Across The Sands' to protest offshore drilling

Residents of Pinellas County, from Clearwater Beach down to Fort Desoto, stood at the shores of the Gulf of Mexico and locked hands to stand against off-shore drilling on Saturday, Feb. 13.

The event, "Hands Across the Sands," is the brainchild of Dave Rauschkolb from Seaside, FL. A few months after its inception, concerned Pinellas County residents and members of the Sierra Club decided to join hands with the rest of Florida to show the world, and the government, that Floridians are against off-shore drilling in the Gulf of Mexico.

"People don't want oil drilling on our beaches," said Cathy Harrelson, an organizer for the event. "They don't want oil rolling up on our beach. They don't want marine life to die... You don't need a spill to have damaging effects."

According to Harrelson, between 2,500 and 3,000 people attended the event.

"It was an amazing spectrum of people who came out to say 'We don't want you drilling,'" she said.

Talk of drilling in the Gulf off the shore of Florida has been bouncing around the legislature and the media for years. The debate will soon continue in both the U.S. Senate and the Florida State Legislature to determine if Florida is going to allow oil drilling off its shore.

The Hands event was also a way for residents to point out that the government could be spending its time created new energy sources, instead of relying on oil wells, which could one day run dry.

"We have to now get very serious about [energy] alternatives," Harrelson said.

The organizers and participants of Hands believe that the pollution from oil drilling is a constant threat to Florida's ecology. They believe that oil drilling will also run off tourists, who are coming to visit the state's award winning beaches, not oil rigs pumping out in the Gulf.

## Judge E. J. Salcines to receive Stetson Law's Tower Award

GULFPORT – Judge E. J. Salcines has been selected to receive Stetson University College of Law's Tower Award on May 1 at TPeppin's Hospitality Centre in Tampa.

Judge Salcines will be presented the award during Stetson's Second Annual Scholarship Gala, which raises funds for law student scholarships. This year's gala co-chairs are Stetson Law alumni Meredith Phipps Nutter '04 and Rick Nutter '03.

A Tampa native, Judge Salcines was appointed to Florida's Second District Court of Appeal in 1998, where he served for a decade. Judge Salcines' legal career spans work as an attorney, federal and state prosecutor, assistant U.S. attorney and judge. He received a J.D. degree from South Texas College of Law, as well as Honorary Doctors of Law Degrees from Stetson Uni-

versity College of Law and Florida Southern College. Judge Salcines has received numerous honors from civic groups and bar organizations for spearheading outstanding legal community service programs. He was awarded the University of South Florida's President's Distinguished Citizen Award in 1993 and Distinguished Service Award in 1996. The City of Tampa recognized him as Hispanic Man of the Year in 1993. Born to immigrants of Spain, Judge Salcines became the first Spanish-speaking assistant U.S. attorney in 1964.

Judge Salcines was knighted by King Juan Carlos of Spain, who inducted him into the Royal Order of Queen Isabella in 1979. Judge Salcines is a widely recognized authority on the history of Spanish heritage in Tampa, Cuba's revolu-

tionary figure José Martí and the Spanish-American War.

Last year's gala honored football legend Lee Roy Selmon with Stetson's inaugural Tower Award for his years of service to the Tampa Bay community.

## COUNTRYWIDE CHECKS TO GO OUT TO MORE THAN 2,700 FLORIDA HOMEOWNERS

TALLAHASSEE – Attorney General Bill McCollum today announced that more than 2,700 people will receive checks from a 2008 settlement his office obtained with Countrywide Financial Corporation. As part of the settlement, Countrywide is offering foreclosure relief payments to eligible borrowers who returned valid and timely Claim Forms and Releases under a program administered by the Countrywide settlement administrator. More than \$16.9 million will be distributed this week, and each check will be written for just over \$6,000.

"These checks will make a significant difference for Floridians who are trying to save their homes," said Attorney General McCollum. "This will provide real relief to struggling homeowners and families."

In July 2008, the Attorney General filed a lawsuit against Coun-

trywide, one of the nation's largest mortgage companies, for allegedly engaging in deceptive and unfair trade practices. The Attorney General's lawsuit claimed Countrywide put borrowers into mortgages they couldn't afford or loans with rates and penalties that were misleading. That lawsuit was resolved in October 2008, and the settlement agreement included a foreclosure relief payment program for Florida homeowners with qualifying Countrywide mortgages.

Check recipients must take note of important information about their relief payment. First, the checks must be cashed on or before May 13, 2010. The payment under this settlement may be taxable, and recipients should consult a tax advisor if they have any questions concerning their possible tax liabilities as a result of this payment.

Under the settlement, the Attorney General also obtained \$4 million to fund foreclosure defense assistance program. The money will be provided to organizations over the course of two years, and the first funds were distributed in late 2009. The organizations that receive the grants agree to provide free legal assistance to eligible homeowners who face foreclosure but cannot afford an attorney to review their case.

"These resources, both the checks to homeowners and the grants to fund pro bono foreclosure defense assistance, are substantial assets to Florid-

ians," said Heather Rodriguez of Holland & Knight law firm and president of the Legal Aid Society of the Orange County Bar Association, one of the organizations that received grant funding and has an attorney dedicated to foreclosure defense assistance. "Orange and Osceola Counties are both high in foreclosures, and homeowners are struggling. We appreciate the Attorney General's commitment to assist our residents."

Countrywide Chief Executive Angelo Mozilo was also named in the Countrywide lawsuit and the civil case against him is still pending in Broward County Circuit Court. The Attorney General has also called on Bank of America, the company that acquired Countrywide after the lawsuit had been filed, to be more responsive to consumers who are trying to modify their loans and save their homes from foreclosure.

## UF researchers find genes that 'tune' flower fragrances

GAINESVILLE — Shakespeare famously wrote, "That which we call a rose by any other name would smell as sweet." With all due respect to the Bard, University of Florida researchers may have to disagree: No matter what you call a flower, its scent can be changed. A team at UF's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences has uncovered some of the genes that control the complex mixture of chemicals that comprise a flower's scent, opening new ways of "turning up" and "tuning" a flower's aromatic compounds to produce desired fragrances.

"For a long time, breeders have mostly focused on how flowers look, their size, color and how long blooms last," said David Clark, a professor of environmental horticulture. "But scent has gotten left behind. Go to a florist and try to smell the flowers. You probably won't get what you expect."

Over the years, Clark says, breeders have selected flowering plants that produce bigger, more attractive flowers with long vase lives; but in doing so, they may have been inadvertently selecting plants that were willing to devote less to producing fragrance.

That may change. For example, a customer may someday be able to walk into a florist and select from scented or unscented varieties of the same flower.

In work published in the January issue of The Plant Journal and the February issue of Phytochemistry, the researchers describe how various genes in

petunias help regulate the amount of the 13 major aromatic compounds in that flower's fragrance.

The work will help researchers control the levels of these compounds, adjusting a flower's fragrance while also producing more or less of it.

In the papers, the researchers also describe some of the more fundamental aspects of how flowers produce scent. For example, they observed that the scents are largely manufactured in the petunia flower's petals, and that scent production is activated when the flower opens.

The studies are part of an ongoing effort to isolate the chain reaction responsible for producing scent, so that fragrances can be modified without interfering with other flower qualities, said Thomas Colquhoun, a UF environmental horticulture researcher and first author on both papers.

For more than a decade, Clark and his colleagues have combed through more than 8,000 petunia genes. The search has yielded some interesting finds.

For example, the gene that produces the compound that gives rose oil its distinctive scent also makes tomatoes taste good.

By manipulating this gene, UF researchers led by horticulture professor Harry Klee have been able to create tomatoes with more flavor. Klee, Clark and colleagues are now working with plant breeders and taste specialists to prepare the tomato for the marketplace. Better smelling roses are also in the pipeline.

## USF AFROTC cadet earns Silver Valor Award

As Rosa Hernandez watched her daughter being honored by the University of South Florida and Air Force ROTC (AFROTC) officials in front of 48,000 fans at a USF home football game her eyes welled up and the tears overflowed.

"When I brought her and her brother to the United States, all I wanted was for them to have a chance to do great things," Hernandez said.

Her daughter is Estefania Buritica, a first year cadet in the AFROTC program at the University of South Florida. The award Cadet Buritica received is the AFROTC Silver Valor Award, the second highest award an AFROTC cadet can receive.

When she is not going to class or participating in ROTC activities, Estefania Buritica drives a student shuttle bus around the USF campus. She received her award for actions taken one afternoon in the fall term while driving the shuttle.

That afternoon the university had received an on-campus security threat. Cadet Buritica was performing duties as a driver on one of the campus shuttle buses and followed established procedures for such a situation. As events unfolded, Cadet Buritica became aware that her shuttle had drawn the attention of security personnel.

Throughout the unfolding of events Cadet Buritica maintained communications with the appropriate authorities. Her calm and controlled disposition kept the passengers calm and aided the police in successful resolution of a po-

tentially catastrophic event, earning accolades from her supervisory chain up to and including the university president.

The AFROTC Valor Award recognizes cadets who distinguished themselves through voluntary acts of heroism. This does not necessarily need to be in connection with an AFROTC event. A Gold Valor Award would involve conspicuous risk of life while the Silver Valor Award is earned for voluntary acts of heroism that do not meet the risk-of-life standard.

Cadet Buritica was nominated for the award by her AFROTC Detachment Commander, Colonel Robert G. Wright, Jr., in acknowledgement of Buritica's living out the Air Force's core values of integrity, service and excellence. In his nomination letter, Col Wright stated "Cadet Buritica's valorous actions to safeguard her passengers most certainly embody service before self, and by all accounts she executed her responsibilities with excellence and flair."

"My actions were instinctive," said Cadet Buritica. "I knew I needed to protect the lives of my passengers and make sure I aided the officers. The drivers are trained for situations like this and AFROTC training teaches discipline, thinking and maintaining composure. I just let the training take over. Overall, I'm just thankful the situation was quickly resolved and no one was hurt."

Buritica's mother's dream has come true; she is doing great things and better yet, being recognized for it.

SPCA of Tampa Bay is holding its inaugural Tampa Bay 2010 Dog Games on Saturday, Feb. 20 from 11:00 a.m. at its location in Largo, 9099 130th Ave. N. The games will consist of four categories where participants can vie for a bronze, silver and gold medal.

In a race against the clock and each other, owners can steer their dogs through an

obstacle course in the Amateur Agility contest. These contestants will be judged on speed and accuracy.

The Flyball competition is a canine relay race. Each team will consist of four dogs who must charge through an obstacle course and leap over hurdles in order to catch a ball.

In the Canine Freestyle event, owners and dogs can cha-cha their way to first place. Each couple, consisting of a dog and a person, will dance to a set of choreographed steps.

The final competition held at the Tampa Bay 2010 Dog Games is the Canine Good Citizen tournament. This contest was designed for pit bull or pit bull mixed breeds, but is open to all dogs. If the pooch passes

too far from the shore to the main attraction.

The suggestions were as varied as the people who voiced them.

One man offered the idea of moving the S.S. American Victory, a 1940s era merchant marine ship currently residing in Tampa, to The Pier. Another man suggested purchasing a navy aircraft carrier and use that structure to the body of The Pier.

One attendee compared the future of The Pier to the movie Field of Dreams with that ever so catchy mantra "If you build it, they will come."

Many residents said that the new design should incorporate entertainment for families, teens and children.

"The youth need a skatepark," Denise Ruggiero said. "The youth of St. Pete are not currently being served."

The Pier Advisory Task Force arranged a presentation, updating the public on the current costs, funding and ideas. Some of the ideas mentioned by committee member and vice-chair Ed Montanari included a swing bridge connecting Vinoy Park with Spa Beach Park and included docking for mega yachts. While many citizens nodded their heads at the idea of a bridge connecting the two parks, many were not thrilled with pursuing mega yachts.

"I think chasing mega yachts is somewhat misguided," resi-

dent Carlos Garcia said into the microphone.

A comparison between Baywalk and The Pier was repeatedly mentioned throughout the forum.

"You are trying to build Baywalk on the water," one resident said. Others felt that the plan for The Pier should incorporate Baywalk and the parking garages.

Currently, the task force has six flexible plans for the future of this unique beacon of Tampa Bay. Three of these plans include keeping the existing pier and 3 others involve a complete redesign of the area.

"We want the public to know that our primary focus is pier," Montanari said. "For over 100 years The Pier has been an important part of downtown St. Petersburg and all of Pinellas County."

Pier Option 1 will keep the inverted pyramid as is, with renovations and updating the structure. This alternative will maintain the city icon, but the funding may not be enough to address all the problems, such as the uncovered walking distance from the shore to the entrance.

Pier Option 2 will reduce the width of the approach in half, which would decrease infrastructure costs, but will also decrease the amount of parking.

Pier Option 3, the plan agreed upon by most people who want to keep the existing inverted pyramid, involves building two new bridges out to the Pier, leaving the current approach in place so that businesses can continue to operate during the renovations. After the new bridges are complete, retailers and other programs will be installed in the middle of the two bridges.

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# Bulls dominate Cincinnati at home with a 65-57 victory

TAMPA - The University of South Florida men's basketball team outscored Cincinnati 41-34 in the second half of Tuesday night's game as the Bulls went on to defeat the Bearcats, 65-57, in front of 6,607 fans at the Sun Dome.

The win improved the Bulls to 16-9 on the season, and 6-7 in BIG EAST play, the most wins in BIG EAST play ever for USF.

Junior guard Dominique Jones exploded for 19 points in the second half, part of a 26-point effort on the night, to lead all scorers.

USF got 12 points from senior Mike Mercer and 10 points from sophomore Augustus Gilchrist, in the absence of junior Jarrid Famous, who missed the game with a sprained knee.

Gilchrist made his first start since Dec. 2 against Hampton and led the Bulls with six rebounds. Senior Alex Rivas also made his first start of the season.

Sophomore guard Anthony Crater came off of the bench to score nine points as well as spark the USF defense.

USF avenged its 78-70 loss to Cincinnati on Jan. 20 by beating its BIG EAST foe to move into a tie with Cincinnati and Notre Dame at 6-7 in BIG EAST play.

The Bulls held Cincinnati to just 38 percent shooting for the game, and forced the Bearcats to turn the ball over 16 times.

The Bulls continued their home court advantage against the Bearcats, as USF collected its fourth straight BIG EAST home victory in front of the largest crowd of the season.

The Bulls opened the second half on a 21-6 run, and scored 41 points of their own after halftime.

After a quick bucket by the Bearcats to open the game, the Bulls got Jones open on a

screen, and he knocked down an open three from the top of the arc to give the Bulls the early 3-2 lead.

Howard was able to drive to the basket early, drawing two early fouls and getting to the charity stripe line, where he would knock down his two free throws.

The Bulls got a fast-break layup from Mercer at the 12:55 mark to give them the lead back, 7-6, the last time UC would hold the lead in the game.

Cincinnati was able to hit a mid-range jumper, before Crater picked the pocket of Deonta Vaughn, and took the ball to the rim for the easy layup.

Mercer continued his hot shooting early on, as he knocked down a three from the corner with 6:20 remaining in the half to give the Bulls the 18-11 advantage.

Cincinnati closed the USF lead to just 24-23 with under a minute remaining in the half thanks to a 7-2 run to end the first half.

The Bulls came out in the second half firing on all cylinders, and got a jumper from freshman Toarlyn Fitzpatrick to begin the scoring in the second period.

Mercer grabbed a loose ball on the offensive end and dished to Howard, who skipped it to Gilchrist who knocked down a three and put the Bulls up, 29-23.

Jones led a fast-break which led to a layup, and was part of a 9-0 USF run to open the second half.

The Bulls kept the pedal to the metal as Howard drove the lane, and dished to Gilchrist who finished with a big dunk to put USF up 38-27 with 11:54 remaining, part of a Bulls' 14-4 run.



Bulls guard Dominique Jones led all scorers in the game against Cincinnati.

The Bulls extended their lead thanks to a 21-6 run to open the second half, which included 11 points from Jones.

Cincinnati went into a full-court press and was able to cut the USF lead from 18 to 11, 50-39, with under five minutes to play.

Jones took an isolation with under two to play, dribbled right, crossed up his defender, and pulled up for a three from the wing to all but end any hope of a Cincinnati comeback.

USF will be back at home Saturday as the Bulls host St. John's at the Sun Dome for a noon tip-off.

USF was firing on all cylinders in the second half of their victory of the Bearcats. The Bulls shot 60 percent from the field in the second half, and 48 percent for the game.

Adderley started out singles competition for USF with a win. Adderley took on Morgado in the flight one singles spot and he beat Morgado in two sets 6-1, 6-1.

Frank picked up the Bulls fifth singles win of the day in his flight three singles match against Ayala. Frank lost the first set to Ayala 6-4 but came back in the second set and won it 6-3 which sent the match into a tiebreaker set. Frank downed Ayala in the tiebreaker set 10-3.

The Bulls will be back in action on Friday, February 19, when they host Middle Tennessee State University at the USF Varsity Tennis Courts. The match is set to start at 2 p.m.


