IN AN UNMARKED GRAVE.

We publish on another page a legal notice from the King's Court of Germany in reference to the settlement of an estate of Franz Burmeister, who was drowned in the Halifax River in 1885.

Burmeister came here from Volusia, with his wife and young children, to plaster what was then known as the Ocean House, but now the Grand Atlantic Hotel. He remained here after finishing the job and worked at whatever he could get to do to supply the needs of life to his wife and little ones. He was known to the then few settlers of this town as an honest, industrious, hard-working man.

One day news came to him that a relative of his had died in Germany and left him a large estate. He had not the means to take himself and family to the fatherland, but by saving his earnings he accumulated enough to buy his wife and children a ticket across the water, and one bright July morning they started on their journey, and bade the husband and father good-bye for what proved to be the last time. Burmeister went patiently on with his work, his ambition being to save enough so that he too might shortly join his family and claim his inheritance. But that was never to be.

He was poling a lighter around Orange Island (better known as Manley's Island) about a week after and fell from the lighter into deep water and was drowned. He was taken from the water the next day and buried in Pine-wood Cemetery and lies to-day in an unmarked grave. Hon. C. L. Smith assisted at the burial and is probably the only man who could to-day find the grave.

The notice we are publishing is in reference to the settlement of the estate. His wife has again married and it seems there is a controversy between her and the children as to who should have the property.

FLOATING SPILES.

As per your request I transmit the following, relative to the floating spiles in the river near New Smyrna.

An interview had with J. H. Vrooman, the contractor, having in charge the repairs made at the New Smyrna Bridge resulted in the following information: The discarded spiles numbered about fifty in all, the balance left standing in the bents where they would do no harm. The Ballough Bros., of your city, replaced all necessary spiles, their contract engaged them to tow the discarded ones ashore instead of casting them adrift. As this portion of their work has not been completed with, their work is considered unfinished. As it is, the spiles are a menace to navigation and liable at any time to damage water craft, and imperil life. An effort should be made at once to collect these obstructions, as they are now said to follow the channel for many miles down the river. This information is due the public, as Mr. Vrooman, the contractor, is in no way responsible for these obstructions, as has been claimed. Yours truly,

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

DELYND, FLA., Dec. 3.—The County Commissioners met in regular monthly meeting last evening, with all members present, Captain Rogers, of Daytona, in the chair. There was no special report of road work, and the only repairs of moment have been the putting of pine straw on the road from DeLand to the Junction. The committee to view and report on the road from the city limits, at the east end of New York avenue to Blue Lake avenue, and thence north to the intersection of Minnesota avenue, east, reported, and the road was ordered advertised according to law. Rife-bonds of Messrs. Gould, Linch, Hymen and Shave were approved. Applications for pension by A. A. Montgomery, T. C. Marlow and Della Purdon were approved. After payment of Criminal Court costs, amounting to \$33.83, and of the usual current bills, the board adjourned until its January meeting.

It was agreed that immediately after the next meeting all county prisoners should be put at work on the DeLand and Daytona road, and continue thereon until it is put in good order, and the clerk of the board was instructed to correspond with the Pauley Jail Company regarding the purchase of a portable jail cage, to be used for the prisoners while at work on the road.

CONVENTION ADJOURNS.

The second annual convention of Mental Scientists, which has been in session at Seabreeze, adjourned Tuesday evening, to meet at Kansas City next Thanksgiving day.

Mr. Burgman declined re-election as national secretary, as he desires to give attention to local affairs.
