**NOW AND THEN**

Mr. Waterman Johnson, formerly a merchant of Flemington, but at present residing at Micanopy, was in town yesterday and today, looking up his taxes, and paid this office an appreciated call. In conversation he told how the world moves on and things that are done and approved today were condemned a few years ago. He referred to the use of ice in the treatment of measles and the resultant fevers that followed the ailment.

Mr. Johnson said in 1881 measles were an epidemic among Flemington and young and old died like sheep with the black vomit. The disease was so fearful in its ravages that the living could not bury the dead fast enough. He said the treatment in those days was warm tea. No ice was used as it was deemed injurious.

The first doctor in that section to take issue in the treatment of such cases was Dr. Montgomery, of Micanopy. He insisted on the use and prescribed all the ice water the patient could drink and constant ice water baths. The result was that those thus treated recovered. He instanced a case where four ladies in a home were down with measles and fever. The doctor attending used the old form of warm tea. Two died and the other two were at the point of death. The doctor in attendance consulted with Dr. Montgomery, who suggested the free use of ice. It was done and they recovered.

This illustrates the story of the march of time and the progress made along all lines of procedure and none more so than in the medical profession. Mr. Johnson is a very pleasant gentleman and one whom it is always a pleasure to meet.

**CONTEST CARRIED TO COURTS**

**Keheo Declared the Nominee in the Third District, but Mays Appeals to the Law**

Tallahassee, July 28.—The district congressional committee reconvened at 3 o'clock this afternoon to go further into the contest between Mays and Keheo for the democratic nomination. Roll call showed all the members present except Mr. Poore of Santa Rosa county. He was neither present in person nor did he send a proxy. This circumstance broke the deadlock, leaving seven Keheo partisans and six for Mays, and the committee voted accordingly.

When the decision was announced Mr. Mays, who was seated in the audience, arose and with considerable heat said that he had sat patiently through the contest, but all the time with the feeling that he would be counted out of the nomination, which had been given him by the voters of the district.

He took occasion to serve notice on the committee that he would appeal to the people for a reversal of the decision of the majority finding.

A move totally unexpected by the Keheo men was made at the night session of the committee, when soon after the members had assembled the sheriff entered and served the chairman and a number of the committeemen with an alternative writ of mandamus issued from the circuit court, enjoining the committee to canvass the returns as they were sworn to by the county executive committees or show cause why such canvass was not made.

This takes the contest into the courts and removes the question from the province of the committee.

**AUSTRALIA IS ANGRY**

**And England Is Alarmed Over the Results of the Alliance With Japan**

(By William True Hawthorne.)  
 London, July 27.—If ever a people got sick of a thing, the British people have got sick of the alliance with Japan. Hardly a day passes that some embarrassment does not grow out of it. No one has yet been able to discover a benefit.

The most that ever has been claimed for the alliance is that it enabled Great Britain to withdraw her Asiatic fleet, and thus reduce naval expenditures some ten million dollars a year. Just now there is great dissatisfaction that the fleet has been withdrawn, saving or no saving. For there is a fear, deep seated but seldom expressed, that the Asiatic policy as a whole may result in a loss so great as to stagger the imagination—the loss of Australia. England's greatest and richest white colony.

The coming visit of the American battleship fleet to Australian waters is regarded by many thoughtful Englishmen with genuine alarm and apprehension. It is admitted that it will be a severe test of colonial loyalty, and there is little attempt to deny that the test is feared. For some years thoughtful men have looked forward to the dissolution of the empire. The loss of Australia would be the beginning of the end. Is Australian independence or the annexation of Australia by the United States near at hand? There are not lacking those who believe one thing or the other is impending.

**Is White Man's Country**

The unfortunate alliance with Japan is at the bottom of this trouble, as it has been at the bottom of other troubles for Great Britain. Australians are determined that Australia shall remain a white man's country. Great as is their devotion to the empire, their devotion to this idea is greater. They demand that the yellow hordes of Asia shall be kept out, and though the imperial government may sympathize with the demand, its hands are tied. It is bound by treaty to see that the Japanese have on British soil rights and privileges equal to those enjoyed by the people of any other nation.

Years of experience have shown the Australians the folly of hoping for a happy fusion with the yellow races. The Australians are few in numbers. Their purse is empty. They are a young people in the throes of the difficulties of housekeeping. Their land is wide and unprotected. Their knowledge of the Oriental has taught them to loathe him with a hatred which Englishmen at home cannot understand. The Oriental is a synonym for cheap labor and cheap labor is synonymous with cheap mankind. They feel that once Japan is given an open door in Australia the Pacific is practically lost to Britain and not only to Great Britain but to America.

**Fear Uncle Sam**

Discussing this question the other day one of the ablest men in England said: "Now what can Australia do to maintain its ideal of a white Australia? By the end of August sixteen American battleships will drop anchor in Sydney harbor. Already the Australian governments, federal and state, have voted half a million dollars for the entertainment of the fleet. A warm friendship has sprung up between the two white continents. An American cartoonist summed up the situation, a few weeks ago, when he depicted Uncle Sam stretching his long arms across the Pacific, to the obvious dissatisfaction of Japan, with the expression: 'If cousin John doesn't want this, I guess I do!'"

The presence of the American fleet in Australian waters is going to be the test of Australia's loyalty. On the one hand she has the chilly indifference of Britain; on the other is the warm, protecting hand of America. Between the two lies the peril of a yellow invasion. Who shall blame her if she feels a temptation to yield her birthright for the sanctuary of another's arms?"

Nor is the troubles of her colonies with the Japanese the only "yellow peril" which gives Great Britain concern. The future of China is full of grave possibilities of trouble. At a recent banquet Sir Robert Hart, who knows China better than any other white man, said:

"When the transformation is completed, China, with her immense territories, with the untold and yet to be developed wealth of her great provinces, with her hundreds of millions of industrious, intelligent, law-abiding and easily governed people organized to meet the requirements of the new times and armed with the teaching and appliances of scientists—China will rank among the powers of the world and be a great factor in history."

What, then, of the white man's supremacy? It is to be supposed that China, some into her own, would live on terms of neighborly intercourse with the Western world? Would she not remember the many wrongs, the countless humiliations, she has suffered at the hands of the Western nations and seek to avenge them? Not only in England, but throughout Christendom, statesmen are giving serious thoughts to these questions.
