REAL REASONS FOR THE RIOT

A negro in the North, in the hands of a mob for the crime for which many negroes are lynched in the South, stands no more chance to escape being lynched than a negro under similar circumstances in the hands of a mob in the South. It is regrettable that the law isn't permitted to take its course in every part of the country, whatever the crime may be, but as it isn't, the North isn't free to charge that the South has less respect for the law than it is.

The Springfield, Ill., mob was a particularly vicious one. As a matter of fact Northern mobs that lynch negroes seem to be more vicious than such mobs in the South. There was no particular reason why the homes of the negroes in Springfield should have been set on fire. Such barbarism as that would hardly occur in the South, because, as a rule, there is no desire to molest innocent and inoffensive negroes, certainly no desire to destroy their homes and beat and kill them. Such barbarity as that, with the exception of the Atlanta riot, seems to be confined to the North. The reason isn't hard to find. The rioters in that section are mostly working people, and they don't like the competition of negro labor. When an opportunity presents itself they seize upon it quickly with the hope of getting rid of the negroes altogether. When the truth is known respecting the Springfield riot it will no doubt appear that the rioters were not influenced to do what they did so much by a desire to inflict punishment on the fiend who committed the horrible crime that led to the riot, as by a desire to drive the negroes away from the city. If negroes continue to migrate to the North race riots in that section will become more frequent because there isn't as much toleration of the negro in that part of the country as there is in this.—Savannah Morning News.

IS THE DEVIL TAKING A VACATION?

The dogma that the devil takes a vacation has now been propounded by Rev. Dr. Pedro Igen as a reason for closing the Holy Ghost German Evangelical church in St. Louis for the months of August and September, so that he may be able to throw all his energies into the Missouri gubernatorial campaign in opposition to prohibition.

He comforted his flock which was rather alarmed as being left without a shepherd, by the assurance that during the summer months the whole world is immune from the machinations of Satan. No one can be bad during dog days, even if he wants to, according to Dr. Igen, for the devil is then taking a rest.

The devil is accommodating in choosing the season of his idleness, according to Dr. Igen. Just when hard-worked ministers are beginning to fret under the city's caloric torments and to pant after water brooks purling down mountain sides and frapped sea breezes, then Beelzebub runs up a flag of truce, calls off his miners and sappers, ceases his bombardments and assaults upon the fortifications of righteousness, and marches away.

Thereupon the ministers can avail themselves of the devil's magnanimity, relax their vigil on the towers, send the garrison about its amusements, and leave the walls either un-manned or more or less feebly defended by poorly paid assistants. The ministers may feel justified in taking a vacation themselves for several months and let them away to seashore and mountain top.

This is Dr. Igen's way of explaining the unanimity with which many divines take several months off each summer. Their congregations, unprotected, are, nevertheless, in no danger, he says, because the Old Serpent is "off the job."

As to just how the devil amuses his leisure, and where he spends his vacation, Dr. Igen is rather uncertain. He confesses to the same state of mind as to why a personage so indefatigable should need an annual rest.

He thinks, however, that the Prince of Darkness, with all cares for the undoing of man thrown to the winds, may be diverting himself on some other planet, as gleeful as a school-boy playing hooky. There he may rally to himself all the demons of the universe and spend the summer in revels and high jinks. It is possible that the sun, because of the millions of de-

grees of heat, is chosen as the Newport of the fashionable fiends.

On the other hand, says Dr. Igen, the devil may solace himself with all the comforts of hell, considering his industry on earth, he can rarely find time to visit. He may consume a portion of the summer, theorizes Dr. Igen, in delicious dozing in a bed of burning asphaltum, canopied by flames; while servile gnomes, armed with blazing fans, direct upon his face refreshing blasts from the Brimstone Lake.

Or he might gratify his pride by a reunion of all the devils, and fulfill the sublime vision of Milton, when millions of fiends, obeying the scepter of their king, soared upon the lurid air, or covered the flaming billows of the infernal sea and scorching marl, as thick as autumn leaves.—St. Louis Post Dispatch.

"SUNNY JIM" GOT PLENTY "LICKER" IN SAVANNAH

Says Georgia Port Is as Wide Open as it Ever Was—Fruit Stands Selling Beer

Sunny Jim Robinson brings back a tale of booze in bottles in Savannah as plentiful as gems in Golconda, despite the prohibition law passed in Atlanta a little over a year ago. To verify some of the statements he made as to the abundance of everything to drink that man wanted, he brought back the labels off some of the bottles and a skin full of the wild cat stuff.

"I have never seen Savannah wider open than it is today," said Mr. Robinson, "and that is saying a great deal. Everywhere you go you can get something to drink. Even the fruit stands are selling near beer, which is nothing more or less than the well known brands of the real article. You can even state what beer you prefer and get it just as easy as you can in Tampa."

Mr. Robinson said that in many of the places whiskey bottles are kept out in full view, and that in some of them beer is sold, not as near beer, but as the real stuff. The city authorities, he said, seem to be in sympathy with the tigers, and instead of licensing them, haul them up every once in a while and fine them \$100.

"Savannah people are certainly so on the prohibition law," said Mr. Robinson, "and I believe that even the staunch supporters of the law have become convinced that it is a bad thing to try and force any law down the throats of people whose sentiment does not favor it."

"I walked into a drugstore in Savannah to get a drink of soda (laughter), and the clerk looked me over and said, 'Sherry or rye?' Of course I didn't know what he was talking about until he said that I must be a stranger in town. Then I tumbled and told him to give me a little of the rye."

UNCLE SAM NOW OWNS AN AIRSHIP

Washington, August 16.—The Baldwin airship landed at Fort Myer last night after making a flight which broke all records for aerial navigation in this country. For two hours and five minutes the big military dirigible, built for the United States, flew back and forth over a course nearly five miles in length in the official endurance trial.

The airship is now the property of the signal corps of the United States army, a few formalities remaining to be gone through with before Captain Baldwin turns his aerial craft over to Gen. Allen, chief signal officer. The members of the board of signal officers who have conducted the tests were elated over yesterday's showing. The airship has withstood every test required of it by the terms of the contract between the government and Capt. Thomas S. Baldwin.

BIG FIRE AT HIGH SPRINGS

High Springs, August 16.—Beginning at 12 o'clock last night, a terrible fire occurred, the second most disastrous in the history of High Springs. It began on the corner in Dr. Tanner's drugstore and quickly spread until the following business houses and their entire contents were destroyed:

Dry goods store, Mr. R. D. Futch.
Postoffice.
Cold drink stand, Mr. J. D. Neal.
Drug store, Judge Rixey.
Office, Dr. Everard Blackshear.
The building occupied by Dr. Tanner and Mr. R. M. Futch was owned by Mr. Futch, with no insurance. The other buildings belonged to the Danforth estate, with no insurance. The entire block would have been consumed had it not been for the heroic efforts of the citizens of High Springs. The origin of the fire is unknown.

WHAT THEY SAY

Some Very Striking Statements by Eminent Men

Temperance puts wood on the fire, meat in the barrel, flour in the tub, money in the purse, credit in the country, contentment in the house, clothes on the back, and vigor in the body.—Benjamin Franklin.

In the Popular Science Monthly Mr. Felix L. This experiment proves to a certainty that alcohol is not only a violent irritant, but also a narcotic. Can you believe that the still more tender and important internal organs of the body can be less injuriously affected than the mouth?—Dr. McCulloch.

The use of beer is found to produce a species of degeneration of all the organs. . . Intellectually, a stupor amounting almost to paralysis arrests the reason, changing all the higher faculties into a mere animalism, sensual, selfish, sluggish, varied only with paroxysms of anger that are senseless and brutal.
