NOTIFIED OF HIS NOMINATION

John W. Kern, Democratic Candidate, Now Formally in the Race for the Vice Presidency

Indianapolis, Ind., Aug. 26.—John W. Kern was notified yesterday afternoon that he is the democratic candidate for the vice presidency. The ceremony took place at the state fair grounds in the presence of representatives of the party from all parts of the country. The actual notification was simple. After Mr. Kern had been introduced the chairman of the committee notified the candidate in a short speech and the latter replied briefly. Then followed the address of William J. Bryan, the presidential candidate, on the subject of trusts. Mr. Bryan's speech was the chief feature of the day and was listened to with close attention by the great audience that packed the colosseum. Frequent applause greeted the remarks of the speaker.

Mr. Bryan arrived from Chicago yesterday morning with National Chairman Mack and several other prominent leaders. The morning trains also brought many of the western and southern members of the notification committee. The notification committee had quarters reserved for it at the Grand Hotel. Mr. Bryan and Mr. Mack proceeded at once to the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Kern, whose guests they will be until they leave the city.

In advising Mr. Kern of his nomination by the democrats for the vice presidency Theodore Bell, chairman of the notification committee, paid him a high tribute and also lauded the democratic party.

Mr. Bell said that the republican cry of conservatism was a counterfeit of the grossest kind. Of the democratic party he said they would be able to bring about reforms without danger to those who have become innocent possessors of inflated securities which the temporary prosperity under republican rule and their solemn promise to keep it up induced them to purchase.

After Bell had finished his speech Thomas Marshall made a brief address in which, in behalf of the democracy of Indiana, he paid a high tribute to Bryan and Kern.

LATTER DAY LOVERS' LEAP

Rome, Aug. 25.—A romantic elopement from Tientsin has resulted in serious injury to the prospective bride, Giacoma Buscagli, aged 25, became engaged to Maria Piovano, aged 17. But the girl's parents would not consent to the match, and the sweethearts decided to elope.

They took the train to Modena, and had accomplished part of the journey in safety when suddenly a passenger who had been eyeing them suspiciously informed them that he was a detective sent by the girl's father, and that she would have to return home.

Without a moment's hesitation the couple opened the carriage door and leaped out. The train was at once stopped, and the two were found lying on the line unconscious.

The girl is so badly injured that she is not expected to recover.

LILLIAN WAS OBDRATE

Bride Wouldn't Agree to "Obey" and Won Her Point

Laramie, Wyo., Aug. 26.—"Nixey on that word 'obey,' Judge. I don't like it and I won't have it in this marriage ceremony," said Miss Lillian Wilcox as she was being united to Elmer Cole, of Elmira, N. Y., yesterday.

A TRANS-MEXICAN LINE

Mexico City, Mexico, Aug. 25.—The Government has ordered a survey for a new line of railroad to be built across nearly 400 miles of the northern frontier. The recent revolutionary outbreak on the border is responsible for this move, the Government holding it impossible to move its troops from place to place with any degree of dispatch.

Aside from the value of the road to the Government as an aid in preserving peace and order upon that part of the frontier, it is believed that it will be of great value as a connecting link in the enlarged Government railroad merger system.

The proposed road is to run from Monclova, on the east, to Chihuahua, on the west. At Monclova, it will connect with the International division of the merger system and at Chihuahua with the Mexican Central. There is already a branch line of the International running from Monclova west to Cuatro Ciénegas, about 50 miles, but it is said that instead of using this line, a new route which will run further to the north will be selected.

The line will traverse a region that is at present far removed from rich transportation facilities. It will open up a region that is rich in minerals and which cannot be developed until given a means of transporting the ores to the smelters. The construction of the line will be started sometime this fall, it is stated. The proposed line will run from 100 to 150 miles from the Rio Grande. No towns of importance are located between Monclova and Chihuahua.

SORROW DROVE GIRL TO SUICIDE

Miss Winifred Parsons, of New York, Could Not Survive the Loss of her French Fiance

Paris, August 26.—Miss Winifred Parsons, the daughter of the late Charles Parsons, president of the Rome, Watertown and Ogdensburg Railway, New York, who died in 1904, was found dead with a bullet in her head yesterday in her apartment in the Avenue Iena. The police say that the case is one of suicide while friends of the dead girl declare the shooting was an accident.

Owing to the desire of friends and relatives to give the tragedy as little publicity as possible, the affair at first appeared wrapped in mystery. It was learned later, however, that the girl had been suffering from melancholia since the death of her fiance, a young Frenchman, Emile Maas, who died four months ago from consumption.

Miss Parsons was found dead in bed by a maid who entered the room by her breakfast. The girl's right hand clutched a revolver, a bullet from which had penetrated the brain.

A TRAGEDY UNEARTHED

A Tampa Man, While Cutting Weeds Near His Home, Found Two Human Skulls

(Tampa Times, 25th.)

A gruesome find was that made by Frank M. Parker, the produce man, in the tall weeds growing along the eastern boundary of his property on Cardy street this morning. Mr. Parker lives at 103 Cardy street, close to the shore of the Hillsboro river.

His find was an old market basket containing two human skulls, one of them of a full grown man, the other probably belonging to a small sized man or youth. From the marks on the skulls it is plain that the unfortunate of whom they once formed a part, did not depart this life in an ordinary manner, but were struck down by some assassin.

How They Were Found

Mr. Parker took his hoe this morning and went out before breakfast to cut down some of the tall weeds growing just outside his fence. He was working carefully so as to avoid possible snakes, when he saw the end of a basket protruding from the weeds close to the fence.

Mr. Parker pulled the basket from its resting place, disturbing a great number of large ants as he did so. The contents of the basket was covered with a newspaper, and Mr. Parker, believing that he had unearthed some stolen property, pulled back the paper.

What he saw gave him a decided turn. There lay two grinning skulls, from the orbits in which peered out hundreds of large red ants, angry at being disturbed. The finder didn't wait to pursue his investigations further, but went into the house and telephoned over to Sheriff Hobbs. M. P. Moritz was sent to fetch the basket to the office.

Secreted a Few Months

The sheriff overhauled the contents of the basket and found that at the bottom lay a copy of the Tampa Daily Times of March 31st date, and some wrapping paper from the O. P. C. store, while a copy of the Morning Tribune covered the bones. The latter paper was dated May 1st, which shows that the basket could hardly have been placed in its hiding place before that date.

Besides the two skulls and the papers there was one object in the basket, a piece of iron with a screw in it. This looks as if it might have been a handle to some small door or something of the kind. It was suggested that it might have come from some boat and Sheriff Hobbs is inclined to the theory. The basket was in a fair state of preservation, was of the ordinary split wood make, uncovered and with one handle.

County Physician A. C. Hamblin was called by the sheriff. Dr. Hamblin had the basket removed into the open ground back of the sheriff's office and turned water on the skulls from a hose. After the ants had been dislodged and the skulls cleaned he made a careful examination.

A Double Murder

The large skull was that of a man with a heavy, square, protruding chin. The hair of the beard was still clinging to it, a strong black stubble, although nearly all of the teeth had fallen out. There was some black hair clinging to the base of the skull.

"This man was struck with some heavy weapon, say a club," said Dr. Hamblin. "Here is the wound," and he pointed to a fracture which showed that practically all of the side of the skull above the temple had been caved in. "You can see the blood-stains yet. I should judge that the man lived an hour or more after being struck, for it is evident that the blood flowed pretty freely. He was murdered."

The physician then examined the other skull. It was smaller, and there was much straight red hair clinging to the top of the skull. "This skull I judge to have been that of a boy, and he was killed in precisely the same manner," said Dr. Hamblin, as he showed a fracture on the right side of the grinning headpiece. "And here are the blood-stains."

The reported asked if it was possible to tell approximately how long ago the double murder had been committed. "That is impossible to say," said the physician. "It might have been as much as eight or ten years ago. Or it might have been more recently. From indications, although there is little dirt on the skulls, I believe they have been buried in the earth."

Sheriff Hobbs is inclined to believe that the tragedy took place on some vessel along the coast and that the heads were cut from the bodies of the victims and later brought here, taken from some boat and hid in the weeds near the river bank.

The police will assist the sheriff in trying to obtain a clue to the tragedy. It is possible that the discovery will unearth some secret tragedy that has been hidden for years. If two men were missed from some coast settlement at one time, this story will doubtless recall the fact to the minds of some persons and the red hair of the one and the square chin of the other are bound to prove valuable clues to identification.
