**IT IS NOW SHERIFF**  
**JOHN P. GALLOWAY**

Mr. John P. Galloway received his commission last night from Governor Broward, appointing his sheriff of Marion county to fill the unexpired term of Mr. Henry Gordon, resigned. Mr. Galloway's first act was to send out the appointments of his deputies in the different districts, many of the old deputies being re-appointed. As every one in this county knows, Mr. Galloway was nominated at the recent primaries for sheriff for four years, from next January, and will be elected in November at the general election.

E. T. Williams has been appointed a deputy by Mr. Galloway and will have charge of the office and the papers and records connected with it. Will E. Hutson will continue to serve in this capacity also.

Mr. Lewis went out to Moss Bluff this afternoon to visit his family.

A letter to friends in this city from Mr. Robert Munroe at his former home, Syracuse, N. Y., says he is having the time of his life, and that Mr. Dave Williams, son of Judge D. S. Williams, of this city, is showing him the sights. Mr. Munroe had not visited his home before in many years.

Mr. Horace Harrold one of the faithful Ocala mail carriers, is home from his vacation, at Port Inglis, where he spent his time fishing, bathing and other ways. Jennings of Florida, who is Bryan's first cousin; Robert S. Rose, secretary, four newspaper men and A. E. Manning, who will look after the comfort of the party.

Ex-Governor Jennings will have the complete management of the car, and attend to all the details.

While in West Virginia and Maryland Mr. Bryan will confer with the democratic county chairmen of those states, the meetings having been arranged by John W. Tomlinson, of Alabama, head of the organization bureau, who will be represented by ex-Governor Jennings and will give several talks on organization work.

Another Proof of Race Hatred in the North

Des Moines, Iowa, Sept. 11.—Attempting to chastise his wife, whom he had followed in the disguise of a negro, Elwell Smith was set upon by a number of white men, who believed it was a negro assaulting a white woman and nearly lynched him before he could explain the ruse.

He blackened his face with burnt cork and followed her. The wife denies having had any appointment and says she only stopped a white man to tell him she was being followed by a negro. The husband, forgetting his disguise, walked up, thinking this an appointment, and commenced assaulting both.

Their cries brought a crowd, who set upon the black-faced man and all but lynched him. Indignation is high against such assaults here, because three women in the past few months have been assaulted by negroes.

**ORVILLE WRIGHT EXCELS ALL OTHER AREATORS**  
**Made Three Phenomenal Flights at Fort Meyer Thursday, Staying Aloft Over Two Hours**

Washington, D. C., Sept. 11.—Orville Wright, in three phenomenal flights at Fort Meyer yesterday, established new aeroplane records that not only assure the success of the official trials before the army board, but indicate that aerial flight is now only a matter of development.

Two flights of approximately an hour each and another flight in which two men were whirled through the air for upward of six minutes were the achievements of the Wright brothers' aeroplane. The first flight made, yesterday morning, in which the machine circled the drill grounds at the fort 57 times in 57 minutes and 31 seconds, was surpassed last evening when a flight of 62 minutes and 15 seconds was made.

Not satisfied with breaking all distance and time records for a heavier-than-air flying machine, Mr. Wright took Lieut. Frank P. Lahm, the aeronaut of the Signal Corps, for a spin around the drill grounds, making a new record for a two-man flight. Among the spectators were members of the cabinet and high officials of the army and navy.

The Topeka Capital (Rep.) in upholding the direct primary law in Kansas estimates that three Republicans out of four, and one Democrat in three, took part in the recent nominations. "At an average party caucus from a dozen to twenty men attend in a precinct, and from year to year they are mainly the same men," it says.
