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## UNCLE SAM WON'T INTERFERE

Wilhelmina May Spank Castro to Her Heart's Content, so Long as She Doesn't Try to Keep Territory

Washington, D. C., Sept. 12.—The situation in South America between Holland and Venezuela, with reference to the relative position occupied by the United States, was discussed interestingly yesterday by Acting Secretary of State Adee.

"With regard to the Dutch-Venezuelan controversy," observed Mr. Adee, "the United States government will simply be an observer. If war comes out of the strained relations lately created, the United States would send warships to the Venezuelan coast, but not with any intent to interfere. Our naval force would go there to 'take notes'; so to speak—to look on, just as you or I would look at a game of baseball from the grand stand, and the desire of the United States would be to see fair play. This government has no wish that its chestnuts be pulled out of the fire by Holland; our desire would be fair play for the Venezuelans just as much as for the Dutch."

**WILLIAM TELLS HOW HE GAINED HIS WEALTH**  
Not Much of It, and He Came By It Honestly

Evansville, Ind., Sept. 11.—Heavy personal onslaughts on Speaker Joseph G. Cannon of the national House of Representatives were made yesterday by W. J. Bryan in the course of his travels through Illinois. The Democratic candidate attacked Mr. Cannon from all sides. He charged the Speaker with being the favorite of predatory corporations, with having strangled reform legislation and with having falsified the facts with regard to Mr. Bryan's wealth.

Mr. Bryan's congressional district about 9 o'clock yesterday morning, when a ten-minute stay was made at Toledo, Ill. A great crowd had assembled to hear him and the Nebraskan immediately launched his Philippic against the Speaker. Moving on from Toledo, Mr. Bryan repeated his remarks at Newton, Ill.

Not content with his statements at these two places, the Democratic candidate for President later on, at Olney, where he stayed for three hours openly accused the Speaker of telling falsehoods when the Speaker addressed the Springfield convention fixed Mr. Bryan's wealth at a million dollars.

**Showed How He Got It**  
In great detail, Mr. Bryan gave figures showing how his money had been acquired from the day he entered Congress to the present time. He denied that he was worth a million dollars and fixed the amount of his "earthly possessions" at \$150,000 as the extreme limit. He had come by it, he said, through saving a portion of his congressional salary and from receipts derived from his literary and writings. He demanded that Speaker Cannon be as frank as himself and tell the public whether he made any money through lecturing and writing, and to what extent his money making had been hampered by strict attention to public duties.

Not since the campaign began has Mr. Bryan spoken with such vehemence, and it is said to be the first time that a presidential candidate ever went out of his way to attack a candidate for Congress.

## THE FRONT-DRIVE AUTO

Mr. Knox Cleveland is Making Good With His New Idea—The First Machine is on Trial in Atlanta.

(St. Petersburg Independent.)  
Monday's Atlanta Constitution contains a picture of W. K. Cleveland's front-drive automobile, showing Mr. Cleveland at the steering wheel, and he wears a very happy expression. The text of the article is as follows:

That Atlanta is not to be outdone in mechanical accomplishments is evidenced by the recent construction of a remarkable automobile which seems to have solved the problem of wasted horse power and difficult angles in locomotion at a high speed. The machine is the invention of W. K. Cleveland, formerly of St. Petersburg, Fla., a railroad man, who began work on the invention four years ago, and who was granted a patent in December, 1905, in the United States, and subsequently in several foreign countries.

The automobile's distinctive features are a universal interlocking joint attached to all four wheels of the car, a main chain attached to the front as well as to the rear axle; and in steering mechanism in connection with the universal joint, which reverses the direction of the rear wheels while directing the course of the front wheels. Another unique arrangement is an attachment whereby the lamps of the car will turn in unison with the front and rear wheels, keeping the searchlight always in the direction of the turn.

The idea of attaching a chain to the front axle originated in the mind of the inventor in Jacksonville, Fla., when he watched a stalled autoist vainly trying to make his way out of a sand bank. He told the man that the feat would be accomplished with the front chain attachment, and drew a sketch illustrating his scheme. Cleveland retained the idea, and soon after constructed a wood model and sent it to Washington.

Hearing through friends that Cleveland had such a patent, Herbert L. Wiggs, son of Mrs. W. H. Wiggs, of 150 West North avenue, began interested in the project and made Cleveland an offer for it, as the latter was on his way to Chicago to push the manufacture of the car. The inventor had been to South and Central America and had been advised to seek northern capital. Wiggs' offer was accepted and the home of the project was thus transferred to Atlanta.

After buying the rights, Mr. Wiggs received E. C. Calloway into partnership, and the two, with others, who have applied for stock, will push the manufacture of the machine in Atlanta. A charter has been drawn with a provision for a minimum and maximum capital stock of \$100,000 and \$5,000,000, respectively.

The machine was started about three months ago at the shop of the Pearl Laundry Machine Company, on Courtland street, and was built by J. E. Maritz, out of parts made entirely in Atlanta.

The car has been on several tours, and each trial has proven entirely satisfactory to the owners.

The machine's greatest accomplishments are its ability to make sharp turns gracefully and with the minimum of danger, and its utilization of the maximum power in the motor. The front wheels are turned in any direction, makes a doubly efficient turn, and renders skidding, common to the old-style cars, practically impossible, as the back wheels are headed in the direction of the car at the point of the turn, and tend to check the resultant momentum. An angle of forty-five degrees can be described at a good speed.

The utilization of motor power works along the principle of demand and supply, each set of wheels requiring an equal amount of power, and consequently wasting less power than the single-chain attachment. The difference in speed can easily be seen.

Patent rights have been secured in the United States, British possessions, France, Switzerland and Belgium and patents are pending in Russia, Spain and Italy.

The owners of the first completed machine declare their model will soon be on the streets, bearing the sign "Atlanta made."

**STANDARD OIL'S REPLY**  
Of Course, It Highly Approves of the Decision of Judge Grosscup

Chicago, Sept. 11.—Counsel for the Standard Oil Company of Indiana in an answer filed yesterday to the petition of the government attorneys for a re-hearing of the appeal made from Judge Landis' decision finding the company \$29,240,000 for violations of the anti-trust laws, practically endorsed the decision of Judges Grosscup, Baker and Seaman of the United States Circuit Court of Appeals, reversing the judgment and lifting the burden of the enormous fine, as good law amply justified by the record in the case. The conclusion stated by the answer is that the enormous fine inflicted upon the defendant was because of the ownership of its stock by the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, and because of the financial standing of the latter corporation is beyond dispute when the entire opinion of the trial court is considered.

Copies of the answer were served later in the day on the chief clerk in the office of United States District Attorney Sims. Under the rules of federal judicial procedure the government attorneys have the right to file a reply to the answer to their petition if they discover in it new matter which they consider needs a rejoinder.

The answer will be presented to Judges Grosscup, Baker and Seaman of the United States Circuit Court of Appeals and will probably be considered at the October term of court, which opens Oct. 6.

**SHOULD HAVE LIVED FOR SPIE**

Investigation reveals the fact that he is the same man who attempted to kill himself in the rectory of the church of the Holy Innocents, when Father O'Connell prevented him from doing so, acting directly upon the blood and mucous surfaces of the system.

Dr. Brooks was broken in health and in fortune, and a discouraging letter received by him from his wife a short time ago is believed by the police to have been the cause of the doctor's determination to kill himself. In this letter, filled with discouragement, the wife added: "Cheer up; you'll soon be dead."

## THE KEY WEST EXTENSION

Work Has Been Resumed and it is Believed Will be Finished in Sixteen Months

The Key West Citizen of Tuesday says:

"Without a word of notice the work on the railroad terminals started here this morning with a few men, it is true, but they are only the advance guard of the vast army that will be busy on the work from Knights Key to Key West. Those who have been waiting for an official notice of the resumption of the work will be disappointed. It is plain to be seen now that the company promises to gradually increase its force and when the laborers begin again to come in by the hundreds they will find the quarters ready for them. The camps at Pigeon Key and at Spanish harbor started with about a dozen men and have been increased at the rate of from ten to twenty men each week until today there is quite a force of men at each camp.

"This week there will be about fifty men at work on the terminal, but we have no hesitancy in venturing the assertion that within thirty days there will be several times that number.

"Word comes from up the line that No. 10 engine is being put in shape to be brought to Key West. If that is true there will shortly be a gang of men at work laying track and another gang with a dredge completing the fill from Trumbo Island to the grade on the upper end of the key.

"With a work train and an adequate number of dump cars the fill from Stock Island to Boca Chica will be a short job and from there on the grade has been completed for a number of miles.

"The railroad company is very reticent in discussing its plans, but they readily state that they intend to have trains running through to Key West by January 1, 1910. There is no doubt that trains will be running from Pine Key to Key West several months before then."

**LED THE LYNCHERS**  
An Ex-United States Senator Boasts of His Share in Executing a Negro

Memphis, Tenn., 11.—A special sheriff and his posse, former United States Senator W. V. Sullivan as follows with reference to the lynching Wednesday night:

"I led the mob which lynched Neise Patton and I'm proud of it. I directed every movement of the mob and I did everything I could to see that he was lynched. Cut a white woman's throat! And a negro! Of course I wanted him lynched. I saw him hanging from a tree this morning and I'm glad of it. When I heard of the horrible crime, I started to work immediately to get a mob. I did all I could to raise one. I was at the jail last night and I heard Judge Roane advise against lynching. I got up immediately afterward and urged the mob to lynch Patton. I aroused the mob and directed them to storm the jail. I had my revolver, but I did not use it. I gave it to a deputy sheriff and told him to shoot Patton and shoot to kill. He used the revolver and shot. I suppose the bullets from my gun were some of those that killed him. I don't care what investigation is made or what the consequence is. I am willing to stand them. I would not mind standing the consequences any time for lynching a man who cut a white woman's throat. I will lead a mob in such case any time."

**HOLLAND IS DISAPPOINTED**  
Amsterdam, Sept. 11.—Telegraphic dispatches confirm the report of Queen Wilhelmina's miscarriage, which occurred last Saturday evening. The general health of her majesty is satisfactory. Her accouchement was expected, various indications having been noticed early in April. Lately, however, the progress of her majesty has not been satisfactory.
