A. C. L. IMPROVEMENTS

State Engineer Finds Tracks on Ocala and Homosassa Divisions in Fairly Good Condition Tallahassee, Sept. 4, 1908. Hon. R. Hudson Burr, John L. Morgan, Newton A. Blitch, Commissioners, Tallahassee, Fla.: Gentlemen—I submit herewith report of the conditions of the track of the A. C. L. railroad from Croom to Ocala and Gainesville.

From Croom to some point between Center Hill and Okahumpka the track is laid with seventy pound rail. There are several places for short distances where tie renewals have not been completed and track a little out of surface. The balance of track is in good surface and line and ties are good. From the end of this rail, the track to Ocala is laid with fifty pound rail. I am not sure that it is all the same, but this was the weight of rail at points where I took measurements. The track shows in good surface and line with few exceptions to Ocala. The greater part is very good for fifty pound rail, tie renewals are being kept up and trestles show to be in good repair. From Ocala to Gainesville the track averages in fairly good condition. It is very good for track laid with fifty pound rail that has been in service as long as this rail has. It does not show in bad condition at any place, only at some places where the renewals have not been completed, some surfacing is needed. The trestles are being kept up and trestles show to be kept in good repair. Ocala to Homosassa From Gulf Junction to Homosassa, I find that considerable work has been done and the track is being put in good condition. The right of way has been cleared and a good many places in the track through the low country has been ballasted with cinders. A great many ties have been put in the track recently and ties are distributed along the road bed and in piles along the line for continued renewals. The road is in good surface and line where tie renewals have been completed, and is not in bad condition in other places. From Ocala to Juliette the track is in very good condition; tie renewals are being kept up and the track is in very good surface and line, with the exception of the curves between Rockwell and Leroy and near Martel. The rough track in these places seems to be due more to rail in bad condition rather than want of surfacing. Yours respectfully, (Signed) Frank P. Damon, Inspecting Engineer.
