Americans are First in the Conquest of the Air Lemans, Sept. 17.—On the field of Avours yesterday Wilbur Wright, the aeroplane pilot of Dayton, O., eclipsed all European records for sustained aeroplane flights. He remained in the air 39 minutes and 13.5 seconds. This gives the Wright brothers the record for both hemispheres.

GERMAN AIRSHIP COLLAPSED

Berlin, Sept. 17.—The Parseval airship buckled in the air yesterday and came down to the earth at Grunewald, near Berlin. At the time of the accident the airship was racing with the Gross balloon in the direction of Dohrzig, where Emperor William was waiting to witness the flight of two aerial monsters. Both the airships faced a light wind which freshened quickly until it became very difficult for the balloons to make any headway against it. When the interior of the balloon collapsed the machine started to come down. It cleared the water and landed on the roof of a house.

BRAVERY OF BELCHER

A St. Petersburg Policeman Charged Into a Dark Room and Killed a Desperado St. Petersburg, Sept. 17.—Constable E. A. George and an unknown Italian are dead, as the result of the most sensational affair ever known in St. Petersburg.

The Italian came here yesterday Tampa on the boat and during the entire voyage acted very ugly, refusing to pay his fare or to work his way to St. Petersburg. The police were notified and Chief Sims placed the Italian under arrest, and after leading him over to Constable George, who delivered him to the jail. Parties hearing a shot in the jail telephoned to the city and Chief Sims, accompanied by officers and citizens, went in post haste to the jail, where George was found lying in a pool of blood.

Defied the Officers "Who did this?" cried Chief Sims, and with that the Italian warned him to get away, at the same time displaying the revolver. A battle royal then followed, for the Italian stood, revolver in hand, defying anyone to get within reach of the weapon.

The fire department was called to the scene and played a stream of water into the jail, but finding this would not work, smoke was forced into the jail, but the desperado held the fort. After two hours of steady fighting and seeing that the Italian had no intention of giving up, ten or twelve shots were fired into the jail, but the Italian showed no fear and fired back at the officers.

Belcher's Bravery Officer Belcher then threw open the door of the jail and with Chief Sims walked into the jail. Upon seeing the officers the Italian ordered them to halt and leave the jail but Officer Belcher opened fire on the desperado, shooting three times, all of which took effect in the Italian's body.

With the revolver still clutched tightly in his hand the Italian fell face downward and was dead. As far as known the desperado was unharmed when he entered the jail, and it is believed that once upon the inside he pounced upon Constable George and took his revolver from him and then shot him dead.

When the body of the dead constable was rescued it was discovered that his head was badly beaten, his skull being crushed and part of his brain was lying on the floor.

A SIXTEEN FOOT STALK

They seem to be raising some corn up low way

Webster City, Ia., Sept. 17.—Although this season of the year always brings forth numerous "tallest corn" stories, many of which are imaginative, Webster City has an exhibition a corn stalk which is by actual and veracious measurement 16 feet and 3 inches in height.

This remarkable stalk is on exhibition at the local bank, and in the field from which it came there are many other stalks nearly as high. The highest ear on the stalk is 9 feet 7 inches above the ground, and only a giant could reach it without using a step-ladder. Practically the entire field will have to be cut before the corn can be pulled, as most of the ears are at too great a height to be reached by the ordinary man.

ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION

And Proposed Charter of the Estero Fruit Company The undersigned intending and proposing to organize a corporation under the general laws of Florida in relation to corporations for profit, hereby make and publish the following articles of incorporation and proposed charter, viz: 1. The name of the corporation shall be Estero Fruit Company, and its principal place of business shall be at Martel, in Marion county, Florida.

2. The general nature of the business to be transacted by the corporation is, to own, lease or otherwise acquire, orange, lemon and grape fruit groves, and real estate, sell, encumber, lease or otherwise dispose of the same; grow, buy and sell oranges, lemons, grapefruit, and other citrus fruits, and deal generally as fruit and produce growers and dealers, own, lease or rent and operate boats, trams, tramways and other means of transportation for private purposes, and for purposes of the business of the company, as may be necessary and proper in carrying on the business aforesaid, and deal generally in real estate.

3. The amount of capital stock authorized is the sum of fifteen thousand dollars, which will be divided into one hundred and fifty shares of the par value of one hundred dollars each, and will be paid in as follows: By a conveyance to said corporation by Messrs. Ray, Clark & Collier of a certain orange, lemon and grapefruit grove, situated at or near Estero, in Lee county, Florida, the just and true value of which is hereby fixed by the incorporators at the sum of ten thousand dollars, and the remainder of said capital stock will be paid in by a conveyance to said corporation of certain tools, implements and machinery now owned by the incorporators, and in labor and in cash, to an amount and value of not less than the sum of five thousand dollars, to be agreed upon at the first meeting of the stock holders hereof.

4. The term for which the corporation shall exist is fifty years.

5. The business of the company shall be conducted by a president, a vice president and general manager, and a secretary and treasurer, which said officers shall be elected at an annual meeting of the stockholders on the first Tuesday in December of each and every year. The officers who will conduct the business of the company until those elected at the first annual meeting shall be qualified are, Daniel A. Clark, President; H. M. Hampton, Vice President and General Manager, and Walter Ray, Secretary and Treasurer.

6. The highest amount of indebtedness to which the corporation can at any time subject itself is the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars.

7. The names and residences, and number of shares subscribed for by each subscriber are as follows: Daniel Clark, Martel, Florida, 50 shares. H. M. Hampton, Ocala, Florida, 50 shares. Walter Ray, Martel, Florida, 50 shares.
