SURE ENOUGH SEA SERPENT

Captured on the Irish Coast—Or May be the Whisky Was Extra Strong

Belfast, Sept. 17.—A red-eyed sea serpent, 20 feet 6 inches long, with a fan-shaped tail and a head like that of a conger eel, has been shot and dragged ashore in the Copeland Islands off County Down.

And photographs have been taken to prove it!

Two brothers saw a huge, snake-like creature lashing the waves "very like a whale." It was floundering in shoal water.

It required four men and a pony to drag the body ashore. The body tapers from six feet, its greatest thickness, to six inches at the tail, which is fan-shaped. It has three large fins and the body is covered with scales. The eyes are goggle-shaped and very terrifying.

PRELIMINARY HEARING OF MEL BURTON

Mel Burton in his testimony said Spragin knocked him down and was beating him unmercifully, when he, Burton, took out his knife and began using the weapon in self-defense. The trouble grew out of a pair of pants Burton brought to Spragin to have altered. He called a dozen or more times and at each time Spragin had an excuse. Finally Spragin insisted that Burton take a \$2.75 pair of pants that he, Spragin has gone out and purchased, in place of the \$5 pair Burton refused to take the substitute pants, but demanded payment for the ones Spragin had disposed of, and in consequence the assault took place.

After hearing all the arguments of the attorneys and the evidence in the case, Burton was discharged.

GRIEF AND ANGER OF A GEORGIA MOTHER

Shot a Negro Who Had Assaulted Her Child

Powder Springs, Georgia, Sept. 17.—After forming and heading a posse to chase Robert Bostick, a negro, who had attacked her 9-year-old daughter, Mrs. Sarah Reed, wife of a prominent citizen, shot the negro full of birdshot as soon as he was overtaken.

Bostick was employed at the Reed home, and enticed the little girl into an outbuilding, where he attacked her and then fled. When the child told her mother, Mrs. Reed (her husband not being at home) armed herself with a shotgun, formed a posse of neighbors, and led them in pursuit of the negro. After a long chase the negro was discovered hidden behind a log in the woods. Mrs. Reed called on the members of the posse to stand back. She raised her gun and discharged both barrels into the negro, probably fatally wounding him.

She began to reload the gun, when the sheriff and deputies rode up and took charge of the negro. Mrs. Reed, sobbing, begged the sheriff to let the negro Bostick. The sheriff hurried the negro to Marietta to prevent a lynching.

HADN'T ROOM IN HOLLAND

So He Has Brought His Wife and Thirteen Children to Expand With This Country

President Roosevelt would have been "de-light-ed" had he been on the Holland-America Line pier yesterday when the steamship Rotterdam docked and welcomed Myrheer William M. Branderhorst, his laughing wife and thirteen happy, robust children. Myrheer Branderhorst, who is only thirty-eight, left his native town of Noordbrabant, Holland, he said, to come to America, where he would have room enough to raise a family and where there would be opportunity for his children to grow up and expand. The thirteen, he asserted, was only a beginning.

"Holland is a fine country," he said, "and I love it; but for a man who wants to raise a big family, it is too cramped. I am a firm believer in the anti-race suicide doctrine advanced by President Roosevelt and, hearing that there was plenty of farm land here, I talked it over with my wife and we came. The country offers opportunities to my children they could not get in Holland. We are both young and hope the family will increase in the future as rapidly as it has in the past."

The Holland farmer brought his family over as cabin passengers, having during his twenty years of married life amassed something beside a record breaking family. He will go as far west as Bella, Iowa, where he will either take up farming or enter some other business. Of the thirteen children, nine are girls and the rest boys. Booth Tarkington, who was on board, took an unusual interest in the family. He said he would call President Roosevelt's attention to it as
