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SULTAN WILL SURRENDER

His Rights as a Suzerain Over Bul-
garia—Is Now Looking for a Soft
Place to Fall

Constantinople, Oct. 7.—The council of ministers held a long session yesterday for the purpose of considering the action of Bulgaria in declaring her independence of Turkey.

The council decided that it is impossible to accept any proceedings that violated the existing treaties, and that Turkey should address a circular note to the powers, pointing out the necessity of taking measures to enforce respect for the Berlin treaty.

Replying to a telegram sent the Turkish government by Prince Ferdinand, Turkey states that she has invited the powers to confer on the situation, and as her rights are guaranteed by the powers she will look to them for their defense.

THE GUESTS OF HONOR

In Chicago Today are Bryan, Taft and
Wu Ting Fang

Chicago, Oct. 6.—With William H. Taft, William J. Bryan and Wu Ting Fang as its guests of honor and principal speakers, the Lakes to the Gulf Deep Waterway Convention will begin its sessions in the auditorium today.

Judge Taft is scheduled to speak this morning, at the opening session, and will meet Mr. Bryan at the Chicago Association of Commerce "waterways dinner" this evening. Owing to the non-political nature of the gathering, both Mr. Taft and Mr. Bryan will confine their remarks to waterways and commercial development, and campaign issues will be carefully ignored.

A Graceful Compliment to Taft

There will be no question as to which of the candidates will receive the nod at the right hand of the chairman. It will be occupied by Mr. Taft at the express wish of the democratic nominee and his friends. Chairman Mack declared that Mr. Taft, as a recent member of the present administration, was clearly entitled to the place of honor at the feast. The Ohioan, therefore, will sit at the right hand of President Hall, and the Nebraskan at the left.

LONGWORTH SAYS ITS A LIE

That he Said That Roosevelt Would
Try to Succeed Taft in 1917

Cincinnati, Oct. 7.—Congressman Nicholas Longworth, who was in Cincinnati yesterday, en route East, to continue his speaking tour, denounced as a campaign lie the widely printed story that in a speech at Rock Island, Ill., he proposed that after Judge Taft had served two terms as president, that President Roosevelt would again be a candidate for the presidency.

BRUIN KILLED THE BABY

The Terrible Result of an Attempt to
Make a Pet of a Wild Beast

Tucson, Ariz., Oct. 7.—A terrible tragedy was enacted at Elysian Grove, a pleasure park, when an immense black bear escaped from a cage and charged a throng of visitors.

The animal, which had been raised in captivity from a cub, had been in the habit of drinking soda pop at the bar and when he escaped he went there. The bear became enraged and charged the crowd.

The wife of a Southern Pacific employe, Bess Laird, ran with a car-curtain containing an infant. The bear pursued and snatched the infant and crushed it to death before its mother's eyes.

It was attacking the woman when a shot from a policeman's revolver stopped it. The bystanders opened a fusillade and killed the bear with a score of bullets. The bear had been closely confined since a week ago when it attacked a small boy.

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SLIPPING INTO THE SEA

It Will Not Be Many Million Years
Before Waves Again Roll Over
the Peninsula of Florida

Tallahassee, Fla., Oct. 6.—The state of Florida, according to State Geologist Sellards, who has just completed a survey of its underground waters, is being gutted and carried into the ocean. Dr. Sellards does not think there is cause for alarm at the prospect, since the rate of reduction as at present noted is not more than a foot in every period of 5,000 or 6,000 years, yet the fact is indisputable to the geological eye, and since this is the first official survey conducted under the authority of the state government it is well worthy of notice and consideration.

Dr. Sellards points out that the topography of the state is lacking in evidences of any violent upheaval, distortion or folding, the topographical features being the result of the combined action of eroding agencies which have been working since the first appearance of the peninsula as dry land. The underground water has acted under exceptionally favorable conditions since the open nature of the soil and rock permits the greater part of the water to enter the earth, establishing subterranean rather than surface drainage.

The State Dissolving

"In Central Florida," says Dr. Sellards, "the topography and general surface features are determined to a large extent by the work of underground water. Solution is the most important result of underground water circulation. That underground water is efficient as a solvent is evident from the analyses of well and spring waters. Rain water entering the earth with almost no solids in solution returns to the surface through springs and wells with a load of mineral solids in solution determined by the length of time it has been in the ground, the distance traveled and the character of the rocks and minerals with which it comes in contact. The mineral water thus taken into solution is carried along with water, and while some of it is re-deposited, a large amount is removed annually. An estimate of the total mineral solids thus removed is difficult. A conception of the largeness of the amount removed is obtained from a consideration of some of the individual springs."

Silver Springs' Freightened Waters

Dr. Sellards takes Silver Spring in Marion county, at the head of the Ocklawaha river, which is a famous spot known to thousands of people all over the country by reason of its popularity with the tourists, as an example of many springs that are engaged in the business of dissolving the interior of the state and rushing their freighted waters off to the sea in such surreptitious innocence that hereafter the people have been uninformed as to the dangers which their purring waters threatened in removing the ground beneath their feet. Analysis of the waters of Silver Spring shows that there are 274 parts solid per million parts of water. Otherwise expressed each million pounds of water is carrying with it 274 ounces of solids in solution. Silver Spring is estimated to flow a little more than 3,000,000 pounds of water per minute (368,913 gallons.)

"From these estimates it would appear," he continued, "that the surface level of the central peninsular section of Florida is being lowered by solution at the rate of a foot in five or six thousand years."

The Disappearing Lake

Readers of the Morning News will recall an account of a disappearing lake published during the summer of last year. This phenomenon was witnessed by hundreds of people, and this subject has been investigated by Dr. Sellards in the course of his work in gathering information concerning the underground waters of the state. Such occurrences, while interesting, are not to be wondered at in Florida, says he, since the state is dotted with surface sinks and a sink may break through the bed of a lake at almost any time and let the waters through to join the underground supply. Lake Johnson, near Tallahassee, was drained in this manner in 1907.

In his report Dr. Sellards gives this mention of the occurrence: "In April, 1907, a sink formed near the southwestern side of the basin, rapidly draining the lake. In June a second sink formed to the south of the old sink, and carried off the water in a local depression surrounding it. Mud and surface material were carried into the sink, with the result that the underground outlet was soon clogged, preventing further escape. Seepage from the sides, together with the rainfall of the following summer, converted the basin into a lake again."

Dr. Sellards can be given a preliminary report on the underground water supply of Central Florida, which will be interesting to many who have wondered at the numerous lakes and sink holes that had been without apparent cause. It is the first serious work of the geological department since its establishment a year ago, and promises to be of great value and wide distribution.—Savannah News.
