BRYAN IN IOWA

Cedar Rapids, Ia., Oct. 8.—"I present myself as an example of one who has outlived the venomous attacks of his opponents. You heard me called a demagogue twelve years ago. You saw them bury me and you heard them chant their songs over my grave, and now they have to explain why it happened that I was not dead."

With all the fervor that he could master, W. J. Bryan, facing a vast assemblage in the Chautauqua Auditorium between Tama, and Toledo, Ia., yesterday delivered himself of this utterance. At no time during the present campaign has he spoken so earnestly, or with such vigor.

His remark followed a bitter denunciation of Mr. Taft for refusing to agree to a publication of campaign contributions before election. "No honest man and no political party conducting an honest campaign," he declared, "need be afraid of the light."

At Woodward he heaped ridicule on the Republicans by charging them with taking credit for the growth of crops, the shining of the sun and the bringing of rain. "In fact," he said, "they seize upon anything that they think gives a plausible excuse for voting the Republican ticket." At Maxwell, he compared the granting of special privileges to a case of poison in the human system. "There has been a poison at work in our politics," he declared, "and today its manifestations are such that I believe the American people are ready to apply the remedy, and that poison is the poison of privilege, the poison of favoritism. Our government has been run too largely in the interest of the favored."

all day in the course of his travels through the state, the Democratic candidate, never in better form, hurled defiance at his opponents and challenged them to meet his arguments. Fifteen speeches and handshaking with thousands constituted his day's work, the concluding speech being made here last night in the auditorium, which was filled to overflowing.

TAFT MAY INVADE THE SOUTH

Washington, Oct. 8.—The story comes here from the Taft "bandwagon" in Missouri that the Republican candidate is planning to make a tour into the South, but that his itinerary is being kept secret for fear Mr. Bryan will follow him.

The story is that Mr. Taft himself is trying to persuade his managers that he should make a trip through the South, making a fight for the electoral votes of Kentucky, Tennessee, North Carolina and Georgia, but his managers are not inclined that way.

Whether Mr. Taft is tired of the fight and wants to get into pleasant country where Mr. Bryan will not trouble him, whether he feels that he must have several Southern states to get elected, or whether his confidence of the North impels him to seek votes in the South for the mere glory of it, is not figured out here.

But all agree that if the last is his view, he is the only Republican leader who is so deceived. In spite of the apparent authenticity of the story it is believed here that Taft will not go to Georgia. He may be allowed to go once to North Carolina.

ROOSEVELT IS CONFIDENT

Washington, Oct. 8.—President Roosevelt is entirely confident that William H. Taft will be elected to succeed him, according to George R. Sheldon, treasurer of the Republican National Committee, who was the President's guest yesterday at luncheon.

Mr. Sheldon came from New York at Mr. Roosevelt's request to discuss with him the general political situation. After the conference Mr. Sheldon gave out a statement in which, with the authority of the President, he denied that Mr. Roosevelt does not approve the manner in which Chairman Hitchcock is running the campaign.

Mr. Sheldon said the President heartily approved Mr. Hitchcock's management of the campaign and Mr. Hitchcock has the President's entire confidence. The report that Mr. Sheldon would resign as treasurer of the committee was positively denied as was a rumor that some differences exist between the President, Secretary Root and Mr. Sheldon.

Mr. Sheldon stated that campaign contributions had not been as liberal as in previous campaigns, but this he attributed to various state laws on the subject. The Republicans, however, he said, would have enough to carry them through the campaign.

MACK SURE OF NEW YORK

Chicago, Oct. 8.—Norman E. Mack, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, made known last night the reasons upon which is based his prediction that New York State may safely be regarded as Democratic this year. Mr. Mack's statement regarding the situation in the empire state is as follows:

"The Democratic party in New York was never more united, not even in 1892, than it is this year, the state is never doubtful when the Democrats stand together. With a united party we find our opponents all shot to pieces; some Republicans are opposing Roosevelt, others are against Hughes, while another faction is set against Taft."

"As an instance of the union of the Democratic forces, the National Democratic Club of New York city, composed of 1,400 members made up of bankers, merchants and professional men, opposed Bryan almost to a man in 1896 and 1900."

"I am told that 95 per cent. of the club's membership is ready to support Mr. Bryan this year and the club recently passed resolutions endorsing him and have contributed \$2,500 with a promise to contribute a like amount later. With this situation I feel that New York is not only safe for Bryan but there will be a Democratic landslide."

BAD LUCK FOR BOOKER

Jackson, Miss., Oct. 8.—A score of persons were more or less seriously injured yesterday just as Booker T. Washington closed an address at the Coliseum on the Fair grounds. An audience of 4,000 or 5,000 persons had assembled to hear him, many white people from the city being present occupying reservations on the gallery. As the crowd arose to leave, one section of the gallery gave way with a crash and the occupants were precipitated to the floor beneath, but not instantly, the fall being gradual. However, several were more or less seriously hurt from the fall, or by being trampled under foot by the panic stricken negroes on whose heads the occupants of the gallery were spilled.

ROOSEVELT'S SHORT MEMORY

Baltimore, Oct. 8.—"When President Roosevelt so sweepingly condemned Haskell for his alleged connection with the Standard Oil Company, he perhaps forgot that in 1904 his, Roosevelt's, committee received \$100,000 from the Standard Oil Company and spent it."

This statement by Judge Alton B. Parker, of New York, brought to their feet in a burst of wild applause 6,000 Democrats who assembled last night in Richmond Market Hall to hear him. Senator John W. Daniel of Virginia, A. C. Bacon of New York and others discuss the issues of the campaign.

"And when Chairman George B. Cortelyou of the National Committee in that year went to the Standard Oil Company by appointment to ask for money for the campaign fund," continued Judge Parker, "he was not satisfied with \$100,000, but wanted more."

"It may be true that Roosevelt wrote to Cortelyou telling him to send that \$100,000 back to the Standard Oil Company, but it is equally true that Cortelyou did not send it back, but used it. And it is also true that he was never punished by Roosevelt for not sending the money back. On the contrary, he was rewarded by being made a Postmaster General of the United States and afterward Secretary of the Treasury."

Senator Isador Rayner, in introducing Judge Parker gave, among other reasons why Bryan's election is to be desired, that "he is so little like Roosevelt."
