PRESS ASSOCIATION MEDAL CONTEST

Offer Open to Boys and Girls of the High Schools of the State of Florida—Excellent Opportunity for the Pupils of the Ocala High School.

Quincy, Oct. 9.—At the last regular meeting of the Florida Press Association it was decided to offer to the boys and girls of the high schools of the state two medals valued at \$30 and \$20 respectively. These medals are offered for the best work in declamation under the rules given below. The purpose of the contest is to foster the love of oratory in the breasts of the children, to assist in upbuilding the high school of the state, and to promote a warmer feeling of comradeship between the boys and girls of Florida.

The rules of the contest, which are printed below, are drawn with a view of making the contest absolutely impartial to contestants, schools and sections. The boys from Gainesville will have no better chance to win one of the medals than his schoolmate from Key West or Pensacola.

The offer of the press association evidences on its part an interest in the public schools of the state. The newspapers of Florida have always been on the side of the common school and have been of inestimable importance in the upbuilding of the sentiment in favor of the advanced high school course. These medals are but an additional mark of their interest, and it is the duty of the principals and school officers of the state to see that the contest is a memorable one.
