OUR TRIP TO THE GULF

About four weeks ago papa, mamma and I decided we would take a trip to the coast. The morning we left we were joined by our cousin, Charley Carter, and Eli Baxley, at Wildwood. From there all went along merrily until noon, when we stopped for dinner. There we took one of the hardest rains of the season. But we took it as a good joke and continued our journey. That night we camped at Pemberton's Ferry. We started from there early next morning and arrived at my uncle's that night about 8 o'clock. We had then traveled in two days 70 miles. After resting over the Sabbath a party of men, seven in number, went on a deer hunt. They stayed four days and killed seven deer. The following Tuesday several families joined us and we all went on a big hunt. All enjoyed themselves. My uncle took along a large tent for the ladies. We camped near the Wish-Wash Springs, an ideal place for a camp. Our party this time killed four deer. I tell you it was lots of fun cooking venison on the oak coals. Mr. Henry Carter, my uncle, killed the largest deer. It weighed over 100 pounds dressed. Mr. Ryles, one of our party, mounted the head for me. It looks as natural as life itself. We then had so much venison we wouldn't kill any more.

We all rested for a few days and then started for the coast. We went to Hammock Creek to the Latell fisheries. Hammock Creek is a beautiful place on the Gulf eight miles below Bay Port, not far from Arpeka. The fishermen went out fishing and in two hours caught over 800 fish. They came in at 3 o'clock in the morning and all of us had to go down to the dock and see the fish. They certainly looked beautiful, all in a pile. Then everybody was busy until after sunrise. We had a fine breakfast of fish and roe. We camped on the old camp ground, where we could get plenty of cabbage palmetto. They are so much nicer than garden cabbage. After breakfast Mr. Wallace McNatt took eight of us dinner on the bay. Then just as sunset was over, Mr. Latell invited us to take a sail with him. We went out about six miles and saw plenty of diamondback and sea turtles, shark and fish.

The last night we were there Mr. Latell invited us all up to his lovely home, where we spent a pleasant evening listening to some beautiful music. Mr. Latell played the piano and Mr. Ryles the violin. We had two fiddlers in camp and plenty more on the beach. After a three weeks' stay we broke up camp and started for home. After feasting on venison, fish, roe, squirrels and cabbage palmetto we began to feel homesick. We left Saginaw Thursday morning and arrived home Friday night at 7 o'clock. Will the Messrs. Carter, Gants, R. McNatts and Rewis accept thanks for the hospitality we received while in their homes? We enjoyed ourselves vastly. One of the Party.
