A SERIOUS ACCIDENT

As neither gentleman saw the approach of the other, Mr. Sands ran against Mr. Rodgers' mule, striking with his wheel the breast of the animal on the right hand side, causing her to rear and plunge, striking down Mr. Sands, and the animals wheeling like a flash, trampled Mr. Sands under foot and severely injured him. As the animals turned in the road they upset Mr. Rodgers' wagon and threw him violently to the ground, his previously injured shoulder receiving the shock, but he never lost his lines. The animals dragged him fully fifty feet when they ran against a tree, snapping off the end of the wagon-tongue. Fortunately the tree stopped the animals. Mr. Rodgers, after getting on his feet, immediately went to the assistance of Mr. Sands. A match was struck and a fire built. About this time along came Messrs. Carn and Bittinger, who soon ascertained the cause of the accident. Mr. Carn took Mr. Sands to town for medical aid, while the editor assisted Mr. Rodgers in getting the fragments together, splicing the broken pole, putting the wrecked bike on the wagon and driving into town.

It was a miraculous escape for Mr. Sands. Had he struck the pole of the wagon it would have killed him instantly, and how he escaped the hoofs of the mules and their vicious kicks is beyond comprehension.

Had Mr. Sands used a lantern on his bicycle the accident would not have occurred.

An alarm of fire was sounded at 12:20 yesterday, and it proved to be the residence of Mr. J. M. Meffert, living in the southwestern portion of the city, on what is known as the old Waterman place. The fire was caused by a defective flue in the fireplace of the sitting room. It burnt through the west side of the chimney. The furniture in the first story of the building was saved, but owing to the high prevailing winds, and despite the heroic efforts of the fire department, the main portion of the building was consumed. The kitchen was saved without any damage. The fire burned for three hours and drew an immense crowd. We understand that Mr. Meffert had no insurance on his home, and that temporarily he will remove to Lowell, where he has another home, which he occupied before purchasing this property and moving to Ocala. Mr. Meffert and family have the sympathy of the community in the misfortune that has overtaken them. Quite a misfortune overtook the hose wagon in its journey to the fire. As it attempted to turn the corner at Pittman's store the clasp of the breast plate of the left horse broke, and the team ran into the show window of Mr. Pittman's store, smashing the same, but doing very little damage to the horses. The harness was quickly repaired, and the driver, Ed Tucker, proceeded to the fire.

THE BAPTIST REVIVAL

Two Grand Sermons by Dr. Wharton to Large Audiences

Dr. Wharton, the noted Philadelphia Baptist evangelist, now in Ocala for a week, drew a big house Sunday morning at the Baptist church. In the absence of the vocal program, Dr. Wharton led the singer Mitchell, Dr. Wharton led the vocal program and did it magnificently, though he claimed he did not know a note.

Pastor Warren said as the collections were called for he desired for the people to be as liberal as possible as it took money to get Dr. Wharton here. He had hoped to have in use a new collection box which accepted a dollar or 50 cents complacently, but rang a gong at a quarter. Then there was craning of necks in the rear pews, and the remarks were general to the effect that the new device would do the ringing act on them to its heart's content.

Dr. Wharton took for his text Psalm 89:15. The sermon charmed the audience. They heard every word, and the effect was magical.

Dr. Wharton is not so tall, say five feet, ten, but of broad shoulders and expanding chest, and weighs easily 200 pounds. If his girth is any indication of avoirdupois. He is probably a man of fifty years, fine looking and well preserved as he appeared to a looker-on in the rear of the room.

Dr. Wharton has a soft, pleasant voice, speaks with great deliberation and distinctness, so every word he utters is heard. There is no effort on his part, and all through his ideal sermon he maintained the same tone of voice, entirely free from that style peculiar to most exhorters, who throw themselves into paroxysms of crescendo shrieks and then falling back into a collapse of utterance. Another marked feature of his sermon was when he made a statement it stood for all the impressiveness and power of good, pure Anglo-Saxon speech.

No synopsis we could give would do this grand sermon justice, and to emphasize this we say just go and hear Dr. Wharton, no matter what are your church or non-affiliations. If the former you will have more respect for your religion, and if the latter it will greatly assist you in getting the real blessing he spoke so tenderly and touchingly of. Services will be held every morning during the week from 10 until 11, except Saturday—no longer—and a sermon at 7:45 every night except Saturday night.

The morning subject was the "Golden Jubilee" as viewed from the material point as it effected the people of Judea, and from the New Testament version as it spoke of Jesus' presence, death and atonement. There were union services at the church last evening, and the attendance was so large that many people not only stood in the doorway and on the sidewalks but turned away for want of room to see and hear. Reverends L. W. Moore and W. C. Lindsay had seats on the platform. Dr. Wharton's subject was, "Building on Christ." It was a fine discourse and made a deep impression. The singing was truly inspiring. The interest evinced during the morning and evening services was of the character that indicated great good from them.

Among the pleasant things said by Dr. Wharton in the morning was that he did not see he could be of very great service here, as he had heard before coming here that Rev. L. B. Warren was the best preacher in Florida, and had done such splendid services during his pastorate that little remained, except for him to co-operate with him and help him to arouse deeper interest. There being no services at the Episcopal church last evening, quite a number of its members were present. Rev. Little went up to Orange Lake Sunday afternoon to minister spiritually to the people of that section.

INSTRUCTIONS

How to Qualify to Become Voters in the Primary Election.

All persons from other States who will have resided in this State one year, and in Marion County six months prior to April 11, 1904, are entitled to register. Any person who has never heretofore registered in this county must register with the district supervisor of registration of the district in which he now lives, or with the supervisor of registration at the central office at the courthouse, and obtain a registration certificate. Any citizen of this state who has moved in to Marion County and who will have resided in this county six months prior to April 11, 1904 (the last day for registration), must register with the district supervisor of registration in the district in which he now resides, or with the supervisor of registration at the courthouse.
