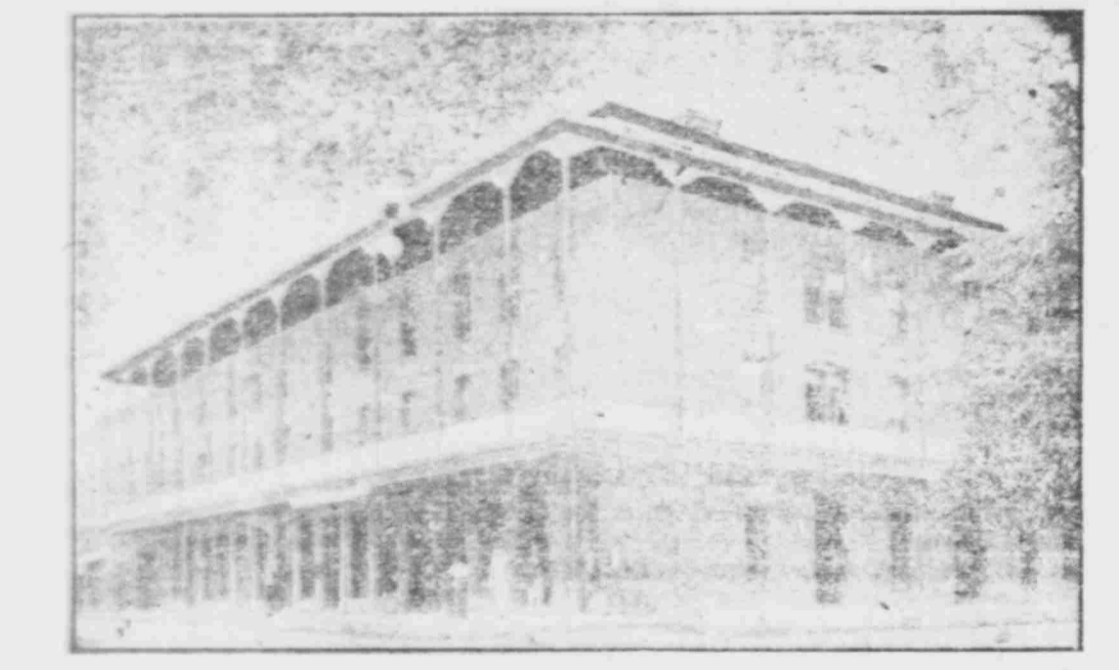

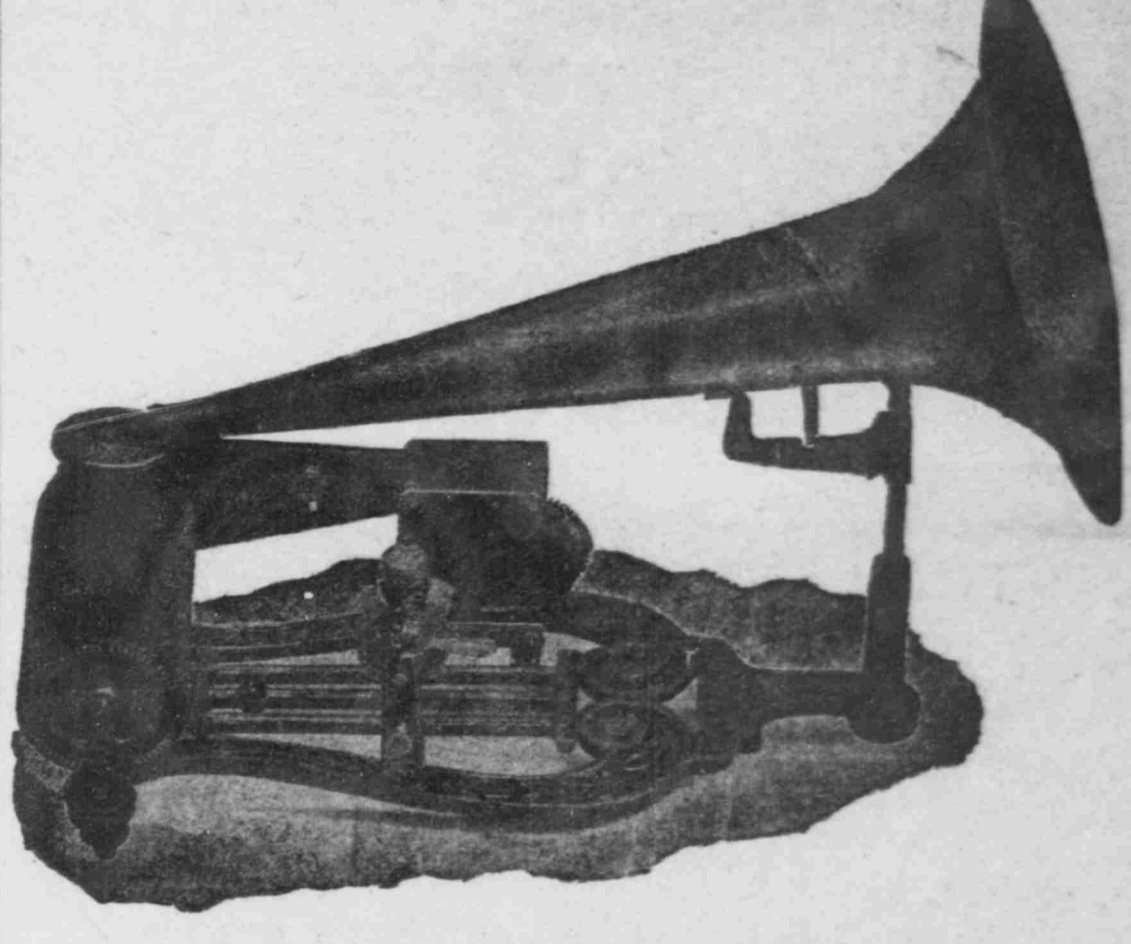
The male members of the Ocala colony went down to the lake Saturday afternoon to visit with their families over Sunday.
