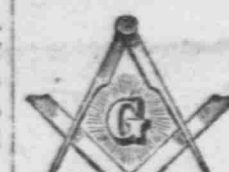

MORE COTTON THIS YEAR.

Washington, Nov. 23.—The amount of the crop of cotton of 1906 ginned up to Nov. 14, according to a bulletin issued by the Census Bureau today was 8,521,486 bales, counting round bales as half bales, as against 7,501,180, last year. The number of active ginneries is given as 27,881, against 28,310 last year. Of this quantity Florida ginned 43,831, of which 14,977 were Sea Island.

The return by Ponce is necessary owing to the fact that the battleship Louisiana cannot get outside the harbor of San Juan. Governor Winthrop tendered the presidential party a reception last night, which was the greatest social function in the history of Porto Rico.

KAISER WILHELM IN COLLISION.

Mammoth German Liner Ran Into a British Mail Steamer.

Cherbourg, France, Nov. 23.—A dispatch received here reports that the North German Lloyd steamer Kaiser Wilhelm Der Grosse, which left Southampton and Cherbourg Wednesday for New York, has been in collision with the Royal Mail steamer Orinoco. Both vessels were severely damaged.

It is declared that four members of the crew of the Kaiser Wilhelm were killed, while twelve were injured.

Five members of the crew of the Orinoco are missing and are supposed to have been drowned.

MURDED OF SPOUSES

A REGULAR BUSINESS.

Budapest, Nov. 23.—The Central Institute of Medicine has just completed chemical examinations of portions of twenty-five human bodies which have been exhumed at Knez, in the Temesvar district, and found that every one bore strong traces of arsenical poisoning.

As a result two peasant women have been arrested. It is charged that they made a regular practice of selling arsenic in this district to persons who desired to rid themselves of their spouses. Five men and two women have been arrested recently at Knez, charged with murdering their spouses. The investigation is progressing and further arrests are expected. Most of the inhabitants of Knez are Rumanians.
