"It is the opinion of Rev. Edward Abbott," says the Canadian Baptist, "that New Zealand is in many respects the most advanced of the governments of the world. In that colony women have had the right to vote always, and on all questions they vote on absolute equality with men. The government owns and manages the railroads, parcels express and the telegraph and telephone services, as well as the post office. If in any town there are not as many children as will justify the founding of a school, the children are carried to and from the nearest school free on the government railway. The government also carries on a banking and life insurance business, and a trust business such as is managed in our country by a trust company. Old age pensions are provided for, that insure old people against want. They must have reached a certain age, and have lived a fixed number of years in the colony, besides being free from any stain of criminality and without any private income. The country has also a system of compulsory arbitration.'




