A MYSTERIOUS MURDER

Body of a Middle Aged Jacksonville Lady Found Beneath Her Bed

Jacksonville, June 6.—Mrs. Mattie E. Carlisle was found dead beneath the bed in her room at 117 West Church street in this city, Sunday morning.

Mrs. Carlisle was the widow of Joseph Carlisle, a former merchant of this place, and since the death of her husband, several years ago, has made a business of renting furnished rooms to tourists during the winter season. Her house had been well filled until recently, and at the time of her death there were but two lodgers in the house, both young girl stenographers.

The young ladies left the house at 8 o'clock Saturday morning, and never saw her alive again. When they returned at noon Saturday they did not see her, but the house was open, as usual, and as they were only rooming there, it was a frequent thing that they did not see her in the middle of the day. When they returned in the evening, however, and could not enter the house, they raised an alarm and policemen searched the house, but without finding anything.

The young women refused to stay in the house, and went to the home of a neighbor for the night. Sunday morning they returned, and finding the woman still missing, the police department was again notified, and Detective James Crawford was sent to the house. He found the back door open and upon searching the house made the gruesome discovery. The body was under the bed and a blanket had been thrown across the bed to conceal it. The head and body had ugly contusions and the lower limbs of the victim were badly swollen.

There was no clue to indicate a motive for the crime. Two diamond rings were found on the dresser, and in a laundry bag currency to the amount of \$150 was found. There was no confusion to show that any struggle had occurred, and the death of the unfortunate woman is veiled in mystery. She was more than 50 years of age and had had no relatives or intimate friends here. One son, Dr. Carroll Carlisle, connected with Kress and Owens, manufacturing chemists of New York, has been notified.

The entire detective force is at work on the case.
