ITS STRATEGIC IMPORTANCE

Supplementing the summary in our issues of March 13 on the views of Commodore W. H. Beecher, U. S. N., on the strategic value of Key West as a naval base, an officer writes about the effect of the completion of the Florida East Coast Railway along the Florida keys on the strategic importance of Key West. This railroad is a wonderful piece of engineering work and is of the greatest military importance. No railroad in the country, writes our correspondent, is of more strategic value. In Europe such a road would have been built as a purely military road. This road is now in operation as far as Knight's Key, about thirty-five miles east of Key West, and removes all objection to Key West based on its isolation and lack of communication. It has been claimed that this railroad is much exposed to being cut by a landing force from cruisers, but as Commodore Beecher has shown, there are but few places where cruisers could navigate inside of the reef and then for only a short distance. A flotilla of torpedo boats could readily command the inner waterway and give adequate protection to this railroad. The protection afforded by the outer reefs, seven miles to the seaward from the railroad, is in itself a better protection than many other coast railroads have. This railroad and its telegraph lines will solve all the problems of the navy coast patrol in transmitting intelligence and facilitating the operation of torpedo boats and the navy forces to command the straits of Florida. The construction of the road has already had a marked effect upon the currents and tides. The filling between the keys has diverted the currents that passed between the reefs and the keys, north and south, until they now flow to a large extent around into the harbor of Key West—Army and Navy Journal.

PROPOSED NEW PENSION LAW

Section 1. That the governor, comptroller and treasurer of this state are hereby constituted the state board of pensions.
Sec. 2. Any person who enlisted in the military or naval service of the Confederate states during the war between the states of the United States and did not desert the same and who performed services in actual line of duty for a period of not less than one year, unless incapacitated for such duty by reason of wounds received or disease contracted while in line of duty and whose property valuation both real and personal does not exceed the sum of \$5,000 and who was a bona fide citizen of this state continuously since 1895, shall receive quarterly payments the sum of \$100 per annum, and all such persons who lost a limb or limbs, an eye or eyes, or who is disabled by reason of wounds, disease or age, to gain a livelihood by manual labor, shall be entitled to receive each in quarterly payments (per annum) the following amounts, to-wit:
Amount of Pensions
For total loss of eight, \$150; loss of one eye, \$100; loss of one leg or foot, \$125; loss of one hand, \$125; loss of both hands, \$150; loss of both feet, \$150; loss of one hand and one foot, of the same person, \$150; for personal injuries, disease or age, whereby the person is unable to earn a livelihood by manual labor, \$120; for total disability as shown by affidavit of some reputable physician, \$150; Provided, however, that no soldier or sailor or their widows, who were on the pension roll and drawing a pension prior to January 1, 1907, and have not since that time been stricken from said rolls for valid reasons, shall be required to make other of further proof, if eligible under the provisions of this act.
Sec. 3. The widow of any deceased soldier or sailor who enlisted and served in the military or naval service of the Confederate states or of this state during the war between the states of the United States and did not desert the same, and who performed service in actual line of duty for a period of not less than one year unless incapacitated for such duty by reason of death, wounds received or disease contracted while in actual line of duty and who has not been married since the death of her husband and whose property both real and personal does not exceed the sum of \$5,000 shall be entitled to receive the sum of \$120 (per-annum) in quarterly payments, provided such widow was married to such soldier or sailor, prior to 1895, and has continuously resided in this state since 1895, and also the widow of any deceased person who was at the time of his death drawing a pension from this state under the provisions of this act, shall be granted a widow's pension upon satisfactory proof of her marriage, her residence in the state and the death of her husband. And the pension so granted shall date from the death of the widow's husband; provided she files her application within ninety days after the death of her husband.
Sec. 4. No person receiving a pension from any other state, shall be entitled to a pension under this act.
Sec. 5. The payment of all allowed claims shall be made from the date of filing of the application in the pension department. Any person who drew a pension from the state at the time of the passage of this act and who is entitled to a pension under this act, shall upon making the proper application, be paid from the passage of this act. Payments shall not continue to pensioners during absence from this state of longer duration than twelve months.
Sec. 6. The person who was discharged on account of being underage, or for disability and who did not re-enlist upon the removal of the said disability upon becoming of the required military age of eighteen years before the termination of the war shall be entitled to a pension under this act.
