FIGHTING IN THE FILIPINES

Revolt of a Detachment of the Native Constabulary in Mindanao—Mutineers Repulsed and Driven to the Hills

Manila, June 16.—Part of the second company of native constabulary, stationed at Davao, Mindanao Islands, mutinied on the night of June 6, attacked the company quarters without warning, and gained possession of the quarters before resistance could be offered by a few native non-commissioned officers and several loyal members of the company.

Governor Walker immediately rallied the Americans and such natives as could be trusted in a large church and preparations for defense were hastily made during the night. Windows and doors were barred, loop holes cut, food and water taken into the building and everything made ready to withstand a siege.

At 5 o'clock in the afternoon the mutineers attacked the church. For three hours the fight raged. A heavy fire was directed against the church and its defenders, but Governor Walker and his small force repulsed with such vigor that they discouraged all attempts to storm the place.

In the meantime news of the mutiny had reached Hato, a town of considerable size, forty-six miles southeast of Davao. A company of constabulary stationed there hurried to the relief. Their approach caused the disloyal constabulary force to withdraw during the night. Thirty native troops escaped to the mountains with their arms and equipment.

Hard Crowd to Handle
The district of Davao in the island of Mindanao, where the native constabulary of the Philippines mutinied, is the home of the uncivilized hill men of the islands. They murdered a former governor and have been a constant source of danger to the whites who have entered the province for commercial purposes.

In Davao there is a considerable colony of Americans who raise and export hemp, copra and rubber.

Lieut. Allen Walker, of the Philippine Scouts, is the governor of the province, and it is a part of his command that is reported to have revolted.

Burn Children Alive
The hill tribes are wild and speak twenty-six dialects, which adds to the difficulty of civilizing them. Slavery still exists in the mountains above the coast towns, all prisoners captured in the fights between the tribes being held for menial service.

In his last report Gov. Walker says the hill tribes make human sacrifices to "Mandarangan," the devil in that part of the country, by burning children at the stake.

MARTIAL LAW IN MISSISSIPPI
Bloody Street Fight in Meadville Causes Troops to be Called Out
Meadville, Miss., June 16.—As the result of a street duel here yesterday afternoon Dr. A. M. Newman, chancery clerk of Franklin county, and Silas Reynolds, are dead. Dr. Lenox Newman, son of one of the deceased, and Herbert Applewhite, a lawyer, are probably fatally wounded, while Ernest Newman was shot in the leg and two others were slightly injured. The encounter was fiercely waged, and the lives of numerous bystanders were jeopardized. So much ill feeling was displayed by the friends of the combatants that a company of state troops from Brookhaven occupied Meadville and put the town under martial law.

EIGHT MEN DIED IN AGONY

A De Facto Snake in the Glass Poisoned an Entire Camp of Italian Workmen in West Virginia

Richmond, June 26.—Joseph M. Staten, bridge inspector for the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway, who has just returned from an inspection tour of West Virginia, tells of the remarkable death of eight Italian laborers on the Piney Creek branch of the road, near the town of Raleigh, following a wild debauch with a barrel of beer.

According to Staten, the men purchased and set up the barrel of beer in their shack in the mountains and proceeded to drink their fill. Later all eight were discovered lying about on the beds and on the floor dead.

To the fact that a considerable portion of the beer was still left in the barrel, the conclusion was reached that overindulgence had not caused the death of the men.

The barrel was taken into the yard and the beer allowed to escape thru the bung hole. None of the beverage was allowed to be drunk for fear it had been poisoned. A large rattlesnake was found in the bottom of the barrel after the beer had been drawn off. It is presumed that the snake, in its death agony, injected enough of its poison into the beer to kill the men who drank of it.

C., June 16.—Jesse Bunker, a deaf mute, the youngest son of Chang, one of the famous Siamese twins, was killed by lightning yesterday in his tobacco barn, in Surry county, where he and his son and a workman took shelter during the storm. Bunker's hat and one shoe were torn to pieces, but the body was not mutilated. The son and workman were knocked senseless for an hour or more. Bunker was 48 years old and prosperous.
