THE COUNTRY'S ONLY HOPE

Is in Making the Life of the Farmer More Pleasant and Profitable.

Washington, Aug. 14.—John W. Gates in a recent interview declared the development of this country had scarcely begun and commented on the limited population of the Southwest compared with its area. James J. Hill, the railroad magnate, in an interview, declared his belief that because of decreasing cattle supply compared with the increase in population, the time would come when the workman would be compelled to give up the eating of meat.

Agreeing with both, and suggesting the education in farming as the means to improve conditions, James Wilson, secretary of agriculture, gave out an interview here. "Mr. Gates is right in his assertion that this country is capable of supporting a vastly increased population," said Secretary Wilson, "but it can only be done with improved and more scientific methods of farming and better conditions all around."

"I agree with Mr. Hill. We are not producing foodstuffs in proportion to the increase in population. The chief reason for this is that the number of those engaged in agricultural pursuits is out of proportion to our ever-increasing population."

Cities Grow at Country's Expense "The trouble lies in the fact that the cities have grown in population at the expense of the rural communities. The people have moved from the country to the town, and in consequence the farms have not produced as they would if the people had remained to work them."

"The history of the country for the last 50 years gives abundant reason for this state of affairs. We began to develop our manufacturing about that time. We gave these manufacturing ample protection with a tariff which was a good thing for them and for the farmer, who found thereby a ready home market for his product. "But the factory offered better inducement to the youth of the farm, better wages, shorter hours, the attractions of a town or city life, lights at night, exciting recreation, and things which the farm had not. This tended to draw the life blood of the farm and did much to begin the trouble. Then we began to build railroads. These in their building and operation took the bone and sinew of the farm throughout the region they traversed."

Farmer's Life a Burden "About this time we enacted the homestead law, and began to give land away to whoever would go upon it and till it. This brought a horde of settlers, who took up vast sections of valuable land and began to farm. "The rich virgin soil tilled by these thousands produced abundantly, more than the section needed or could consume. In consequence prices dropped. Corn, wheat, rye, cattle, hogs, potatoes—all the staple articles of food dropped to prices so low as to make it not worth while to harvest them. "These conditions continued for years. The farmer's life was a burden, and, with mortgages facing him, a snare. There was no inducement for the son to follow in his father's footsteps and inherit either the burden or the homestead. The farmer who had taken up government lands dropped out of agricultural pursuits. "That is the condition that confronts us."

"True, the farmer today is in a better position than he has been for years. He is getting good prices, and he should not begrudge them to him after the long years through which he has passed. "Farmer Reaping His Reward "He has to work hard, 16 hours a day at least, but he is getting a long-deferred return for his labor. The way to get people from the city to the farm is a broader and wider distribution of agricultural education. "Most of our college boys today are strenuously working turning out lawyers, doctors, preachers and typewriters, but few of them make any effort to graduate a farmer. I would have agriculture in some form taught in every seat of learning and in our public schools. "Starting with the fact that while the farmer has to work hard he has as a reward better health, a longer life and a more independent existence than any other man on earth, it ought to be easy to make the life attractive. "Then I would have the young men taught the newest and latest methods of agriculture. Show them how they can produce more from an acre than their fathers did, prove to them how to make \$2 where their fathers made but \$1, and you will have offered the inducement needed to check the abandonment of the farm for the city."

New York, August 14.—Off for Germany, where he will make a series of flights in demonstration of the merits of the Wright aeroplane, Orville Wright sailed yesterday on the Kronprinzessin Cecilie. His sister, Katherine, accompanied him. They will make a brief stay in England. Last night in a brief interview, Mr. Wright said in effect that either he or his brother Wilbur, barring mishaps, could fly 1000 miles. While he did not say this directly, he hinted as much by saying that their perfected machine could carry fuel enough to last 25 hours, which would enable it to travel 1000 miles if a 40-mile speed was maintained.

CASTRO HAS LOST HIS CASH

Venezuela's Ex-Dictator Has Been Dosed With His Own Medicine.

Caracas, Aug. 14.—The much heralded appeal of Cipriano Castro to the Venezuelan congress, which was referred by Castro's friends in that body to a special committee for report, has died a natural death in the committee room, and instead of the desired report the curious ex-presidential message has been achieved. Thus a last spasmodic effort of the few friends of the late dictator to awaken some sentiment for their fallen idol has failed, and the ex-dictator has not even had the satisfaction of having his words reproduced in the Venezuelan newspapers, as must have been his wish.

Wiping Out Castro's Fortune The systematic spoliation of the fortune which Castro left behind him in Venezuela has proceeded with such glancing strides that after the first six months the \$5,000,000 of known assets have been almost totally wiped out. The method by which \$1,000,000 of Castro's property was reduced to \$500,000 and this paltry remainder then taken away from him will probably be a revelation even to Castro himself.

He is now having a taste of the same medicine which he administered to the Venezuelan people for so many years.

SOUTHERN RAILWAY TRAIN SMASHED TO SPLINTERS

Bristol, Va., Aug. 14.—While going down grade at forty miles an hour, the Washington and Chattanooga vestibule train southbound left the track on the Southern Railway two miles west of Midway, Tenn., at 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The engine turned over and rolled down a bank, followed by the mail and baggage and express car.

As if by a miracle nobody was killed but ten persons were injured, including Engineer Samuel Bush, Knoxville, who is believed to be fatally hurt. The engine and four cars are a complete wreck. The coaches were torn to splinters without seriously injuring any of the passengers. The mail car was split in two and the floor hurled forty feet into a field, with Postal Clerks R. W. Hunt and Fay Pierce clinging to it.
