ADMIRAL DEWEY'S OPINION

The Veteran Sailor Disputed Congressman Landis' Assertions Regarding the Navy.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 9.—Defending with characteristic vigor the American navy, Admiral George Dewey says that not only is our navy not a "bluff," but he is confident that it would give a good account of itself should war ever come.

The admiral's remarks were called forth by a statement attributed to former Representative Landis of Indiana, who in a recent speech at Cincinnati, in advocating a ship subsidy, is reported to have said that "those Americans who are informed consider our navy a bluff."

The expression was characterized by Admiral Dewey as "a piece of gutter journalism."

But the American navy is not quite so helpless as one might imagine from Mr. Landis' remarks," said the admiral. "We have fifteen colliers and several transports already in service. Of course, these would not be enough in time of war, and I hope that we will continue to that number. If we were to have a war, we could purchase no many ships as we might need. It would, of course, be a great deal better if we had them already. The admiral declared that the United States needed a merchant marine not only for the value it might possess as furnishing auxiliaries to the navy, but to carry the American flag in the marts of the world.

"But," said Admiral Dewey, "there will be no war. And so long as we go ahead steadily and moderately in adding to our navy, replacing the older ships with the most modern type, thus keeping our navy abreast of the world, no one will ever be able to say, like Mr. Landis, that other nations do not regard the American navy seriously."

CAUGHT UNDER THE CORN

A Negro Mill Hand Smothered to Death in a Torrent of Grain

Atlanta, Oct. 9.—Caught under the rush of tons of corn at the Atlanta Milling company's plant yesterday afternoon, Lowry Arubrug, a negro twenty years of age, was smothered to death before relief could be given.

This story parallels the tragedy in Norris' remarkable story of wheat, in which the wheat king is smothered in the tremendous rush of grain in the chutes.

Arubrug and another negro, both new to the work, were engaged near the chute at the Atlanta mill, where a resistless tide of corn was pouring through. The falling grain got a grip on Arubrug's leg, and as he struggled to release himself he began screaming in fear. Simpson, the other negro, rushed to his aid, but Arubrug was sucked under through the chute buried under fifteen feet of corn. When the negro was dug out he was dead.

CANAL CALLS FOR MUCH COIN

Expense is Mounting Toward Fifty Million a Year

Washington, D. C., Oct. 9.—The Panama Canal Commission has forwarded an estimate of \$48,000,000 as necessary to continue the construction work during the fiscal year of 1911. This is ten million dollars more than in 1908. Fifteen millions are for supplies and the remainder for general expenses. Two hundred and ten millions have been appropriated for the canal to date.

COLUMBUS LATE COMING

Hudson and Fulton Left Little Enthusiasm for the Premier Discoverer.

New York, Oct. 9.—Surfeited with parading, illuminations and decorations, residents of New York are preparing to breathe one long sigh of relief Saturday night at the end of the Hudson-Fulton frolic.

And just as they were congratulating themselves that they would not have to do any cheering until New Year's Eve, along comes Christopher Columbus and helps himself to the first legal holiday, Tuesday, Oct. 12, 1909.

Just two days after Messrs. Hudson and Fulton have returned to history to recuperate from the roughest voyage either of them ever experienced, the man who first ascertained our whereabouts will come back for his share of the municipal applause. Judging from the weariness of the folks hereabouts, Christopher will have to do some tall hustling to dig up a few cheers for himself. Everybody is willing to concede that he did a neat little trick when he found our hiding place, but no one has the strength left to make a demonstration. There may be a few warmed over cheers here and there, but the populace, for the most part, is cheerless.

Last week New Yorkers were jaunted off their own sidewalks by 2,000,000 strangers, and this week they have left in limbo. Unless Columbus comes in on an airship no one will see him, the custom of wearing the face half way down the back being universal since Wright flew in the air and Curtiss flew to St. Louis.

Next Tuesday afternoon, however, 26,000 members of Italian societies will parade in honor of Columbus. Unofficially Columbus Day has been observed in New York since 1892, but it was not made a legal holiday until the last session of the legislature.

A DUTY ON GUM RESIN

If it is Imposed, it Will Greatly Help American Naval Stores Men.

Although the treasury department in Washington puts off inquiries with the statement that a few days, and Capt. Henry Blun, Jr., of Savannah, who interceded with the Federal authorities about the matter, declines to discuss it, there was a well founded rumor among the naval stores trade yesterday to the effect that an import duty had been imposed on rosin, says the Savannah News of Friday.

If this is true—and there seems to be no doubt about it, though it cannot be confirmed yet—it is a great victory for Capt. Blun and will mean much for the industry throughout the length and breadth of the turpentine belt. France has been importing gum rosin into the United States free of duty and supplying the consumers at a price which was practically the production cost in America.

French Rosin in Competition

Several months ago the Savannah board of trade passed resolutions protesting vigorously against the admission of gum rosin free of duty. Congressman W. G. Brantley, of the First district, and the senators from Georgia have for some time been trying to convince the administration at Washington that a serious injury was being done the rosin industry by its failure to impose a duty. But all of these agencies seemed to avail nothing, and French rosin continued to come in in competition with the American product.

Then Postmaster Blun, republican national commissioner from Georgia, according to the News, became interested in the matter. He went to Washington the latter part of last week and in a business like manner presented the case to the treasury department officials. He had the facts and figures with him and at the conclusion of the argument the matter was referred to the appraiser at the port of Philadelphia. Here is where official information ends, but a report was current among the trade here to the effect that the appraiser had submitted to his report back to the treasury department, recommending a duty of 20 per cent. ad valorem and that a decision had been reached in accordance with this report.

Is a Great Victory

If this is true it is a great victory. It will mean that rosin which has been shipped into this country and sold for \$5 a barrel, for illustration, will cost the consumer \$6, as the duty on a \$5 package is 20 per cent. ad valorem would be \$1. Just what effect this will have on the domestic article has not appeared, but one thing is certain, the import duty will either shut off the French shipments entirely or will enable the price of domestic rosin to maintain itself.

Because of cheaper labor conditions, and a limited demand for rosin in France, the French product can be exported to this country almost at less cost than the domestic rosin can be produced and supplied, if no import tax is charged. Last year alone something like 100,000 barrels of French rosin were imported.

A FIRE HORROR IN NASHVILLE

Nashville, Oct. 9.—Four persons were burned to death yesterday in a fire which destroyed a brick dwelling at the corner of Eight avenue and Jefferson street.

The fire was clearly of incendiary origin. When the alarm was given the building was enveloped in flames. The inmates were hanging out of the windows, begging for aid. The firemen ran up several ladders and succeeded in rescuing eight people, several of the rescued being of a most thrilling character. The four unfortunate persons were in rooms just above where the fire originated and could not be reached. Their charred bodies have been taken from the ruins. Two negroes are under arrest, charged with the crime.

MANEUVER NO MORE

The Boston Campaign has Taught the Military Authorities a Good Lesson

Washington, Oct. 8.—Joint maneuvers of the regular army and national guard are a thing of the past. At least there will be no repetition of the national guard armories since then, as the present directing forces in the war department are in control.

Some valuable lessons were learned in that period of stress and privation, but the cost in human suffering is held by the war department officials to have been out of all proportion to benefits derived, and besides they are now convinced that all of real utility that was taught to the militiamen could just as well have been imparted through other means and without filling hospital cots during the campaign and without causing dreary lists of absentees and company roll call in the national guard armories since then, attributable to pneumonia and dysentery extending over weeks after the return of the militia from the field.
