**TRIBUTE TO THE WORK OF A FLORIDA MAN**

A high tribute to the work of the late John O. LaFontisee, of Jacksonville, who, with Asa L. Brower, conducted the government's thorough-going study of the naval stores industry last year, was paid by R. S. Kelley, assistant forester in charge of forest statistics of the United States forest service, in his speech at the Annual Convention of Turpentine Operators' Association in Jacksonville on Wednesday. Assistant Forester Kelley said:

"Another step toward increasing our knowledge of the naval stores industry was taken when, at the instance of Senator Taliaferro, the agricultural appropriation bill for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1908, provided \$10,000 for an inquiry into the destruction of forests by the production of turpentine and rosin and the sources and methods of the industry.

"To carry out the provisions of Senator Taliaferro's amendment, the forest service detailed to the work Mr. John O. LaFontisee, of Jacksonville, and Mr. Asa L. Brower, a graduate of the University of Michigan. With Mr. LaFontisee's energy and sterling qualities you were acquainted even better than were we in the forest service. We who worked with him sincerely regret with you his untimely death, and we both realize full well the real loss which it brought to the naval stores industry.

"Mr. LaFontisee and Mr. Brower traveled through every part of the South gathering statistics of production, and making a careful study of the longleaf pine forests. The facts which they secured, and the conclusions which they reached give most valuable information upon the present status of the industry.

**VALUE OF THE LOWLY PEANUT**

The peanut is rapidly becoming an important farm product throughout the Southern states, says the Richmond News Leader.

Its vines are valuable as forage and the peas that are not marketable can be used for feeding purposes. Throughout the boll-weevil district of the cotton belt the peanut is grown as a money crop, and special oil-producing varieties will assist in keeping the oil mills of the Southern states supplied with raw materials. The value of the commercial peanut crop of the United States for the year 1908 was estimated at \$12,000,000.

Although the majority of people recognize the peanut only as it appears for sale in the shell, hulled and salted, as peanut candy or in the form of peanut butter, many new lines of consumption have been found for it in the past few years.

In addition to these uses it is an ingredient of the peanut and vegetable meat, peanut meal and salad oil. In the preparation of vegetable meats portion of the oil is pressed from the ground peanuts, other ingredients, including vegetables substances, are added, and the whole is crushed and pressed into tins ready for use.

Peanut meal, made from finely ground blanched peanuts, is used in confections, such as almonds, macaroons and small cakes, to which it imparts the desired almond flavor.

Peanut oil is used in the same manner as olive oil; also for mixing with cotton seed oil in order to improve the quality of the seed oil for salad purposes.

Peanut oil is of somewhat lower value than first-class olive oil, and is sometimes mixed with it for the production of oil that can be sold at a lower price than pure olive oil. On the other hand, it is of a higher grade than cotton seed oil.

With the coming shortage of cotton seed with which to manufacture oil in this country, there is a great possibility of building up a peanut oil industry throughout the cotton belt that will keep the oil flourishing.

A bushel of first-class peanuts, weighing about 28 pounds, will produce about one gallon of oil, worth 45 cents, and 20 pounds of oil cake and hulls, which when ground and mixed together, is worth approximately 26 cents. Such peanuts must be obtained at prices not exceeding 40 cents a bushel to make the oil industry profitable.

By-products of the peanut are cotton linters, the product of the farm stock and dairy cows, and the plant is being largely utilized as forage and as a soil renovator.

In large cleaning factories the shells are generally used for fuel, and the ash resulting therefrom is valuable as a fertilizer for cotton.

The thin brown covering of the peas or nuts has a feeding value almost equal to that of wheat bran, and is especially desirable for mixing with the smaller particles of broken peas for stock feeding.


