ALMOST AN ACT OF PIRACY

SEIZURE OF THE CALDWELL H. COLT CALLS FOR STRONG CRITICISM FROM THE FISHING GAZETTE.

The Fishing Gazette, published in New York, contained the following in its last issue:

"It is unfortunate that the seizure of the American fishing schooner Caldwell H. Colt has occurred at a time when President Taft is about to pay a friendly visit to President Diaz of Mexico, for, if the statement of the skipper of the Colt is correct—and there is no reason to believe otherwise—the seizure of the Caldwell H. Colt is an act of piracy. The vessel, disabled for three weeks, put in at Progreso for repairs. The captain and crew were cast into dungeons and not permitted to communicate with the American consul or the owners of the vessel. After a lapse of many days the crew were released. The vessel is held, and Mexican officials say they intend to hold her. It might be well for Secretary Knox to take a hand in the affair. The Latin-American republics think the American Eagle has so many feathers in its tail that it is possible to pull them out with impunity. What is needed in Mexico and the Central and South American ports is the fear of God, and some lead judiciously administered."

RAILROAD HAS STARTED WORK

CHANGES IN ROADBED, NECESSITATED BY PAVING OPERATIONS, HAVE BEEN COMMENCED ON TARRAGONA STREET LINES.

Changes in the roadbed on lines of the L. & N. railroad in the city limits made necessary by the paving operations, have been started by the railroad company, and one of the noticeable features about the improvements is the fact that cross-ties are being laid and will be used over the entire system to be improved in the city limits. As the paving work will affect the Tarragona street tracks the more generally, that thoroughfare has been the first to get the benefit of the contemplated changes. In accordance with established grades, the tracks will have to be lowered to a depth of several inches, it was explained yesterday, and to get a graded grade for the tracks to be paved between Gregory and Belmont streets, the first work has been started between Gregory and Chase streets. At the same time the authorized spur to the new local home of the Armour Packing Company is being built. The new building will be erected at the north-west corner of Chase and Tarragona streets.

New material for the improvements authorized by the railroad company has been arriving constantly at the corner of Alcaniz and Wright streets has been used as a storage place for material not needed immediately.

PARKWAY AND CIVIC LEAGUE

RESOLUTION ADOPTED BY BODY SENT TO AND FILED WITH COUNCIL COMMITTEE FOR ACTION.

Through a resolution sent to the city council last night, the Palafox Street Parkway question has been opened again. Several ladies from the Civic League, whence the resolution came, were present, and the ladies had the pleasure of watching from start to finish the deliberations of the council, for their question did not come up until among the late matters considered.

The resolution was referred to the parks and ways committee on motion of Alderman Bear. In full the resolution is as follows:

Whereas, we note from the newspaper reports that the negotiations looking to the removal of the street car tracks from the center of the Palafox Parkway have not yet been successful, therefore be it

Resolved, That we earnestly request the city council to immediately renew its efforts to secure the removal of the street car tracks as originally contemplated. In this connection we desire to express our belief that if the answer of the Pensacola Electric Company to the city council's request for the removal of its tracks was not satisfactory to the council, it would be entirely proper for the council to agree upon and adopt a proposition to be presented to the Pensacola Electric Company and to contain such provision covering this removal as the council is willing to accept.

Five head of stock were picked up and claimed by Tennie Machett, living near the Saunders mill, northern city limits. A fine of \$15 and costs was imposed in this case. The defendant pleaded that it was his wife's stock, but that did not lessen the fine.
