**RICHMOND NOT GOUGING GUESTS**

**Veterans Find Virginia's Hospitality More Than Empty Phrases.**

Richmond, Va., May 29.—The seventeenth annual reunion of the United Confederate Veterans opens tomorrow in this city, and will last until June 3. The crowd in the city is immense, all the South having turned out with a full number of veterans and friends, who are coming from almost every town in the South.

The reunion seems to have been taken as the family gathering of the entire Confederacy, where they will have been lacking in sending here "the boys" who survive from the mighty numbers that the South sent to the fray.

The city itself looks like the capital of some proud country, that has called all its sons to the family fireside, and then has dressed up until she scarcely knows herself in her finery. Almost every house in the city is decorated with flags and bunting, and the people wear a glad some air, as though all business had been laid aside.

It is said that more reunions of old generals and colonels will take place here than has been known since the war.

Much curiosity has been manifested to see the statue of the president of the Confederacy, Jefferson Davis. Charleston has sent a big crowd, as enthusiastic as though the reunion were in the palmetto state, and Atlanta has a huge number here. Atlanta is after the next convention, and will get all its vigorous delegates can bag by coaxing or logic, for Atlanta has some very good points about its treatment of conventions, a principal one being its generous hospitality to delegates and their friends.

Gen. Gordon, commander of the Tennessee division, is easily a marked man among the assembled hosts, and he is all alive over the presence of old comrades and old generals. He considers that the main event will be the unveiling of the statue of the former president of the Confederacy.

**TO SELL SHIP AT AUCTION**

**The Condemned Ship Euphemia to be Sold to Highest Bidder To-Day.**

The Italian ship Euphemia, now moored at Perdido wharf, is to be sold at public auction today, commencing at 9 o'clock this morning, and as the equipment is valuable it is expected that there will be a number of bidders for the property.

The Euphemia arrived in this port April 8 from Buenos Ayres, having been chartered by Rosasco Bros. to load a cargo of lumber. While in the gulf she encountered severe storms and when she arrived in port it was found that she had sustained considerable damage. A survey of the vessel was recently held and she was condemned as being unseaworthy, and ordered sold to the highest bidder.

The ship is of 802 net tons. She is a wooden vessel, and has been in service for many years, but is yet in a fairly good state of preservation. The sale of the ship and equipment will be separate, the hull being first sold, and then the sails, chains, ropes, anchors, boats, etc.
