High Handed Action  
An article appeared in your Saturday's issue, to-wit: "Colored Church Excommunicated from Union Baptist Church." Mr. J. T. Mason for bringing suit against the trustees of the church.  
This article should have read that the "Colored Church Excommunicated from Union Baptist church Rev. J. T. Mason through prejudice of its officers, by questionable statement of the committee sent to wait on him, and to assist their lawyer in fighting the case to prevent him from getting his money.  
I am a citizen of Pensacola. I labored earnestly to build up the said church for six years.  
I thought it not beneath my dignity to assist these officers to build a new church, but gave my time to raising money for the new church, believing I had reliable men to look after my salary.  
By alas, what was the consequence? Plots, plans and every conceivable thing resorted to by these men to defeat my success.  
The question is, why is a lawsuit against the church? The secretary will answer in his heavy-handed way that he denied the whole truth, wrote checks for \$113 and said it covered the debt to me, when it did not; informed my collector that he owed me nothing, but I was in debt to the church. Therefore the collector informed me that the church denied owing me anything. This compels me to prove that the church does owe me, or lose what is honestly due me.  
It is no desire on my part to have a lawsuit, but a church has the same obligation to pay its debts as a honest man has.  
No charge was ever given me about this matter. While I was away, they took advantage of my absence, and excommunicated me from the Union Baptist church without notice, without trial, and on a false charge.
