LATE NEW SUITS FILED IN CIRCUIT COURT HERE

LEWIS TRIAL FOR LYNCHING

State Springs Surprise in Form of Threat Made Against Sheriff.

By Associated Press. Charlotte, N. C., July 24.—The state to-day sprung a surprise in the trial of Zeke Lewis, charged with lynching J. V. Johnson last year. A letter was admitted in evidence over the protest of the defense, received by Sheriff Bogan and signed by "crowd that killed J. V. Johnson." It threatened Sheriff Bogan with death if he revealed the names of any men who recognized the night of the lynching. The letter said "342 men were in the mob, and though there might some fools, at least 275 were settled men, who knew what they were talking about and would do as they said."

Bogan was recalled to the stand, and swore positively to the identification of Lewis as a ringleader. The case will probably reach the jury tomorrow.
