A letter was admitted in evidence over the protest of the defense, received by Sheriff Bogan and signed by "crowd that killed J. V. Johnson." It

threatened Sheriff Bogan with death if he revealed the names of any men he recognized the night of the lynching. The letter said "342 men were in the mob, and though there might some fools, at least 275 were settled men, who knew what they were talking about and would do as they
