MEMORIAL OAKS IN THE PLAZA

In an old copy of the Baptist Union, published at Mobile, and dated April, 1889—just 19 years ago—there appears the report of an address delivered by Dr. T. A. LaParo, of Pensacola, in which he dedicated two oaks now standing in the Plaza to the memory of Rev. Z. A. Owen and Rev. C. B. DuBose, pastors of the Baptist and Methodist churches, respectively.

These two pastors had been particularly faithful during the yellow fever visitation of 1852, and after their death the citizens planted these memorial oaks for them and the trees are now standing on the western part of the Plaza.

OFFICIALS LOST LIVES

From Superintendent to Stable Bosses, All Perished in Hanna Mine.

By Associated Press. Hanna, Wyo., March 31.—The bodies of only five of the 58 miners and

mine officials killed in mine No. 18 of the Union Pacific Coal company by the two explosions Saturday have been recovered. Other bodies probably will not be reached for several days. The widows and orphans are being cared for, and there is no destitution.

The official force of the mine was completely wiped out by the disaster. From Superintendent Briggs and his three foremen down to the gas watchmen, stable bosses and others, all are dead, and complete reorganization of the working forces will be necessary.
