Services for that day will be as follows:

A celebration of the holy communion followed by a meeting of the woman's auxiliary, with an address by the bishop at 9 a. m.

The next meeting, with another celebration of the holy communion, for the members of the council and a sermon will be held at 11 o'clock a. m., after which the council will organize and adjourn to meet again at 3 p. m., when the bishop will give his annual address.

At 8:30 p. m., a missionary meeting will be held, at which there will be given several addresses on the subject of missions, and announcements made for other services.

It is expected that there will be a large attendance of clergymen and laymen as it is always considered a privilege to come to Tallahassee to enjoy the open-hearted and open-handed hospitality of the people of St. John's parish. Charles Martin Niles is rector in charge.

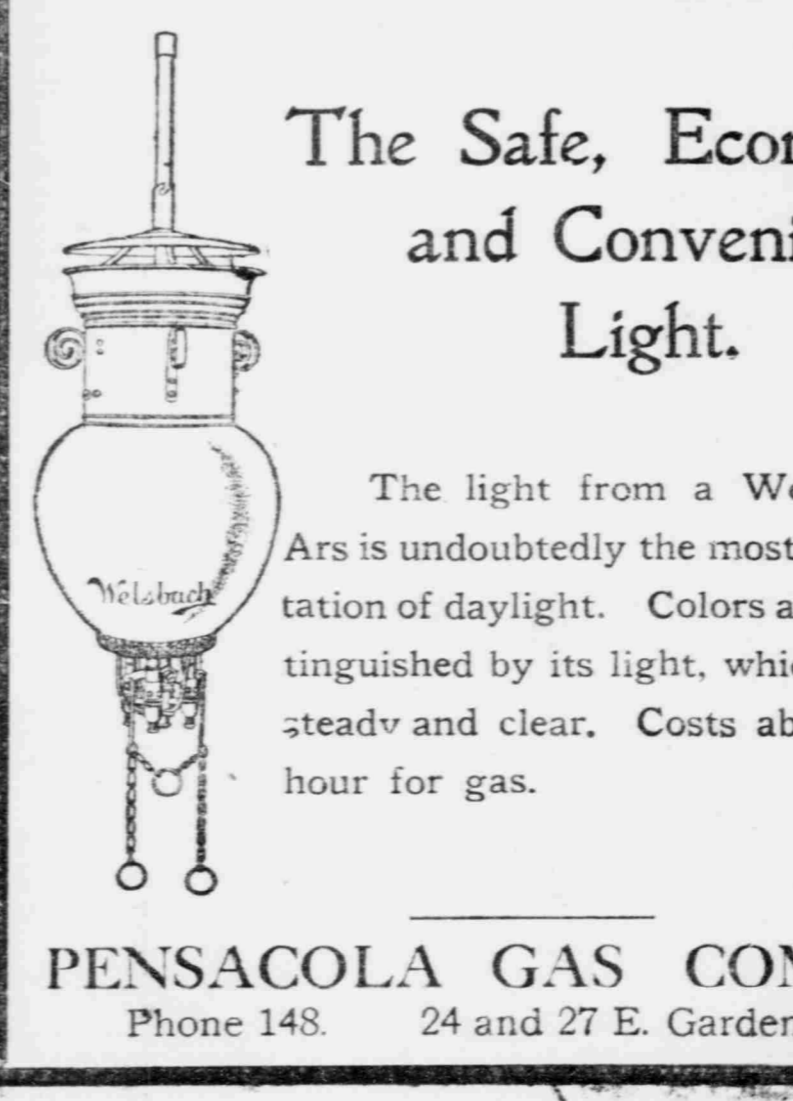
