DEATH OF MRS. MARY A. RHODES

Wife of J. F. Rhodes Died Yesterday, After a Short Illness.

Death claimed one of Pensacola's best loved young matrons yesterday morning, Mrs. Mary A. Rhodes passing away at her home at 229 West Government street, after an illness of about two weeks. The deceased, who was the wife of J. F. Rhodes, well known in local business circles, was 31 years of age, being a member of one of Pensacola's oldest families, having been Miss Mary Kupfrian, daughter of C. Kupfrian of this city, previous to her marriage which took place nearly twelve years ago.

Beside the husband, two brothers and two sisters, she is survived by four children, who are Edna C. Edward R. William and Josephine, to mourn her death. The end, which was an inexplicable sad one, came after the wife and mother had been confined to her bed for a comparatively short time and proved a shock whose effect will be a lasting one. Death, saddening in any form in which it may occur, came as a blow to

this household, when a mother, full in the prime of her glorious young womanhood, was snatched from those who needed her most, and four small children were left behind.

The funeral will occur this afternoon at St. Michael's church, interment to be in St. John's cemetery.

PREPARING FOR THE BIG CIVIC PRIDE PICNIC

THE EVENT PROMISES TO BE ONE OF THE MOST ENJOYABLE IN THE HISTORY OF PENSACOLA, AND WILL NO DOUBT BE LARGELY ATTENDED.

Enthusiasm, the real and undisputed brand of Pensacola enthusiasm, is evincing itself in the most unexpected places nowadays in connection with the big Civic Pride picnic which is to occur on July 3rd at Bayview Park, and to which a general invitation has been extended to the entire city. There is plenty of promising talk on the all-absorbing topic heard on the street every day, and committees, full of the work before them, are exceptionally active in the downtown district.

The program committee has been getting busy with the city's best known talent, with most gratifying results, and the entertainment to be accorded the public at the park on the all important date will be the best that can possibly be secured. In fact, there does not appear to be, throughout the length and breadth of Pensacola, a man, woman or child who has not received the idea in the enthusiastic manner which it deserves, a fact which argues well for the success of the coming event.

PROMINENT CITIZENS TALK.
Geo. W. Johnston, who is chairman of the Bayview Park Commission, and who is an enthusiastic promoter of the event, talked to a representative of The Journal yesterday, voicing the sentiment of a great many of his colleagues in the work now in progress. "The Bayview Park board," remarked Mr. Johnston, wishes the day we celebrate to be the biggest one of the entire year. Let all Pensacolians arise early on the third, take down the stars and stripes from its resting place and unfurl its banners in the breeze so that it may confront the crowds throughout the day from every turn. The way to Bayview Park, in fact, should be decorated thoroughly with flags in order to add a true touch of patriotism to the event. And about the basket part of the affair, we all know what that means. Let everyone have a guest or two on that day, perhaps a bachelor friend who probably eats his lonely meal 364 days of the year at his restaurant or club. Be sure and give the particular fellow a bid, and put it in writing so he won't forget. Then there's the bachelor girl; if there is anything in this world that a

woman appreciates—next to a proposal—it's an invitation to spend the day at a picnic frolic. Yes, by all means, invite the bachelor girl. We want her. Tents and bathing suits will be the right things to have along, too. The tents can serve as a kind of headquarters for your family and your guests, and in case of a storm their usefulness will be fully demonstrated. Launches and any sort of private boat will also add to the pleasure of the day.

COMMITTEES WORKING HARD.
According to Mr. Johnston, every committee-man is hard at work in order that Pensacola's civic pride picnic shall be one of the biggest successes of the year. A band has been secured which will play from two o'clock in the afternoon until eight at night, and the public speakers who will appear have already been invited, and moreover, have been accepted. A number of male choruses have been secured, and recitations and songs will be a part of the day's program. The contest committee, which is composed of Messrs. Boyer, Oliver and Bingham, is planning some events which will soon be forgotten, and it is quite safe to say that athletes, from crack oarsmen to climbers of bread-cakes, will have every opportunity to show their skill.

CRITICS ARE ANSWERED.
"There has been some criticism," declared Mr. Johnston, in conclusion, "in conducting a celebration on the third instead of the fourth of July. That is easily explained. Pensacola has been rather luke warm in her Fourth of July celebrations previously, and we propose to make amends for the past this year by taking two days instead of one. We propose to begin bright and early at Bayview on the morning of the third, and to keep it right up throughout the day, and then to give the fourth over into the hands of the members of the Y. M. C. A., who are planning a series of interesting boat contests on Bayou Chico. The big two-day celebration will then be brought to a grand climax on Saturday night with a display of fireworks, which will also take place at Bayou Chico.

FOR NEW DEPOT IN PENSACOLA

Chamber of Commerce Committee Confers With Supt. Saltmarsh.

An important conference between the Chamber of Commerce committee on transportation, manufactures and agriculture, and Superintendent Saltmarsh of the Louisville & Nashville, took place yesterday morning, with a view toward establishing better passenger facilities for the city, and if possible to secure a new depot for Pensacola.

The ground was gone over thoroughly, and the matter discussed from its various standpoints, the result being that Mr. Saltmarsh agreed to take the matter up with higher officials, with a view to meeting the desires of the Chamber of Commerce as soon as business conditions begin to show a decided improvement.

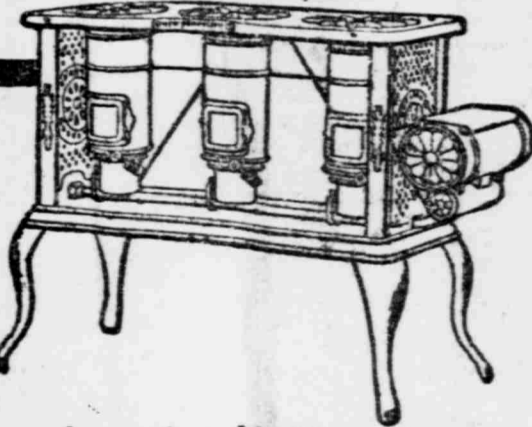

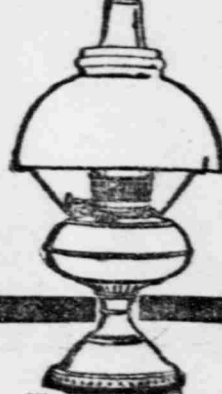
