AUTOMOBILE RACES TO COMMENCE AT 11 A. M., THE CARS MAKING A FORTY-MILE RUN FROM FLOMATON TO PENSACOLA—THE FIRST RACE OF ITS KIND.

Pensacola's first automobile race is to be witnessed Thanksgiving. The start will be from Flomaton at 11 o'clock in the forenoon, and the finish will be on the Brent road near Sunset lake, as the automobiles will not come into the city limits at high speed.

The race has attracted much attention, and the owners of cars are enthusiastic over the approaching event, which promises to furnish much amusement for a large number, as many having signified their intention of going out and getting good positions along the road to see the cars as they pass by.

The cars now in the race are the finest and fastest owned in Pensacola, and their owners expect to make some speed records on the forty-mile run. Everything possible is being done to prevent accidents. The cars will be started about fifteen minutes apart, their time being taken when they leave and also when they finish. The roads and bridges are in good condition and the autists will become familiar with the few bad spots on their run up to Flomaton to commence the race.

The car making the fastest time on the run will be awarded a handsome silver cup, valued at not less than \$100.
