should be sandwiched in between two dry counties. Prohibition should be so managed that the people now in the business would not have their property confiscated by a too sudden change. A man should be first allowed to unload and then made to quit. When the sale of intoxicating liquor is prohibited in a given district and a poor man with a nickel cannot buy a drink, then a rich man with a dollar must not buy it. While on this campaign I promise not to carry any whiskey into any dry county, either in my valise or otherwise. And if Florida goes dry and I want a drink I will leave the state to get it. I will respect the local laws of every community.

State and Federal Courts. Congress should so regulate the jurisdiction of the federal courts as to confine their judgments and decrees to federal questions, and they should not be permitted to prevent the enforcement of state laws by the issuance of temporary injunctions before the validity of the state laws has been determined. The state laws should be enforced by officials selected by the people of the state subject only to be enjoined by any court, state or federal, only after final hearing upon the constitutionality of the state law.
