GREAT VICTORY FOR THE STATE OF FLORIDA

(Continued From Page Nine) of the constitutional provision requiring 25 per cent. of the sales of public lands to be paid into the state school fund to whatever rights, titles or interests the railroad companies had or may hereafter acquire under and by virtue of the several grants of the residuary interest of the state therein.

Summary. In other words, the negotiations have embraced a settlement and dismissal of the two suits instituted by the L. & N. R. R. Co., the satisfaction of the final decree for \$251,000 in money, the dissolution of the injunctions entitling the use of the \$250,000 in the hands of the trustees, the dismissal of the suit and dissolution of the injunctions in the case of the Southern States Land & Timber Co., the dismissal of the two suits and cross-bills filed by the Wisner Land Co., as assignee of the claims of the Florida Southern Ry. Co. and the South Florida Railroad Co., the J. T. & K. W. Ry. Co. and the Silver Springs Ocala & Gulf Railroad Co., and the assignment and conveyance to the state board of education at the instance of the trustees, in recognition of its claim for lands previously sold of approximately 400,000 acres of lands heretofore contracted by certificates to be deemed upon the issuance of patents to the state of Florida, and 1,500,000 acres of open residuary grants.

ESCROW LANDS PAY THE BILL. The moneys referred to in the L. & N. decree were the proceeds of the sale of 103,000 acres of land in Taylor county, which were embraced in deeds to the Tallahassee Southern R. R. Co., which the Jennings administration was inaugurated without consideration other than in aid of the construction of railroads, in contravention of the policy adopted by the Jennings administration, which deeds were withdrawn from the bank at the expiration of the time named in the articles of agreement, and were cancelled by the trustees in open session, the trustees at that time being W. S. Jennings, governor; W. H. Reynolds, comptroller; J. B. Whitfield, state treasurer; W. B. Latham, attorney general, and B. E. McLin, commissioner of agriculture.

A portion of the lands embraced in the escrow deeds, aggregating 103,000 acres, were sold by the trustees for approximately \$225,000 net. This money has been in the hands of the trustees ever since, on deposit in various banks, on an interest basis, and amounted, at the date of the decree to \$251,000. These negotiations have been concluded by the present Trustees, consisting of N. B. Broward, governor; A. C. Com, comptroller; W. H. Ellis, attorney general; W. V. Knott, state treasurer, and B. E. McLin, commissioner of agriculture, the final decree against the fund for \$251,000 satisfied, the suits all dismissed, the injunctions dissolved, and all the remaining right, title and interest in said land grant claims of said railroads companies and their assignees conveyed to the state board of education, for and in consideration of the payment of \$125,000 in money, which is less than one-half of the proceeds of the sales of the 103,000 acres of lands found by the Jennings administration in escrow, and of the conveyance by the trustees of 445,000 acres of lands contained in certificates issued by the trustees in 1858 and 1859 (or in lieu thereof), such certificates containing an agreement by the trustees to deed said certified lands as such patents therefor should be issued to the state of Florida.

HARBOR, RIVER AND MARINE NEWS

Shipping Transactions and Notes of Interest Along The Bay Front.

There were two arrivals yesterday, the British steamships Dictator and Dandanian. The Dictator came in from East London, via St. Lucia, and is consigned to Brown & Co. She was out 33 days. The Dandanian came from Wilmington, and is consigned to Merritt & Co. Both vessels are in ballast and will take cargoes here.

There were no naval stores products received here yesterday. Louisville and Nashville employes say that the receipts this week averaged a trifle smaller than those of previous weeks.

The side-wheel steamer Columbia, which has been lying in the Baylen street wharf for repairs, was towed to Aiken's wharf late yesterday afternoon by the tug Britannia.

The British steamer Northwale, hence, has arrived at Kinsale. The British steamship Colonial, 2,177 tons net, Captain F. C. Raby, from Liverpool, via Mexican ports, consigned to Alfred LeBlanc, with coffee and rice from Vera Cruz, consigned here, and cargo in transit for Liverpool, she arrived at the head of Girod street, and will load for Liverpool. She reports sailing from Liverpool Jan. 11 encountered strong westerly gales, with high seas, out to Abaco, with occasional northers on the Mexican coast, and sailing from Coatzacoacoas, Feb. 17, experienced a strong norther in the Gulf of Mexico, with head seas to port.

The British steamship Greystoke Castle, 3,405 tons net, Captain George H. Lewis, from Antwerp, via Cardiff, for coal to Frederick Levland & Co., Ltd., 1,200 tons general cargo for New Orleans and 700 tons general cargo in transit for Galveston, arriving at Celeste street, to be discharged, will sail for Galveston. She reports sailing from Antwerp, Jan. 26, and Cardiff, Feb. 1, experienced ordinary and moderate weather out to the Gulf of Mexico, and in the gulf a strong norther, with head seas, to port.—New Orleans Picayune.
