BUSINESS OF ELECTRIC CO.

Number of Passengers Handled Shows Increase Over Last Year.

That the crowds in Pensacola this year for Mardi Gras were much larger than the year previous, is proven conclusively by the number of passengers handled by the Pensacola Electric company during the two days of the festivities, as compared with the business of last year.

Last Mardi Gras, Feb. 11 and 12, the company handled 25,461 passengers, 11,848 riding on the first day and 13,613 on the second day. Monday and Tuesday, this Mardi Gras, a total of 27,636 passengers were handled, 13,435 on the first day and 14,201 on the second day. This shows an increase of 2,175 passengers over the number handled during the festivities of 1907.

THE UNDERSIGNED SUBSCRIBERS do hereby make application for Letters Patent, incorporating us and our associates into a corporation, in accordance with the laws of Florida, under the following Charter:

I. The name of the corporation shall be THE ASPHEN LUMBER COMPANY, and its principal office and place of business shall be Pensacola, Florida, with the right to establish branch offices and places of business at such other place or places as may be necessary or convenient in the conduct of its business. II.
