LARGE NUMBER LEFT FOR WASHINGTON LAST NIGHT

BETWEEN FORTY AND FIFTY SUBPOENAS HAVE BEEN SERVED ON PENSACOLIANS TO TESTIFY IN SWAYNE CASE AND MANY MORE ARE EXPECTED.

Between twenty and twenty-five witnesses from this city who have been summoned to testify in the Swayne impeachment trial which begins in the United States senate on February 10 left for Washington on the 11:05 o'clock train last night and will travel to the national capital via Montgomery and Atlanta. Among those who left last night were S. H. Bell and wife, A. Greenhut and wife, Lep Meyer, Geo. W. Pryor, Don McLellan, B. H. Burton, Mrs. W. H. Northup and U. S. Marshall Theo. F. McGourin, W. A. Blount and R. W. Sublett, who were expected to leave also, were excused for the present and will not leave for several days, if at all.

A telegram was received yesterday by Frederick N. Webber, assistant Sergeant-at-arms of the U. S. Senate, who is in the city serving the subpoenas, canceling the papers in the cases of W. J. Martin, Mike Murphy, and A. L. Rettinger who had been previously served and who were at the station ready to depart.

More to Follow.
Dr. Renshaw is too ill to undertake the trip at present and was excused. The same is true of a colored woman named Blue, who was also subpoenaed.

Assistant Sergeant-At-Arms Webber received a telegram yesterday stating that a list of names had been forwarded to him of other residents of Pensacola and vicinity upon whom he was instructed to serve subpoenas, but the list was not received owing to the fact that both telegraph companies are practically out of business in nearly all of the southern states. He stated at the depot last night that owing to the delay in receiving his mail and telegrams he did not know what action to take and could do nothing until the belated instructions arrived.

From present indications there will be several hundred witnesses before the senate in this important case as so far as can be learned, everybody that had been connected even remotely with Judge Swayne in the past has been ordered to appear. All of the clerks and employees of the courts at Waco, Tyler, Dallas and Fort Worth, Tex., have been served with subpoenas to appear and testify, as have those of New Orleans and Pensacola and many from Jacksonville and other Florida points.

There was a big crowd at the station last night and Ticket Agent Sublett did a land office business in Washington tickets. Nearly all of those leaving tried to secure Pullman car accommodations, but only a few were able to do so, every berth having been engaged in advance. A special sleeping car will be run from Montgomery for the accommodation of those en route to Washington from Pensacola.

Among those leaving on the noon train yesterday were John S. Beard, Miss Sullivan, and Percy S. Hayes.

MANY HOMESEEEKERS ARRIVED WEDNESDAY NIGHT.

Dr. R. B. Crawford, of Chicago, passenger agent of the Louisville & Nashville railroad, arrived in the city Wednesday night, accompanied by thirty-five homeseekers who are looking for a location in this section. They are being shown the country surrounding this city and it is possible that many of them will eventually settle in this vicinity.

PANAMA ZONE FULL OF FEVER

CHIEF AT ANCON HOSPITAL DE. CLARES DISEASE EXISTS AND WILL SPREAD.

Dr. E. H. Wheeler is chief of the hospital staff at Ancon, on the Isthmus of Panama. The doctor arrived here yesterday as a passenger by the steamship City of Washington, says the New York Herald.

Dr. Wheeler is a man of direct speech. "There is yellow fever down there," he said, "and there is likely to be more. When I left Panama there were seven pronounced cases in the Ancon hospital, and two suspects. The cause is simple. The district is infected and has been. Into that district numerous non-immunes have been sent. These are the facts and I do not believe there has been any disposition to conceal them."

"There were 215 patients in the Ancon hospital when I left. Excepting the yellow fever patients most of all of these were victims of malarial poisoning. To prevent the spread of these diseases the best thing to do is to kill the mosquito which carries the infection. Everything is being done that can be done to make the isthmus more healthful than it is, but it is not a health resort just now.

"To make the canal zone healthy everything is being done that it is possible to do, streets are being cleaned, garbage is being collected and burned, but—the zone is not yet a health resort."

FLOODS CAUSE GREAT DAMAGE

ALL ROADS WEST AND SOUTH OF MERIDIAN MAY BE COMPLETELY TIED UP.

Meridian, Miss., Feb. 9.—The prospect tonight is for a complete tieup of all roads west and south of Meridian, and unless the wrecking crew of the Mobile and Ohio that went out under the charge of Trainmaster Alexander at 5 o'clock succeeds in stopping a break at 142-mile post, trains north on the Mobile and Ohio have to be annulled. The break occurred this afternoon directly after the southbound passenger pulled across the culvert. The water was roaring around this opening at the time the southbound passenger approached it, but by crossing slowly, the engineer made the run into Meridian without mishap.

There is grave danger to-night that a break will occur at Curran. The track in some places on the Mobile and Ohio south of here is almost on a level with the water, and if the road-bed gives way, whole sections will be washed out.

It has not been determined at this hour whether the officials will attempt to send trains south at midnight. All depends on the report of track walkers, that will be telephoned in from time to time.

The New Orleans and Northeastern is completely shut off from all communication south. The train that left here for the south at 7:45 o'clock this morning turned back when Chunky bridge was washed. The rise of the river the night previous had forced the waters again up to near the level of the track and false work under the new iron bridge and its structure was threatening to give way every minute. The train was backed into the city, and an announcement made that no other trains would be sent out over the Northeastern until the flood danger has passed.

Late this afternoon arrangements were made for sending Northeastern trains south over the Mobile and Ohio to Mobile and getting them into New Orleans by way of the Louisville and Nashville, but the threatening condition of the Mobile and Ohio roadbed to the south may prevent this.

The Alabama and Vicksburg road, near Chunky, on either side of the river of that name, is in danger of giving way. The train that left here at 11 o'clock this morning passed over safely, but it is almost certain that the train due here to-night will be unable to get across the four miles of swamp that is a perfect sea of water at this time.

The rain fell in torrents all last night, and at 5 this morning over 5 inches had fallen. There has been little relief from the downpour, and every indication points to more rain to-night. Thus far no damage to Alabama and Southern trains north are reported, but sections of that road were washed out in 1902, and the flood this year promises to be damaging to railroad property.

The Northeastern has served notice that no time freight will be accepted until further advices are issued.

CARYVILLE NEWS MATTER

CONVICT INSPECTOR N. A. BLITCH LOOKS AFTER STATE'S INTERESTS THERE.

Caryville, Feb. 9.—Hon. N. A. Blitch, ex-senator from Levy county, and supervisor of the state convicts of Florida, was in Caryville this week en route to the state prison of R. L. Milliner & Co., about 5 miles north-east of this place in Holmes county for the purpose of inspecting same. Mr. Blitch reports the prisoners well fed and kindly treated in every respect; in fact, is loud in his praise of the member of the above firm who has personal charge of the entire lot of prisoners.

Senator Blitch also states to your correspondent that reports had been circulated to mislead the people of Florida that the state convicts were not treated kindly at the state prison near Caryville, and wishes to state for the information of the people of the state of Florida that there is a convict prison for Washington county Florida, a short distance from Caryville, which is controlled by the county commissioners of this county, that he as state supervisor has nothing to do with this prison, and knows nothing about its management. So far as the state convict prison of R. L. Milliner & Co., is concerned, it not only reflects much credit upon the manager, Capt. Lindsay, but the prison is a paragon of neatness in every respect. The laws of the state are complied with as far as possible.

The Sanford Lumber Company at Caryville, is constantly improving its big mill plant at this place and are at present placing two new boilers of the latest improvement in position for immediate use so as to enable the machinery to be run with about 750 horse power.

The Choctawhatchie river is rising very fast, and is full of logs bound for the mills near Freeport and Point Washington.

MOTOR BOAT RECORD BROKEN AT MIAMI.

Miami, Feb. 9.—W. Gould Brokaw, with his motor boat Challenger, beat his record and that of the world, this morning on Biscayne bay time, 2 minutes 2 seconds. The race was begun near the quarantine station, running due south five miles. Biscayne bay was alive with craft, from tiny rowboats to the largest in these waters, and thousands witnessed the exciting race. Mr. Brokaw is confident that he can reduce the record, and if weather conditions are favorable he will make the attempt next Friday.

Roosevelt Honored.
New York, Feb. 9.—President Roosevelt has been chosen an honorary member of the League of Former German University Students, an honor accorded to only one other, the grand duke of Baden, uncle of the kaiser, and rector-in-chief of the University of Heidelberg. If he accepts, a delegation of the league members will go to Washington to present him an engrossed memorial, in his youth the president spent a short time studying in Germany.

BODY OF SAILOR FOUND FLOATING IN BAY.

The body of a sailor from the Norwegian Bark Magna, who disappeared from that vessel about a week ago, was picked up yesterday near Commandancia wharf and removed to an undertaking establishment to be prepared for burial. It is believed the man fell overboard while returning to the vessel from a visit to the city.
