

WORLD'S NEWS CONDENSED

Prince Wilhelma, of Sweden, is visiting the United States.

By a vote of 159 to 16 the Georgia house passed the negro disfranchisement bill with a few minor amendments which it is considered certain the senate will adopt and that the bill will become a law.

Child Sir Henry MacLean has been handed over by his captor, the bandit Raisuli, to the Illkmes tribe, which in turn has set him at liberty. McLean, next to the sultan, is the most influential man in Morocco.

The Korean supreme court has passed sentence upon the members of the Hague deputation. Yi Sang Sol has been condemned to be hanged and Yi Wichoun and Yi Chun have been sentenced to imprisonment for life.

The program completed for the conference of the International Law Association which is to assemble in Portland, Maine, on the 28th, shows that the participants will include eminent legal lights from many parts of America and Europe. The conference will be in session three days, under the presidency of the Right Hon. Lord Justice Kennedy, of Court of Appeal, London.

The telegraphers' strike situation is unchanged, neither side willing to concede a point. The striking telegraph operators discovered a school of telegraphy in operation in the building formerly the Newsboys' Home, in Grant street, Pittsburg. Strikers raided the place and captured the instruments after a battle. A dozen young men who were learning telegraphy to take the places of strikers, were frightened away.

Dispatches from Shanghai contain the interesting news that Tai Hu, the empress dowager of China, has announced her determination to abdicate at the next Chinese new year. She desires to hand over the care of the state to the emperor, and it is stated, a secret decree has been issued calling a meeting of the grand council to make the change. The dowager empress, who is now 72 years old, has been supreme in Chinese affairs for many years.

Muller, Schall & Co. have announced the engagement of \$500,000 in gold for shipment to Germany. They add that their London agents have an option on the gold and may earn it in reaching Plymouth. The shipment is in the nature of a special transaction not in the usual line of gold transportation. This brings the total of gold exports since May 27, when the first gold was shipped for Europe, on this movement amounted to \$8,000,000.

The first of twenty relief trains sent by the Boston and Maine railway arrived at Old Orchard Beach in the night, and was greeted there by New refugees driven from their winter homes by the great fire there before. Millions and millions of dollars' worth of clothing, food, and other necessities were given to the refugees who were given sandwiches and coffee. A hundred empty passenger cars soon arrived and took the summer people to their homes. Seventeen hotels, sixty cottages and twenty stores were burned, with a loss of \$7,000,000. The number of people who were left homeless is estimated to be less than 875.

The voluntary segregation of negroes in separate towns and communities in their own was discussed at a meeting before the National Negro Business Congress, at Topeka, Kan., Friday. The advisability of establishing such towns was urged by representatives of several such communities. Among the eight represented was Eatonville, Fla. It is believed that the result of the meeting will be to bring the worthy members of the race leaving the worthless ones to hang around the dives of the white cities there might not be so much objection to it. The labor problem in the South would be accentuated if such were the result.

Philadelphia numismatists have received with interest the announcement that new designs for United States coins by the artist Augustus Saint Gaudens, have been accepted by the government. Three denominations will be affected—the double eagle, the eagle and the bronze cent. A radical change is made in the design of the cent, and though the Indian head will be retained it will bear little resemblance to the old one and it is expected to be more characteristic of the head of the American Indian, with real headdress instead of the present design. The present Indian head is really a Caucasian type, the face having been posed for by the little daughter of James M. Longacre, the engraver of the Philadelphia mint, who designed the present penny in 1859.

Steps for expediting the excavating work on the Panama canal by the award of contracts for furnishing fourteen new steam shovels have been taken by the Isthmian Canal Commission. There are almost sixty shovels there now, so that the added number will increase the work of excavating about 20 per cent. Deliveries of these machines are to begin in sixty days and be completed in 140 days.

In order to protect its 10,000 miles of track from a possible future strike of railroad telegraphers, the Pennsylvania railroad has decided to open a school for telegraphy where it will educate and train students in railroad work. The school will be opened at once at Bedford, Pa., and J. F. Cossma, one of the best known instructors in telegraphy in the country, will be placed in charge. Other instructors are being rapidly engaged. Members of the Order of Railway Telegraphers are much agitated over this move.

Albert L. Pope has been appointed receiver for the Pope Manufacturing Company of Hartford, Conn., on application of the McManus Kelly Company, of Toledo, Ohio, who were represented by James H. Freemore of New York. Bonds were fixed at \$250,000. The receiver is the son of Col. A. A. Pope. In the order it is specified that the receiver may conduct the business and contract for the sale and delivery of automobiles, tractors and their accessories to such an extent as in his judgment may be advisable and until the further order of the court. The Pope Company has manufacturing plants in Hartford and Berlin and Westfield, Mass., and Hagerstown, Md. A director of the Pope Manufacturing Company is cited as saying that the company has had trouble in trying to negotiate a loan. The company is a New Jersey corporation, succeeding the American Traction Company in the manufacture of tractors and automobiles. It was a stock of the Pope Motor Car Company and the Federal Manufacturing Company. It has \$1,000,000 common stock, \$2,000,000 first preferred and \$5,000,000 second preferred with no liquid assets.

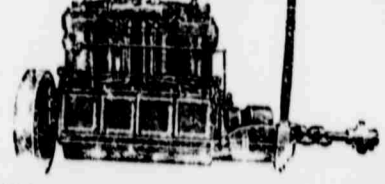
