Daytona Beach lowers tax rate

DAYTONA BEACH — The Daytona Beach City Commission cut another \$2.4 million of revenue at their last meeting when they gave final approval to the millage for 2009-10.

The final rate is \$5.42 per \$1,000 of assessed value, which will bring in \$2.4 million less than the \$5.99 rate they set earlier this month.

They had already reduced the budget by \$2 million when they set the \$5.99 rate.

Mayor Glenn Ritchey said he changed

his mind after approving the \$5.99 rate and decided a bigger cut in the budget was worth lessening residents' tax burden.

"I came here tonight thinking about a \$1 million reduction from where we were," he said. "In tough times, tough decisions have to be made. Every little bit helps. It sends a message that we know what's going on in the community."

Several members of the community spoke in favor of lowering the rate.

Ed Connor, an Ormond Beach resident and member of Volusia Tax Reform, said all the taxing authorities

say their taxes are only a small portion of a total bill, but when there are so many taxing authorities it adds up to a lot.

"Your millage may not be that high but add all the millage rates," he said. "Volusia County has the sec-

Holly Hill sets property tax

HOLLY HILL — Holly Hill gave final approval last week to the property tax rate for 2009-10. It will be the roll-back rate, which means it will bring in the same amount of money as last year, excluding new construction.

The new property tax rate will be \$5.72 per \$1,000 of assessed value.

The rate was increased from the current rate of \$4.88 because of the decrease in property value.

At the new rate, a homeowner with an assessed property value of \$150,000 with a \$50,000 homestead exemption will pay \$572 in city taxes.

The room was silent when Mayor Roland Via announced the opportunity for public comment. There was no discussion among the commissioners, either.

Commissioners Liz Towsley and Mark Reed voted against the rate.

Ms. Towsley said after the meeting she voted against the millage because she believed the city could consolidate jobs and reorganize to save money.

"There's redundancy," she said. "We could eliminate positions, but the commission did not want to consider it."

Mayor Via said the city had been consolidating positions for the past few years.

Sheriff's Office unveils new crime watch program

VOLUSIA COUNTY — Law enforcement can't be everywhere, all the time.

So, that's where a new crime-fighting program established by the Volusia County Sheriff's Office steps in.

Volusia County Sheriff Ben Johnson unveiled Operation BOLO, or Businesses on the Look-out, last week. The program will train businesses and street workers to look for suspicious activity, signs of crime or potential crimes.

"This is a joint effort," Sheriff Johnson said. "They give us information and we let them know what we're looking for."

The program started when Emerald Waste Services, the trash collector for unincorporated Volusia County, met with the Sheriff's Office about the idea.

Other counties in Florida, including Alachua County, had already successfully started a similar program.

"We thought it was a great idea and immediately jumped on board," Sheriff's Office

Biketoberfest, charity event rides on without icon

VOLUSIA COUNTY — In many ways Bruce Rossmeyer personified Bike Week and Biketoberfest.

He was larger than life, a well-known presence at both events, and a key figure in their growth.

Mr. Rossmeyer passed away in July, but his daughter said the tradition he started will continue.

"We're moving forward just like Dad would want us to do," said Mandy Rossmeyer Campbell. "It's going to take the whole family to try and fill his shoes, but we're going to do the best we can."

Mr. Rossmeyer, who died in a motorcycle accident July 30 in Wyoming, attracted crowds to the

Beach Street area when he organized events at Riverside Park near his Harley-Davidson dealership, one of many he owned around the country.

He later built Destination Daytona in Ormond Beach, which became another biker mecca.

There was no event at Riverside Park at last year's Biketoberfest, but it's back for this year (Oct. 15-18) and will once again be under the umbrella of the Rossmeyer family.

Ms. Rossmeyer Campbell said they are partnering with other companies to have a muscle car show, staged music, contests, custom bike builders and more.

Documentarian preserves local history

VOLUSIA COUNTY — While people around the country are watching renowned documentary filmmaker Ken Burns' new series on America's National Parks, those of us in Volusia County can check out professional documentation of our own geography and history thanks to local multimedia storyteller Eric Dusenbery.

In 2005, Mr. Dusenbery created Cinderic Documentaries, Inc., a DeLand-based nonprofit organization dedicated to enriching and preserving local history and traditional culture. Ever since, the group has recorded fading local places and lifestyles through documentary photography and oral interviews that are exhibited

throughout the state.

This weekend, Cinderic will be at Port Orange Family Days Community Expo.

Mr. Dusenbery, a DeLand resident, became interested in historical sites when, as a child, his parents took him on road trips, making frequent stops at various "presidential and other community-oriented sites."

After working for 20 years as a commercial editorial photographer, he discovered that much of Florida's history and culture was either vanishing or being overlooked and forgotten.

"I hated to see it happen," he said.

So, he started documenting "what's right in our backyard."

Past projects include "Seville Public School," documenting its people, stories and events; "Croaker Sacks and Catfish Stew," exploring recipes, cooking, and food preparation in Depression-era rural Volusia County; and the earlier "At Water's Edge," focusing on the livelihood of some of Florida's fishing villages.

Mr. Dusenbery's projects are funded by grants, sponsors and donations. His lat-

est project, "Lessons from the Grave," is a look at Volusia County's history through its cemeteries.

"Because so many of the world's cemeteries have been lost or forgotten, we decided to focus on those remaining near us," Mr. Dusenbery said. "We are talking to the descendants of people in those cemeteries, trying to develop an oral history of these 'pioneer ancestors' from stories that have been passed down for generations."

Mr. Dusenbery's free e-zine, "Armchair Culture: Places to See and Stories to Hear in Volusia County," gives readers a peek at Cinderic's projects, workshops, photography, local sites, events, and internships.

A recent issue highlighted the Arches at Calle Grande Avenue on the Ormond Beach-Holly Hill line.

"I love historic churches and architecture in general," he said. "Old rodeo arenas, too."

To shoot his historical subjects such as the arches, Mr. Dusenbery uses what most would call a cumbersome 4X5 architectural

view camera — the type that requires a tripod and a black hood to shield the photographer.

The detailed Corinthian columns are neglected, but still a curious sight to newcomers to the area. Dusenbery said he "imagined how they looked in 1924. Built to look like marble, the structures are adorned with horses...and other figures at the top." They stand along the canal that had been part of the entrance to the former Rivera Hotel, developed by William Hardesty. The gateway is currently listed as one of the County's endangered historic sites.

Cinderic Documentaries accomplishes its mission of preserving local history through both its projects and educational outreach. The organization is currently working on a Web site to showcase rural Volusia heritage projects, and a youth project to encourage teens to record places and people important to them.

Cindi Brownfield, the organization's public relations manager, said Mr. Dusenbery is performing a great service for Volusia County residents.

"Eric is a very talented photographer and storyteller," Ms. Brownfield said. "His projects play an important role in documenting the people and stories that make Florida what it is today. We can all learn something from his stories, both about Florida and about ourselves."

Streetscaping continues in Holly Hill

HOLLY HILL — The streetscaping project in Holly Hill is continuing with the replacement of the transit shelters along Ridgewood Avenue. Earlier this year, street signs were replaced.

The street signage and transit shelters were designed to reflect the city's historic nature, said Marsha Radulovich, CRA coordina-

tor. "Holly Hill was incorporated in 1901, so it's a fairly old town," she said. "The heritage theme kept coming up when the master plan for the area was made."

She said the theme fits in well with City Hall, a historic stone building which was built during the depression.

All of the transit shelters will have bike racks and trash receptacles and many will feature landscaping.

Ms. Radulovich said the bike racks will be convenient for anyone who wants to park their bike and visit a business.

"It's all about mass transit," she said.

The improvements are being made in the city's Community Redevelopment Area. Funding comes from property tax in that neighborhood.

The idea of a Community Redevelopment Area is to focus funding on areas that

need improvement, she said.

"It's like weeding your garden," she said, "so that everything you want to grow comes back. Looking at something nice that makes you smile — that's all part of it."

Future streetscaping plans include gateway signage at the city limits, way-finding signs for the post office, library, chamber, etc., and new signage at Hollyland Park.

spokesman Gary Davidson said.

Workers, including trash collectors, public works employees and businesses, will be trained to spot signs of crime, such as broken windows, open garage doors or ladders against a business.

Additionally, since these workers regularly visit neighborhoods, they know when someone or something might be out-of-place, Sheriff's Office officials said.

"We're in these neighborhoods, every week," said Brian Hughes, sales manager for Emerald Waste Services.

"Our guys are out there and they see a lot of stuff. We're just the eyes out there, we live in these communities and we want to make it safe for our neighbors. We're just doing the right thing."

Mr. Davidson agreed. "It gives us a whole lot of extra eyes and ears in the community," Mr. Davidson said. "(The training) sort of opens their eyes to things that they may see as they go about that may be a sign of something."

And, hopefully if crimi-

nals know there are a lot of people watching, they might think twice.

"The deterrent value alone makes the program worthwhile," Mr. Davidson said.

The Sheriff's Office will be able to send out information about criminals on the run or missing persons to workers and businesses so they can keep a look out as well, Mr. Davidson said.

"It's a tremendous value to us," he said.

Since launching the program, several businesses have asked to join, Mr. Davidson said.

"It's a fantastic program," he said. "It doesn't

cost taxpayers a dime. It gives an increased diligent presence in the community."

While the program only covers unincorporated Volusia County right now, Mr. Davidson said the effects won't just be felt there.

"It doesn't matter where it occurs," he said. "We just need the information."

He said once residents, workers and businesses are trained, they will be better prepared to combat crime wherever they are. Additionally, cities may decide to start similar programs in their jurisdictions.

Local man sees art in everyday objects

ORMOND BEACH — Some say that seashells are the ocean's gift to the beachcomber.

Many people enjoy collecting them, and they all face the same question — what do you do with all those shells?

Robert and Virginia Burton of Ormond Beach have found a unique way to use the shells they've collected over the years.

Mr. Burton creates decorative garden pieces by forming concrete shapes and then decorating them with the shells.

"We moved down here with boxes and boxes of shells," said Ms. Burton. "We've found a good way to display them."

The retired couple moved here from Oak Island, North Carolina, where they enjoyed walking on the beach and collecting shells.

Not many people move to Florida to get away from hurricanes, but that's why the Burtons relocated here in 1996.

"The island was only a mile wide," said Mr. Burton. "When a storm came near they would shut off the water and electricity."

To create the concrete shapes, Mr. Burton uses common household items as molds — anything that can hold concrete.

"I couldn't throw anything plastic away for a long time," said Ms. Burton. "When I would come home with a plastic container of any kind, he

would see it as a mold for concrete."

Mr. Burton said if he likes the shape he'll make a mold of it.

He first sprays the mold with a lubricant, pours in the concrete, and then artfully arranges shells, marbles, stones or other objects on the wet concrete.

When dry, the new formed art object slips easily out of the plastic mold.

Mr. Burton said he doesn't know where he gets the inspiration for his creative designs.

"A little red wine might help," he said, laughing. "I just sit back here on the patio and daydream."

He said he started the hobby about 10 years ago to keep his mind occupied.

"My wife can read but I can only read for awhile," he said. "When you get old you sit and remember and some of the things you remember aren't that great."

Ms. Burton gets involved with the hobby by painting flowers or other decorations on some of the pieces.

The Burtons have moved beyond just creating garden pieces. They see art in many things that others throw away.

On their back porch sits a piece of art displayed in a concrete base. It's actually part of an old sewing machine but looks like modern art.

They found a hollow mannequin, used it as a mold and now have a statue of a human figure.

The only problem is a limit to display space.

"I never run out of ideas," said Mr. Burton. "They come everyday. But I'm running out of places to put these things."

They voted to increase the millage rate on your property tax bill by 19 percent.


They have become the advocates for the county management and sympathizing with their insatiable appetite for more tax dollars.

Seabreeze QB Thompson fights back from injury

VOLUSIA COUNTY — The Seabreeze Sandcrabs football team is 2-2 for the season so far, but that record doesn't reflect how impressive they've been on offense. They have scored 129 points in those four games and the two losses came from only five points combined.

A big part of the team's success can be attributed to senior quarterback Matt Thompson, who leads the area in passing with 908 yards and 12 touchdowns. He has also run for 208 yards with two touchdowns.

"Just look at what he has done so far," Seabreeze head coach Marc Beach said. "He has done a great job spreading the ball around and he hasn't really keyed in on one guy. If the offensive line gives him time, he will do very well.

In the Sandcrabs' last game, a 21-17 loss to Lake Brantley, Thompson ran for 104 yards with a touchdown while passing for 182 and a score.

Thompson is enjoying his success this year. Last year wasn't so great. He

sprained his ankle in the first game of the season, a 20-14 win over Spruce Creek.

The road back from injury has been a tough one. When he got hurt, Thompson almost gave up football.

"I was really depressed," he said. "I was done for the season. I stopped coming to practice but coach called me and told me that this was still my team. He told me that I could still help. I became a coach and mentor. I helped Dominique in big games by calming him down."

Dominique Roberts is a wide receiver on the team who replaced Thompson at quarterback after the injury.

Matt's father Lynn Thompson said his son was determined to play at least one more game his junior year.

"Last year's injury was difficult for Matt and especially for his mother," said Mr. Thompson, who is the athletic director at Bethune-Cookman University. "He was committed to his rehab. He fought really hard to come back. He did a lot of it own his own."

Thompson was able to return for the state semifinal game against Tallahassee Lincoln, which they lost.

Coach Beach credits Thompson's commitment to making it back for that last game.

"He worked extremely hard to come back," Coach Beach said. "I think the success we had late last year helped push him. He has an extremely hard work ethic."

Thompson shares the credit for his success with his teammates, especially the receivers.

"We are just clicking," he said. "I got my friends who transferred from Spruce Creek in Devonte and Alex Mack. Dominique Roberts has been my boy since day one. I have had a good relationship with Bret Kramer and John Christopher. They know where I am going to throw the ball. They end up right there."

Thompson's growth and development is also coming along.

"He has picked it up," Coach Beach said. "The only knock is that the injury has hurt his pocket presence but he is doing a

good job of looking down field. He is improving every week."

Coach Beach said he believes Thompson has a future in football.

"He's a good athlete and football player. He did miss a lot of time last year but I think that he is a D-I prospect," Coach Beach said, referring to the NCAA's highest sanctioning level for college football teams. "Now he will get more film for people to look at. Of course, winning helps. He will have a chance to pick a school that best fits him."

Once football season is over, Thompson will move onto basketball and track, but for now, he's not thinking about anything but football.

"Right now, I just want to finish this season and win a championship ring," he said. "After that I will make my decision where to go to college."

Thompson said he is receiving interest from Bethune-Cookman, FAMU, Prairie View State, Memphis, Wake Forest, Western Kentucky and the Citadel. B-CU has also extended him an offer to play basketball, he said.



Daycare dog fighting ring busted in Chicago

From ap.org: A home day care was the site of a dog fighting ring, authorities said, and investigators who raided the house found a blood-spattered garage floor and battered and malnourished dogs not far from where children played.

Three men were charged, including the day care operator's husband, and authorities were seeking two others. Authorities initially said four people had been arrested. Nine battered dogs — four of which were puppies

— were rescued, police said. Day care officials could not immediately be reached. No one answered a knock at the door of the home.

Dart said approximately 10 children were found in the day care during the raid, but they were not in the immediate vicinity of the dogs. Neighbors and authorities say the day care was operated out of the basement of the house and a fenced-in play area was in the backyard.

Gambler claims casino brainwashed him

From news.aol.com: A Detroit man has filed a lawsuit against a local casino, claiming the gaming business is at fault for "brainwashing" him and should give back more than \$670,000 he's lost there since 2000, according to *The Detroit News*.

Italo Mario Parise, 61, is seeking redress under a seldom-used state law that he

and his lawyer interpret to mean the MotorCity casino had a duty to stop Parise after he lost big.

Gambling law experts, including legal briefs filed on behalf of the casino's parent company, maintain that the law applies to illegal casinos, not legal ones, and that finding in Parise's favor could be a major blow to the industry.

The law dates back to 1827, Parise's lawyer, Frank A. Cusumano, told the newspaper. Parise said hasn't gambled since March 22.

Postal worker stole 30,000 DVDs

From news.aol.com: A former postal service employee has pleaded guilty to stealing more than 30,000 DVDs that moved through a western Massachusetts Post Office.

Myles Weathers, formerly of Springfield, took DVDs that

were mailed by Netflix to customers for a year beginning in January 2007.

Federal prosecutors say the movie rental company alerted Springfield Post Office officials that a suspiciously high number of DVDs were disappearing.

As many as 100 movies a week were disappearing. Weathers was arrested in February 2008 after investigators filmed him taking DVDs from packages and slipping them into his backpack.

He faces 10 months to 16 months in prison and restitution costs of about \$38,000 at his Dec. 23 sentencing. His attorney did not immediately return a call seeking comment.

ond highest millage in Florida.

Commissioner Derrick Henry said taxpayers need a break.

"I agree we have gotten too large," he said. "It will be a challenge, but we need to get smaller."

The new approved rate of \$5.42 is the same as last year. The same rate will bring in less money because of declining property values.

With the new rate, a homeowner with a residence valued at \$150,000 and \$50,000

homestead exemption will pay city property taxes of \$542.

Mayor Ritchey said city staff is now charged with coming up with a new budget using the approved millage. He said he did not want any cuts in essential services such as police and fire protection.

City Manager Jim Chisholm said he could transfer money from other funds to make up for less tax dollars in the general fund.

"We can probably do some things to mitigate the impact," he said, "but if cuts are made again next year it could affect quality of life."

Commissioner Pam Woods

suggested that work on the budget should start earlier in the year.

"We need to get public input," she said. "Maybe at the first of the year we can start doing some planning."

The mayor said they could plan workshops at regular intervals for budget discussions.

The new rate is far below the rolled-back rate of \$6.53. The rolled-back rate is the rate that would bring in the same amount of money as the current year, minus new construction.

The commission approved the \$199 million budget for the next fiscal year.

in her own car, according to Holly Hill police when they saw her speeding at better than 80 mph along several side streets and blowing through stop signs. Hawkins was actually heading to the Holly Hill police department after learning her 25-year-old son had been arrested during a fight at the Holly Point apartments. Holly Hill police said when Hawkins finally pulled over, she identified herself as a police officer and became verbally and physically abusive. According to the police report, Hawkins called the officers rednecks and corrupt and said she'd sue them for "messing" with her family. Chief Mark Barker said when his officers could not subdue Hawkins, they moved to arrest her and he said that's when things turned physical. Hawkins allegedly tried to grab one of the officer's tasers, then used law enforcement defense tactics against them. One of the arresting officers sprained a wrist and the other suffered a twisted knee. Hawkins is on administrative leave pending the outcome of the investigation. Hawkins has another son who told WESH 2 his mother would not have behaved the way Holly Hill police claim she did. He also claims the confrontation at the apartments where his brother was arrested, was mishandled by Holly Hill police and that his police officer mother was

only trying to resolve that situation when she was arrested. Holly Hill Police now say they are reviewing the incident.

Confession can be used at trial

A judge recently ruled the confession made by a prison inmate after the murder of a corrections officer, can be used in court during trial later this month. Enoch Hall was serving life at Tomoka State Prison in Daytona Beach in June of 2008, when prosecutors said he repeatedly stabbed Officer Donna Fitzgerald. Defense attorneys claim Hall was beaten and threatened into confessing, but the judge found no credible evidence of that. The judge also denied the defense's motion for a change of venue.

DNA led to identification

Daytona Beach police say DNA led them to identify a man suspected in a huge jewelry store heist. Investigators said Surray Tavares Brown, 33, left his DNA at the Sears store in the Volusia Mall last May. Detectives just got a hit and have a warrant out for Brown's arrest. The burglary was also caught on surveillance, but the suspect had a T-shirt over his face as he used a mallet to break open glass jewelry cases.

He cut himself on the arm and that's how police got the DNA and the identification.

Chemical scare brief shuts down U.S. Highway 1

A chemical scare briefly shut down a main road in Ormond Beach and led to several evacuations. 1,900 gallons of swimming pool chlorine apparently ruptured out of a container in the back of Pinch a Penny pool supply store on U.S. Highway 1, blowing out the retaining wall around it. The chemical leaked into the back parking lot of the store and to be safe, Hazmat was called in while Ormond Beach firefighters and police contained the area and evacuated several businesses and residents nearby.

In liquid form, the chlorine is not deemed as dangerous and the Hazmat team quickly hosed down the area and prevented bigger problems. Officials checked soil samples and were assured the chlorine did not leach into the water supply.

Deputy nearly hit during get-away

A Volusia County Sheriff's deputy had to jump out of the way to avoid being hit by a man who investigators said stole a

car from the Enterprise rental lot behind the airport in Daytona Beach. Enterprise employees saw the suspect jump a fence and jump into a Dodge Avenger parked on the lot. A deputy assigned to the airport was out of his patrol car trying to stop the suspect, when the suspect drove at the deputy. The deputy and an Enterprise worker jumped out of the way, but the suspect clipped his patrol car, then took off. Despite a search of the area, investigators did not find the suspect or the stolen rental car. The stolen vehicle had a sign in the back window that read bad brakes. The business had parked it because the brakes had yet to be fixed.

Woman dies from burns

A woman critically burned in a house fire in Daytona Beach died after suffering third-degree burns in the blaze. Robin and Floyd Pond were in the house on Forest Ridge Drive when fire broke out. Investigators said the fire was the result of an electrical problem. Floyd Pond was out of the house, but Robin tried to put the fire out with a bucket of water and was badly burned. Robin was taken to Shands Hospital in Gainesville for intense care, but she did not survive her severe injuries.





Don't overlook the value of 'Catalina' coupons

If you've shopped for groceries at a large supermarket, you've undoubtedly noticed the long "string" of coupons that print out at the register along with your store receipt.

These checkout coupons, or "Catalinas," as coupon shoppers commonly call them, are incredibly valuable to coupon shoppers. (Catalina Marketing Corp. introduced the computer system that issues checkout coupons about 25 years ago, although the company says it's not sure how or why shoppers picked up on the name.)

If you've ever taken a look at the kinds of Catalinas that print after your shopping

trip, you'll notice that they typically fall into three categories: money-off coupons for specific products, coupons for money off on your next shopping trip or alerts of upcoming sales.

A shopper receives money-off Catalinas when the UPCs of certain items in their cart are scanned at checkout time. The register "sees" a certain brand or type of item you are purchasing and spits out a Catalina that offers a discount on a competing item that you may consider purchasing in the future.

Last week, I purchased a certain brand of apple juice and received a \$1 checkout coupon for a competitor's brand of apple juice. You

may even receive a coupon for a free item.

Just in the last month, I bought one variety of pet treat and received a coupon for a free package of treats from a competing brand. A couple of weeks later, I bought one brand of yogurt and received a Catalina for a free four-pack of a competitor's brand of yogurt.

The second type of Catalina is issued during a general money-back sale at the store. You may see a store ad that states, "Buy

any 10 products in this group and receive \$10 off your next order."

That \$10 savings comes in the form of a checkout coupon good for \$10 off your next shopping trip. The discount is good on anything in the store. It's just like having \$10 cash to spend.

The third kind of checkout coupon is an "alert." These coupon alerts aren't technically coupons, since they don't offer money off anything in particular, but they do contain details of an upcoming sale at the store. These "secret" sales are typically not advertised in any of the store's flyers, so these checkout alerts are the only way shoppers can get in on the savings.

Unfortunately, many shoppers consistently overlook the value of checkout coupons. It's true that carrying a long, somewhat cumbersome ticker-tape of Catalinas with your receipt as you exit the store can be a mild annoyance. But the value of all three of these varieties of coupon cannot be overstated. They're all important, and you should save them all. I certainly do.

Just as we save all of our coupons that come in the newspaper, even the ones for things we think we may not buy, saving all of our Catalina coupons ensures we'll have them on hand in case those items go on sale too.

Almost two months ago, I

received three \$1 coupons for a smoothie beverage that I'd never tried before. Even though this is a product I wasn't terribly interested in purchasing, I held onto the Catalina coupons. A few weeks ago, just before those coupons were due to expire, the smoothies went on sale for \$1. Because I'd saved my Catalinas, now I got three of them for free.



Fort Pierce has something for everyone

What a way to spend a day. If you jump in the car, drive under two hours (depending on where along the east coast you begin your journey) you will find your way to Fort Pierce. The city lies on the Indian River along Florida's Treasure Coast between Vero Beach and Port St. Lucie.

What you find here might just surprise you. There's adventure, history, culture, arts, theatre, museums, beaches, boating, eco-friendly activities, treasure hunting, golf and more to enjoy in this hidden gem.

For history buffs, there is the St. Lucie County Regional History Center where one might be interested in the sinking of the Spanish treasure fleet in 1715 (hence Treasure Coast) or the Seminole War of 1838 and the history of Fort Pierce.

For history and art lovers there is the life of A.E. "Bean" Backus Gallery and Museum. "Beanie" Backus was a self taught artist of the Florida landscape and was instrumental in inspiring and mentoring the famed Florida Highwaymen artists, a group of approximately 26 black Florida

artists that painted and sold their art out of the trunks of their cars along the Florida highways. The artists were not acknowledged as a group until the 1990s, when Jim Fitch, art collector and curator, named them in a 1995 article on antiques and art around Florida. The paintings are very desirable to collectors of both folk and African-American Art.

Also located in Fort Pierce is Harbor Branch Oceanographic Institution, once a privately funded oceanographic research center now merged with Florida Atlantic University, the U.S. Navy UDT SEAL Museum, for those interested in the history of Navy SEAL training, and the Smithsonian Marine Ecosystems Exhibit. Those interested in marine life would not be bored with these options.

Boating is a popular activity particularly because you have the City Marina running alongside the city. The marina was wiped out by Hurricane Frances in 2004 when all of the floating docks were gone when the storm was over. They have been rebuilding ever since. The entrance is now much

closer to the inlet.

Golf seems to be part of the Florida lifestyle in general and Fort Pierce is no different. There are many courses, both private and public, including Indian Hills Golf Course that has been a cornerstone of Fort Pierce since 1938.

For those who enjoy the performing arts, the recently renovated Sunrise Theatre opened for live performances. Originally built in 1923, the doors were closed in 1983.

The Fort Pierce Preservation Association purchased the theatre in 1997 and renovated it. It is now being used once again as the cultural center of St. Lucie County and the Treasure Coast.

This year's lineup includes: An Evening with Chris Botti, Tommy James and the Shondelles, Kool and the Gang, ABBA Mania, and A Kenny Rogers Christmas and many more.

Captain Leo drums for drum — and it works!

Eerily quiet at dawn until off in the distance the faint sound of Indian drums. Well actually, it was Indian River black drum. I was south of the Haulover Canal and just across the Volusia line into Brevard County.

Once more fishing with the venerable red fish expert Leo Hiles, but this time we had a different target.

Captain Leo had been telling me about a large school of drum that had been occupying the same space for some time.

Nothing gets me as excited as the prospect of catching black drum (Well, almost nothing.)

After a long run in Leo's Blue Ghost, we stopped well off the designated area to approach as quietly as possible with the electric motor.

Once in place, we sat for a while just watching for any movement that would give the school away. Lots of large mullet were swirling about and an occasional single red fish pushed water, but black drum are notorious for

schooling tightly and should never be mistaken for individual reds.

After some time with no drum showing, Leo began jumping up and down on the deck of his boat.

Now if you have been paying attention to this column or have bought Leo's book "Fish Sense," you know that he and I constantly preach the value of stealth on the water.

Yet here he was stomping about on purpose. I was startled to say the least. "Look!" Leo shouted. Sure enough, about 200 yards away a very large school of drum had surfaced.

It could be nothing else, but a direct response to the thumping of his boots. I had never seen such a thing. "That's it! Now we know where they are," Leo chuckled.

Back in quiet mode we

eased into casting position. Each of us dropped a fresh dead shrimp with split shot just off the edge of the school.

Right away Leo hooked up with an eight-pounder and soon after, I landed a fat five-pound drum. Good eating and hard pulling, black drum rank as one of the most desirable of local fishes. It was a rare treat to find them on the flats, for in my usual haunts they are mostly a deep-water catch.

I won't recommend that you try Leo's method, but if you are in shallow water and are pretty certain that drum are there, if all else fails you might try drumming for drum. I saw it work perfectly. Remember there are still copies of Capt. Leo's book available at (386) 345-2213.


