Several seats in northeast Volusia County up for grabs

For now, Daytona Beach will have the only primary election in Northeast Volusia on Aug. 14, while Holly Hill will hold its general election on that date. All the rest of the municipal races in Daytona Beach and Ormond Beach will hold until the Nov. 6 balloting, as will any runoff necessary in Holly Hill.

But all that could change when



official qualifying ends. In all three cities, official qualifying begins at noon on Monday, June 4, and ends at noon on Friday, June 8.

The mayoral race in Daytona Beach already has three candi-

dates vying to replace current office-holder Glenn Ritchey, who is not running for re-election. And three candidates are running in a special primary election the same day to fill out the final two years in the term of a Zone 1 commissioner who's running for mayor.

Announced so far in the mayor's

race are Gwen Azama-Edwards, a former Daytona Beach

Holly Hill OK's pay for employees who volunteer

HOLLY HILL — The motto is: "The city with a heart." Still, commissioner Liz Towsley Patton doesn't think taxpayers should be paying for city workers' volunteer time.

"If it's volunteer, it usually means I'm giving my time because it's that important to me," she said in a phone interview after a recent Holly Hill City Commission meeting.

At that meeting, the commission approved the Holly Hill City Employees Volunteer Program. Ms. Patton was alone in her opposition. The new program allows the city manager to give employees up to two paid days a year for volunteering. Holly Hill has about 100 employees. City manager Jim McCroskey said that if every employee took

advantage of the new program, it could cost the city \$30,000 to \$40,000 a year.

Ms. Towsley said she believes in volunteerism and would be less resistant to the new employee benefit if the commission had spelled out guidelines. Guidelines for the new city-employee benefit are completely up to the manager.

"There should have been guidelines," Ms. Towsley said. "The city manager at his discretion gets to decide who gets the volunteer pay. There's nothing to follow, not for him or the next city manager. We made an employee policy with no guidelines."

In a separate telephone interview, commissioner Donnie Moore defended the new program.

Local artist immortalized on DeLand museum sign

DELAND — Harold Garde had the beaming glow of an artist who had finally "arrived" on Saturday night, bouncing from handshake to hug at the Museum of Florida Art on the Stetson University campus.

Not only was the museum honoring the New Smyrna Beach snowbird with a one-man show that featured a 16-panel mural — stretching 8-feet-tall and 24-feet long — that hadn't seen the light of day for 35 years; it was also installing a same-size reproduction of that mural as the backdrop of its permanent signage outside.

"It looks absolutely wonderful," said the

88-year-old artist before the unveiling. "I just love what this museum has been doing to support my work. It's my greatest honor to be here right now."

Along with the giant 192-square-foot mural and sign, a few dozen smaller works were also on display nearby from the last 11 years of Mr. Garde's work.

They all employ the "Strappos" technique of printmaking, which Mr. Garde invented decades ago. This dry transfer technique is recognized by academics worldwide, with the New York Metropolitan Museum of Art permanently displaying Mr. Garde's work.

In a side gallery at the DeLand museum,

Police: St. Peter teacher filmed students changing

DELAND — Stephanie Anderson was appalled when she discovered pictures of nude girls on an iPad her mother had found on April 1 at Walmart. Weeks later, she was floored when she learned the device belonged to a math teacher at St. Peter Catholic School, from which she and her three sisters had graduated years ago.

"I was shocked," Ms. Anderson said from the front yard of her Minnesota Avenue home, "because I went to school there. My whole body was shaking. I want him on the sexual offender list. People need to know who he is and what he's about."

Police say the teacher, Joshua Waguespack, immediately began searching for his iPad after losing it at Walmart, using a tracing application on his iPhone that led him to Ms. Anderson's neighborhood.

It was Ms. Anderson's mother, Tina Jones, who found the iPad at the Walmart Supercenter. She took it home and gave it to her daughter to see if she could find out who it belonged to.

As Mr. Waguespack was searching the neighborhood for his tablet computer, Ms. Anderson opened an application on the desktop that prompted the instant upload of seven nude pictures. They appeared to feature a young girl in her bedroom, exposing herself to the camera.

"I was disgusted and I was really concerned," she said. "I thought that somebody needed to know."

It wasn't long before she got her chance.

Mr. Waguespack was right across the street, where Ms. Anderson's neighbor suggest-

ed he seek help from a police officer who was parked a block away near Stone Street. He did that. Minutes later, he and two officers were at Ms. Anderson's front gate.

"I didn't hand him the iPad," recalled Ms. Anderson one recent afternoon from that same gate. "I just walked up and he literally took it from my hand. I was confused. I said, 'This is yours?' And he said, 'Yes.' That's when I said in front of the officer that was there, 'Can you explain to me why there's pictures of underage girls nude on here?'"

Though they had yet to view the images, the officers did seize his iPhone and iPad before letting Mr. Waguespack go that day. They also impounded his truck, since he had a suspended license.

The incident ultimately led police to arrest Mr. Waguespack on April 26, after he admitted to surreptitiously video recording two of his math students at St. Peter Catholic School, aged 12 and 13, as they changed clothes in a closet. He told police about these recordings — and others — but insisted that the pictures Ms. Anderson viewed were of a young adult woman who now lived out of state.

Ms. Anderson refutes that: "This was a little girl," she said.

Mr. Waguespack is charged with three felonies: two counts of video voyeurism involving minors and one count of tampering with evidence. He's been granted a bond of \$10,000 for each of the three counts.

A police report notes how Mr. Waguespack admitted to concealing pen cameras to record the girls in his classroom closet, where girls would regularly change. On his iPhone, investigators also

found a text exchange he'd had with a former student — at the time 16 years old — in which he'd stated "he was very close to crossing the line."

A detective wrote in the report that Mr. Waguespack indicated "attractions toward younger females" and "a problem with voyeurism."

Police allege that he deleted the nude photos that Ms. Anderson saw from his iPad at her front gate and threw away the pen cameras after the investigation began.

During the investigation, police say he also admitted to secretly videotaping co-workers in a changing room when he worked at a Walmart in Orlando.

Mr. Waguespack, whose last known address was 538 W. Ohio Ave. in DeLand, was fired from St. Peter on April 13. Diocesan officials say he was fully vetted with a background check before being hired in 2009.

"The safety and well-being of our students are very important to us," said Carol Brunati, spokeswoman for the Orlando Catholic Diocese, while reading a prepared statement over the phone. "...We pray for all those involved in the situation."

Don't bring me red gumbo, no!

From time to time I have mentioned that I was raised in Southern Louisiana.

While that is true I am not a full-blood Cajun, no. My dad moved our family to the bayou so he could take a job in the off-shore oil fields. I was in the fourth grade. Truth is: I don't remember much before becoming a swamp-running, Hell-raising Cajun kid. You really can't live in the swamps along Louisiana's Gulf coast without adopting the lifestyle.

For most of my friends, English was a difficult second language that they just could not wrap their tongue around. English was only used in formal instances like school and maybe at the bank. At home or when there was no chance that a foreigner was listening, they would always revert to the more comfortable French dialect.

Ours was a tight-knit closed community that outsiders sometimes found impenetrable. Back then, the rest of the U.S. barely knew we were there and that was perfectly fine with us.

Sometime back in the 1970s, the nation and the world discovered Cajun food, Cajun music and the very different lifestyle of the people of Southwest Louisiana. There, the food is to be savored like good music and good music should be savored like good food.

Once we were found out you couldn't escape all sorts of Cajun flavored foods. Potato chips, corn chips, hamburgers and just about everything else that is consumed came out with a Cajun-flavored variety. It didn't matter that none of these things actually exist in Louisiana.

Same with the music. True Cajun music is the most simple of sounds. No horns, no orchestras. Just a squeezebox, fiddle, guitar and perhaps a tub base and washboard. Soon those of us from the Atchafalaya Basin area grew tired of all the fakery and denounced all imitations.

One of my own pet peeves is when a restaurant peddles a gumbo that is based on tomato sauce. Not long

ago I drove up to Flagler Beach on a tip from a reader to visit The Big Easy Cafe. When I walked through the door, my first question for owner Nicole Mazie was: "is your gumbo roux based?"

If she had said no, I would have turned and walked right out. That to me is a basic that cannot be compromised. Gumbo is a brown soup. No red sauce can pass in there, *no shah*. Once that hurdle was crossed I enjoyed my visit immensely. I was wearing my wife Lana's honorary Cajun T-shirt and Nicole's husband Walt snapped my picture for the wall. Back in the early '80s when I took Lana to my high school reunion, the Cajuns made her an honorary coonass (Cajun) by presenting her with the T-shirt and a quart bottle of Tabasco Sauce (made just outside of my hometown of New Iberia). Nicole Mazie is originally from Greta, just across the river from downtown New Orleans so she is the real thing.

Right here I suppose we might as well deal with a couple pronunciations. There is no "wheeze" in Louisiana. It is Lose-y-anna. There is no "leans" in New Orleans. It is New Orlanz. Okay, now we can get back to The Big Easy Cafe. What a find! First I ordered a muffaletta sandwich. Well, a half a muffaletta sandwich. No one could eat a whole one. For the un-initiated, it

consists of select salamis and hams with provolone and mozzarella cheeses on special round bread. The real secret is the delicious olive salad topping that Nicole makes beautifully. Although my half sandwich was still too much to eat I ordered three or four side dishes. I had a cup of their most savory seafood gumbo, a cup of dirty rice and a cup of red beans and rice. Me, I don't want to miss *nuthun*, no.

They also carry the famous Zapp's bayou chips. For sure, by the time my sandwich was made, I couldn't eat it, no. *Oh my my, dat was so much fun*. Before I left I had to buy a bottle of Louisiana Lightning Strike Sauce that is made in Abbeville, La., only 20 miles from my home.

Now listen up *shah*, if you are a homeless Cajun or even a Cajun wannabee, then paddle your pirogue on up to 213 S. Second Street just west of the Flagler Pier. If you go on Friday or Saturday morning, they will be serving authentic Cafe Du Monde beignets and coffee. I will be the one in the

corner with the powdered sugar all over his face. Ha. Ha! *Laizzez les bon temps rouler*. That's right, let the good times roll!



Local historian remembered for knowledge of community

PORT ORANGE — Although Harold Cardwell spent the last half of his life as a blind man, he was able to see into the eyes of history.

A former landscape architect, horticulture therapist and teacher for the blind, he was well known throughout Florida for his historical expertise, writing 13 historical books and serving as a member on numerous historical societies, including the Port Orange Historical Trust.

Mr. Cardwell, 85, died April 13 after a battle with cancer.

His wife of 57 years, Priscilla Cardwell, collaborated with him on his historical books and served with him on the Port Orange Historical Trust. She described her husband as a "wonderful father and provider."

"He loved people. He loved life," she said. "He was an all-around good guy."

Ms. Cardwell, 80, said she had known her husband since she was 6 years old and first became acquainted because their respective brothers were friends. The Cardwells developed an appreciation for history early in their lives because their parents were also interested in history, she said.

One aspect of history Mr. Cardwell had a fondness for was Civil War history, she said.

"He loved the Civil War," Ms. Cardwell said. "We have gone to a number of the civil war battlefields."

Mr. Cardwell would himself be a part of history for his work on a top-secret project during World War II. From 1944 to 1946, he was assigned to the atomic bomb project, which later became known as the Manhattan Project, in Oak Ridge, Tenn.

In a 2007 interview with Hometown News, Mr. Cardwell said his role in the project was working on thermal diffusion and uranium enrichment.

"We knew it was dangerous," he said. "We knew it was something on the order of a super bomb, but we couldn't discuss it."

Mr. Cardwell said at the time he believed his exposure to radiation led to his blindness, which forced him to give up driving and his landscape architecture business.

It also caused his cancer, Ms. Cardwell said.

But his health never stopped him from living his life.

After losing his eyesight, he became a teacher at the Division of Blind Services in Daytona Beach. Until his death, he participated in many historical boards and societies throughout the area such as the Daytona Beach Historical Preservation Board, Halifax Historical Society, Florida Historical Society, Florida Anthropological Society and Florida Trust for Historic Preservation.

With his wife, he founded the Port Orange Historical Trust in 1986, where he served as president.

Colleagues remembered Mr. Cardwell most for his dedication to preserving the area's history. Matthew Romanik, a local attorney who is vice chairman of the Daytona Beach Historic Preservation Board, said he was honored to serve on the board with Mr. Cardwell.

What impressed him the most about Mr. Cardwell was that he was able to recall those histories from

memory rather than writing notes, and that he was deeply involved with the boards he served on in spite of his blindness.

"Harold unquestionably was one of the most knowledgeable Daytona historians ever," Mr. Romanik said. "He not only recalled his own history, but also sought out others' histories."

Kent Donahue, who served on the Port Orange Historical Trust with Mr. Cardwell, remembered working with him and his wife on several history projects over the years, including a historical book about the city entitled "Port Orange - A Great Community Volume 1."

"We're saddened by Harold's loss," he said. "He was not only a good man, but (also) passionate about history, especially Port Orange history."

In addition to his wife, Mr. Cardwell is survived by his son, Harold Cardwell Jr.; his daughter, Ruth Landau; eight grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

city clerk; Derrick Henry, a former city commissioner; and Edith Shelley, who's giving up her commission seat.

The Zone 1 special election features Dale Heuermann, Carl W. Lentz IV and Ruth Trager.

If no one candidate gets

more than half of the votes in these races, the top two vote-getters in each will square off in the general election in November.

As of late last week, two of the three city commission races are being contested on the November ballot, with just incumbent Pam Woods unchallenged so far in Zone 2.

In Zone 4, incumbent Robert A. Gilliland, who has said he'll run for re-election,

is being challenged by Thomas A. Kaczka.

The Zone 6 race, so far, is between newcomers Paula R. Reed and Cathy Washington. Incumbent Cassandra G. Reynolds hasn't indicated whether she'll run for re-election. If she does run, the Zone 6 race will be on the primary ballot.

Except for the special election for Zone 1, the

Local housing market no longer a nightmare

The long nightmare Volusia County's housing market has been floundering in for the past five years seems to be coming to an end as area builders are starting to wake up. While the recovery in prices will be slow, they at long last should be on the way up.

The U.S. Census Bureau reported that building permits were issued for 150 new single-family houses in the first quarter, up from 116 last year. While an average of 50 a month doesn't sound like a lot, it is a big improvement. That number creates sustainable growth and helps prop up prices. A number closer to 100 a month would be optimum in a market this size, anything more and we're back to building a bubble that isn't pleasant when it bursts.

With the builders adding to their inventory of vacant lots and the huge pile of foreclosures dwindling, we should see a modest increase in housing prices by the end of the year.

Further evidence an economic recovery is underway was the retail sales report for February from the state Department of Revenue. Taxable retail sales were up 5.8 percent from February 2011 as auto sales stayed strong and

mayoral and commission races are for four-year terms.

In Holly Hill, the mayor and all four commissioners' seats will be up for two-year terms in municipal elections on Aug. 14, with a runoff election on Nov. 6, if no one gets more than half

the votes in races with three or more candidates.

As of last week, Mayor Roy Johnson and commissioners John Penny in District 1 and Donnie Moore in District 3 have announced they will run for re-election.

District 2 Commissioner Rick Glass is stepping down at the end of his term. So far, two candidates, Gilles Blais and Penny Currie, have announced runs for the seat Mr. Glass is vacat-

ing:

District 4 Commissioner Liz Townsley Patton hasn't indicated whether she's running again, but if she does, she'll face a challenge from Elizabeth A. Albert.

In the northeastern-most corner of Volusia County, Ormond Beach will have two-year terms for the mayor and all four commissioners on the Nov. 6 general election, unless three or more candidates file for any

race, in which case a primary election will be held Aug. 14.

By late last week, only incumbents Troy Kent (Zone 2), John Richard Boehm (Zone 3) and Bill Partington (Zone 4) have announced re-election bids, and none has drawn a challenger.

Mayor Ed Kelley and Zone 1 Commissioner James Stowers haven't announced their plans yet.



Standardized tests — a closer look

For those who have not spent a year or more in a classroom taking responsibility for developing young minds, it may appear that all changes are made for the benefit of the children. This may not be true.

Taxpayers love to hear buzzwords such as “accountability” and “merit pay” and want them applied to education. They are descriptive words that tend to provide assurance and comfort that the public is honestly getting all they can for their money. They are appropriate in many venues such as manufacturing where a count or measurement can be made to obtain a precise and objective result.

Education does not, however, lend itself to this type of measurement. Educators are dealing with human minds, not inanimate objects. Children come to the classroom with a wide range of intellectual and language abilities, background experiences, motivation and support systems. Those who have never been directly responsible for the awesome responsibility of personally teaching children may use their influence to implement programs that, to the non-educator, appear to be for children. Their ideas and efforts may be popular and bring them accolades from the tax-paying citizen-

ry, but do little or nothing for children.

Another buzzword often referenced is “standardized testing.” The FCAT (Florida Comprehensive Achievement Test), which is frequently in the news, is a standardized test. There are many standardized tests available to educators, but the FCAT is the one that has been selected for Florida schools. When used properly, a standardized test is an important tool for the professional teacher/educator in diagnosing strong or weak areas in an individual or an entire classroom. With a professional interpreting the results, an enrichment or remedial program, whichever the case may be, can then be custom designed. This is the proper use of a standardized test—to assist each teacher, in helping each student.

As a practical matter, standardized tests are generally administered to elementary students by their classroom teacher who is aware of the test questions. In the case of the FCAT, the results are currently being used as an accountability tool to give

letter grades to schools and determine merit pay for teachers. With so much personally at stake, is it then not reasonable to assume that a teacher may give emphasis to the learning concepts being tested? If so, the credibility and reliability of the test are compromised thereby defeating the true purpose of a standardized test.

Improved test results qualify the entire school for additional state funding, the non-educators now have their sought after accountability and the public gets to view charts showing FCAT results in the newspaper. Were the children's best interests considered in using the FCAT results to give letter grades to schools and to evaluate teachers, or were the children “left behind” in this whole process?

Educators provide an amazing service and they readily assume the responsibility inherent with their chosen profession. As in any profession, however, there are those who perform their duties at differing levels of effectiveness. Both the faculty and administration are aware of these differences. Teacher evaluators, when doing their evaluations, take into consideration teacher conferences, daily observations, conversations and student abilities. They do

not need results from the FCAT or any other standardized test for this purpose. As much as the public may want accountability, a standardized test is misused when it becomes a tool to evaluate teachers and schools. The results do not accurately reflect either the true effectiveness of a teacher or the quality of teaching within a school. Teachers should be allowed to teach the prescribed curriculum without the temptation or the need to focus on test items.

Standardized testing should be used as it is intended — to help the teachers know and understand each child's aptitude and achievement level and to help each child become the very best person he/she can be. When used as a measure for accountability purposes, standardized test results may satisfy the minds of taxpayers and politicians, but do not address the needs of the child.

Perhaps the terms “accountability” and “merit pay” would be more appropriately applied to legislators than to educators.

14 other Strappos works appear, all produced by Mr. Garde's former students.

As abstract expressionism goes, David Fithian, the museum's exhibitions coordinator, considers Mr. Garde's work on par with the likes of Picasso and Matisse. He said this particular work isn't "famous at all now," but having such a permanent, visible post won't hurt its public profile.

"I respect him," said Mr. Fithian. "He speaks the language of art and he has a great vocabulary for it. He knows how to critique it, how to teach it and how to do it himself."

George Bolge, the museum's chief executive officer, said Mr. Garde's colorful and playful work "sets the bar" for future acquisitions.

"It shows an artist, over a period of time, exploring his avenues to express his creative responses," said Mr. Bolge, "dialoging with his

past and present in a conversation that's still relevant and bearing fruit today. I'm sure you could ask Harold, 'Would you want to continue it' and he would say, 'Yes, I can have several more'... because it's simply an artist who's doing a masterpiece who's never finished."

The mural, which was recently redubbed "Icono-class" because Mr. Garde couldn't remember what, if any, name he'd once given it, was created one piece at a time over several years. It depicts a slowly meandering series of abstract figures in a myriad of shapes and primary colors.

In the early 1970s, Mr. Garde was raising a young family and teaching community college and high school outside New York City. That's when he painted the first few panels of the mural.

"I decided shortly after that that I wanted to keep making more," he said, "so what this ended up as is 16 individual paintings, but paintings that all link together."

Since the work took place during a formative time in his life as an artist, he came to think of them as "representing a continuation of life, this colorful, playful branching out."

Today, he says he sees nothing but "jubilation" when he looks at it.

That giant, visual playground will serve the museum well, said Judy Thompson, museum board president and the brainchild of mounting a reproduction of the painting outside.

"We had a problem," she said, "with the facility being virtually invisible to the community, so the fact that

we found such an extraordinary piece of art that transforms the building into something everybody will see as they drive by ... we couldn't be more excited."

DeLand Mayor Robert Apgar presented the artist with a key to the city before the unveiling.

The excitement was compounded by the fact that luck was so involved with the sequential work's rediscovery.

Mr. Garde finally found a New York City gallery cavernous enough to display the finished work in 1976. After that, the piece ended up with Mr. Garde's son, Keith.

"But he didn't have any room to put it up, either" Mr. Garde recalled. "Who has a wall big enough for an 8-by-24 foot painting?"

It wasn't until 2009, when art collectors Bill and Kathie Hohns were seeking treasure in Mr. Garde's summer home in Maine - with the artist's permission, of course - that two of the painting's panels were discovered in an attic space.

"I said, 'Harold, what are these?' And he looked up at them and he thought and he said, 'You can't have those.' He said, 'They're part of a great big piece I did. I just don't know where those pieces are.'"

They found them with Keith. Thus began a three-year process of reproducing the work from acrylic-on-masonite to a more lasting exterior sign.

"It's not only the first time in 35 years that it's appeared in public," said Mr. Hohns proudly, "it's the first time in 35 years that Harold will have seen it hung. This is really very special."

manage that," he said. "I have the faith in Jim McCroskey to set up a model for future city managers. I've got faith in Jim McCroskey that it will be exemplary."

Mr. McCroskey said that he'll consider requests for city employee volunteers that originate with organizations. However, he noted that city employees can be the requesting representatives for those organizations. He said requests will be reviewed by the city's human resources manager, along with the police and fire chiefs, for approval. The city's special events, such as the recent Hogs on the Hill, will qualify for the new volunteerism program. Mayor Roy Johnson strongly supports the new volunteerism program.

"That's what city employ-

ees are doing anyway," he said in a phone interview. "They're out helping the public."

Mr. McCroskey said he thought up the employee benefit when trying to get more hands to help with an upcoming city of Holly Hill/Florida Power & Light project. On May 17, from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m., volunteers will do energy audits on 50 homes. Residents have requested the audits. Contractors will follow behind the volunteers to do small adjustments that can help residents reduce their energy use. The power company is paying for the event, and the services are free to residents. Mr. McCroskey said not enough city workers were volunteering for the project, and he didn't want to see it end before it started.

"We had two choices," he said. "We could turn the program back or come up with an innovative way to get volunteers," he said.







Peppers: Posh digs and family dishes

ORMOND BEACH — It may be a successful chain restaurant, but nothing about Peppers Mexican Grill & Cantina is canned or rubber-stamped.

This is a gourmet culinary experience with surroundings to match. High-backed booths and intricate tile work line the walls and floors inside this spacious space, at 794 S. Atlantic Ave. Giant Mexico-themed paintings project the restaurant's mission: creating an authentic vibe with an artistic twist. Adding to the ambiance is Spanish music and family matriarch Anita Lopez handing out every table's warm chips and cilantro-laced salsa.

"Sometimes, tourists will see the

restaurant and kind of think, "This is going to be expensive," said owner Hugo Lopez, "but then they look at the menu and say, 'Wow!'"

Though none of the prices drift much higher than \$14 per entree, the freshness, quantity and creativity of the food reflect a much higher price tag.

Some of the food even comes out flaming. Take the Queso Fundido appetizer (\$6.99): grilled mushrooms, onions and poblano peppers combined with chicken or chorizo sausage that's then combined with the Lopez family's signature white wine sauce — salsa flameado or flaming sauce — before mozzarella cheese melts down over everything in the oven. The finishing touch is a light spritz of grain alcohol to keep a flame going until the food

is at the table and ready to eat.

"That's our most popular appetizer," said Mr. Lopez.

It's one of several recipes made distinctive through a few decades of trial and error.

Enrique Lopez moved to North Carolina from Mexico in 1992. Two years later, his wife and children followed.

Mexican restaurants the family planted there and in Kentucky were short-lived, but success finally came when they moved south to Georgia and Florida.

At present, the family owns eight Peppers restaurants from St. Mary's, Ga., to Panama City, most of which are run by family members. In Ormond



Beach, mother Anita works the front of the house and father Enrique holds down the kitchen.

"It feels good," said Ms. Lopez in Spanish, "to have my sons and daughters running them. It makes everything easier."

On the menu, Latin favorites like fajita platters, fish tacos, fresh ceviche, mole poblano chicken, quesadillas and carnitas vie for attention with family recipes that attempt to tweak traditional dishes.

The Mariachi (\$13.99), for

example, features grilled grouper smothered in shrimp, tomatoes, onions, jalapenos and cilantro. Another family recipe, the Shrimp Cancun (\$11.99) flame-broils shrimp, crispy bacon, cheese and mushrooms then douses it in wine sauce for a fajita wrap specially geared toward titillating taste buds.

Fear not, though: The menu includes a half-dozen vegetarian offerings. It even has chicken nuggets for children who have yet to broaden their palates. All of it is available at the restaurant's cantina, too —which offers two-for-one drinks at happy hour, 4 to 8 p.m. Sundays through

Thursdays.

On Friday, live music aims to keep the tabs open long after bellies are full. Desserts like a fried banana burrito, flan and caramel-stuffed churros will set you even deeper into your seat.

It might take a while to digest the main course and make room for more.

"We serve big portions," noted server Pedro Ruvalcaba, "so to be honest, not a lot of people want dessert here."

Nevertheless, sticking around isn't hard to do at this point, especially with everything so clean and aesthetically pleasing.

"When you first come into this restaurant, it can be a bit

different than other Mexican restaurants," Hugo Lopez said. "What we try to get out there is that they can find this restaurant clean and beautiful. Other restaurants, you might go in and smell grease and things like that. You might see dirt. But even if you walk into the kitchen right now, you'll find the floor, everything, clean."

Indeed, the kitchen was spotless.

A lost causeway, loving manatees and regained fishing chops

Last week, my guest aboard my 17-foot Polar was Diana Simmons. We have known each other for several years since we both serve on the Board Of Directors of the Ormond Beach Historical Society. This past January, I had donated a fishing trip to the Society for their annual fundraiser and Diana had been the high bidder at the silent auction.

Unfortunately, soon after she secured the winning bid, she had broken her ankle and been slow to heal. This fishing trip would be long-awaited and much-anticipated for several reasons. Diana had a long history of fishing with her husband, Mike, but had lost him to cancer a few years ago. She told me that since his passing, she had not been able to muster up the courage

to go fishing without him. As we launched from Sanchez Park in Ormond Beach, I was well aware of her fragile state. I began by taking a long slow ride down Thompson's Creek which I believe is one of the most beautiful boat rides in the area. Halfway along the creek, I pulled to a stop at the Lost Causeway. This is a place that all local historians are aware of, but few have actually seen. Deep in the swamp, it is only accessed by water and then it must be high tide for most boats to make the trip.

The causeway was a road built in the 1700s by British settlers in order to get their sugar and other product to market in what is now Ormond Beach. The portion of the causeway I showed Diana is where a lot of soil and shell was filled into a marsh to build a 10-foot wide road. To stabilize it palm trees were planted along both edges. The trees still stand. The bridge has long since fallen into the creek, but it is very obvious that this was once a road. After the causeway, we did quite a bit of bird watching and finally came to the Tomoka River, where I planned to fish. I had been having a degree of success there with quite a bit of action, although nothing large had come up in some time. It seemed like a good

place for Diana to regain her fishing chops. Unfortunately, the fish didn't see it that way. Nothing much hit for three hours. Fishing with shrimp tipped jigs, I was only able to land one flounder. Nothing for Diana. The best part of our Tomoka River time was when we came upon a pod of six or eight manatees that were obviously thinking about beginning a family. This is a happening I have stopped to watch many times. It begins when a lone female comes in season and begins to emit a scent that calls the males. The males will herd her into shallow water and the mating begins, with the largest alpha male leading the way. The younger males constantly interrupt the love making as they seek a turn

with the female. It is quite a sight to watch. By now I was a bit worried that I was not going to be able to find fish, so I headed into Strickland Creek 1700s and switched to fishing shrimp on a 4/0 red circle hook. At my first stop, Diana hooked a very feisty sheepshead and managed to play it down. I felt some better. Next I went to one of my old favorite black drum holes and sure enough, I landed a nice keeper as soon as my bait hit the water. Before I could get it into the boat, Diana was hooked up to a bruiser that had to be around five pounds. The fight was long with first the angler and then the fish having the upper hand. Eventually the smart old drum dragged her line over the barnacles and broke her off. Lost fish, but

good fun. Soon after my guest was able to hook up with a drum of a couple pounds and was more evenly matched. This time Diana did a perfect job and the drum was hers. Never one to pass up a chance to perform, I told her I could talk to the animals and made the drum croak as I removed the hook. She humored me with a hearty laugh. Back at the boat ramp, I filleted the catch and sent her home with a smile. I hope Diana continues to fish.

Hello smart shoppers. Let's delve into some inexpensive recipes to get you through these rough economic times. If obesity was a problem in America before, resorting to high-fat fast food and tons of carbohydrates is sure to make it worse. Let's look to foods such as white clam sauce, pasta fagiolo and red beans and rice. You could feed an army for practically nothing. Try whole wheat pasta or Barilla plus to get the good carbs. Enjoy. WHITE CLAM SAUCE serves 3-4

I use canned baby clams; they never get tough like minced, chopped or fresh clams. My recipe contains mushrooms. Even if you don't like them, once they're chopped you'll never know they're in there. Serve with a tossed salad and crusty Italian or French bread and enjoy. It's low in fat, cholesterol free and good for you.



ROMANCING THE STOVE
with the Grammy Guru **ARLENE BORG**

- 1/4-cup extra virgin olive oil
- 10-ounce can baby clams
- 7-ounce can mushrooms stems and pieces
- 1 cup bottled clam juice
- 4 large cloves garlic
- 6 or 7 sprigs fresh Italian parsley, chopped, or 1 tablespoon dried
- 1/4-teaspoon oregano
- 1/2-teaspoon black pepper
- Few shakes crushed red pepper, optional
- 3/4-pound linguini or spaghetti

Cook pasta in boiling salted water. While water is heating, prepare sauce. Peel and chop garlic, reserving half. Lightly sauté half the garlic in oil, remove from heat. Add the clam juice, juice from clams, liquid from mushrooms,

oregano and the black and red pepper. Return to heat and bring to a boil. Coarsely chop mushrooms and add to sauce. Cover and cook over low heat. When pasta is almost done, add the clams, remaining garlic and parsley to the sauce. Continue cooking until pasta is done. Add sauce to drained pasta and serve.

PASTA CON FAGIOLE serves 4

However you say it, pasta fazool, once considered peasant food, is pasta and beans, best made with small pasta like tubetti, tubettini or titolini.

My mom told me that years ago, pasta was sold in local markets in huge barrels and the broken pieces at the bottom were mixed together and sold for a penny a pound expressly for this dish; peasant food!

1/4-pound left over Virginia ham, if you have some frozen, or 1/4-

- pound boiled ham, chopped (this can also easily be vegetarian)
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 2 or 3 cloves fresh garlic, chopped
- 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 1-1/2 8-ounce cans tomato sauce
- 1-1/2 cans water or broth
- 1/2-teaspoon dried oregano leaves
- Few sprigs fresh Italian parsley, chopped, or 1 teaspoon, dried
- Two 15-1/2 ounce cans great northern beans or half white and half red kidney beans
- 1/2-teaspoon each, salt and pepper
- Few shakes crushed red pepper, optional
- 1/2-pound small pasta

Cook pasta in boiling salted water until al-dente; drain, set aside. Chop vegetables in processor, add ham and pulse until coarsely chopped. Sauté in oil or water until golden.

Add tomato sauce, water or broth and seasonings. Cook about 20 minutes. Add beans

with liquid and continue cooking for 15 minutes. Add pasta, cook until tender. Serve in soup bowls with a sprinkling of grated Romano cheese.

RUTH COLEMAN'S RED BEANS AND RICE (NIB) serves 4-6

My dear friend, Ruth, was the sweetest southern lady. From her New Orleans heritage comes this recipe.

Wash and pick over beans, cover them with three times their volume of water. Bring to boil and boil 2 minutes. Cover pan, remove from heat, let sit one hour. Drain and proceed with recipe. This procedure is said to remove up to 80 percent of the gas-producing properties.

- 1 pound dried red kidney beans, prepared as above
- Water
- 1 large onion and 3 medium cloves garlic, peeled and chopped

About 1/4-pound piece Virginia ham or 1/2-pound kielbasa or smoked sausage, sliced 3 small bay leaves Salt and pepper to taste Few dashes cayenne pepper

In large pot, cover beans with water, 1-inch over the top. Boil about 5 minutes. Add onion, garlic, bay leaves, a little salt and pepper, cayenne and the chunk of ham.

If you're using the sausages, add 1/2-hour before done. NOTE: Both available low fat.

Cover pot and simmer for about 1-3/4 hours, adding more water if needed, until beans are soft.

Discard bay leaves, remove 1 cup beans and puree in blender. Return to pot (this procedure will give the gravy the proper consistency).

Serve in large soup bowls over rice and pass the hot sauce.

Any sport under the sun is dangerous

May is National Skin Cancer Awareness Month. With this in mind, I'd like to address the need to protect your skin from the damage that the Sun and UV rays can cause.

For those of us that work indoors, we really don't consider how much damage the sun can do to us in the short time we spend in our cars, walking in from the parking lot or the like. Yet, regardless of how little time you spend outside, you need to consider applying sunscreen.

As golfers, we spend a lot of time in the elements subjecting our skin to tremendous danger. If you don't already take precautions to prevent skin damage, the time to start is now! It's time to pay attention to your skin, make an effort to protect it, and allow yourself a healthier future.

For those of us that work outside or play outdoor sports, applying sunscreen to your face, neck, arms and so forth hopefully has become as routine as brushing your teeth or putting on deodorant. With sunscreen now available in convenient sprays and sticks, it's easy to apply quickly and without getting your hands greasy.

One in five Americans will develop skin cancer during his or her lifetime and more than 1 million Americans are diagnosed with skin cancer each year. Statistics show that someone in America will die



of melanoma every 67 minutes. Of all cancers, skin cancer is the most common and nearly half of all Americans who live to age 65 will develop skin cancer. These are scary numbers. Fortunately, skin cancer is the easiest to prevent and cure if detected early.

The key to preventing and curing skin cancer is early detection and use of sunscreens to protect your skin. The most common warning sign of skin cancer is a change in the appearance of the skin, such as a new growth or a sore that will not heal.

Studies show that just one sunburn will double your risk of developing skin cancer. Children are especially at risk. On average, anyone under the age of 18 has three times the sun exposure of an adult.

Melanomas are especially deadly, as they tend to spread quickly throughout the entire body. Basal and squamous cell cancers are much less deadly, but can leave your skin scarred.

When you know that you are going to be spending time outside, you should apply sunscreen at least 30 minutes prior to your activity. It's also best to reapply every two to three hours or immediately

after getting out of the water. While any sunscreen is better than none, experts recommend using at least a 30 SPF rated sunscreen.

Something many people forget to protect is their lips. We now have lip balm with sunscreen available to us. Just as your lips can dry out and chap during the winter, they can also burn from the sun at any time during the year.

As golfers, we tend to ignore the sun, especially when it isn't too hot outside. We feel that a simple cap or riding in a cart protects us from the worst the sun has to offer. This simply isn't true. In fact, as much as 80 percent of the sun's rays penetrate clouds, mist or even fog.

Sun damage causes premature aging, wrinkles, age spots and dry skin. None of us want to age, much less age faster than nature intended. Look at some of the older guys on Tour and you can tell which ones spent years without protecting themselves.

The most often used excuse for not putting on sunscreen is that it will leave your hands greasy and make gripping the club difficult. Companies have found ways for us sports-happy people to apply sunscreen without dirtying our hands. Sprays are one of the most convenient methods for application. I happen to prefer the stick. It never touches my hands and goes on with just a swipe. I think that I get better coverage with

it and it fits neatly into my bag.

For extra protection for your face, neck and ears, wear a hat with a wide brim, not a baseball-style cap. There are even special clothing products available to keep your body cool, while covering your arms and neck.

Our world is changing and whether you believe in "global warming" or not, you must remember to protect your skin.

If you suspect that you have already damaged your skin from sun exposure or your skin shows any warning signs, by all means, have your doctor or dermatologist give you a check up.
