Daytona has crowded ballot

Ormond Beach has only one race; Holly Hill has three

DAYTONA BEACH — Four of the five seats up for grabs in an August 14 primary election in Daytona Beach

will feature contested races, and two of them could result in runoff in the Nov. 6 general election.

Meanwhile, Ormond Beach will have just one contested race in its primary in August, while neighboring Holly Hill will have three in its municipal election.

That's the situation after candidate qualifying ended June 8.

The ballot in Daytona Beach will feature four can-

didates vying for the mayor's seat, and two candidates each in two commissioner races. All three contests are for 4-year terms.

In addition, a special election will feature three candidates trying to replace an incumbent commissioner who is running for mayor. The winner of that race — which may have to be determined by a runoff in the general election Nov. 6 — will serve out the remaining

2 years in the term for that seat.

The

mayor's race has Gwen Azama-Edwards, Derrick L. Henry, Fred Hoffman and current Zone 1 Com-

Fido-friendly parks growing in popularity

Dog parks have been springing up in a number of locations around Volusia County. Several cities, include Edgewater, New Smyrna Beach, Daytona Beach and DeLand, currently include them in near-future plans.

Existing parks around the county include three county-run dog parks: Barkley Square, a 14-acre park at 1010 N. Ridgewood Avenue

near DeLand; a 3-acre portion of Gemini Springs in DeBary; and at Bicentennial Park north of Ormond Beach, the newest of the three which opened last October. (Dogs also are welcome at other county parks as long as they are kept leashed and under control.)

Orange City built Waggin' Trails Dog Park last year. The 4.5-acre facility at 1201 S. Leavitt Avenue opened in December.

Voters should know of changes before election

VOLUSIA COUNTY — Registered voters, watch the mail for new voter information cards. They'll be out by the end of the month, and a lot of folks will have new precincts to head to and new races to vote in.

"We did have 174 precincts and 130 polling places," Volusia County Supervisor of Elections Ann McFall said. "After reapportionment, the (Volusia County Council) has

approved 125 precincts and 102 polling places."

The supervisor will have people at the abandoned polling places on Primary and Election days.

"Any precinct that closed, we'll have a live human being there to give directions," she said.

Reapportionment has changed many political boundaries. Ms. McFall said the new precinct lines are aimed at keeping voter blocs together. That reduces the number

Volusia libraries have wide array of online services

VOLUSIA COUNTY — It's an unavoidable fact that library visits have dropped recently. Many blame the Internet — so much of what we once needed to go to the library to do can now be done from in front of a computer.

But, guess what? The

library is on the Internet too, with a wide variety of resources and functions.

Worried that not many people know this, the Volusia County Public Library system holds classes to let people know how to take advantage of its online services.

The Daytona Beach Regional Library on City Island recently held a workshop to help individuals nav-

igate through Surfcart, their online search engine and database.

Liz Zealor of Daytona Beach found the workshop to be helpful.

"It's something that I have to apply when I get home, but I know I have some work to do," she said.

Library cardholders are provided with a broad access to various digital format

materials, and can use their card number and PIN to log on to the site remotely to search for content on seemingly any topic.

Cardholders can also perform tasks, such as check out material, view their loan history and downloading music and audio books on the site.

Some of the resources included in the database can educate users on business,

help teach a language, provide legal forms and help students with test prep courses.

"There are certain databases that appeal to different segments of our patron base," said Deborah Shafer, Adult Programs Coordinator at the Daytona Beach Library.

Freegal, a free music website catalogued by Sony, is

Florida Bicycling Association opens headquarters in DeLand

DELAND — The Florida Bicycle Association has come to town and opened its first brick-and-mortar office at 336 N. Woodland Blvd., a space shared with the DeLand Area Chamber of Commerce.

"We're like the (American Automobile Association) for bicycling," Tim Bustos, executive director, said. "We try to make the roads safer for everyone, which in turn makes bicycling safer."

The 2,000-member association was incorporated in 1997. Mr. Bustos said its history goes back to the 1980s. Then, volunteers banded together to advocate for more bicycling lanes and trails, because there were too many road fatalities. Their efforts were successful, Mr. Bustos said, and the bicycling fatalities were falling dramatically. Perhaps a victim of its success, the loose association faded out or existence.

"It was rejuvenated in the late 1990s, because of a couple high-profile fatalities," Mr. Bustos said.

One of those fatalities was a friend of Mr. Bustos, Margaret Raynal. She and Doug Hill of Gainesville were killed in 1996 when a pickup truck struck six bicyclists in Clay County. Ms. Raynal's death

was especially painful news to many cycling enthusiasts, because of her work with law enforcement agencies throughout the state to promote bicycling-safety classes and her advocacy for helmet laws. Fellow bicycling enthusiast and Florida Governor Lawton Chiles composed a letter to be read at her memorial service.

Mr. Bustos became the association's executive director about a year ago. He'd recently moved from California to be closer to his aging parents in Pensacola. He said running a state organization from a living room in Pensacola wasn't working out well. Mr. Bustos — who'd gone almost four years in California without owning a car — was driving a lot more than he wanted to.

"It's a long way to anywhere from Pensacola," he said. "I realized quickly I needed to be more centrally located. I got out a map and drew a big circle from Orlando to Gainesville."

DeLand travel writer Herb Hiller suggested moving the Florida Bicycling Association to Volusia's County Seat. Mr. Bustos said West Volusia has warmly welcomed the association and him. The town has strong connections to the state's bicycling community. DeLand City Commissioner Leigh Matusick, who grew up

riding her bike in DeLand, doubles as the president of Bike Florida.

"I think the Florida Bicycling Association is a great fit for the City of DeLand and surrounding area," she said. "We have a lot of (bike) paths and trails coming in."

The association has a budget of about \$200,000 a year. Sales of "Share the Road" license plates helps fund it, along with membership dues, contract work for the Florida Department of Transportation and other government bodies, along with corporate sponsorships. "We enjoy a lot of support from businesses, and not just bike shops," Mr. Bustos said.

Business leaders have a growing realization that bicycle enthusiasts are great customers, he said. Bicyclists tend to have better-than-average discretionary income, take more time in areas they visit and burn a lot of calories that need to get replaced with a lot of food.

Mr. Bustos said the association is busy creating Florida bicycle touring maps, and working to at least double its membership. Additionally, it's developing a curriculum for law-enforcement academies.

Dan Smith. When it comes to my name, I arrive cloaked in anonymity. One of hundreds — thousands, probably.

In actuality, I'm not so common. Especially my name.

When I was born, my parents chose the name Daniel with the intention of calling me Danny. I was to be Danny Smith. When the actuality of giving me such an anonymous name finally struck them they changed at the last minute and named me after my mom's brother who was fighting in Europe with the U.S. Army at the time. When I left the hospital, I was Aubry Daniel Smith.

I still was called Danny; for most of my young life Aubry was an afterthought and only used for legal purposes. In school all of the kids called me Danny and so did the teachers.

Most of them were grateful since they already had a tough job pronouncing all of the Cajun names. We had a Placid (Plah-ceed) and a Desire (Desi-ray) and those were just the boys. At the end of the day I found myself in a class with a tough old Cajun teacher named Miss Mestayer (Met-e-ya). She was an intimidating old gal and had us all quaking in our boots from the get-go. When she called the role that day and stopped at my name, I interrupted and asked if I could be called Danny. She replied in that booming voice of hers, "There'll be no Christenings in this room, boy!"

She then called Oohbry Smith and I sheepishly answered "here" to a room full of snickers. She had gone straight to the French pronunciation and given Au the sound of O. Of

course, Obyr soon became "ovary" to the boys in that room. I was doomed.

After I moved from Louisiana I learned to live with Aubry. It did separate me from the huge number of Dans, Johns and Marys in the phone book with the last name Smith. All was well until about 1990 when I was in the mall and heard someone calling "Aubry." When I turned to see who wanted me, a woman was calling to her little girl. *What? No!*

My name was a man's name. You hardly ever heard it unless you watched old British movies, but now all of a sudden little girls named Aubry were turning up everywhere. I began getting calls to my home during which salespeople would try to sell me feminine products and the like. This was an unexpected turn of events.

By then I was writing quite a bit and was using my given name. I dropped the now-feminine Aubry immediately — I was writing for fishing and car magazines, after all. I shifted to A. Daniel Smith for a while but that sounded just too pretentious for me. I'm not an "A. Daniel" sort of guy, — I'm just Dan.

Still, having such a common name causes me all sorts of trouble. I have been accused of skipping out on bills and hounded by collectors for things I didn't owe. On the last

Tuesday of May just passed, my wife Lana and I sat down for the evening to share a pitcher of mojitos and watch a movie when the phone rang. It was Jeanette Breaux, a friend from Louisiana who I have known since elementary school. When Lana answered, Jeanette said in a solemn voice, "I'm so sorry for your trouble." Apparently, word had gotten out in Cajun Country that I had passed on.


Lana replied "Oh, it was no big deal."

You see, one of the things that we have in common with the Louisiana people is storms, and Tropical Storm Beryl had just skirted our coast. Lana assumed that the "trouble" Jeanette spoke of was the bad weather. When she said basically "no biggie" I suppose Jeanette thought we must have been having some marital problems.

Of course, I was not the Dan Smith who had passed away. When the fellow who mistakenly started the rumor called me, I had to ask him how I met my demise.

Prostate cancer. *Yikes!* I always figured I would drown — anonymously.

Ormond Beach student wins award for volunteer work

PORT ORANGE — Eloi Le Roux did everything he could to support the non-profit organization he formed with his brother — even if it meant scavenging through dumpsters.

“My brother and I would literally go dumpster diving behind Walmart and Lowe’s to find boxes,” he said, explaining he gathered the boxes to set up at school hallways to collect clothes, toys and school supplies for “We Care, We Share,” an organization he and his brother Alex co-founded in 2009 to benefit struggling Volusia County families.

Now Eloi, who lives in Ormond Beach, can say his dumpster diving helped him win an award.

The 16-year-old junior at Spruce Creek High School was given the Youth Achievement Award by the Port Orange Youth Advisory Board for his volunteer work. He received the award at Tuesday’s Port Orange City Council meeting.

“I’m really grateful for this opportunity to receive this award,” Eloi said. “(The feeling) is hard to describe.”

The Youth Advisory Board, a city board run by local teenagers, gives the Youth Achievement Award annually to a young person between the ages of 12 and 18 who made “a significant contribution to the welfare of the community through their accomplishments, leadership and service,” according to city staff.

Eloi’s work organizing drives for We Care, We Share has benefited more than 2,000 Volusia County residents. Most recently, a clothing and donation drive organized last Christmas resulted in 148 children receiving items such as winter coats and stuffed animals.

“He’s been reaching out to so many kids in the area,” Thanda Le Roux, Eloi’s mother, said.

Eloi collects so many items for his donation drives that he “takes over” the garage at home several times a year, Ms. Le Roux said.

Aside from the work he does with his own nonprofit, Eloi also volunteers with the American Red Cross and Avante Nursing Home in Ormond Beach.

Eloi considered the award “more than

just me,” believing people in the community who donated items to the drives shared a part of the credit.

“All of them cared enough to go through their house to look for clothes and (other items),” he said. “They did the giving. I’m the one who arranged the giving, really.”

Recipients of the award must live in Port Orange or attend a school in Port Orange. Although Eloi lives in Ormond Beach, he was eligible for the award because he attends Spruce Creek High School, where he is an International Baccalaureate student and is actively involved with the National Honor Society, the Student Government Association, and the French Club.

It was his advisor at the National Honor Society, Deborah Keith, who recommended Eloi for the award. In a written statement supporting Eloi, Ms. Keith commended the student for his initiative, not only in his volunteer work but also in bringing attention to the issue of ocean pollution.

Last year, Eloi and his family embarked on a seven-week transatlantic trip from Ponce Inlet to Portugal on a sailboat. Eloi, who was looking for evidence to support a campaign to raise awareness of ocean pollution, used a system of six 120-pound test fishing lines to collect debris floating

in the water in an area between Bermuda and the Azores known as the Atlantic Garbage Patch.

Ms. Keith said Eloi's nonprofit work and his ocean pollution campaign demonstrate his "leadership and heart for service."



True to form, a Volusia County Superintendent said that she hopes the board would investigate why the scores declined. Have they all been living under a rock?

For years now, mediocrity has replaced excellence as a widely accepted practice in our schools. Now that mediocrity cannot be achieved, we are simply willing to accept failure as the new medium.

Our children are getting a second rate education, while all of the time their parents are getting a first rate snow job. A second rate education begets a second rate society. Is

this by accident or by design? We'll reap what we sow! You be the judge.

Food trucks should be not allowed on public property

Back in the 1980s, the cost of a restaurant build out was about \$300 a square foot. Today, it's closer to \$1,000. State and local municipalities are constantly seeking ways to protect their citizens. That's good. But, their oversight comes at a price to brick and mortar operators. Providing more access for the handicapped, more extensive sanitation requirements, building code changes and higher liability coverage add up.

America is the land opportunity. First time entry into the restaurant business is expensive.

We get the food truck customers have embraced these traveling road shows. How could they not with food critics and "FoodTV" embracing these vagabond operators like they are some sort of rock stars while casting aside the legitimate restaurant operators who've provided material for their columns and shows for so many years.

It is everyone's right to choose where to spend dining dollars, but municipalities should not be promoting unfair competition. They must stop allowing food trucks or food vendors to park on city streets or sidewalks. Cities should require food trucks and vendors to make their own arrangements on private property. Or, establish a Municipal Food Truck Court and charge them rent. All truck food should be produced at licensed commissaries and subject to the same Board of Health inspections like our restaurants. Finally, all food truck operators should be required to carry product liability insurance to protect their customers.

Local job market remains the bad news

The abundance of good business and economic news so far in June might finally help overcome the one last bad spot in Volusia County — the lack of jobs.

Granted much of the news is about projects that are still a good ways away, such as Bayshore Capital's plans for two condo-hotel towers at 801 S. Atlantic Ave. in Daytona Beach or a marina/restaurant project at Port Orange Riverwalk.

Still, recent statistical reports point to better times. Retail sales were up 6.9 percent in March from March 2011, a trend that has been going on since last fall. Bed tax collections were up 6.6 percent in April with all three of the county's tourism districts showing gains.

The housing market is starting to show some real life with KB Home planning to build about 100 townhouse units at LPGA International and more than 40 units at Tuscany Woods off North Clyde Morris Boulevard in Daytona Beach. A builder has even started construction on two new houses in South Daytona.

But there have still been some pockets of resistance to the economic improve-

ment. For example, Palm Coast-based McCharacter's closed its second location adjacent to the New Smyrna Beach airport. On Main Street in Daytona Beach, Wise Guys, the Dog House and Main Street Café closed. However, the café closure may have been temporary. The smoke from the Kmart and Food Lion closings also hasn't cleared yet.

With all the good things happening, you can't help but think that the next jobs report will be positive.

Another sign commercial construction and real estate are doing well is a lease-purchase that Buddy Budiansky and Ron Frederick of Prudential Commercial Real Estate in Daytona Beach just negotiated. The partners worked with owner Dover Properties and tenant Hinckley Trust on the deal for 162 Vining Court in Ormond Beach. Doug and Liz Piatt plan to use the building for a construction office and interior design studio. Doug Piatt has been doing a lot of the renovations in downtown Ormond Beach for businessman Bill Jones.

Sparton Corp. is on a roll again with new contracts. Its ERAPSCO joint venture has gotten two contracts in the past week from the U.S. Navy. The first contract was for \$10.8 million for the AN/SSQ-101A Air Deployable Active Receiver sonobuoy. The second contract was \$12.9 million for the AN/SSQ-53F passive sonobuoy. As always, much of the work will be done at Sparton's DeLeon Springs plant. A sonobuoy is an underwater device that detects submarines and other objects.

Two long-time executives at Brown & Brown Inc. of Daytona Beach got promotions recently. Linda Downs has been named chief operator officer and Charlie Lydecker was named president of the retail division. Brown & Brown is one of the nation's largest insurance sales networks and also handles employee benefits management for clients.

On the restaurant beat, Scuttlebutt's has opened on

South Beach Street in Daytona Beach. However, the business is still squabbling with the city over its sign. Also, construction has started on Mel's Diner at Gulfstream Village in Port Orange. Somewhat restaurant related, a Verizon Wireless store is going in the former Dunkin Donuts shop at Nova Road and West Granada Boulevard in Ormond Beach. The Dunkin Donuts moved to a larger place farther south on Nova.

The steady drop of gasoline prices continued with the average in the Volusia/Flagler county area hitting \$3.349 Monday. Not sure if we'll see it get down to \$3, but it's definitely a lot better than paying \$4.

of different ballots, reducing possible election confusion. Volusia County is going from three to two congressional districts, four to three state senate districts, and six to four state representative districts.

Reapportionment changes stem from a combination of the 2010 census and the Fair Districts amendments to Florida Constitution voters overwhelmingly approved the same year. The amendments forced legislators to draw districts that more closely follow existing political boundaries, such as county lines, and keep them compacted.

The reduction in precincts and polling places, along with other changes, will save the county's election department workers' hours and money.

"Although it's an extra asset,

we didn't do it to save money," Ms. McFall said. "But, we'll save \$70,000 to \$80,000 per election."

Elections have cost the county about \$400,000 in recent years. With the changes afoot, the number of poll workers needed is going from about 1,800 to about 1,000. Volusia County has about 317,000 active voters (those who've voted in the last four years). Another 33,500 are registered to vote, but "inactive," they have not voted in at least four years.

Ms. McFall said that only about half of voters will show up for the Aug. 14 primary election and Nov. 6 general election.

"Fifty percent of voters do (alternative) voting," she said. "With early voting, about 25 percent, and 25 percent do absentee voting."

Unlike years past, anyone can vote by absentee ballot now. No reason needs to be

given for requesting an absentee ballot. Early voting for the primary election starts on Aug. 4. Early voting for the general election begins on Oct. 27. To participate in the primary, a voter must be registered by July 16. To participate in the general election, a voter must be registered by Oct. 9.

Voters heading to the polls must remember to take state-issued and photo IDs. For example, a driver's license, Social Security card, or military ID. The state-issued IDs don't have to have pictures, but voters who use those without them need to have another photo IDs as well. Ms. McFall said people don't have to take their voter information cards to the polls, but it's a good idea. Additionally, Votran will give anyone with a Volusia County voter information card a free ride to and from a precinct during early voting and on election day.

There's been much news lately about the Florida Division of Elections advising local supervisors about possible undocumented immigrants unlawfully registered to vote. Ms. McFall said the state elections office gave her 15 names to check.

"One of the 15 is in the military," she said. "Could you imagine me sending a letter to someone serving in the military that they're voting status is in question?"

She said the state division advised local elections officials of 1,700 it suspected of being unlawfully registered to vote due to immigration status. Most were in South Florida.

"There's a quiet protest going on with supervisors," Ms. McFall said. "We're not doing a darn thing."

She explained that part of the reason for that is state



Hotel/condo project impresses city leaders

DAYTONA BEACH — After 20 years of a lull in hotel construction on the shores of Daytona Beach, a Canadian investment group looks to develop a massive project on the 10 acres it owns in the South Atlantic redevelopment area.

Two beach front hotel/condo buildings will comprise the property and will have features currently unseen in the city, such as a skywalk connecting the North to the South buildings, and an A-frame design that will maximize ocean and river vistas for guests.

"(The renderings are) an awesome depiction of an iconic-looking structure for Daytona Beach," said Mayor Glenn Ritchey, after a recent

presentation by Andrew Brown, president of Bayshore Capital Inc., local attorney Glenn Storch and Edwin Peck, president of Daytona Beach-based Peck & Associates Construction. During the presentation, renderings of floor plans for the two 20-story towers were shown, along with the façade of the buildings, which impressed both the Mayor and City Commissioners.

The two buildings will have a combined 900 keyed rooms, and all will have kitchens or kitchenettes.

Additional novelties include an inside atrium, a pool with a "lazy river," 40,000 square feet of conference space between the two hotels, a spa, fitness center, and interior parking. Many of the features, including a lounge, will be staged on the

seventh floor from which the skywalk will extend.

Mr. Brown originally came to Daytona Beach with his investment group two years ago with the idea of purchasing, but saw the opportunity for development after seeing the price of beachfront property in the area.

Bayshore Capital Inc. owns 20 acres of beachfront property, but this is the first development project proposed to the City Commission, and will be located in the 800 block of Atlantic Avenue.

"With the amount of hospitality product that's been removed from the market during the condo run-up, we think that Daytona is long overdue for a top (product)," Mr. Brown said.

Commissioners seemed impressed.

"There's nothing about it I don't like," City Commissioner Rob Gilliland said.

"The quality of the product really impressed me," City Commissioner Pam Woods said.

The commission gave consent for city manager Jim Chisholm to move forward with negotiations on tax breaks and allocation of finances from the South Atlantic Community Redevelopment Area.

If the approval process passes through accordingly over the next year, construction could begin as early as July of next year. Phase one, which will be the north-side building and skywalk, is projected to take 21 months to complete.

"We believe that this will be a real shot in the arm for the Daytona economy, and

we look forward to working with local constituents as we develop out our other properties," Mr. Brown said.

Members of the Toronto-based investment and development group said they recognize the importance of forming alliances with locals for the project. Along with Mr. Storch and Mr. Peck, the group also hired Daytona

Beach architect Roman Yurkiewicz, who helped design the final product. Phase 1 is expected to generate 350 to 400 permanent jobs, and around \$30 million will be spent in payroll expenses for subcontractors, material suppliers, architects, engineers and other jobs during the 21 months of construction.

missioner Edith Shelley trying to replace incumbent Mayor Glenn Ritchey, who is not running for another term. This race, too, could result in a runoff in the general election.

The commission race for Zone 4 pits incumbent

Robert A. Gilliland against challenger Thomas A. Kaczka, while the Zone 6 ballot features Paula R. Reed and Cathy Washington. Zone 6 incumbent Cassandra G. Reynolds is not running for reelection.

The special election to fill the zone seat being vacated by Ms. Shelley has three candidates: Dale Heuermann, Carl W. Lentz IV and Ruth

Trager. As in the mayor's race, if no one candidate garners more than 50 percent of the votes cast in August, the two top vote-getters will square off in November.

Zone 2 Commissioner Pamela J. Woods was declared the winner in that race when no candidates qualified to run against her.

In Ormond Beach, the mayor and four commission

seats were open for 2-year terms. But only the Zone 1 race will be contested, with incumbent James Stowers facing off against challenger Alan Burton.

Mayor Ed Kelley and commissioners Troy Kent (Zone 2), John Richard Boehm (Zone 3) and Bill Partington (Zone 4) are all returning for another term.

Holly Hill will have voters

deciding between two candidates for mayor and two candidates each in the contests for districts 2 and 4.

Incumbent Mayor Roy Johnson will face a challenge by former mayor Roland Via.

In the district 2 race, Loretta Arthur and Penny Currie are trying to win the seat being vacated by Rick Glass, who opted not to run for reelection.

In District 4, where current Commissioner Liz Townsley Patton is not running again, the candidates are Elizabeth A. Albert and Joseph Paul.

Incumbent commissioners John Penny (District 1) and Donnie Moore (District 3) were reelected without opposition.

All the Holly Hill seats carry 2-year terms.

something that can appeal to many demographics.

Cardholders can find music dating from the '60s to current hits by artists such as Adele on Freegal. The songs can be sampled up to three per week can be downloaded.

Music will remain on personal devices, unlike eBooks and audiobooks. Patrons can check out digital books for either seven or 14 days and can read background content of the story before the download is made.

On Surfcat, cardholders have the ability to check out books, TV series, and non-fiction and foreign films from

any of the 14 locations throughout the county and have the item shipped to their nearest location.

The database can also provide users with digitized information from articles or journals that might not be present or available at the library.

"If someone is looking for scholarly journals and we don't have them, we show them how easy it is to locate the item, which comes with full citations," Ms. Shafer said.

NewsBank is one reference tool that categorizes newspaper articles by geographic location and has content from all across the globe.

"You have to know what your source is so you know you're getting reliable information," said Lorri Davis of the Daytona Beach Library.

Reference USA is another tool that allows users to find information from businesses and individuals, at no cost.

The sources available to cardholders are exclusive, and in some cases do require a fee. Membership to any Volusia county library is free.

While on the website if any questions arise, it's possible to contact a librarian by phone, text message or online.

Black Heritage Trail offers historic look at Daytona Beach

DAYTONA BEACH — Recently, Lionurd Tynes, a local historian and archivist, strolled by the Mary McLeod Bethune Home on the campus of Bethune-Cookman University with a group of tourists following his lead. He reels off the significance of the historic site, and tells how Mrs. McLeod-Bethune influenced the community, including blacks and whites.

The home, built in 1915 and declared a national historic landmark by the National Park Service in 1975, is one of 18 properties

listed on the Black Heritage Trail of Daytona Beach.

The Black Heritage Trail is detailed in a 28-page booklet that compiles personages and institutions that contribute to the history of the city's black community.

It was inspired by and dedicated to the late Yvonne Scarlett-Golden who was a native Daytonan, and a political and an educational force both nationally and within the city.

Members of the Heritage Trail Committee worked together to gather documents and factual information, along with photographs, in order to share the city's history and significance. A booklet was creat-

ed, which allows visitors to take a self-guided tour of the sites along the trail.

Among the 18 sites are the Howard Thurman Home, Masonic Lodge No. 36, John H. Dickerson Community Center, and Bonner Elementary, which was previously Cypress Street Elementary, the school Mr. Tynes attended as a child.

Mr. Tynes is on the Historic Preservation Board within the committee, and is one of many individuals who were paramount in the Trail's creation.

The booklet was printed last year, but Mr. Tynes maintains an intricate role in spreading awareness of Daytona Beach's rich histo-

ry by conducting tours of the city's landmark locations upon request.

"It's amazing the history here," Mr. Tynes said. "What knocks me down is people born and raised right here and they say 'man, you mean to say that happened in that building right there that I used to walk by every day going to school?'"

Mr. Tynes enjoys this historic awakening in locals but what's also significant is the fact that a vested interest develops on a broader level.

"When people come up and say 'oh what are you doing with that building? And then it becomes, 'oh no, we're going to save this

building. That's the joy I think about being a historian," he said. "This Trail lets the community know these are the kinds of things we're doing, and these are the kinds of things we need to

preserve." It's not only locals, however, who see the booklet as a way to educate themselves. Groups and individuals throughout Florida See TRAIL, B7



have come to Daytona Beach to walk the Trail, and hear Mr. Tynes' firsthand accounts of his experiences and connections to the various sites.

Having grown up in Daytona Beach starting in the 50s, Mr. Tynes can explain well the history, buildings and sites that are still standing in the city, and also those that have deteriorated or been demolished.

The largest group guided on a tour of the Trail came from Orlando, and contacted Assistant City Manager Betty Goodman, who serves as the city's liaison for tours of the Trail.

Ms. Goodman, who grew up with Mr. Tynes, was contacted by employees of local radio station 94.5 FM about arranging a guided tour of the Black Heritage Trail after they saw the

booklet online.

"This has been really rewarding. It's amazing how people see (the Trail) from other cities," Ms. Goodman said.

Mr. Tynes and Ms. Goodman both agreed he would take the group of about 45 people, ranging in ages from 70 to seven, to as many locations their allotment of time allowed for.

"They enjoyed it very much. It was a very nice experience, and they were very organized. You have to really be organized," Mr. Tynes said.

Logistics and planning is something that has to be considered before conducting a tour, Mr. Tynes explained.

In September, a church group from Atlanta will visit Daytona Beach and see the sites included in the Trail.

"(The Trail) is really bringing people to our city and creating interesting thought or activity for

It's time to reap the bounty of Florida's waters

As I am writing this, the first signs of a Halifax shrimp run are appearing. As I waded near Tomoka State Park, my movement was spooking up more shrimp than usual, and as I launched my boat at Granada Bait, owner Ike Leary told me to take along my cast net. The next day, I took a ride down to Orange Avenue, and from the bridge, I could see a few boats working the channel. By the time you read this, a shrimp run could be going full bore.

The summer of 2010 gave us the best shrimp run in many years and lasted all the way to fall. Last year, the run didn't last nearly as long but was very intense. On a few occasions, I was able to get a 5-gallon limit in just over an hour. Considering that these days I throw a smaller 8-foot net, that is pretty good catching.

The flounder season seems to be slowing up and so far has only been fair. I have caught 38 since mid-March, and that has provided many tasty meals for my family and friends, but it is not going to measure up to last season when I caught 107.

When I finish this correspondence with you, I will spend a little time inspecting my boat and trailer. I'm thinking about a trip to Florida's West Coast to snorkel for bay scallops. The season begins July 1, and I intend to be at Crystal River. (Me and half of the fishermen in Florida.) The area open is from the

Hernando-Pasco County line on up to the Bay County line.

If you haven't done this, you are missing a lot of fun for the whole family. My own kids are now long grown but won't miss a scallop trip. My son is now 28 but has been snorkeling for scallops since he was 9. Back then, we made him wear water wings that kept him from diving, but he could still spot them in the clear water.

Be sure to keep your scallops iced at all times. Until you have eaten bay scallops just plucked from the sea, you have not eaten scallops, but they are very fragile and require much care.

It is not too early to begin planning your trip to the Keys for the lobster mini season. That happens the last Wednesday and Thursday of July. It is a long drive

down there and lobstering is hard work, but the reward is oh so sweet.

In the meantime, let's keep an eye on the Halifax for the shrimp run. Remember, there is no anchoring in the boat channel. Whenever law enforcement finds a bonanza of 30 or 40 boats in a group, they see it as a good chance to write tickets without burning much fuel.

Summer is popping all around us and there is a tasty bounty to be reaped.
