School Board reduces tax bills, but new tax up for vote Nov. 6

VOLUSIA—The average homeowner will pay about \$620 in property taxes for the county's public schools next fiscal year, 2012-2013. That's about \$30 less than for this fiscal year.

At its last regular meeting, Sept. 11, the Volusia County School Board approved 2012-2013 budgets that totaled \$766.5 million, about \$40 million less than last year. It approved a \$459.2 million operating budget, which is about \$8 million less than last year.

"I think the budget is responsible," Dr. Al Williams, school board chairman, said in an interview after the meeting. "It's a responsible

budget. We're trying to save jobs and programs, which we will if we pass the \$1 tax."

Mr. Williams was referring to a temporary property surtax voters will decide in November. Mr. Williams said that he expects Volusia County voters will support the proposed surtax, \$1 per \$1,000 of accessed, non-exempt property value. Dr. Robert Moll, deputy superintendent for finance and business, has previously told the school board that the average Volusia property taxpayer would see about an \$80 increase if voters approve the referendum.

At the meeting, the board adopted a property-tax rate of \$7.89 per \$1,000 of accessed, non-exempt value for fiscal year 2012-13.

The property appraiser has put Volusia's taxable value at about \$26.5 billion, the fifth year of decline. In 2007, the appraiser valued the county at more than \$42 billion.

The appraiser's office puts the average value of a Volusia home at \$103,500. That's down from about \$105,000 in 2011. With the adopted tax rate and accessed, non-exempt value of most homes, Mr. Moll projected the average school tax bill to \$620.

The school district is continuing to lose students, too, which it has since 2007. The student drop affects state funding, and it could cause

the school board to adopt downward budget amendments in coming months.

"We've essentially lost an elementary school," Mr. Moll said in a phone interview. "Right now, as we sit here today, we're 700-plus (students) below projection."

At the meeting, Mr. Moll told the board, "I can't tell you why we're

Lack of Holly Hill budget input irritates residents

HOLLY HILL—The city commission tentatively adopted its 2012-2013 budget after getting an earful from a few residents about not having budget workshops beforehand.

At a special meeting Monday, Sept. 10, the commission unanimously nodded at a tentative budget and property tax rate. Final budget adoption is slated for the next regular meeting, Tuesday, Sept. 25.

"It's concerning to me that we got to this point without a workshop," resident Steve Smith said. "Perhaps behind the scenes ya'll got together with the city manager and said you didn't need to do that."

In an interview after the meeting, Commissioner Liz Towsley Patton said the city has always had budget workshops before tentatively adopting budgets. She said the practice ended after the hiring of Jim McCroskey as city manager in 2010.

"Historically we have always had workshops and so have other cities," she said. "We didn't have a

budget workshop (this year)."

The commission adopted a tentative property-tax rate of \$7.35 per \$1,000 of non-exempt, accessed value, slightly less than the rollback rate of \$7.38. Rollback is the tax rate that would generate the same amount of ad valorem taxes as the previous year, minus new construction and annexation.

The tentatively adopted rate is slightly higher than this fiscal year's rate of \$6.95 per \$1,000 of non-exempt, assessed value. However, property values in Holly Hill have headed downward. According to the Volusia County Property Appraiser's office, Holly Hill's taxable value declined from about \$476 million last year to nearly \$453 million this year. With that drop in value, a higher property-tax rate can mean the same, or a lower, tax bill on a property.

In an interview after the meeting, Mayor Roy Johnson said the city commission is on the way to adopting a responsible budget for fiscal year 2012-2013.

"We were trying to get (property taxes) below the

rollback rate and that's what we did," he said. "I asked (Kurt Swartzlander, finance director) if we could go as low as 7.35, and he said he could and that's as low as he could go."

The commission also unanimously adopted a tentative general fund budget of \$8.8 million, which is higher than last year when it was \$7.1 million. The commission is now poised to adopt a package of city budgets that totals \$28.3 million.

At the meeting, Commissioner John Penny rejected criticisms about not having workshops before tentatively approving the city's budgets and property-tax rate. Workshops are special meetings at which commissioners can discuss city business, but cannot take actions. He said residents have a couple weeks to review the budgets and talk with commissioners before and at their final adoption.

"If you see something that jumps out at you — if you say, 'Oh, my god, you guys have lost your mind,' we have one more opportunity to talk about it," he

Florida fall still hot; some can't afford to beat the heat

PORT ORANGE — The scorching summer heat becomes a distant memory by the time September rolls around, but not in Central Florida.

With 80-degree highs still common even as the kids start a new year of school, it's essential for homeowners to have a working air conditioning unit to keep their residences cool in the Florida heat — although some can't afford the expense.

One local expert hopes to provide some help to homeowners on fixed incomes. He's already helped out one person: a World War II veter-

an who lives in a manufactured home.

Tom McGuire, chairman of the Volusia Air Conditioning Contractors Association, said he's seeking approval from the association's board of directors to start a fund that would support local homeowners in need of new air conditioning units who cannot afford the expense.

Mr. McGuire, who owns the local air conditioning business Flair Air Conditioning, said the idea came about after he came to the aid of an 88-year-old World War II veteran, George Bumpus, who was living without a working air conditioner.

He sent a service technician out to Mr. Bumpus's res-

idence, and the technician found the veteran's air conditioner had a defective compressor. Because Mr. Bumpus's air conditioner was

more than 30 years old, replacing the unit entirely was the most practical solution, but he couldn't afford it. "I explained to (Mr.

Bumpus) we couldn't fix his unit, we had to replace it," Mr. McGuire said. "We quickly realized he didn't have any

said. However, at the meeting Ms. Patton sided with Mr. Smith and others who complained about the lack of budget workshops.

"I did ask for workshops, even though we meet with Mr. McCroskey," she said. "But there should be some transparency. This budget, I assume, will go through because it's below rollback."

Commissioners may individually discuss city business with the manager,

under state law. It's common for city managers to have private discussions with commissioners to find out their priorities when crafting budgets. The mayor rejected criticisms about not having budget workshops.

"Absolutely nobody in this world asked me to have a workshop," he said. "If they had, we could have had a workshop."

In the interview after the meeting, Ms. Patton reassured that she did ask for budget workshops.

"Over the course of this year, we've spent a lot of money that has not had any

transparency with the public," she said.

The meeting was moved to Sept. 10 from its regularly-scheduled time of Sept. 11, because the Volusia County School Board was adopting its fiscal year 2012-2013 budget that day. The state prohibits cities from taking budget votes on the same day as their counties' school boards. Commissioner Donnie Moore, a critic of property taxes, wasn't at the meeting. In a telephone discussion after the meeting, he declined to comment on the commissioners' actions until he could get additional information.

having the decline. We weren't expecting it. I can tell you this — it's mostly from the southwest."

According to the district's annual 20-day count last school year, Volusia had just more than 61,630 students among its 69 schools, about 50 fewer than the previous year. The 700-plus enrollment-drop estimate is for the next student count.

District officials thought student enrollment declines had ended. In May 2007, just over 64,000 students attended Volusia's public schools. The projection at the time was that the county's public schools would have more than 70,000 students by the start of this school year.

With continuing budget cuts and student reductions, the district has been cutting positions by eliminating them as people left for various reasons. The adopted budget will cut 247 more teaching positions. The dis-

trict has about 4,400 teachers, which is down from about 4,650 in the 2010-2011 school year.

School Board member Stan Schmidt, Port Orange, said in an interview that the district is suffering from continuing budget cuts.

"We're having to get rid of programs that absolutely help kids," he said. "We haven't bought buses in four years. That's getting to be a problem. A few years ago our technology budget was \$12 million. In this budget, it's \$2 million."

money to replace the system. He lost his disability pension, and he told me he was on Social Security."

Mr. McGuire contacted fellow VACCA members to see if they had a used unit in good working condition that could be given to Mr. Bumpus, but nothing was available. So instead they donated money to support the purchase and installation of a new air conditioning unit for him.

Because replacing Mr. Bumpus's unit cost less money than what VACCA members pledged, Mr. McGuire is interested in using the leftover funds to help somebody else in a similar position.

"You can't imagine living in a mobile home in Florida without air," Mr. McGuire said. "It's extremely hot."

Temperatures in the Daytona Beach area have reached highs above 80 degrees for most of September, above what the National Weather Service considers normal fall temperatures in the region. Derrick Weitlich, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service's Melbourne office, said normal temperatures are between 70.4 and 76.6 degrees.

Mr. Weitlich said the long-term climate outlook for the area in the fall months is "equal chances," which means NWS cannot determine the probability that temperatures for the area would be above, below or near normal temperatures.

"They don't technically

have an advanced forecast," he said, although he predicted "slightly high chances of above normal (temperatures) occurring through the end of September."

But with fall temperatures in the area proving to be as hot as summer, Mr. McGuire wants to provide some relief from the heat for those who can't afford it.

As for his first beneficiary, Mr. McGuire said he was proud to step up and support a veteran in his time of need.

"Here's a guy who did so much for the country, now he's struggling to get by," Mr. McGuire said.

Rediscovering a bit of lost history

When the first settlers arrived on these shores, the Tomoka River was a highly valued waterway.

If you look at a map of Florida's East Coast you will notice there are precious few navigable streams heading west. With no roads, in order to escape the harsh salt environment, they would need to sail inland. Although the Tomoka is only around 16 miles in length it did provide a means of getting west.

Beginning in the early 1700s the British began clearing land on the north side of the Tomoka River for sugarcane plantations. Eventually they would dig the canals connecting Bulow Creek to what is now the Halifax River on the Ormond Loop. There was also a road constructed in order to get their goods to market over land.

Those of us who love local history have known about the road that became known as "The Lost Causeway," for many years. Indeed, John Bostrom chronicled his search for it in the 1800s and my friend Charlie Dutoit was credited with re-finding it in 1986. At that time Charlie was working as a biologist at Tomoka State Park.

Being the fisherman that I am I had "found" a portion of the causeway on Thompson's Creek back in the '70s. In those days I fished Thompson's and Strickland Creeks every week.

Each time I would pass the causeway I would ponder the mystery it provided me. The causeway consists of a berm filled with shell marl and the like to create about a 10-foot-wide road over the salt marsh. It is lined with palm trees. Each stream it crossed had to be bridged. Of course the wooden bridges have long since disappeared.

For years I wondered where the road would have crossed Strickland Creek. You see, the two streams are divided by a narrow island. It was clear the causeway had to continue on the east bank of Strickland Creek, but where? Nowhere along Strickland was there any sign of a manmade road like on Thompson's. It was a mystery.

About six months ago I received a

call from Ron Howell, a local historian and author. Ron and I both serve on the board of The Ormond Beach Historical Society, as does Charlie Dutoit. Ron asked if I would take him to photograph the Lost Causeway for his new book on John D. Rockefeller.

As we motored out in my little skiff I told Ron of my mystery. Once we arrived and the pictures had been taken, I mentioned that I had always wanted to go straight across from the causeway and walk the island to Strickland, but the vegetation was so thick I had never tried it. With Ron's encouragement, we did it. We both suffered some scratches and muddied clothing, but soon we were standing on the banks of Strickland Creek, staring over at the far shore.

Nothing there to see. But then as I scanned to the north, I saw the path that runs the half-mile up to Ormond Beach Middle School. After all of these years, a light came on. That path ends at the narrowest part of the creek. If

you were making a bridge where would you do it? Of course! Also I remembered that Strickland Creek averages about 10 feet deep for the length of its four miles, but at that narrow spot it is only 3 or 4 feet deep. Sure! There is an ancient wooden bridge buried there. After years of attracting silt and sediment it has created a shallow spot.

For years people (including me) have been using that path to walk to the creek. As far as I know, no one has put together the probable fact that it is the extension of The Lost Causeway. 

If you don't follow these guidelines, you may find your email box filled with some very nasty messages called flames. The guidelines I'm speaking of are known as "netiquette" and are an important part of participating in the online community.

For starters, let's go over some basic email etiquette. Email messages are quick to bang out and send instantly with the click of a button. This makes them especially susceptible to bad grammar, lousy spelling and poor content. Remember, humor and sarcasm can easily get lost in a medium such as email and can result in some pretty rude messages being sent.

Take your time with your message and if you are trying to be funny or sarcastic, use a "smiley" or "emoticon." These are little faces created with the characters on the keyboard, and when looked at with your head tilted to the left, look like little facial expressions.

For example, :) is your basic smiley, :(is the same guy only in a bad mood, this emoticon is a wink ;) and this :(emoticon is crying.

Emoticons can be used to put the emotion back into a message that's become sterile and mechanical. Using an emoticon can be essential to let your email recipient know when you are just kidding.

If you have a word processor or email client with a spell checker, use it when you compose your message. Also, watch out for the "caps lock" button on your keyboard. TYPING IN ALL CAPITAL LETTERS IS CONSIDERED SHOUTING AND SHOULD BE AVOIDED!

I've heard the argument that typing in all caps makes it easier to read, but if you have trouble seeing when you are typing your message, there are other ways to increase the font size. Learn how to increase your font size and don't rely on caps lock, it can really get on peoples' nerves.

Remember email has flaws. Avoid foul language and "private" or "confidential" messages. Email routers aren't perfect and your message may be accidentally sent to Mrs. Smith's first-

grade discovery class. Never send anything you'd be embarrassed for your mom to see (a deleted message can have copies archived all over the place).

If you send an email message that can get you in trouble, Murphy's Law will kick in and you will (usually long after you thought the message in question was "deleted") be embarrassed.

These guidelines apply not only to email but even more so to message boards and blogs. Message boards are an area where netiquette is of the utmost importance. They are online bulletin boards that are read every day by countless people all over the world and if you post a bad message to one of these boards, you may find yourself the center of a "flame war" and your email box will be flooded with hundreds of nasty responses.

Use common sense when posting messages to message boards or blogs. If you have a gut feeling that maybe you shouldn't post a message, don't. Once you post a message you usually can't take it back and you may offend thousands.

Other pitfalls to avoid in the message boards are the "trolls." These insidious little messages are designed to generate outrage and flames. Again, you'll recognize them

when you see them. Don't respond. That will only encourage them. Remember these words of wisdom: don't feed the trolls.

And lastly, don't fall for any of the countless get rich schemes on the 'net. They're there and you'll know them when you see them. Trust me, there is no money waiting in Nigeria, you didn't win some foreign lottery and you'll do nothing but annoy people if you forward that chain letter. If it sounds too good to be true then it's probably a scam.

Take time to find out the rules of the road before you try to communicate with the masses. Usually checking the FAQ (frequently asked questions) before posting messages can help prevent your email box from overflowing with flames.

All of these suggestions also apply to instant messenger programs and texting, as well. It is easy to forget about manners and grammar when sending text messages and sure, it may be "just an instant message" but remember, there is someone on the other end. Be nice!

Another big project comes our way

Some big gaps along the oceanfront in Daytona Beach could get filled in with the plans of two development groups.

Most of you are probably aware of Bayshore Capital's plan to build two, 20-story buildings with as many as 900 condo-hotel units in the 800 block of South Atlantic Avenue.

The new plan comes from Protogroup Inc. of Palm Coast and could be even bigger. The company, led by Alexey and Dmitry Lysich, has submitted plans for two, 25-story towers with an 11-story building connecting the two and bridging the Oakridge Boulevard beach ramp. It would have 505 hotel rooms in the south tower and 105 condo units in the north tower. There would also be 18,000 square feet of meeting space and 14,000 square feet of retail space.

In the 500 block of North Atlantic, there would have been two stumbling blocks to the project — the beach ramp and the existing Sea Dunes Inn. But Protogroup has decided it will just go over and around those two structures.

Of course, Bayshore and Protogroup still have to come up with the financing to build these massive lodging properties, but neither appears to be relying on banks or other lending institutions. A Bayshore official previously told this columnist that his company has the investors it needs. A city official said a representative of Protogroup has said that company also has investors who will foot the bill.

The city does plan to provide some financial assistance, but it mostly amounts to help with infrastructure improvements. There is the possibility the developers will seek some tax rebates, since the projects are in the Main

Street/South Atlantic Community Redevelopment Area. Well, part of the Protogroup's project is in that area. The part north of Oakridge Boulevard is not.

Watching to see which company will be the first to start construction and the first to open the doors will be interesting. Feel free to start your own betting pool among your friends, but regardless, the winner will be the city of Daytona Beach that will finally have two more large resorts to help boost the economy.

After cruising along early in the summer tourism season, the Volusia County hospitality industry stumbled in July — well, at least in part of the county. Countywide bed tax collections were down 2.92 percent from July 2011. After steady gains for most of the year, you have to wonder if some fairly large operator didn't forward the tax revenue to the county on time. If so, the August report could show a big gain. While the coastal area struggled, though, West Volusia boomed, thanks to little league baseball. Tournaments in DeBary and other activities helped to push West Volusia lodging activity up sharply.

Passenger traffic at Daytona Beach International Airport continued to rise in August, up 9 percent from August 2011. There were 50,047 passengers traveling through the airport, compared to 45,951 last year. Airport officials keep working with existing and

potential commercial carriers to offer more flights at the airport. Surely if passenger traffic continues to go up, they will be successful eventually.

McDonald's apparently wants to emulate the old La Quinta joke, a favorite of the motel chain's chief executive. What does La Quinta mean when translated from Spanish to English: next to Denny's. So, what does McDonald's mean when translated from Scots to English: next to Walmart. The burger giant already has a new restaurant nearing completion in front of the Walmart Supercenter in New Smyrna Beach. Now, it wants to put one in front of the Walmart Supercenter in Deltona at Howland Boulevard and State Road 415. For a while there it looked like there would be a McDonald's in every Walmart Supercenter, but that didn't hold up.

Zen Bistro, a popular Thai hole-in-the-wall restaurant on Bay Street in Daytona Beach, is trying to expand into more of a full-size restaurant. The owner has bought the property on Magnolia Avenue across from Jimmy John's and the Cellar restaurant in Daytona Beach, and is seeking approvals to expand the parking there for a bigger place.

In one other bit of lodging news or, at least, possible lodging news, county and Daytona Beach International Airport officials continue to move forward in the permitting process to prepare land at Thames Avenue and Williamson Boulevard for three possible motels. The land, at the west end of the airport and Daytona Beach International

Speedway, wouldn't be too conducive to industrial development, but it sits right between two existing motels. Eventually motel operators will be looking for more places to put properties near the speedway and the airport has one of the few available parcels of land, besides the speedway, of course.

Buddy Budiansky and Ron Federick at Prudential Commercial Real Estate FL in Daytona Beach had three recent commercial deals. The partners sold a 1,464-square-foot office/warehouse unit in the Holly Business Center, Eighth Street and Center Avenue, Holly Hill. They represented the seller, Beach Prints Inc. Barbara LaTourelle of Trademark Realty Group represented the buyers, Robert and Olga Huntly, who plan to use it for a wholesale musical instrument operation, and possibly retail as well. The two represented both the owner, Hull Road LLC, and the tenant, Eric Drewry, in the leasing of a 1,500-square-foot flex warehouse space at 873 Hull Road, Ormond Beach, Unit 3. The unit will be used for storage. They leased Unit 10, a 1,500 square-foot flex warehouse space in Stonewood Business Park at 1725 S. Nova Road, South Daytona, representing the owner, RWF Properties LLC, and the tenant, John Upton.

The partners also are now the leasing agents for Sunshine Park in South Daytona. The old mall has several small to large spaces available.

Family struggles with their sick child

PORT ORANGE — Not long after Nathan Grant started to walk, he started to limp.

By Aug. 5, the two-year-old couldn't even stand any more. That's when an x-ray and blood work revealed Nathan had leukemia. His family rushed home that day and packed for his first of several stays at Arnold Palmer Hospital for Women and Children.

"It was heartbreaking, scary," said his mom, Jennifer Grant, 32, who's taken this year off from teaching at Chisholm Elementary in New Smyrna Beach to devote to her son and his frenzied schedule of appointments. "It was kind of a fear of the unknown. You hear about leukemia all the time, but we didn't know much about it."

After a week of tests, doctors diagnosed Nathan with acute lymphoblastic leukemia, which is a lesser risk than other types of the disease but requires some of the most exhaustive chemotherapy regimens.

"His treatment will take place over the next three and a half years," Ms. Grant said, "but his is the most treatable type so that was a little bit of a relief to us."

Last week, after his first phase of chemotherapy was completed, a bone marrow scan discovered his leukemia had already gone into remission. But that good news is tempered with the reality the treatments must continue, as must his constant isolation from the world.

Nathan's grandmother, Kathy Stevens, said that's been the hardest part.

"He's been isolated because his resistance was so low," Ms. Stevens said. "Not being able to see him has been the worst."

But it's a precaution that must be obeyed, Ms. Grant said. A few weeks ago, Nathan was hospitalized after suffering constipation. Last week, he was

admitted again to Arnold Palmer just for running a fever.

"It was just a low-grade fever," she said, "but with children who don't have adequate immune systems, every little thing, they strictly monitor."

Nathan's father, Rob Grant, 42, kept his job with the U.S. Postal Service, but one income doesn't make ends meet.

"We have decent insurance," Ms. Grant said, "but we've only been a month-and-a-half into his treatments and already we've got \$1,400 in co-pays."

Friends and family have stepped up to help them cope.

A Labor Day fundraiser at World of Beer ended some of the co-pay pressure. A barrel racing fundraiser last weekend at King Palm Arena ended some more of the strain.

"People are just coming out from everywhere," said Ms. Stevens, who didn't even enlist her fellow barrel racers to help.

"They just called and said we're going to help and took it from there," she said.

Dean Feller, a barrel racing friend of Ms. Stevens, said he had to organize a fundraiser when he heard about the Grants' ordeal.

"It's just one of those things we felt we had to do," he said. "We thought of our own kids and felt compelled to do this right away."

The struggle is just beginning for Nathan, though. His mother is comforted, at least, that he seems to be getting used to the routine.

"Even in here he's still playing and laughing," she said last week from his room at Arnold Palmer. "At his weekly doctor visits, he used to scream just with the doctor looking at him. Now, even when they're taking blood, he just puts his arm out and lays there. He just let's them do their thing. He's my trooper."

See You at the Pole gives religious students a prayer

VOLUSIA — While they can't pray in class, students throughout Volusia County can pray at school if they participate in See You At The Pole before school on Wednesday, Sept. 26.

"For me, it's the chance to be able to meet with other believers and Christians on your campus you didn't know before," Kayla Delay said.

Kayla is a student at Mainland High, and a member of its Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

See You At The Pole Global Day of Student Prayer started in 1990 with a small group of Texas students. According to the National Network of Youth Ministries, which sponsors the event,

millions of students across America and in other nations now participate in the annual prayer event. It's on the fourth Wednesday in September. Like their peers throughout the country, students in Volusia will gather at their schools' flagpoles before school to pray.

"We're encouraging our students to go to the pole and pray for their country and their friends," the Rev. Jay Gibson, youth pastor at First Baptist Church of Daytona Beach, said.

Rev. Gibson said it's impossible to know how many students will participate in See You At The Pole. He said it's loosely organized and, of course, any student who wishes to participate can, since it's a student initiated and led event.

According to a 2010 Pew Forum on Religion and Public Life survey, many Americans mistakenly believe the Constitution, or Supreme Court decisions, forbid any prayer or other religious activities on public-school campuses. What the Supreme Court said in its Engle v. Vitale and Abington School District v. Schempp decisions is that no government body can mandate students or teachers to pray.

Student-led voluntary prayer or other religion-based activities are a much different matter. While See You At the Pole is Christian-based, student-led initiatives are open to all religions.

"That's absolutely protected by the Constitution," Rev. Gibson said. "Students need to know it's a Constitutional right to practice one's faith (on campus) and do so without fear of punish-

ment."

Kayla said she's participated in See You At The Pole since the sixth grade. Her mother, Gloria Delay, said her daughter youth always has stories about it when she gets home.

"Every year there's always an excitement they come home with," she said. "They try to carry that through the year."

The high-school junior said that in addition to helping her meet fellow Christians, the annual prayer event gives her opportunities to comfortably share her faith with others.

"There was a time in middle school, my eighth-grade year, we'd prayed in a courtyard," she said. "A fellow student stopped by and asked why I was praying, why were we gathered there. He started to ask questions about Jesus."

Questions she was thrilled to answer.

Rev. Gibson, who's served at First Baptist for almost five years, said students sometimes take the one-day See You At The Pole event and turn it into regular prayer meetings. He said that happened a few years ago at Spruce Creek High School.

"I have seen seasons where that event is continued, kind of a daily or weekly meeting at the pole," he said.

Rev. Gibson said most participating students try to show up at their schools flagpoles about a half hour before classes start. He said students who wish to participate just need to show up.

with the right type of lenses. Mrs. Rubin handles personalized fitting, including contacts, but the more specialized function of finding the appropriate glasses for the patient is the job of Michelle Mattered, eye store manager and board-certified optician.

"Everything is personalized for the patient," Ms. Mattered said. "It's customized. We also consider face shape and skin color," she said. Once a decision has been made, the completed order is sent to a specialty lab in Arizona. "They do great quality of work — then it's over-nighted back." As an add-on, the patient's initials can be laser-etched on the side of the frames.

ORMOND BEACH — In its short two-year life, Rose Villa has become one of the most talked-about gourmet experiences in the area.

And it's not just the freshly prepared, continental fare and gracious service that are getting noticed.

Also on point is the immersive Victorian ambience that's courtesy of owner Bill Jones, the president of Holly Hill's Metra Electronics. He's bedecked the 111-year-old inn he bought in 2007, which sat as commercial space for decades, with his characteristic attention to detail.

It took him three years to put it all

together before opening, and for his efforts he received an Ormond Beach Chamber of Commerce Beautification Award.

From the complimentary valet, lush landscaping and green, purple and gold facade outside to the replica wallpaper, restored longleaf pine woodwork and eye-catching collection of portraiture and period posters inside — time escapes the visitor for an elegant trip back in history. Mr. Jones even hand-selects the soundtrack, an evocative background medley of early-century supper club ditties.

"Fine dining with history," is how the management describes the experience at Rose Villa, but that wouldn't

go far enough to explain the backlit LED menus or the private media conference room.

"Every ounce of passion or detail I put into the food here," said executive chef Chris Pruneau, a culinary school graduate from Schoolcraft College, who's served under noted chefs like "Top Chef Masters" competitor Takashi Yagihashi at his Michelin three-star gem Tribute outside Detroit, "(Mr. Jones) doubles it in ambience. The guy is like a mad scientist when it comes to décor."

The zinc bar imported from Paris, for instance, as the centerpiece of an upstairs absinthe bar with 27 labels

available — making it what Mr. Jones' representative and local Realtor Dorian Burt calls one of the largest restaurant offerings of

absinthe in the United States. Why zinc? It's cold to the touch, keeping the absinthe and any other drinks frosty much longer than it takes to consume them.

And the immersion into history continues: The doors

throughout the two-story inn still bear the oval-shaped brass room numbers from when the establishment first was built in 1901.

Even the kitchen is a showcase with mint tin ceilings and immaculate china, the bathrooms for Carrera marble and commissioned stained-glass pieces.

It's all this suspension of disbelief that slides you smiling into your seat, but it's the food that keeps you there comfortably.

Our table started with a bottle of light and smooth pinot gris from King Estates, then two appetizers: a trio of fat, Ecuadorian shrimp dressed with light greens in a horseradish cocktail sauce, alongside melt-in-your-mouth Tenderloin Carpaccio that — as if not delicious enough left alone — came

piled with scallions, capers and tiny fritters containing the famed Stilton blue cheese from Great Britain.

In no way were appetites satisfied by the appetizers, which start at \$18. One of four salads on the menu, the Spiced Pear and Duck, was a palate-pleasing blend of sweet and spiced and savory, with tender duck confit on a bed of mixed greens dotted with not only spiced pear but also whole hazelnuts and dried cherries in a lightly tangy warm maple vinaigrette.

We tore into our entrees not from hunger but curiosity.

I paced myself with the Roman Saltimbocca, featuring veal medallions competing with crispy prosciutto in a sage-perked white wine sauce alongside a creamy risotto made slightly sweet with cippolini onion.

My guest was savoring her Wild Striped Bass with the same determination to prolong the moment. One side revealed a flaky and fresh specimen; the other, a crispy pan-seared skin that played a dance on the tongue with the sweetness of the side dish — little explosions of pumpkin ravioli.

The possibilities for dinner are varied but not overwhelming. The 11 entrees in the fall/winter menu that Chef Pruneau just released follow an American course with French techniques. Costing upwards of \$22, they range from a Bone-In, 16-oz. Filet or Veal Osso Buco to a Brandied Apple Chicken or The American Turkey Dinner.

For dessert, it's usually a simple choice of three table-side shows: the cinnamon-



sparkling fireworks of a citrus coffee, a Bananas Foster or a cherries jubilee. Just like grandpa used to get for grandma.

But the chef doesn't rest on those laurels that much. Recently, he threw together a white chocolate-avocado tort as a special that "sold to the first table right away," he said, "then started selling out."

It's all part of perfectionism, he said over dessert. "If you're true to yourself and do everything to the best of your ability, then you've got nothing to worry about. Nothing."

Not a twitch of worry showed on his face.

On the other side is an empty building he intends to turn into an upscale bar festooned with his weighty art deco collection.

Fishing not so hot when the water is too warm

If you have read about all of the great fishing lately, don't believe it. The good news is it should pick up as soon as the water temp dips a few degrees.

I can now declare my summer flounder season over. I ended up with 72 this summer. That may sound like a lot, but that is over a 24-week period and averages out to only three a week. Some of those were turned back and more were given away to those pour folks who don't fish.

It has come to my attention that some of you may be confused by the opening of the short red snapper season in the Atlantic. That has nothing to do with our inshore redfish that are also known as red drum. The only snapper we get inshore are of the mangrove variety. It's not impossible to catch a red snapper in the inshore but darn near it. Anyway, when I refer to reds please know that I am only talking about red drum.

Small snook are around the Tomoka State Park and I have heard the same about Spruce Creek. I caught an 18 inch on my jig and saw another take a silver spoon. Trout have faded a bit after a strong summer. The water in the Halifax is showing some discoloration from all of the rain but so far I think we are all right. From my experience it takes a bit

more tannic acid than is now showing to discourage the fish.

Actually, there is tons of bait in the Basin area and that always bodes well. Things down in the Mosquito Lagoon are still unsettled. Despite what you may have heard, the algae bloom is still going strong there and now includes a good-sized fish kill. Scientists from the state are working on it. I am hearing that the bait is missing there and that may be the reason why the Halifax is so full of mullet and the like.

As we move into fall watch the weather systems to lead you to good fishing. Any time you are able to get out on the leading edge of a front you will do well. I put that theory to work when Hurricane Isaac passed but had little luck. I went out looking for black drum and only landed one undersized red. Still, down through the years I have usually done well fishing a front.

Actually for drum I would take it a step further and say that you can catch them when the barometer has bottomed out. With deep-

water drum it is a light issue. They feed best at twilight or dawn and when it is cloudy will eat all day. Years ago when the dead-end canal in Tomoka State Park was drum heaven you had to wait until the setting sun cast a shadow onto the water. You could sit there all day and soak a shrimp without a bite but as soon as the trees cast their shadow — hang on.

As the water cools the fish will react by trying to take on a layer of fat for the coming winter. If you are able to find them, most species will then eat. Best will be redfish and trout.

Out on the beach you had best be packing away some sand fleas, because it won't be long before they disappear. The fish know that, too, and will be hitting. Watch for the fall mullet run to also bring the big reds to the beach.

Fishing right now is not the best but good things are in store. If you are like me you will go anyway. After about four days I become land sick from a lack of motion.

enue since 2007; and a list of reductions in instructional and extra-curricular programs if the one mill tax is not approved by voters.

Voters will be asked to consider a one mill property tax which would be used to support academic programs, retain teachers, and support the arts, athletics and student activities in Volusia's public schools.

The tax would be for a period of four years, July 1, 2013, through June 30, 2017, generating about \$26 million a year. This money would be used to replace the loss of state and federal funds and the current .25 tax millage.
